Goals & Policies

- Goals and policies drive the plan and set the direction of the City for mobility planning
- Goals: general policy direction
- Policies: specific statements guiding day-to-day actions
- Together they guide future mobility planning, actions and implementations



Goals & Policies - Key Updates

- Added multi-modal concepts
 - Improve conditions for pedestrians and bicyclists
 Added transit considerations
- Reference Complete Streets / Living Streets
- Emphasis on safety
- Parking
 - Address "right-sized" parking, shared parking arrangements, compliance with Street Master Plan



Goals & Policies - New

Goal – Incorporate Complete Streets methods into planning and design projects.

- Added a range of new policies
- Policies focus on:
 - Accommodating all users & maintaining safety
 - Safe bicycle & pedestrian facilities
 - Family-friendly routes
 - Encourage car-sharing/electric vehicles
 - Integrating funding/design of pedestrian/bicycle improvements
 - Improving connections to transit facilities
