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### **RECOMMENDATION:**

Staff recommends that the City Council proceed with the approval of City Council Assignments and the selection of the new Mayor and Mayor Pro Tem.

### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:**

There is no executive summary with the recommended action.

### FISCAL IMPLICATIONS:

There are no fiscal implications associated with the recommended action.

### **BACKGROUND:**

The City of Manhattan Beach was organized, formed, and incorporated under the laws of the State of California as a General Law city on December 2, 1912. The City has a "Council-Manager" form of government where the City Manager is appointed by the City Council and is the Chief Executive Officer of the municipal corporation. The City Council acts as the board of directors of the municipal corporation and meets in a public forum where citizens may participate in the governmental process. The Mayor serves as the chairperson of the City Council.

The City Council consists of five members, elected at-large on a non-partisan basis, who serve staggered four-year terms, with a two consecutive term limit. City elections are held the Tuesday following the first Monday of March, in odd numbered years. Every nine and a half months, the City Council conducts a reorganization at which time the Mayor and the Mayor Pro Tem are selected.

### **DISCUSSION:**

The Mayor is a member of the City Council and selected by a majority of the City Council every nine and a half months. As a member of the City Council, the Mayor shall have all the powers of a member. In addition, the Mayoral role is largely ceremonial as he or she attends public events on behalf of the City Council. It has also been the discretionary responsibility of each Mayor to review the standing list of City Councilmember assignments to various government and community-related committees and make assignment changes as he or she feels are necessary.

The Mayor Pro Tem is also a member of the City Council and is selected by a majority of the City Council every nine and a half months. The Mayor Pro Tem serves as backup to the Mayor, presides over the City Council meeting in the Mayor's absence, and attends events when the Mayor is unavailable.

### **CONCLUSION:**

Mayor Burton has served as Mayor since July 7, 2015, and will now return to City Council as a regular members this evening.

Staff recommends that the City Council proceed with the approval of City Council Assignments and the selection of the new Mayor and Mayor Pro Tem.

### **POLICY ALTERNATIVES:**

There are no policy alternatives with the recommended action.

# Manhattan Beach City Council Councilmember Assignments/Committee Descriptions

### City Council/Manhattan Beach Unified School District Ad Hoc Committee:

This committee is comprised of two Council members and two School Board members. The committee meets on an as needed basis, usually if there is a specific issue to deal with.

### Finance Subcommittee:

This committee is comprised of two Council members and the City Treasurer. The committee meets on a quarterly basis to discuss issues such as the investment report, the annual audit, the annual budget, and other finance-related issues. The Treasurer maintains regular contact with the Finance Department staff.

### South Bay Cities Council of Governments (SBCCOG)\*:

This is a joint powers authority of the 16 South Bay cities of Carson, El Segundo, Gardena, Hawthorne, Hermosa Beach, Inglewood, Lawndale, Lomita, Palos Verdes Estates, Rancho Palos Verdes, Redondo Beach, Rolling Hills, Rolling Hills Estates, Torrance and the Harbor City/San Pedro communities of the City of Los Angeles. Each member has one delegate. The group meets once a month (4th Thursday) to discuss issues of relevance to the South Bay cities such as legislation, transportation, and other such intergovernmental issues.

### South Bay Regional Public Communications Authority (RCC)\*:

This is a joint powers authority currently owned by the cities of Gardena, Hawthorne and Manhattan Beach (services are also provided to the city of Hermosa Beach under contract). The Board of Directors meets twice a year and is comprised of elected representatives from each city, executive staff and users from each city.

### <u>Independent Cities Association (ICA):</u>

ICA is a non-profit corporation established in 1961 by the full service cities (cities that provide their own police and/or fire services) in Southern California to represent the interests of the member cities collectively. ICA is governed by a 20-member Board of Directors elected by the member cities which meets once a month (1st Wednesday).

### <u>Independent Cities Risk Management Authority (ICRMA)\*:</u>

Established in 1980, the ICRMA is a joint powers authority that offers member cities excess liability, excess workers' compensation and property programs. ICRMA is directed by a governing board consisting of one representative from each of the 29 member cities and meets once a month (2<sup>nd</sup> Wednesday).

### Los Angeles County Sanitation Districts (LACSD)\*:

The Sanitation Districts are a confederation of independent special districts in LA County covering approximately 800 square miles and encompassing 78 cities within the County that construct, operate and maintain facilities to collect, treat, recycle, and dispose of sewage and industrial waste. There are 24 separate Sanitation Districts, each with a separate Board of Directors consisting of the mayor of each city within that District. The Board of Directors meets once per month (3<sup>rd</sup> Wednesday).

### Los Angeles County City Selection Committee:

This is an ad hoc group made up of elected representatives from each city in Los Angeles County (the mayor is the automatic delegate) that elects nominees to seats on regional boards (MTA, AQMD, etc.). The group meets on an as-needed basis.

### League of California Cities:

The LA County division of the League is made up of the 86 cities in LA County and provides information to assist in providing high-quality services to the cities and their citizens. All City Council members, City Managers, City Clerks and other staff are invited to attend the LA County Division meetings which take place on the 1st Thursday of every month.

### Southern California Association of Governments:

SCAG functions as the metropolitan planning organization for the six counties of Los Angeles, Orange, San Bernardino, Riverside, Ventura and Imperial. The General Assembly meets once a year and is attended by a representative from the City.

### Manhattan Beach Neighborhood Watch:

Neighborhood Watch Block Captain meetings are held monthly (3<sup>rd</sup> Monday). It is up to the committee chair and the City delegate to work out appropriate participation for the City representative. Attendance may also include a brief report/City update at the beginning of the meeting.

### Manhattan Beach Hometown Fair Association:

The annual Manhattan Beach Old Hometown Fair is organized by an all-volunteer, non-profit board of directors. The meeting schedule varies and is provided to the board members. It is up to the committee chair and the City delegate to work out appropriate participation for the City representative. Attendance may also include a brief report/City update at the beginning of the meeting.

### Manhattan Beach Sister City Committee:

The Sister City Committee is a non-profit organization dedicated to promoting goodwill, friendship, cultural, education, economic and people-to-people exchanges among the citizens of two cities. The agenda empowers private citizens as well as municipal officials, local businesses and civic organizations to foster true relationships with the people of both countries through community outreach programs. Manhattan Beach's sister city, Santa Rosalia in Baja California Sur, Mexico was selected in 1989. The Committee meets once a month (1st Monday). It is up to the committee chair and the City delegate to work out appropriate participation for the City representative. Attendance may also include a brief report/City update at the beginning of the meeting.

### Manhattan Beach Chamber of Commerce:

Established in 1941, the Chamber of Commerce is dedicated to promoting business and community through a mix of opportunities for business expansion, personal growth and community connection. The Board of Directors meets once a month (2<sup>nd</sup> Wednesday). It is up to the committee chair and the City delegate to work out appropriate participation for the City representative. Attendance may also include a brief report/City update at the beginning of the meeting.

### Downtown Manhattan Beach Business & Professional Association (DBPA):

The DBPA is a non-profit corporation established in 1985 which serves all business license holders in the downtown area except commercial property owners. The Association works on parking, transportation and community programs, marketing and advertising of the downtown and holds a variety of promotions and special events. The DBPA meets twice a month. It is up to the committee chair and the City delegate to work out appropriate participation for the City representative. Attendance may also include a brief report/City update at the beginning of the meeting.

### North Manhattan Beach Business Improvement District:

The North End BID (the area generally surrounding the Rosecrans Avenue and Highland Avenue intersection) was originally formed in 1969, and then reformed in 2004 with a broadened scope to address physical improvements to the district, signage, and marketing. It includes all business license holders in the defined area and has a 7-member board comprised of business owners within the BID boundaries which meets as needed. It is up to the committee chair and the City delegate to work out appropriate participation for the City representative. Attendance may also include a brief report/City update at the beginning of the meeting.

### Coastal Corridor Mobility Task Force:

Formerly known as the LAX Ground Committee, the task force is made up of cities impacted by LAX, specifically related to ground transportation. This committee meets on an as-needed basis.

### Los Angeles World Airport LAX/Community Noise Roundtable:

The Roundtable was created in September 2000 and is intended to reduce and mitigate the adverse noise impacts that the users of LAX create on the surrounding communities and their environs. Membership of the Roundtable consists of local elected officials, representatives of congressional offices, members of recognized community groups, the FAA, the ATA and LAWA management. The Roundtable meets the 2<sup>nd</sup> Wednesday of every odd numbered month.

### **RECOMMENDATION:**

It is recommended that the City Council adopt by Resolution the attached Side Letter Agreement with the Manhattan Beach Police Officers' Association (MBPOA) modifying Article 12(e) Special Pays - Training Officer Pay of the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU). The City Council adoption will authorize the City Manager to execute the Side Letter Agreement and take appropriate actions necessary to carry out the terms of the Side Letter Agreement.

### **FISCAL IMPLICATIONS:**

The fiscal impact of adding one additional Field Training Officer (FTO) assignment consists of the 5% specialty pay plus additional payroll costs associated with the specialty pay. The approximate cost of each additional FTO assignment made is \$6,137 on an annual basis. The actual cost may vary if the temporary assignment is less than one year and/or there are multiple temporary assignments made.

### **BACKGROUND:**

The MBPOA MOU for term of January 1, 2016 through December 31, 2018, which was adopted by Council on December 15, 2015 provides for a maximum of six (6) police officers allowed to be designated as Field Training Officers. This assignment provides for a 5% of actual base salary premium pay. Newly hired police officers are required to successfully complete a field training program under the direction and supervision of an FTO in order to pass probation, regardless of whether they are newly graduated from a police academy or an experienced hire new to the City of Manhattan Beach.

### **DISCUSSION:**

From time to time, the Police Department may have a temporary operational need to increase the number of Police Officers designated as FTO. This occurs when there is either a large number of newly hired officers and/or assigned FTO's are on leave. The purpose of this side letter is to amend the terms of the existing MOU and provide authority to the Chief of Police to temporarily increase the number of assigned FTO's when operational needs require it. These would be temporary assignments at the pleasure of the Police Chief, and the assignments may be terminated at any time when there is no longer an operational need.

### THE MANHATTAN BEACH POLICE OFFICERS' ASSOCIATION

This Side Letter of Agreement ("Agreement") between the City of Manhattan Beach ("City") and the Manhattan Beach Police Officers' Association ("POA") (collectively "Parties") is entered into with respect to the following:

WHEREAS, the City and the POA entered into a Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU") with the term of January 1, 2016 through December 31, 2018; and

WHEREAS, the MOU provides that the City agrees to pay a maximum of six (6) police officers who are designated as Field Training Officers, five percent (5%) of their base salary; and

WHEREAS, the City has advised the POA that it wishes to authorize the Police Chief to designate additional Field Training Officers due to several operational reasons, and the POA agrees that the Police Chief should have that discretion; and

WHEREAS, the parties wish to modify Article 12(E) "Training Officer Pay" to authorize the Police Chief to designate additional Field Training Officers; and

**NOW THEREFORE**, the parties agree as follows:

1. Article 12(E), **SPECIALTY PAYS/**<u>Training Officer Pay</u> is modified as can be seen with track changes below as follows:

### **ARTICLE 12: SPECIAL PAYS**

Specialty Pay assignments and compensation shall be as follows:

(e) <u>Training Officer Pay:</u> The City agrees to pay a maximum of six (6) police officers, who are designated as Field Training Officers (FTO's), 5% of the employee's actual base salary per month. The parties agree that to the extent permitted by law, Training Officer Pay is special compensation as defined by CalPERS regulations and shall be reported as such to CalPERS pursuant to Title 2 CCR, Section 571(a)(4) as Training Premium.

The Police Chief shall have the discretion to designate additional police officers (in addition to the maximum of six (6) provided for in the previous paragraph) as FTO's if needed. These additional FTO's will be assigned temporarily based on operational needs of the Department as determined by the Police Chief. These FTO's can be

removed at any time by the Police Chief. The officers designated as additional FTO's shall receive the pay (5% of the employee's actual base salary) for being designated as an FTO.

### **RECOMMENDATION:**

It is recommended that the City Council adopt Resolution Number 16-0028 appointing the City's primary and alternative representatives to the Independent Risk Management Authority ICRMA Governing Board.

### **FISCAL IMPLICATIONS:**

There are no fiscal implications associated with the recommended action.

### **BACKGROUND:**

The City of Manhattan Beach participates with nineteen (19) other cities in the ICRMA, a public risk pooling Joint Powers Authority (JPA). ICRMA provides the City with pooled and excess insurance coverage for the City's Workers' Compensation, General Liability, and Property programs as well as access to other ancillary coverages that include Cyber Risk, Crime Bond, and Equipment Breakdown. The ICRMA is governed by a Board of Directors that makes risk management decisions for the risk pool and directs professional staff in carrying out JPA initiatives.

### **DISCUSSION:**

On June 19, 2012 Council approved resolution 6366 appointing Councilmember Amy Howorth as the primary representative to ICRMA, Cathy Hanson (then Human Resources Director) as the alternate representative, and Christine Tomikawa (then Risk Manager) as

the substitute alternate. Traditionally, a councilmember has been one of the appointed representatives to the ICRMA board. However, the staff appointees generally attend meetings and engage in governance activities that impact the fiscal stability of the pool and the City. The current recommendation is to appoint staff members to the ICRMA board positions.

Risk management and risk pooling are complex disciplines that require specialized technical knowledge and experience to ensure program and funding stability. The staff members recommended for appointment are responsible for the day to day operations of the City's risk management functions. They have years of experience in working with the myriad of issues that arise in the governance of a risk pooling JPA. They have a comprehensive understanding of the interrelationship of the City's individual risk programs and the programs administered by the ICRMA. The Council would continue to be informed of any issues associated with the JPA activities.

### **POLICY ALTERNATIVES:**

### **ALTERNATIVE:**

Appoint one Councilmember as the substitute alternate in the place of Christine Tomikawa. An amended resolution would be provided for signature based on the direction of the Council if this approach is selected.

### PROS:

The Council would continue to have an opportunity to attend ICRMA meetings.

### CONS:

The staff level of involvement would diminish, which creates a dilution of knowledge, skills, and abilities in JPA governance. This would reduce the depth of competence at the staff level.

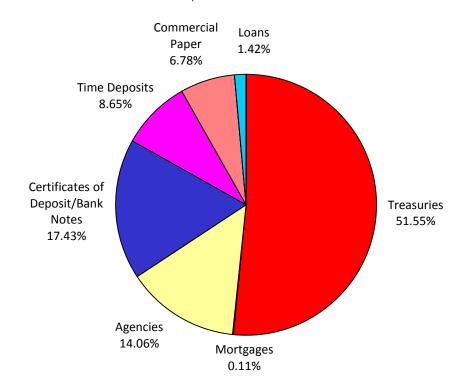

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

Staff recommends that the City Council waive further reading and introduce Ordinance No. 16-0004 repealing section 2.44.050 (Voting Procedure) of Chapter 2.44 (City Boards, Commissions and Committees) of Title 2 (Administration) of the Municipal Code and adopt Resolution No. 16-0032 memorializing the interview, appointment and voting process for City Boards, Commissions and Committees.

#### **FISCAL IMPLICATIONS:**

There are no fiscal impacts associated with the recommended action.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

At the February 2, 2016, City Council meeting, staff was directed to review the current interview, appointment and voting process to the City's Boards, Commissions and Committees, and return with recommendations to streamline the process.

At the April 7, 2016, City Council Retreat, staff was further directed to draft an ordinance repealing the codified voting procedure contained in Municipal Code Section 2.44.050 for City Boards, Commissions and Committees, and replace it with a process adopted by

resolution. City Council also instructed city staff to incorporate in that resolution a process for interviewing and appointing commissioners.

#### **DISCUSSION:**

The City Clerk's office conducted a survey of other cities to ascertain if there was a uniform 'best practice' which can be applied to the interview, appointment and voting process for the City's Boards, Commissions and Committees. The results of the survey revealed that there was no established 'best practice,' and each city surveyed had different procedures regarding their appointment process. However, using these results as a basis and in conjunction with direction from City Council, staff has developed several recommendations to help simplify the City's current appointment process. Below are the recommendations which have been incorporated into Resolution No. 16-0032:

- Interviews will be conducted at a City Council meeting, typically in the afternoon before the City's regular Tuesday night Council meeting.
- Start time for the interviews will be determined based off of the number of applicants for each vacancy.
- A defined set of interview questions will be drafted and reviewed by the Human Resources Director for impartiality prior to the scheduled interviews.
- Each candidate will interview with the entire City Council as a group.
- Interviews will be conducted in the City Council Chambers and will be recorded and broadcast for public viewing.
- Applicants will be called into the City Council Chambers one at a time for their respective interviews.
- After all interviews have been completed, City Council will deliberate and make appointments to each vacant seat based on a majority vote.

Resolution No. 16-0032 will now govern the interview, appointment and voting process for City Boards, Commissions and Committees. Changes or amendments to the resolution cab be done at one duly noticed council meeting, and can be effective immediately.

#### **PUBLIC OUTREACH/INTEREST:**

The City Clerk's office has posted notices of the revised application deadline and rescheduled interview date on the display boards at City Hall, posted to the City's website and e-notified. Additionally, a notice was advertised in the Beach Reporter in the April 14, 2016 edition and also distributed through the City's social media platforms, including Facebook and Twitter. The revised deadline to submit applications is now Friday, April 22, 2016, by 5:30 PM. Interviews of applicants originally scheduled for April 22, 2016, will now be rescheduled for Tuesday, May, 3, 2016, prior to the start of the Regular City Council meeting.

WHEREAS, the Manhattan Beach City Council is sensitive to the need for fairness in making appointments to boards, commissions, and committees;

WHEREAS, the Manhattan Beach City Council desires to appoint qualified, knowledgeable, and dedicated people to serve on its boards, commissions and committees:

WHEREAS, all appointments will be consistent with requirements of applicable law:

WHEREAS, the Municipal Code previously governed the process for appointments; and

WHEREAS, the purpose of this Resolution is to establish a fair, consistent, uniform and efficient process for making City Council appointments of members to the City's various boards, commissions and committees.

NOW THEREFORE THE MANHATTAN BEACH CITY COUNCIL DOES RESOLVE AS FOLLOWS

- <u>Section 1</u>. Interviews for vacant boards, commissions or committee seats will be conducted at a City Council meeting.
- <u>Section 2</u>. The start time for interviews will be determined based on the number of applicants for each vacancy.
- <u>Section 3</u>. A defined set of interview questions will be drafted and reviewed by the Human Resources Director for impartiality prior to the scheduled interviews.
  - Section 4. Each candidate will interview with the entire City Council as a group.

Section 5. Applicants will be called into the City Council Chambers one at a time for his or her interview. Section 6. Interviews will be conducted in the City Council Chambers. Section 7. After all interviews have been completed, City Council will deliberate and make appointments to each vacant seat based on a majority vote. Section 8. Each Councilmember may nominate not more than one (1) person for each vacancy, with each vacancy to be filled separately, and with each Councilmember commenting upon why he is making his particular nomination.

- A. Each Councilmember may cast one (1) or two (2) votes with not more than one (1) vote per nominee.
- B. Any nominee who receives one (1) or no votes will be eliminated.
- C. Each Councilmember may cast one (1) vote for any remaining nominee. Any nominee receiving three (3) votes, is appointed. If no nominee receives three (3) votes, the nominees who receive one (1) or no votes shall be eliminated and step (C) shall be repeated.

RECEIVE REPORT AND PROVIDE COMMENTS

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

Staff recommends that the City Council receive and provide comments on the Proposed Fiscal Year 2016-2017 to Fiscal Year 2020-2021 Five-Year Capital Improvement Plan (CIP).

#### **FISCAL IMPLICATIONS:**

Depending on City Council feedback, resources from transportation, water, sewer, stormwater, parking, and general funds may be impacted. The five-year 2017-2021 CIP includes 89 projects totaling \$107,465,686 from a variety of funding sources. The funding appropriation request for FY2016-2017 is \$9,906,500. Finance has confirmed that sufficient funds are available to finance these projects based on the preliminary Five Year Forecast.

While the total funding (carryover funds and new funds) represents a significant investment in the City's infrastructure, it is important to note that the wastewater (sewer) system projects (\$16,625,795), water system projects (\$32,919,755), and Sepulveda Bridge Widening Project (\$19,482,110) are a combined total \$69,027,660. Therefore, the wastewater projects, water projects, and Sepulveda Bridge Widening Project together make up approximately 64% of the overall (carryover funds and new funds) five-year Capital

Improvement Plan.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

The Capital Improvement Plan is a tool to assist the City Council to make capital project decisions. Most capital projects are long-term design-construction projects, and may require funding beyond one fiscal year. This is why a five-year plan is proposed to the City Council each year, so that long-term planning may be considered. The document is dynamic and may change as the City's priorities and needs change. The Capital Improvement Plan allows for multiyear systematic scheduling of local physical improvements based on sound planning, public demand for improvements, and the City's ability to fund the improvements.

Annually, the City Council considers and approves projects to be funded in the upcoming fiscal year. In addition, projects for the subsequent four years are listed, but funding is not approved until the appropriate fiscal year. However, review of subsequent year projects allows for the planning and budgeting of the improvements, communicates City Council intent, and assists in organization of capital and maintenance projects in future CIP work.

The following is a summary of City Council's most recent review of this item along with the upcoming PPIC and Planning Commission meetings that are important in the CIP approval process.

#### February 16, 2016 City Council Meeting

At their February 16, 2016 meeting, the City Council reviewed the first draft list of proposed projects for the FY17-21 Capital Improvement Plan.

#### Planning Commission

On April 27, 2016, the Planning Commission will review the proposed Fiscal Year 2017-2021 CIP. The Planning Commission's role is to evaluate the Capital Improvement Plan's General Plan conformance.

#### Parking and Public Improvements Commission (PPIC)

On April 28, 2016, the PPIC will review the proposed Fiscal Year 2017-2021 CIP. The PPIC's role in the CIP is to provide comments for City Council's consideration.

#### **DISCUSSION:**

The proposed five-year CIP includes 89 projects. This number is different from the February 19, 2016 meeting because Annual Program Projects such as the Slurry Seal, Curb & Gutter Replacement and Non-Motorized Projects have been consolidated to simplify tracking and accounting. Of the 89 total projects, seventeen (17) are brand new projects to the proposed five-year CIP (Attachment 1). In addition, there are seventeen (17) existing CIP projects that are in need of additional funding in FY2016-2017 (Attachment 2).

Projects in the City's Capital Improvement Plan are typically presented in two formats; projects are organized by project type and projects are organized by fund source. There are overarching considerations in each of the funding areas (Wastewater, Water, Stormwater, Streets/Transportation, Facilities, and Parking) that require discussion and direction. The Projects by Type spreadsheet is an excerpted section of the proposed Capital Improvement Plan and shows the entire five-year plan (Attachment No. 3).

#### Overview of FY 2017-2021 Capital Improvement Plan Funding Sources

There are multiple sources by which a project may be funded.

#### Water and Wastewater Funds

The Water and Wastewater Funds are used for repairs and improvements to the City's water and wastewater infrastructure. Proposed water and sewer projects were identified through Utility Master Plans completed in 2010. These plans indicated significant investment is required to assure the long-term dependability of the water and sewer systems.

#### Stormwater Funds

The Stormwater Funds are used for repairs and improvements to the City's storm drain system. The City's General Fund will subsidize the Stormwater Fund in FY16-17 due to a lack of revenue. With the new NPDES permit, the City's responsibility to create or improve solutions for storm drain pollution prevention is greatly increasing.

#### Capital Improvement Fund

Capital Improvement Funds are generated from General Funds and are distinguished from other funds as being more discretionary and not restricted to certain uses such as Water Funds or funds reserved in various dedicated fund types.

#### Gas Tax Fund and Measure R (Local Return Fund)

The City funds street improvement projects with the dollars it receives from various sources including State and County Gas Tax Funds. These funds are restricted and may only be used for street-related improvements. Annual street improvements typically include the Slurry Seal Program, the Concrete Curb, Gutter and Ramp program and arterial and collector pavement rehabilitation projects.

Beginning in 2009, the City began receiving Measure R Local Return funding. The funding is available, on a per-capita basis, through a Los Angeles County measure passed by voters in 2008. Funds may be used for street and transit purposes.

#### Parking Funds

The Parking Funds are used for repairs and improvements to the City's parking lots and meters. Funding is obtained through the city's parking meter program.

#### Overview of the FY2017-2021 Capital Improvement Plan

The following summary addresses each "type" of project. Attachment 3, the Projects by Type Spreadsheet, provides a five-year plan with project titles and individual costs of each project.

#### **Wastewater Projects**

The five-year CIP includes ten (10) Wastewater projects with \$100,000 in requested funding for FY2016-2017.

- The FY2016-17 requested funding is for the design for the Spot Repairs of Gravity Sewer Mains in Areas 5, 6 & 7.

#### Water Projects

The five-year CIP includes eleven (11) Water projects with \$3,835,000 in requested funding for FY2016-2017.

 The FY2016-17 requested funding is for Painting the Block 35 Elevated Tank, the Peck Ground Level Reservoir Replacement, Redrilling and Equipping Well 15 and a proposed brand new project to allow for Water Meter Upgrade and Automation.

#### Stormwater Projects

The five-year CIP includes one (1) Stormwater project with \$210,000 in requested funding for FY2016-2017.

- The current stormwater fee (from the Utility Service Charge) only funds a portion of operational costs. Current allocations are not sufficient to fund needed infrastructure replacements and are not expected to meet the future needs of the system improvements based on the NPDES permit requirements.
- The FY2016-17 requested funding is for continued funding for Stormwater Quality Improvement Catch Basin Inserts and Storm Drain Repairs. Drainage projects on Laurel and at 14th / Magnolia have been added to the scope of work for the existing Storm Drain Repair project.

#### Streets/Transportation

The five-year CIP includes forty-one (41) Streets/Transportation projects with \$4,030,000 in requested funding for FY2016-2017.

 The FY2016-17 requested funding is for capacity enhancements, pedestrian and safety improvements, concrete repairs, asphalt pavement projects and traffic signal improvements.

#### Facilities (CIP Fund and Special Revenues Fund)

The five-year CIP includes twenty-three (23) Facilities projects with \$877,000 in requested funding for FY2016-2017.

 The FY2016-17 requested funding is for workspace modifications, design for the Village Field Turf Replacement Project, the Ceramics Studio Renovation, and the Fiber Master Plan.

#### **Parking Projects**

The five-year CIP includes six (6) Parking projects with \$854,500 in requested funding for FY2016-2017.

- The FY2016-17 requested funding is for Parking Structure Rehabilitation and Reinvestment and Pier Lot Safety Lighting.

#### Tentative FY 2017-2021 Capital Improvement Plan Schedule

# Measure R Local Return: Measure R is a one-half cent (0.5%) sales tax approved by Los Angeles County voters in November 2008 to meet the transportation needs of Los Angeles County. Local Return: Measure R Local Return funds are provided to cities on a per capita basis. The City began receiving these funds in January 2010 and should receive an estimated \$330,000 per year. The funds can be used for street maintenance, bicycle and pedestrian facilities and transit purposes. Measure R South Bay Highway: A portion of Measure R is allocated to 17 regional project group categories. South Bay agencies will receive funding under the subcategory entitled "Interstate 405, I-110, I-105, and SR-91 Ramp and Interchange Improvements (South Bay)". It is estimated that \$906 million will be available to South Bay agencies over 30 years to fund capacity improvements that benefit the state highway system. Eligibility provisions in the measure have been interpreted to include routes parallel to state highways as well. Safetea-Lu: Federal transportation legislation entitled "Sale, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient Transportation Equity Act: A Legacy for Users" (Safetea-Lu: Federal transportation legislation entitled "Sale, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient Transportation systems." State Pier & Parking Fund: The State Pier & Parking Lot Fund is used to account for the operation and maintenance of the Manhattan Beach Pier, comfort station, and four adjacent parking lots. These properties are owned by the State, but Stormwater Fund: The Stormwater Fund is used to account for the maintenance of and improvements to, the City's storm drains. Revenues are derived from a storm drain assessment to property owners, which is based on size and use of the parcel, and collected through the property tax roles. Prop A & C Funds: The Proposition A and C Funds are used to account for proceeds from the half-cent sales taxes generated by the approval of Propositions A and C by Los Angeles County voters. These funds, which are administered by the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (MTA), are distributed based on population and must be used for transportation-related projects. Revenues are disbursed by the Water Fund: The Water Fund is used to account for the operation of the City's water utility system. Revenues are generated from user fees, which are adjusted periodically to meet the costs of administration, operation, maintenance, and capital improvements to the system. Capital Improvement Fund: The Capital Improvement Fund is used to account for capital projects not eligible for funding from other specific funding sources. Funding sources are derived from various sources such as grant funds or transfers from the General Fund. Gas Tax Fund: The Gas Tax Fund is used to account for the City's share of state and county gasoline tax collection in accordance with the provisions of the State of California Streets and Highway Code. State based on population and must be used towards the maintenance and repair of City streets that serve as State and County thoroughfares. Wastewater Fund: The Wastewater Fund is used to account for the maintenance of and improvements to, the City's sewer system. Revenues are derived from a user charge placed on the water bills. FY2017-2021 Capital Improvement Plan by Type Parking Fund: The Parking Fund is used to account for the general operations and maintenance of City parking lots and spaces. 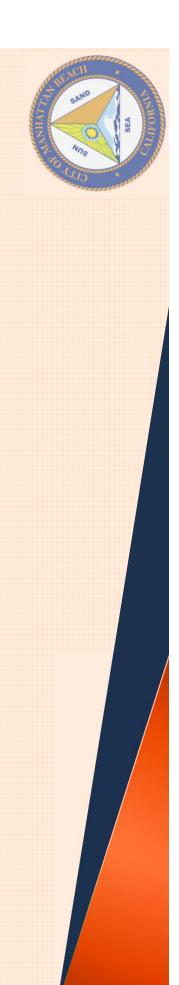

## **DISCUSS**

## **RECOMMENDATION:**

Staff recommends that the City Council receive report and discuss free WiFi in the Parks and Municipal Broadband Networks Fiber.

## FISCAL IMPLICATIONS:

Information Technology's current budget includes \$273,000 for the Wide Area Network (WAN) expansion project. These funds should be sufficient for the WAN and WiFi expansion projects if the Council provides direction to deploy WiFi to the identified locations. The WAN initiative is an approved Information Systems Master Plan (ISMP) project.

## **BACKGROUND:**

At the August 4, 2015 City Council meeting, Staff was directed to explore expansion of the City's network in support of free public WiFi at City facilities and Parks. At the March 1, 2016 City Council meeting, Council also requested that Staff provide an update on the benefits of a Municipal Broadband Network for the City of Manhattan Beach.

## **DISCUSSION:**

## Free Public WiFi

The following discussion provides information on existing WiFi in City facilities as well as the current plan to expand WAN to some City parks and the possibility of deploying WiFi to those sites.

As background, the City recently began offering free WiFi access at the following City

facilities: City Hall, Police Department, Fire Station, Joslyn Community Center, Public Works City Yard, Manhattan Heights and MB Art Center. In addition to these facilities, the City Council directed staff, via the Fiscal Year 14-15 budget process, to expand Wide Area Network (WAN) to several parks and remote locations, which include, Begg Pool, Live Oak Tennis Office, Marine Avenue Park, Marine Park Sports Complex, Polliwog Park, Sand Dune Park, and Mira Costa High School Pool and Tennis Courts. These sites were targeted for WAN extension to accommodate Parks and Recreation activities such as general class registration, tennis court reservations, aquatics membership and afterschool programs. The completion of this Master Plan project will leverage the increase in bandwidth not only to support ActiveNet reservation system and access to the City's enterprise applications. Information Technology has received cost estimates of approximately \$150,000 for the WAN expansion project that are considerably less than the approved budgeted amount of \$273,000.

The WAN expansion offers an abundance of bandwidth that can be scalable to meet staff requirements and also provide free public WiFi access at the above locations. WiFi is a logical extension of local and wide area network services. The estimates received for implementing WiFi at the above mentioned locations are approximately \$100,000 which is well within the budgeted amount of \$273,000. The attached powerpoint presentation provides a map of the locations that staff would recommend for phase I WiFi deployment should the Council wish to move forward with this option.

Tentative Timeline (depended on Council direction regarding WiFi)

- May-June 2016 timeframe: Issue a Request for Proposal (RFP) for WAN expansion (with WiFi capability)
- December 2016: WAN expansion (with WiFi capability) projected to be completed at the above remote sites, which will conclude Phase 1 of the project.

Depending on the remaining funds, staff may also explore and review options for extending WiFi to the remaining sites (Larsson Street Parquette, 8th Street Parquette, Bruce's Beach, Veteran Parkway and Manhattan Village Field) for Council consideration.

## Municipal Broadband Networks

On March 1, 2016, City Council requested that Staff provide an overview and benefits of municipal broadband technologies which are identified below. The term "broadband" is used to describe high speed and high quality Internet access which is always available. Broadband speed is measured in megabits per second (Mbps). The minimum speed for defining broadband as set by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) in 2010 is 4 Mbps. Broadband access can be delivered via different platforms such as cable modem, digital subscriber line (DSL), and fiber optics (Fiber). Fiber is considered the fastest infrastructure for broadband access because it has the ability to transmit data across long distances at high data transfer rates.

For the most part, private companies have traditionally been responsible for deploying the infrastructure required to provide Internet access to communities. However, they have not invested in the infrastructure to deliver high speed broadband (speeds greater than 100 Mbps) via a fiber network. Experts agree that these companies have not invested in the infrastructure because there is no significant profit to be gained from upgrading service for

an existing customer base. Providing a faster or more reliable (or both) connection does not necessarily result in additional revenue. In an effort to satisfy this unserved need, local governments across the nation are analyzing the benefit of investing in municipal broadband/fiber infrastructures.

There are several benefits of investing in a fiber infrastructure. The City can use strands to support connectivity between City facilities, WiFi in public spaces, traffic management, community cameras, LED street lights, parking meters and other Smart City initiatives that require bandwidth. The remaining dark fiber strands (dark = unused strands) can be used as an economic development stimulus tool by supplying high speed Internet access to businesses who have that requirement. This typically includes businesses in the entertainment, video gaming, and social media industries. Offering high speed broadband has been viewed as a competitive edge by providing a service that is not typically available in neighboring areas. Businesses that require extensive bandwidths for conducting business are able to capitalize on the community's infrastructure investment. According to a national survey, broadband access is becoming one of the most important decision factors for the selection of a commercial site after price, parking, and location. In many cases, access to high speed Internet can also dictate location.

To move these fiber initiatives forward, local municipalities have contracted with consulting firms to assist with the development of a Fiber Network Design and Business Plan. Their core mission is to assist agencies with analyzing feasibility and determining economic projections for deploying a fiber network. The consultant companies also explore the benefits/risks and feasibility of deploying a fiber network that can be used to provide high speed Internet access to Manhattan Beach businesses and residents. Project deliverables typically include:

- High Level Network Infrastructure Design
- Potential Business Model and Strategy
- Preliminary Financial Model to Assist with Identifying Opportunities and Risks
- Finalized Project Report Summarizing Findings and Recommendations

## Manhattan Beach Fiber/Data Network

The City currently has limited access to fiber; the City-owned fiber extends to the City facilities listed below:

- Civic Center (Police Department, Fire Station 1, and City Hall)
- Public Works City Yard
- Joslyn Center Community Center
- Fire Station 2
- Manhattan Heights
- · Manhattan Beach Art Center
- Public Works Metlox Office
- Block 35
- Peck Reservoir

## **Policy Alternatives:**

Option 1: Use the WAN expansion savings to implement Phase 1 of free public WiFi at the sites

## listed above

- Pros:
  - Provide free WiFi access for residents and those visiting City facilities.
  - Increased staff efficiency to assist residents to register for classes, take reservations, and improve access to City enterprise applications.
- Cons: There are no foreseen cons at this time.

## **PUBLIC OUTREACH:**

A campaign has been launched to promote the public facilities where free WiFi is currently being offered by installing signage identifying its availability at each City facility. The Information Technology Department will continue to promote free public WiFi access at City sites through the following methods:

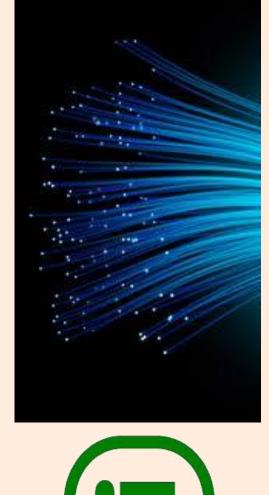

## FREE WIFI in the Parks & BUILDING A MUNICIPAL BROADBAND NETWORK



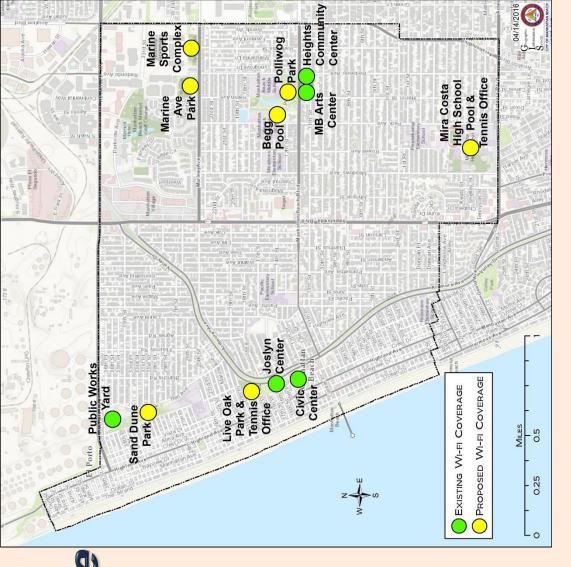

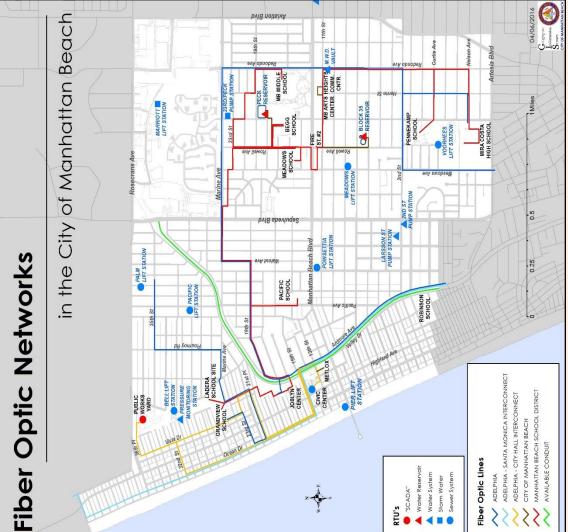

## **BACKGROUND:**

The Manhattan Beach Capital Improvements Corporation (CIC) was formed in 1996 to facilitate issuance of debt for improvements to the water and wastewater system. Most recently, the CIC was the conduit for the refunding of the Metlox Public Improvements (2003), the Water/Wastewater projects (1996), and the Police/Fire Facility (2004) Certificates of Participation (COPs).

## **DISCUSSION:**

The bylaws of the Corporation state that the President and Vice President of the Corporation must be elected from the members of the City Council. Typically, the current Mayor serves as the President, with the Mayor Pro Tem serving as the Vice President. Appointed positions include the City Manager serving as the CIC's Chief Administrative Officer, and the City's Finance Director serving as the Chief Financial Officer.

With the change of Mayor and Mayor Pro Tem on the agenda for the April 19th City Council meeting, staff recommends that the CIC board of directors elect a new President and Vice

President.
