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COVID-19 Situation Report

NOVEMBER 24, 2020

CURRENT INITIATIVES AND UPDATES

- Where L.A. County Stands on the States Tier System As of November 24, 2020, Los Angeles County remains in Tier One (Purple), with "widespread" risk and the most restrictions. According to the State's website, L.A. County reflects 31.9, an increase from 20.6 new COVID-19 cases per day (per 100K), with an adjusted case rate for tier assignment equaling 16.0. The County's overall test positivity rate increased from 5.3% to 6.6%.
- Celebrate Thanksgiving Safely The City of Manhattan Beach wishes everyone a safe and happy Thanksgiving. As you gather for the holiday, residents are encouraged to reduce risk and plan smaller, shorter, and safer celebrations:
 - o Wear a <u>face covering</u> in public settings, at events and gatherings, shopping and in stores, and anywhere you will be around people who do not live with you.
 - Wear a <u>face covering</u> not only people you do not know but also with anyone you do not live with, including close friends and family.
 - Keep your <u>distance</u> especially from older family members and those with chronic health conditions.
 - When indoors, <u>keep windows and doors open</u> so fresh air circulates and wear a face covering.
 - Use all the space you can indoors; spread things out.
 - o Do not share utensils or drinks with anyone.
 - o Commit to keeping gatherings short, whether inside or outside. Shorter is safer.
 - People at higher risk of severe illness or death from COVID-19 (such as older adults and people with chronic medical conditions) are strongly urged not to attend any gatherings, especially indoor gatherings. If you gather with older people or those with chronic conditions, make sure they wear a surgical or N95 mask.
 - o It is <u>safest to celebrate the holidays with the people who already live with you</u>, but if you invite others, only invite a maximum of two other households to your gathering.
 - Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, or use hand sanitizer. Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth.
 - o Stay home if you are sick.

FEDERAL, STATE, AND COUNTY UPDATES

- Actions in Response to COVID-19:
 - O Governor Newsom released "Recovery for All," the final report by the Task Force on Business and Jobs Recovery. The report outlines key priorities and challenges in the State's fight against COVID-19 and ongoing work to rebuild a more equitable, sustainable, and resilient economy in its wake. With cases on the rise globally, nationally, and in California, the report reaffirms the importance of the State's health-first approach as the foundation for a safe and sustainable re-opening.
 - O Governor Gavin Newsom announced the launch of \$25 million in the <u>California</u> Rebuilding Fund to support small businesses rebuild from the economic crisis and keep local economies strong. This program is built to be a resource in the market for the next year as businesses pivot and recover. The Fund was developed as a result of

recommendations from the Governor's Task Force on Business and Jobs Recovery, which emphasized the need to ensure that this economic recovery is equitable.

- California Rebuilding Fund Loan Application Open to Small Businesses As a result of the program launch by the Governor's Task Force, small business owners can apply for a loan at CALoanFund.org., which will collect standard information about your business and match you with a community lender. Free advisory support alongside a network of business support organizations organized by the California Association of Micro Enterprise Opportunity (CAMEO), Small Business Majority, California's Small Business Development Centers, and Women's Business Centers is also provided. The program is not associated with the federal Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) or any other Small Business Administration program. Learn more at CALoanFund.org.
- Community Committee to Ensure Equitable Vaccine Distribution The California Department of Public Health (CDPH) announced the Community Vaccine Advisory Committee members. The Committee will provide input and feedback for the ongoing planning and engagement efforts to ensure equitable vaccine distribution and allocation. Vaccine supplies will be limited in the beginning and will be distributed to those at the highest risk. The Committee is comprised of broad representation from organizations throughout California. - COVID-19 Impact on Childcare: Employers, Providers, and Working Parents The U.S.
 Chamber of Commerce Foundation is hosting a webinar titled COVID-19 Impact on Childcare:
 Employers, Providers, and Working Parents on Wednesday, December 9 at noon. Childcare
 challenges, already persistent and complex, have now been further complicated by the COVID19 public health crisis. Parents are trying to balance childcare and work. Childcare providers are
 trying to stay open or re-open with an unsustainable new business model. Employers are trying
 to determine how and when their working parents can return to work. For more information and

- Guidance Update for Multifamily Residences L.A. County Department of Public Health (DPH) has updated its <u>Guidance for Multifamily Residences</u>. As COVID-19 continues to spread in Los Angeles County, apartment managers, and management companies need to consider their communities' impact and address employee and resident concerns of potential exposure at their place of work and home. The guidance provides general considerations and may need to be tailored for individual apartments and multifamily residential structures. Everyone's help is needed in slowing the spread of COVID-19 in multifamily residences with fitness areas and follow protocols for community <u>gyms</u>, <u>tennis courts</u>, and <u>swimming pools</u>. - Keeping Elderly Congregate Living Facilities Safe DPH has updated its Frequently Asked Questions for Elderly Congregate Living Visitors and Elderly Congregate Living Residents. Visits from family and friends are important to the wellbeing of older adults living in congregate facilities. However, because visitors can introduce COVID-19 into facilities, alternative visitation methods are suggested, such as telephone or videoconferencing. The update includes resources for coping with stress through links to L.A. County Department of Mental Health's COVID-19 webpage, the 211LA webpage to address mental health and wellbeing needs and concerns, and the CDC's Coping with Stress webpage.
- Traveler Form for Non-Essential Travel To help stop the spread of COVID-19, Los Angeles requires all travelers entering the city from another state or country to complete the online

Traveler Form, acknowledging they have read and understood <u>California's Travel Advisory</u>. Travelers should practice self-quarantine for 14 days after arrival. These persons should limit their interactions to their immediate household. This recommendation does not apply to individuals who cross state or country borders for essential travel. Travelers over the age of 16 must submit this form online before or upon arrival at Los Angeles International Airport, Van Nuys Airport, or Union Station. Failure to submit the form is punishable by a fine of up to \$500. Visit <u>travel.lacity.org</u> for more information.

- L.A. County Daily Briefing Statistics on COVID-19 L.A. County Department of Public Health (DPH) confirmed 51 new deaths, one new case of COVID-19 in Manhattan Beach, and 3,692 new cases of COVID-19 in L.A. County in Today's Daily Report. This is the highest number of deaths reported since September 9. COVID-19 hospitalizations continue to accelerate at an alarming speed. There are 1,575 people with COVID-19 currently hospitalized, and 26% of these people are in the ICU. Just two weeks ago, there were 888 people with COVID-19 hospitalized. The increases in cases and hospitalizations must slow to avoid overwhelming our hospitals and healthcare staff and save lives. Anytime a person removes their mask and interacts in close distance with others not in their household, even outdoors, they risk either infecting another person with COVID-19 or becoming infected themselves. The longer that interaction, the higher the risk of COVID-19 spread. Everyone must follow the simple public health safety measures that provide protection from COVID-19 and minimize spreading it to friends and family. DPH advises everyone to stay home as much as possible and limit going out to what is essential for the next two to three weeks to slow the surging cases and save lives. Staying home as much as possible, always wearing a face covering securely over your nose and mouth when out, and avoiding being near anyone not in your household are the simple actions that slow the spread of COVID-19. To date, DPH has identified 374,134 positive cases of COVID-19 across all L.A. County areas and a total of 7,497 deaths.
