# **COVID-19 Situation Report**

**JANUARY 26, 2021** 

### CURRENT INITIATIVES AND UPDATES

- City Unveils Loan Program to Assists Local Small Businesses Impacted by COVID-19 In response to businesses facing decreased revenues and possible closures following coronavirus restrictions, the City of Manhattan Beach has created a \$250,000 fund to assist local small businesses by offering loans up to \$10,000. The City Council established the fund to help local small businesses in the City of Manhattan Beach. The loan program will begin accepting applications on Wednesday, January 27, on a first-come, first-served basis until all funds are exhausted. The amount of assistance will range from \$2,500 to \$10,000. Visit <a href="citymb.info/covidloans">citymb.info/covidloans</a> for details.
- County to Align with State Restrictions Following Governor Action On Monday, January 25, 2021, Governor Gavin Newsom lifted the Regional Stay-At-Home order for the State of California based on the State's four-week projection indicating that ICU capacities in all regions meeting the 15% minimum bed availability requirement. This has returned all California counties, including Los Angeles County, to the color-coded tiered system in the Blueprint for a Safer Economy. Following the State's action, Los Angeles County reinstated the Health Officer Order issued on November 25 and plans to issue an additional Health Officer Order on Friday to allow outdoor dining to resume on January 29 fully align with all the sector openings permitted in the purple tier. However, effective immediately, the following services/activities may resume with the proper safety protocols in place per the Health Officer Order.
  - o Private gatherings outdoors up to three households and up to a total of 15 people
  - o Museums, zoos, aquariums outdoor operations at 50% occupancy
  - o Cardrooms outdoor operations at 50% occupancy
  - o Miniature golf, go karts, batting cages outdoor operations at 50% occupancy
  - o Outdoor recreational activities are open
  - o Hotels & motels for tourism and individual travel allowed
  - o Fitness facilities open for outdoor operations
  - o Personal care services open indoors at 25% capacity
  - o Indoor mall, shopping center, lower-risk retail open at 25% indoor capacity; food courts and common areas closed.
- Beach Cities Health District Seeks Volunteers Beach Cities Health District (BCHD) is looking
  for medical and non-medical volunteers to assist with COVID-19 objectives. Positions include
  vaccinations, testings, and positive result phone calls; time commitment varies. Visit

- AARP Tax-Aide Returns to Assist Manhattan Beach Older Adults in 2021 The IRS has
  delayed the tax filing season to begin February 12, 2021. The <u>AARP Foundation Tax-Aide</u> will be
  providing free tax preparation service for the upcoming tax season, including in Manhattan
  Beach. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, there will be changes in the way Tax-Aide will offer

service, abiding by all safety standards. Starting February 3, the AARP Tax-Aide phone line (424) 256-5194 will open to assist callers in initiating the process. Callers will receive a packet of information emailed to them. If the caller does not have an email, other arrangements will be made. Tax-Aide phone hours are Monday through Friday, 9:00 AM to 2:30 PM. The first day for scanning tax-related documents in Manhattan Beach will be February 17. Do not show up to have your documents scanned without first contacting AARP Tax-Aide. AARP Tax-Aide will begin doing Tax Returns remotely, starting February 15. Tax-Aide developed a program that provides the capability to prepare returns in a safe, minimal contact manner.

- Register for MyTurn.CA.gov Register to find out when it's your turn to get vaccinated at MyTurn.ca.gov. My Turn is currently a pilot in the Los Angeles and San Diego counties and will be statewide in February. The technology is from California companies Salesforce and Skedulo and implemented by Accenture. The new system lets Californians learn when they are eligible to be vaccinated and provide the functionality to make an appointment when the resident is eligible. Healthcare providers will use My Turn to automatically share data on vaccines received and administered with the State, reducing reporting lag times.
- Where L.A. County Stands on the States Tier System On Monday, January 25, the State lifted the Regional Stay at Home Order and moved all counties back into the Blueprint for a Safer Economy the criteria used to loosen and tighten regulations on activities. This action comes as projected ICU availability rose above 15%. The State updated tier assignments today. Los Angeles County remains in Tier One (Purple), with "widespread" risk and the most restrictions. According to the State's website, L.A. County reflects 96.5 new COVID-19 cases per day (per 100K), with an adjusted case rate for tier assignment equaling 48.2. The County's overall test positivity rate is 13.9%. The health equity metric is 18.3%.

## FEDERAL, STATE, AND COUNTY UPDATES

- Updated National Strategy to Beat COVID-19 President Biden and Vice President Harris
  have unveiled a seven-point plan to beat COVID-19. The <u>National Strategy for the COVID-19</u>
  Response and Pandemic Preparedness January 21, 2021 document may be downloaded and
  viewed from WhiteHouse.gov. The seven points in the Biden-Harris Strategy Plan are highlighted
  below:
  - 1. Ensure all Americans have access to regular, reliable, and free testing.
  - 2. Fix personal protective equipment (PPE) problems for good.
  - 3. Provide clear, consistent, evidence-based guidance for how communities should navigate the pandemic and the resources for schools, small businesses, and families to make it through.
  - 4. Plan for the effective, equitable distribution of treatments and vaccines because development isn't enough if they aren't effectively distributed.
  - 5. Protect older Americans and others at high risk.
  - 6. Rebuild and expand defenses to predict, prevent, and mitigate pandemic threats, including those coming from China.
  - 7. Implement mask mandates nationwide by working with governors and mayors and by asking the American people to do what they do best: stepping up in a time of crisis.
- Actions in Response to COVID-19 The State addressed several measures in response to the pandemic:
  - o Governor Newsom announced a series of improvements to the State's vaccination plan to simplify, standardize and address supply needs based on lessons learned to increase vaccination pace. The Governor promoted the use of My Turn, a system for Californians to know when they are eligible to be vaccinated and a place to make an appointment when eligible. The system also tracks vaccination data. Healthcare providers will use My Turn to automatically share vaccine data received and administered with the State, reducing lag times.
  - o Governor Newsom and legislative leaders issued a joint statement on the extension of the eviction moratorium through June 30, 2021. The State is moving as quickly as possible to deploy California's share of the latest federal stimulus bill to ensure that up to \$2.6 billion in renter aid is administered equitably.
  - Governor Newsom signed an executive order in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, extending the validity of medical cannabis identification cards that would otherwise have expired.

- Additional Cases Reported of Multisystem Inflammatory Syndrome in Children (MIS-C)-L.A. County Public Health (DPH) recently reported eight additional cases of Multisystem Inflammatory Syndrome in Children (MIS-C). This brings the total cases of MIS-C in L.A. County to 62 children, including one child death. All 62 children with MIS-C in L.A. County were hospitalized, and 45% of the children were treated in the ICU. Of the children with MIS-C, 31% were under the age of 5 years old, 37% were between the ages of 5 and 11 years old, and 32% were between 12 and 20 years old. Latino/Latinx children account for nearly 74% of the reported cases. Most children exposed to or infected with SARS-CoV-2, the virus that causes COVID-19, develop only a mild form of the illness. However, others develop MIS-C, a severe, sometimes fatal, inflammation of organs and tissues, including the heart, lungs, kidneys, brain, skin, and eyes or gastrointestinal organs resulting in lifelong health impacts. While not all children will have every MIS-C symptom, the symptoms include fever, abdominal pain, vomiting, diarrhea, neck pain, rash, bloodshot eyes, and or feeling extra tired. If you believe your child is displaying MIS-C symptoms, contact your primary care or an urgent care provider. Seek emergency care for critical or lifethreatening conditions. If you do not have a primary care provider, dial 2-1-1, and L.A. County will help connect you to one. - L.A. County Daily Briefing Statistics on COVID-19 DPH confirmed 291 new deaths, six new cases of COVID-19 in Manhattan Beach, and 5,927 new cases in <u>Today's Daily Report</u>. To date, DPH identified 1,085,044 positive cases of COVID-19 across all areas of L.A. County and a total

of 15,592 deaths. There are 6,307 people with COVID-19 currently hospitalized, and 25% of these people are in the ICU. Testing results are available for approximately 5,410,000 individuals, with 19% of all people testing positive. To view DPH's COVID-19 Daily Data, visit lacounty.gov.
