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COVID-19 Situation Report

CURRENT INITIATIVES AND UPDATES

- Our Community, Our Loss Sadly, the L.A. County Department of Public Health (DPH) confirmed another resident from Manhattan Beach passed Saturday of COVID-19. This brings the deaths in Manhattan Beach to 14 residents. The City sends our deepest sympathies to every person experiencing the sorrow of losing a loved one to COVID-19.
- Manhattan Avenue Street Closure To allow additional social distancing at restaurants offering outdoor dining in the public right-of-way, Manhattan Avenue between Manhattan Beach Boulevard and 12th Street will be closed to vehicles beginning Friday, February 12. However, please keep in mind, set up for the closure may begin on Thursday, February 11. The City encourages residents and motorists to take Highland Avenue for north-south travel. Center Place will remain open for east-west traffic but should be used for local traffic only. Visit citymb.info for details.
- Celebrate Presidents Weekend Safely, Mind the Travel Advisory With the upcoming Lunar New Year, Valentine's Day, and Presidents Day, DPH advises against non-essential travel and gatherings with people not from your household. COVID-19 surged after Thanksgiving and Christmas travel in November and December. The more people travel, the more interactions they have with individuals outside their household, the greater the risk of getting and spreading COVID-19. Shared transportation, including travel by air, bus, or rail, can put travelers at stake and all community members if infected travelers spread COVID-19 to others after returning to Los Angeles County. A travel advisory remains in effect for L.A. County. Anyone arriving in Los Angeles County must self-quarantine for ten days; please stay at your home or lodging for the ten days and avoid contact with others. If you must travel, please plan accordingly. Know how widespread COVID-19 is at your destination. It is critical not to travel if you are sick. Residents should stay home if experiencing symptoms, have not finished their isolation period after testing positive for COVID-19, or have not finished their quarantine period after being exposed, or likely have been exposed to someone positive for COVID-19. - Provide Input on the City's Budget and Funding Priorities The annual budget is one of the most important documents the City produces. It provides a financial plan and a framework for priority issues while maintaining core services like maintenance, public safety, and infrastructure. The City is preparing recommendations to the City Council for the annual budget and wants to know your priorities. Learn how the City expends funds, examine where revenue stems from, prioritize infrastructure projects, provide input on addressing COVID-19 impacts, and budget where to "spend a dollar" worth of the City's general fund. - Library Resources for Job Seekers Funded by the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act, L.A. County Library announced the continuation of its Work Ready series, a

workforce development program for Library customers looking to build job skills or discover new career opportunities. The weekly virtual Work Ready programs cover topics ranging from writing cover letters and interviewing to identifying high-growth careers and working from home. The webinars, conducted by special guest presenters and L.A. County Library staff, provide valuable tools and information to individuals seeking to expand their skill sets. • Where L.A. County Stands on the States Tier System – The State updated tier assignments today under its <u>Blueprint for a Safer Economy</u> – the criteria used to loosen and tighten regulations on activities. While <u>Los Angeles County remains in Tier One</u> (Purple), with "widespread" risk and the <u>most restrictions</u>, there has been an improvement for the past two weeks. According to the State's website, L.A. County reflects 42.5 new COVID-19 cases per day (per 100K), decreasing from 61.2, with an adjusted case rate for tier assignment equaling 31.7. The County's overall test positivity rate decreased from 11.3% to 9.5%. The <u>health equity metric</u> also reduced from 15.0% to 13.0%. FEDERAL, STATE, AND COUNTY UPDATES

- Ways YOU Can Build Your COVID-19 Vaccine Confidence Studies show that COVID-19 vaccines effectively keep you from getting COVID-19. Experts also think that getting a COVID-19 vaccine may help keep you from getting seriously ill even if you do not get COVID-19. - **Update on MIS-C** –Today, DPH confirmed nine additional cases of Multisystem Inflammatory Syndrome in Children (MIS-C). The total number of MIS-C in L.A. County is now 75 children, including one child death. All children with MIS-C in L.A. County were hospitalized; 44% were treated in the ICU. Of the children with MIS-C, 32% were under the age of 5 years old, 39% were between the ages of 5 and 11 years old, and 29% were between 12 and 20 years old. Most children exposed to or infected with SARS-CoV-2, the virus that causes COVID-19, develop only a mild form of the illness. However, others develop MIS-C, a severe, sometimes fatal,

inflammation of organs and tissues, including the heart, lungs, kidneys, brain, skin, and eyes or gastrointestinal organs resulting in lifelong health impacts. While not all children will have every MIS-C symptom, the symptoms include fever, abdominal pain, vomiting, diarrhea, neck pain, rash, bloodshot eyes, and or feeling extra tired. Parents should contact their child's doctor, nurse, or clinic right away if their child shows MIS-C symptoms. Visit cdc.gov for more information on MIS-C.

- Report on Economic Impact of COVID-19 The Los Angeles County Department of Workforce Development, Aging and Community Services (WDACS) released a 50-page report, title Pathways for Economic Resiliency: Los Angeles County 2021-2026, an in-depth report on the economic impacts of COVID-19 and the most viable recovery pathways for the County's industries, workers, and communities. The report identified 1) L.A. County lost 437,000 jobs in 2020, 2) There will be 354,000 fewer living wage jobs in 2021 compared to the pre-pandemic economy, and 3). For the entire L.A. County workforce to achieve a satisfactory standard of living, 738,672 living wage jobs would need to be created. The report was commissioned by WDACS and was drafted by the nonprofit Los Angeles County Economic Development Corporation (LAEDC). Visit laedc.org to view the Executive Summary and more information.
- Institutes of Health (NIH), NIH Director, Dr. Collins states that while it is possible some COVID-19 vaccines may offer less protection against some of the new variants, and recent results have suggested the AstraZeneca vaccine may not provide much protection against the South African variant, there is still enough protection in most other current vaccines to prevent serious illness, hospitalization, and death. The best way to keep SARS-CoV-2 from finding new ways to escape our ongoing efforts to end the pandemic is to double down on whatever can be done to prevent the virus from multiplying and spreading in the first place. Dr. Collins advises that with the emergence of the new variants, everyone should slow the spread of SARS-CoV-2. That means following the three W's: Wear a mask, Watch your distance, Wash your hands often. It also means rolling up our sleeves to get vaccinated as soon as the opportunity arises. - Updated Guidance for Places of Worship The State updated its <u>Guidance for Places of Worship</u> and providers of religious services and cultural ceremonies (weddings and funerals) to support a safe, clean environment for congregants, visitors and volunteers. The update was made in response to recent judicial rulings changing capacity limits effective immediately. Indoor activities are now allowed with modifications based on tier status. - Be COVID Prepared on a University Campus The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), National Preparedness Division will host a webinar titled Be COVID Prepared focused on pandemic preparedness actions to take while on a college or university campus. As we have seen over the past twelve months, the COVID-19 pandemic had a significant impact on colleges and universities. Nearly every organization has a webpage devoted to COVID-19 information with recommendations that students have a plan should they need to self-isolate or quarantine due to virus exposure. The threats of COVID-19 are not over, this webinar provides FEMA's toolkit, important information, and an isolation/quarantine template students can use if exposed to COVID-19. College students, parents of college students, student-serving organizations, and institutes of higher education are encouraged to attend the webinar. - FDA Scheduled Public Meeting for New Vaccine The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has scheduled a meeting of its Vaccines and Related Biological Products Advisory Committee (VRBPAC) on February 26 to discuss the request for emergency use authorization (EUA) for a COVID-19 vaccine from Janssen Biotech Inc. A public discussion helps ensure the

- public has a clear understanding of the scientific data and information that the FDA will evaluate to authorize this vaccine. The FDA will publish the agenda prior to the meeting; the meeting will be webcast from the FDA website. Visit fda.gov for details.
- L.A. County Daily Briefing Statistics on COVID-19 DPH confirmed 227 recent deaths, nine new cases in Manhattan Beach, and 3,353 new COVID-19 cases in Today's Daily Report. To date, DPH identified 1,152,239 positive cases of COVID-19 across all areas of L.A. County and a total of 18,360 deaths. There are 4,079 people with COVID-19 currently hospitalized, and 29% of these people are in the ICU. Today, DPH has confirmed five additional cases of COVID-19 variant B.1.1.7. (U.K. variant), totaling eight cases in Los Angeles County. The B.1.1.7 variant is more easily transmissible, and verification of the variant in L.A. County means residents and businesses must be extremely diligent adhering to all public health safety measures, including wearing face coverings, distancing from others, and handwashing; these measures protect against transmission of the virus and known variants. Despite recent decreases in the current COVID-19 surge of cases and hospitalizations, COVID-19 transmission remains widespread in L.A. County and many states and countries. Testing results are available for approximately 5,622,000 individuals, with 19% of all people testing positive. To view DPH's COVID-19 Daily Data, visit lacounty.gov.
