CURRENT INITIATIVES AND UPDATES

- Manhattan Avenue Closure Between 12th and MBB to Continue To allow additional social distancing at restaurants offering outdoor dining in the public right-of-way, the Manhattan Avenue between Manhattan Beach Boulevard and 12th Street will be continued for at least one additional week. Following input from the business and residential community, the City will take various measures to address traffic concerns and enhance resident access. The City thanks for the residents and business community for their patience with this endeavor and hopes that the non-holiday weekend will minimize future impacts. The City encourages residents and motorists to take Highland Avenue for north-south travel and use the nearby parking lots when dining and shopping. Center Place will remain open for east-west traffic but should be used for local traffic only. Ocean Avenue is for local traffic only. Visit citymb.info for details.
- Where LA County Stands on the States Tier System The State updated tier assignments today, under its <u>Blueprint for a Safer Economy</u> the criteria used to loosen and tighten regulations on activities. While <u>Los Angeles County remains in Tier One</u> (Purple), with "widespread" risk and the <u>most restrictions</u>, there has been an improvement for the past three weeks. According to the State's website, L.A. County reflects 29 new COVID-19 cases per day (per 100K), decreasing from 42.5, with an adjusted case rate for tier assignment equaling 20. The County's overall test positivity rate dropped from 9.5% to 7.2%. The <u>health equity metric</u> also reduced from 13.0% to 10.1%. - Library Sidewalk Service and Virtual Programs Continue The Manhattan Beach Library is closed to the public but remains one of the busiest libraries in Los Angeles County. FEDERAL, STATE, AND COUNTY UPDATES

- Vaccination Update The California Department of Public Health (CDPH) updated the <u>COVID-19 Vaccine Allocation Guidelines</u> to clarify essential workers' eligibility. CDPH also released a <u>Provider Bulletin</u>, which allows providers' clinical judgment to vaccinate individuals ages 16 and older beginning March 15, who are at the highest risk of COVID-19 morbidity and mortality due to severe health conditions. - Some LA County Schools Allowed to Reopen with Guidelines L.A. County's adjusted case rate has remained under 25 new cases per 100K people for five consecutive days, meeting the State requirements for schools to open on-site learning for grades T.K. through six. For grades seven through twelve, reopening will not be permitted until the L.A. County case rate drops below 7 per 100K people. Students in grades T.K. through six are permitted for on-site learning if the school is in full compliance with State and county directives. Many of the directives are not new and very familiar to schools that reopened under the waiver program or for services for high-need students. However, new State requirements include:
 - Schools must complete a COVID-19 Safety Plan that includes establishing the CAL/OSHA COVID-19 Prevention Program;
 - Schools are required to consult with labor, parent, and community organizations regarding reopening plans;
 - Schools must ensure sufficient ventilation in classrooms and shared spaces per the ASHRAE (American Society of Heating, refrigerating, and air conditioning engineers) guidance on ventilation and have an appropriate professional evaluate the ventilation system in regards to the ASHRAE guidance; and
 - Schools are required to have a testing plan that includes symptomatic testing and surveillance testing.

- Participate in Supervisor Janice Hahn's School Reopening Survey The Center for Disease
 Control and Prevention released updated guidelines for opening schools safely (see bullet
 below). Per Supervisor Hahn, the recommendations are not a mandate, but they provide a good
 roadmap for moving forward in California and Los Angeles County. Participate in Supervisor

- updated its Operational Strategy for K-12 Schools through Phased Mitigation to complement the U.S. Department of Education's Handbook on Strategies for Safely Reopening Elementary and Secondary Schools. The operational strategy presents a pathway to reopen schools and help them remain open through consistent use of mitigation strategies through the universal and correct use of masks and physical distancing. Evidence suggests that many K-12 schools with strictly implemented mitigation strategies have been safely open for in-person instruction and remain open. For schools that emphasize mitigation at all levels of community transmission, key summary points include:
 - K-12 schools should be the last settings to close after all other mitigation measures in the community have been employed and the first to reopen when they can do so safely.
 Schools should be prioritized for reopening and remaining open for in-person instruction over nonessential businesses and activities.
 - o In-person instruction should be prioritized over extracurricular activities, including sports and school events, to minimize transmission risk in schools and protect in-person learning.
 - Lower incidence of COVID-19 among younger children than teenagers suggests that younger students (elementary school students) are likely to have less risk of in-school transmission due to in-person learning than more senior students (middle school and high school).
 - Families of students at increased risk of severe illness (including special healthcare needs) or live with people at increased risk should be given the option of virtual instruction regardless of the mode of learning offered.
 - Schools are encouraged to use students' cohorts to facilitate testing and contact tracing and minimize transmission across pods.
 - Schools that serve populations at risk for learning loss during virtual instruction should be prioritized for reopening and be provided the needed resources to implement the mitigation.
 - When implementing phased mitigation in hybrid learning modes, schools should consider prioritizing in-person instruction for students with disabilities who may require special education and related services.

The Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) recommends that essential frontline workers, including those who work in education (teachers and school staff), be prioritized for vaccine allocation in Phase 1b, following health care personnel and residents of long-term care facilities (Phase 1a). Vaccinating teachers and school staff can be considered one layer of mitigation and protection for staff and students. Access to vaccination should not be considered a condition for reopening schools for in-person instruction. Even after teachers and staff are vaccinated, schools need to continue mitigation measures for the foreseeable future, including requiring masks in schools and physical distancing. - COVID-19 Vaccinations for the Homebound COVID-19 vaccination of homebound persons presents unique challenges to ensure the appropriate vaccine storage temperatures, handling, and administration to ensure safe and effective vaccination. Homebound persons include those who need the help of another person or medical equipment such as crutches, a walker, or a wheelchair to leave their home, or their medical provider believes that their health or illness could worsen if they leave their home. - Autistic Self Advocacy Network's COVID-19 Vaccine Fact Sheet COVID-19 is especially dangerous to people with intellectual and developmental disabilities. Often, the facts about COVID-19 are not shared in ways that are accessible, but that is why the Autistic Self Advocacy Network (ASAN) released these fact sheets about the COVID-19 vaccine. The Easy Read version uses pictures and large text and has more white space, separate from the Plain Language version without accompanying graphics. Both are great resources to have and share. - State's Safe Schools Reopening Map The State launched the Safe Schools for All Plan's interactive Safe Schools Reopening Map, an online tool providing a statewide snapshot of school status reopenings across California. The interactive map displays data from districts, charter, and private schools. CDPH will be adding key data to the map, including school district COVID-19 outbreaks. The plan will support local communities in making data-driven decisions to open classrooms safely. The map builds on the additional transparency, accountability, and assistance measures incorporated in the Safe Schools for All Plan. - Actions in Response to COVID-19 On March 4, 2020, the Governor proclaimed a <u>State of Emergency</u> to exist in California due to the impacts of COVID-19 to make additional resources available. According to the Governor's Executive Order <u>N-39-20</u>, during the State of Emergency, the California Department of Consumer Affairs Director may waive any statutory or regulatory professional licensing and training requirements on individuals licensed under Division 2 of the Business Professions Code. The Department of Consumer Affairs:
 - Waived restrictions on registered <u>Dental Hygienists</u> relating to administering COVID-19 vaccines;
 - Waived restrictions on <u>Doctors of Podiatric Medicine</u> relating to ordering and administering COVID-19 vaccines;
 - Waived restrictions on <u>Optometrists</u> relating to ordering and administering COVID-19 vaccines; and
 - Waived restrictions on <u>Postgraduate Training Licensees</u> relating to ordering and administering COVID-19 vaccines outside of their postgraduate training program.
- Report on Well-Being of Older Adults and Their Caregivers The CDC Foundation, with technical assistance from the CDC, funded a study to examine community-dwelling older adults' and caregivers' COVID-19 needs and concerns and the public health supports available to them. Some of the study's key findings include: 1) While many stakeholder organizations address multiple areas of interest, including unrelated topics, other organizations focused on an area of expertise (such as elder abuse). 2) The majority of interventions developed in response to the pandemic are educational resources available online. 3) Relatively few interventions are available for older adults for public health emergencies (PHEs) outside of COVID-19 (e.g., natural

- disasters). 4) Across topic areas, the audience for interventions includes older adults, caregivers, direct service providers, and other stakeholders (e.g., advocates, local chapters of national organizations, researchers). And 5) Organizations have adapted existing interventions, primarily by transitioning to remote delivery, where possible. The report titled "Maintaining Physical and Mental Well-Being of Older Adults and Their Caregivers During Public Health Emergencies" was conducted by NORC at the University of Chicago, with its partners TMNCorp and Burness. The report is available for download at norc.org.
- L.A. County Daily Briefing Statistics on COVID-19 L.A. County Department of Public Health (DPH) confirmed 120 recent deaths, eight new cases in Manhattan Beach, and 1,260 new COVID-19 cases in Today's Daily Report. To date, DPH identified 1,169,550 positive cases of COVID-19 across all areas of L.A. County and a total of 19,215 deaths. There are 2,964 people with COVID-19 currently hospitalized, and 31% of these people are in the ICU. Today, the State updated the metrics that characterize transmission in a county and what restrictions must be followed to reduce transmission. L.A. County remains in the purple tier, and transmission continues to be widespread. Los Angeles County's adjusted case rate is now 20 cases per 100,000 people, and our seven-day average daily test positivity rate is 7.2%. The average daily cases, adjusted case rate, and positivity rate are steadily declining after peaking in January. Testing results are available for approximately 5,707,000 individuals, with 19% of all people testing positive. To view DPH's COVID-19 Daily Data, visit lacounty.gov. As part of its commitment to reduce health inequities and ensure the best outcomes for all Californians, the State has a Health Equity Dashboard that tracks California's health equity measure and data by race and ethnicity, sexual orientation, and gender identity. The Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) added County View to their national COVID Data Tracker, providing case statistics by County throughout the United States.
