CURRENT INITIATIVES AND UPDATES

- Our Community, Our Loss Sadly, Manhattan Beach lost another resident to COVID-19 yesterday, making our total coronavirus loss to date, 20 residents. L.A. County Department of Public Health (DPH) also confirmed the second COVID-19 death of a young person under the age of 18 from the County. To all who are mourning someone who has passed away from COVID-19, the City is deeply sorry for your loss. We wish you healing and peace at this challenging time. The loss serves as a reminder that just because certain activities are allowed, or specific reopen protocols are revised does not mean that actions are "safe" and without risk. To keep yourself, your family, your friends, and neighbors, and the broader community and local economy safe, continue following these core practices:
 - o Go outdoors. Outdoor activities are far safer than indoor ones.
 - o **Stay masked**. Consistent and correct use of masks, especially double-masking, both indoors and outdoors, effectively prevents the spread of COVID-19.
 - Maintain distance at least six feet from others. Physical distancing from those who do
 not live with you also helps to keep the virus away.
 - o **Avoid crowds**. The fewer people you encounter and the fewer interactions you have, the smaller the chance the virus will spread.
 - Get vaccinated when it's your turn. All federally-authorized vaccines work well and help protect you, your family, and your friends against COVID-19.
- Stay Safe and Stay Local for the Upcoming Religious Holidays As we navigate through reopenings, vaccinations and make plans for upcoming religious holidays, it is more important than ever to stay safe and travel locally. Travel may increase your chance of spreading and getting COVID-19. The Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) continues to recommend postponing travel and staying home as this is the best way to protect yourself and others this year. When considering a holiday trip, visit CDC's Travel page to help decide what is best for you and your family. Keep in mind, upon return from non-essential travel out of state/country, the Current DPH Travel Advisory and Guidance requires self-quarantine for ten days after arrival. The State updated tier assignments on March 16, under its <u>Blueprint for a Safer Economy</u> – the criteria used to loosen and tighten regulations on activities. Los Angeles County recently moved to Tier Two (Red), with "Substantial" risk level. More <u>businesses can open with modifications or limitations on occupancy</u>. According to the State's website, L.A. County continues to improve its standing reflecting 5.5 new COVID-19 cases per day (per 100K), decreasing from 6.9, with an adjusted case rate for tier assignment equaling 4.1. The County's overall test positivity rate dropped from 2.5% to 2.0%. The <u>health equity metric</u> also reduced from 3.6% to 2.8%. The County must remain in the Red Tier for three consecutive weeks before moving to the less restrictive Tier Three (Orange) even if the County's metrics align earlier with Orange. L.A. County's daily case rate must be at or below 3.9 new cases per 100K people. The County's test positivity rate must be at or below 4.9% for two consecutive weeks to qualify for Orange (see table below). If L.A. County continues to experience declines in the case rate, it is possible to achieve Orange in early April. FEDERAL, STATE, AND COUNTY UPDATES

• Vaccination Update – Currently, people who are eligible for the vaccine include: healthcare workers, residents and staff at long-term care facilities, age 65 or older, education and childcare workers, food and agriculture workers, emergency service workers, law enforcement, and residents between the ages 16 through 64 who have underlying health conditions or disabilities that put them at the highest risk of becoming very sick from COVID-19. At hundreds of vaccination sites across the County, including pharmacies and many community clinics, appointments are open to L.A. County residents or workers meeting the eligibility requirements. - Let's Get to ImmUnity Campaign The California Department of Public Health (CDPH)
 launched a multi-million dollar statewide "Let's Get to ImmUnity" public education campaign to
 boost COVID-19 vaccine acceptance. The campaign ramps up conversations with the hardesthit communities ahead of anticipated vaccine eligibility expansion in May. Along with media
 outreach, the "Let's Get to ImmUnity" campaign will include a revised VaccinateALL58.com
 website later this month, available in at least eight languages. For details, visit cdph.ca.gov.
- Volunteer Recruitment Campaign to Accelerate Vaccinations The Governor's Office launched a volunteer recruitment campaign to accelerate COVID-19 vaccinations and slow the spread. - Actions in Response to COVID-19 Several measures were taken in response to COVID-19:
 - O Governor Newsom announced the establishment of an inaugural board for the California Privacy Protection Agency (CPPA), a new administrative agency charged with protecting consumers' fundamental privacy rights over their personal information. The CPPA Board consists of experts in privacy, technology, and consumer rights. Californians deserve to have their data protected; the appointees represent online consumer protection and business accountability. In many cases, the pandemic forced consumers, healthcare, schools, and businesses online. The board will help protect private information and the digital identities of individuals and families now and in the future. For more information, visit gov.ca.gov.
 - o Governor Newsom signed <u>Assembly Bill 83</u> to provide economic relief to alcoholic beverage licensees most severely impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. AB 83 authorizes the Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control to waive license renewal fees set to expire between March 1, 2021, and February 28, 2023.  - o Governor Newsom signed <u>Assembly Bill 88</u> one-time stimulus and grant payments garnishment exclusion from gross income. Visit <u>leginfo.legislature.ca.gov</u> for details.
- Update on Variants Variants remain a concern, even as more and more people are vaccinated. To date, <u>DPH has confirmed a total of 55 cases of COVID-19 U.K. variant, two instances of the B.1.525 variant, which was also first identified in the U.K., 21 cases of the New York variant, and 1 case of the P.2 variant from Brazil in Los Angeles County. There have been no cases identified of the South African variant. Also, 35 California variant B.1.427 instances were identified, and 276 of the California Variant B.1.429. The B.1.427 and the B.1.429 are both slightly different sequences called the California variant. As we plan for additional reopenings, we know that there is more risk of variants dominating if there is more transmission of COVID-19. All of us need to continue to do everything we can to reduce transmission, including masking and maintaining physical distance whenever we are outside of our homes and around others. - COVID-19 Rent Relief Available to Income Eligible Households Income-eligible households who need financial assistance for unpaid rent and utilities will be able to apply for help through the California COVID-19 Rent Relief program. If you have experienced a financial hardship due to COVID-19, have past due rent or utilities, and have a household income that is not more than 80% of the area median income, you may be eligible to receive help to pay past due or future rent and utilities from the State. - COVID-19 Master Question List The Department of Homeland Security (DHS) Science and Technology Directorate (S&T) published an update to the Master Question List (MQL) for COVID-

- 19. The MLQ is intended to quickly present available information to decision-makers in the operational response to COVID-19 and allow structured and scientifically guided discussions across the federal government, prevent duplication of efforts, and highlight and coordinate research. - FOUND/LA Small Business Recovery Grant Closes March 21 The FOUND/LA Small Business Recovery Fund, in partnership with Pacific Community Ventures and TMC Community Capital, has formed a small business grant for Los Angeles County supporting local entrepreneurs that create spaces that make neighborhoods feel like home. Grant awards range between \$5,000 and \$25,000, depending on business size. Grant criteria include businesses serving the community they're located in, with under 20 employees, previously profitable but negatively impacted by COVID-19. On selection day, grant recipients will be randomly selected from the eligible applicants' pool until funds are expended. Visit foundla.org for more information.
- Nonprofit Cultural Institutions Grant Closes March 23 The COVID-19 Relief Grant
 application for nonprofit cultural institutions closes Tuesday, March 23. The California Office of
 the Small Business Advocate (CalOSBA) in the Governor's Office of Business and Economic
 Development administers grants for small businesses and nonprofits impacted by the health and

- Save the Date: April 15 National Disability Forum Save the date, April 15, for the National Disability Forum (NDF). The NDF is an open forum of Social Security Administration (SSA) that allows all interested stakeholders to share their unique insights on topics of particular interest to SSA early in the process and directly with policymakers. Further, it provides an opportunity for stakeholders to hear from one another. The Forum is open to anyone interested and intended to be a means to gain insight through listening. - NIH Director Discusses COVID-19 Dr. Collins, Director of the National Institutes of Health (NIH), the nation's medical research agency, recently participated in several COVID-19 events available on the NIH website. 1) <u>Dr. Collins participates</u> in a vaccine confidence event at the Washington National Cathedral. 2) <u>Dr. Collins talks to Dr. John Whyte at WebMD</u> on various COVID-19 topics, faith, science, and the new UNITE initiative. And 3) <u>Dr. Collins on MSNBC</u> discusses COVID-19 vaccinations, new variants, and continuing public health measures.
- Businesses Must Comply and Stop the Spread Businesses must implement and follow all safety protocols closely and ensure compliance with all Health Order directives, including occupancy limits, masking, infection control, and distancing requirements. Businesses must ensure there are no crowded spaces or places, report outbreaks of three or more cases, allow employees to work from home as much as possible, and stay home if they're feeling sick. Businesses that are not adhering to safety protocols to protect workers and customers increase the risk for COVID-19 spread. From March 1 through March 14, 112 citations were issued to restaurants, family entertainment establishments, gyms, personal care salons, and other businesses for noncompliance with Health Officer Orders. - L.A. County Daily Briefing Statistics on COVID-19 DPH confirmed 88 recent deaths, four new cases in Manhattan Beach, and 933 new COVID-19 cases in Today's Daily Report. To date, DPH identified 1,212,586 positive cases of COVID-19 across all areas of L.A. County and a total of 22,664 deaths. There are 861 people with COVID-19 currently hospitalized, and 26% of these people are in the ICU. Testing results are available for approximately 5,984,000 individuals, with 19% of all people testing positive. To view DPH's COVID-19 Daily Data, visit lacounty.gov.
