CURRENT INITIATIVES AND UPDATES

- Spring Break Staycation With Spring Break upon us, L.A. County's Department of Public Health (DPH) encourages everyone to remain close to home. Travel increases the risk of getting and spreading COVID-19. While COVID-19 numbers have decreased locally, transmission remains widespread and growing in many states and countries. Los Angeles County residents should continue to avoid all non-essential travel and stay within 120 miles from their place of residence unless traveling for essential purposes. The State Travel Advisory remains in effect in Los Angeles County. Recreational travelers and residents coming to L.A. County must follow California Department of Public Health (CDPH) COVID-19 Quartine Guidance to self-quarantine for ten days upon return from out-of-state or out-of-country travel. Remain at your home or lodging for the ten days and avoid contact with others. Do not travel if you are sick. If you have COVID-19 symptoms, were in crowds, exposed to unmasked individuals in close proximity, or attended gatherings, get tested.
- Vaccination Update While the COVID-19 vaccine supply remains limited in the County, the
 State is expanding who is eligible to get the vaccine based on the expected supply. Governor
 Newsom announced today that vaccinations would open for all Californians aged 50 and older
 on April 1 and age 16 and older on April 15. View the State's COVID-19 Vaccine Allocation Guidelines for vaccine eligibility. Visit VaccinateLACounty.com for information on making an

 vaccination. Vaccinations are always free and open to eligible residents and workers regardless
 of immigration status.
- Have a Safe and Happy Passover The City wishes you and yours a Happy Passover!
 Passover, Easter, and Ramadan will be a little less lonely this year as more people get
 vaccinated. But, we cannot let down our guard just yet. Please remember that private
 gatherings that include more than three different households are not yet allowed and are
 limited to a maximum of 15 people. The smaller the number of people, the lower the risk.
- AARP Foundation Tax-Aide Assistance Returns AARP Foundation Tax-Aide provides free tax assistance to everyone in the community with particular attention to those age sixty and older. Internal Revenue Service (IRS) trained and certified Tax-Aide volunteers will assist with filing 2020 Federal and California State returns safely and with minimal contact. Each Wednesday, beginning March 31 through May 12, 2021, starting 9:00 AM to 2:00 PM, Tax-Aide volunteers will scan tax documents outside the Manhattan Beach Scout House, next to Joslyn Community Center, 1601 North Valley Drive. Due to COVID-19, appointments are required, no walk-ups are allowed. To make an appointment, call (424) 256-5194 Monday through Friday, 9:00 AM to 2:30 PM. Visit citymb.info for more information.
- Additional Health Order Update L.A. County Department of Public Health (DPH) made further
 modifications to the <u>Protocol for Youth and Adult Recreational Sports Leagues</u>. The Protocol was
 modified 3/25/21 to clarify that Sideline Cheer and Flag Football are Outdoor Moderate
 Contact sports. Outdoor Sideline Cheer is permitted to perform at an outdoor competition
 between two teams participating in a different sport. The Protocol also provides an online

Request Form for DPH approval for organizers of an event or competition and clarifies DPH response to Plans submitted by organizers for indoor sports.

The State updated tier assignments on March 23, under its <u>Blueprint for a Safer Economy</u> – the criteria used to loosen and tighten regulations on activities. On March 12, Los Angeles County moved to Tier Two (Red), with a "Substantial" risk level where more <u>businesses can open with modifications or limitations on occupancy</u>. According to the State's website, L.A. County continues to improve its standing reflecting 4.8 new COVID-19 cases per day (per 100K), decreasing from 5.5, with an adjusted case rate for tier assignment equaling 3.7. The County's overall test positivity rate dropped from 2.0% to 1.8%. The <u>health equity metric</u> also reduced from 2.8% to 2.5%. The County must remain in the Red Tier for three consecutive weeks before moving to the less restrictive Tier Three (Orange) even if the County's metrics align earlier with Orange. L.A. County's daily case rate must be at or below 3.9 new cases per 100K people. The County's test positivity rate must be at or below 4.9% for two consecutive weeks to qualify for Orange (see table below). If L.A. County continues to experience declines in the case rate (which we are), it is possible to achieve Orange in early April. FEDERAL, STATE, AND COUNTY UPDATES

• Update on Variants - DPH continues to track variant cases in Los Angeles County. Among 73 specimens analyzed at the Public Health Laboratory this past week, 25 cases, or 34% of the specimens analyzed, were California (B.1.427) variant of concern, and 21 cases, or 29% of the specimens analyzed, were the U.K. (B.1.1.7) variant of concern. This means 63% of the variants sequenced this past week are variants of concern with the probability of increased transmissibility and more severe disease. Other variants of interest that were detected include 8 cases of the New York variant and 1 case of the Brazilian (P.2) variant of interest. While these variants are still considered only variants of interest (and not variants of concern), their presence indicates transmission of mutated viruses from across the globe. The South African or Brazilian (P.1) variant of concern has not been identified in Los Angeles County. While these variants are still considered only variants of interest (and not variants of concern), their presence indicates transmission of mutated viruses from across the globe. Therefore, everyone should continue to do everything possible to reduce transmission, including masking and maintaining physical

- Actions in Response to COVID-19 President Biden signed the <u>Save Lives Act</u> expanding the Veterans Affairs(V.A.) legal authority to provide COVID-19 vaccines to all Veterans, regardless of their V.A. health care enrollment status, as well as Veteran spouses, caregivers, and some beneficiaries. - Health Officer Order Enforcement Protocol Revised The L.A. County Board of Supervisors voted to revise the enforcement protocol for businesses in violation of the Health Officer Order. On a first visit, Health Inspectors will now advise a company of non-compliance and educate the business on the importance of the health and safety protocols. Health Inspectors will consider issuing monetary fines only for the most significant violations and permit suspension or revocation for the most significant violations or repeated uncured violations. Previously, first violation fines had been more frequently enforced on minor infractions of businesses' attempts to operate safely. Visit lacounty.gov for details.
- Paycheck Protection Program Expires March 31 The Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) is a
 loan designed to provide a direct incentive for small businesses to keep their workers on the
 payroll. Borrowers may be eligible for PPP loan forgiveness. The U.S. Small Business
 Administration(SBA) is currently offering PPP loans until March 31, 2021. President Biden
 announced program changes to make access to PPP loans more equitable. View the Frequently

- Tax Deadline Extended Learn How to File for Free The tax deadline was extended to Monday, May 17, 2021. Why pay to file your taxes when you may be eligible to file for free with an IRS-certified tax volunteer? If you make less than \$57,000, free tax preparation help is available through the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) and the Tax Counseling for the Elderly (TCE) for taxpayers who qualify. - BizHelp Webinars to Assist with Post Pandemic Recovery The Los Angeles County
 Development Authority (LACDA) launched online resources to help small businesses navigate
 economic uncertainty and prepare for a post-COVID-19 economy. The FREE programs are

- Update on FEMA COVID-19 Funeral Assistance The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) is dedicated to helping ease some of the financial stress and burden caused by the virus. Under the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act of 2021 and the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021, FEMA will provide financial assistance for COVID-19-related funeral expenses incurred after January 20, 2020. While the program will not launch until April, FEMA published the <u>Funeral Assistance Frequently Asked Questions FAQ</u> page with more information. Visit fema.gov for details.
- Workplace Vaccination Program Although COVID-19 vaccine supply is currently limited, it's not too early to start planning or considering workplace vaccination programs. Strong confidence in the vaccines within a workplace leads to more people getting vaccinated, which leads to fewer COVID-19 illnesses, hospitalizations, and deaths. Communicating clear, complete, and accurate vaccination messages will promote confidence in getting vaccinated and engaging employees in plans to address potential barriers to vaccination. The Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) has updated the Workplace Vaccination Program page with information such as Reopening Your Workplace, Consider COVID-19 Vaccination Options for Your Employees, Best Practices, Vaccination On-Site at the Workplace, and Vaccination Off-Site in the Community.
- Webinar Series to Support Vulnerable Populations The Association of University Centers on Disabilities (AUCD), the Association of State and Territorial Health Officials (ASTHO), and the

National Association of County and City Health Officials (NACCHO) will host a Vaccination Webinar Series featuring state-level jurisdictions and CDC guests on reaching people with disabilities (PWD). Session titles include Scheduling and Transporting PWD to COVID-19 Vaccination Appointments, Reducing COVID-19 Vaccine Hesitancy and Disseminating Accessible Messages, and Educating Others About the Importance of Disability Prioritizing in State Vaccination Plans. - Return to College Out of concern for the health and safety of the campus community, 2021 spring semester courses at El Camino College are online. During the Fall Semester, programs defined as essential under current State directives in the Allied Health, Public Health, Emergency Services, and Critical Manufacturing sectors will be allowed to hold in-person classes on campus. - Research Findings Role of Saliva in SARS-CoV-2 Transmission An international team of scientists led by researchers at the National Institutes of Health (NIH) has found evidence that SARS-CoV-2, the virus that causes COVID-19, infects cells in the mouth. The virus's potential to infect multiple areas of the body might help explain the wide-ranging symptoms experienced by COVID-19 patients, including oral symptoms such as taste loss, dry mouth, and blistering. A better understanding of the mouth's involvement could inform strategies to reduce viral transmission within and outside the body. Visit nih.gov for more information.
- Registered Apprenticeship Technical Assistance Centers The <u>U.S. Department of Labor announced the Registered Apprenticeship Technical Assistance Centers of Excellence</u>. The <u>National Apprenticeship Act of 202l</u>, will create and expand registered apprenticeships, youth apprenticeships, and pre-apprenticeship programs. Programs will draw in a diverse workforce by supporting industry and equity intermediaries who can help recruit women and people of color. It will bolster successful partnerships between apprenticeship programs and community colleges to train Americans for good-paying jobs across industries ranging from construction, energy, manufacturing, technology, and caregiving. - L.A. County Daily Briefing Statistics on COVID-19 DPH confirmed 66 recent deaths, three new cases in Manhattan Beach, and 608 new COVID-19 cases in Today's Daily Report. To date, DPH identified 1,216,250 positive cases of COVID-19 across all areas of L.A. County and a total of 23,020 deaths. There are 729 people with COVID-19 currently hospitalized, and 23% of these people are in the ICU. Testing results are available for approximately 6,041,000 individuals, with 19% of all people testing positive. To view DPH's COVID-19 Daily Data, visit lacounty.gov.
