COVID-19 Situation Report APRIL 15, 2021

CURRENT INITIATIVES AND UPDATES

- Manhattan Beach Library Reopens Monday, April 19 The Manhattan Beach Library and several designated Los Angeles County libraries reopen Monday, April 19, for select in-person services. Library services include browse collection and checkout items, public computer use (limited to 1 hour per customer), printing, hold pickup, reference interaction to find library materials, and free Wi-Fi. Library hours are Monday, Wednesday through Friday, 11:00 AM to 6:00 PM and Tuesday 1:00 PM to 8:00 PM. <u>Sidewalk Service</u> will be available Monday, Wednesday through Friday, 10:00 AM to 11:00 AM and Tuesday 12:00 PM to 1:00 PM and by request only for the remainder of the library's operational hours. - BCHD AdventurePlex Vaccination Site Appointments Full on Saturday AdventurePlex, the Beach Cities Health District's (BCHD) family entertainment facility, has become a local vaccination site and will be open to the public on Saturday, April 17 by appointment only. However, all appointment slots have been filled. BCHD expects to administer approximately 500 Pfizer vaccines at this site (youth 16 and 17 can only receive the Pfizer vaccine). Please note, BCHD has not received additional vaccine allotments and the next date for vaccine distribution is to be determined. To stay informed on the next vaccinate date offered here locally, the community can sign up for the BCHD newsletter here or follow the BCHD social media accounts. The AdventurePlex vaccination site is now open to all eligible L.A. County residents and is located at 1701 Marine Avenue in Manhattan Beach. Visit the MyTurn website to schedule an appointment in the future.
- Health Order Updates L.A. County Department of Public Health (DPH) made several changes to the Health Officer Order effective today, April 15. The changes align with the <u>State's Blueprint for a Safer Economy</u>. Visit <u>publichealth.lacounty.gov</u> for the most current <u>Health Officer Order</u>. Some of the new updates include 1) reopening protocols for indoor <u>Seated Live Events and Performances</u> and <u>Private Events</u> (meeting, receptions, and conferences); 2) Guidance for Informal Social Gatherings, which replaces the prior guidance for private gatherings; and 3) adds Fairs to the protocol for Amusement and Theme Parks. Other protocols updated include:
 - Libraries In-Person Services: The Reopening Protocol for In-Person Services in Libraries update specifies that libraries do not have to isolate returned library materials before reshelving. Employees who engage in re-shelving should wash hands thoroughly after handling returned materials. At their discretion, libraries may resume the rental of meeting rooms or other spaces for private events. At the discretion of the operator and their local government authority, libraries may be open at 75% of maximum indoor capacity.
 - Youth and Adult Recreational Sports Leagues: The Reopening Protocol for Youth and Adult Recreational Sports Leagues update categorizes band and drumline as low contact

outdoor recreational activities that may occur at competitions between two teams in a different sport. It also clarifies required versus recommended safety measures for team bus transportation. Observers are permitted for adult sports, provided that the host venues adhere to the modifications specified in the DPH Protocol for Outdoor Live Seated Events and Performances. Venues that do not have fixed seating may not host observers for adult sports. Outdoor youth sports may permit observers who are not immediate family members, provided that all observers can maintain at least a 6-foot physical distance from other household groups. Indoor sports must limit occupancy in indoor sports facilities to 25% occupancy based on applicable building or fire code. Concession sales at youth or adult recreational sports competitions are prohibited.

FEDERAL, STATE, AND COUNTY UPDATES

- Vaccination Update COVID-19 vaccine safety remains a top priority. DPH is working with healthcare providers for the reporting of any adverse events. The Johnson & Johnson vaccine's adverse events appear to be extremely rare, with nearly 7,000,000 people receiving the vaccine in the United States to date. If you experience side effects after any vaccine, contact the FDA/CDC Vaccine Adverse Event Reporting System (VAERS) at (800) 822-7967 or report it online by visiting vaers.hhs.gov. View the Frequently Asked Questions: Johnson & Johnson Pause page that DPH recently published for more information on the Johnson & Johnson pause. Starting today, COVID-19 vaccines become available to any resident in Los Angeles County who is 16 and older. Please note, youth 16 and 17 can only receive the Pfizer vaccine and need to sign up at a site that offers this vaccine. Visit VaccinateLACounty.com for information on making an appointment if it is your turn and what verifications you will need when you show up for your vaccination. Vaccinations are always free and open to eligible residents and workers regardless of immigration status.
- Actions in Response to COVID-19 The Governor's Office of Business and Economic Development (GO-Biz) announced <u>Source Diverse Source Local</u>, a public-private partnership to strengthen an inclusive procurement and resilient California-based supply chain. The partnership was developed last fall by the California Office of the Small Business Advocate (CalOSBA), part of GO-Biz, in collaboration with the <u>Governor's Task Force on Business and Jobs Recovery</u> (Task Force). These partnerships will leverage California's buying power to drive local economic growth, support diverse businesses and improve communities' resilience as the State continues to build its economic recovery. - Help Prevent COVID-19 Isolation and Loneliness During the pandemic, maintaining safe distancing precautions has been challenging for everyone, even those well-connected with large supportive social networks. Public health guidelines to keep physically distant from others have slowed the spread of COVID-19 and made it difficult for family and friends to see each other. Older adults are at greater risk of COVID-19, but it is also critically important for them to maintain active social connections. - Economic Impact Payments for Those Experiencing Homelessness The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) continues its effort to help those experiencing homelessness during the pandemic. By reminding people who don't have a permanent address or a bank account, they may still qualify for Economic Impact Payments and other tax benefits. Economic Impact Payments, also known as stimulus payments, are different from most other tax benefits; people can get the benefit even if they have little or no income and do not usually file a tax return. This is true as long as they have a Social Security number and are not supported by someone else who can claim them as a dependent. People in this group can still qualify for the first two Economic Impact Payments when they file their 2020 return by claiming the Recovery Rebate Credit. - EDD to Improve Job Opportunities for People with Disabilities California Employment Development Department (EDD) announced \$2 million of Disability Employment Accelerator Funds to organizations to provide career development and job opportunities. The funds will help people with disabilities secure quality jobs in the post-pandemic labor market. The funds will help implement customized programs that include vocational assessments, career counseling, technical skills training, credential programs, apprenticeships, paid work experience, on-the-job training, and job placement assistance. - Join the COVID-19 Community Corps The COVID-19 Community Corps is a nationwide, grassroots network of local voices and trusted community leaders to encourage vaccinations. More than 275 founding member organizations have the collective ability to reach millions of people. The Foreclosure Prevention & Mortgage Relief Program was developed in partnership with the L.A. County Board of Supervisors, NHS Center for Economic Recovery, and the Department of Consumer & Business Affairs. The program is structured to benefit single-family homeowners and property owners with four or fewer units. Approved applicants can receive up to \$20,000 to help offset mortgage delinquencies. - OSHA Seeks Public Input on Whistleblower Program The U.S. Department of Labor's
 Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) will hold a teleconference to solicit
 public comments and suggestions on issues facing the Whistleblower Protection Program. The
 agency seeks feedback on what it can do to ensure that workers are protected from retaliation
 for raising concerns related to the pandemic. The teleconference occurs Wednesday, May 19,
 2021, from 10:00 AM to 1:00 PM and is open to the public. Registration is required by May 12.

- L.A. County Daily Briefing Statistics on COVID-19 DPH confirmed 23 recent deaths, one new case in Manhattan Beach, and 613 new COVID-19 cases in Today's Daily Report. To date, DPH identified 1,227,514 positive cases of COVID-19 across all areas of L.A. County and a total of 23,569 deaths. There are 518 people with COVID-19 currently hospitalized, and 24% of these people are in the ICU. Testing results are available for approximately 6,251,000 individuals, with 18% of all people testing positive. To view DPH's COVID-19 Daily Data, visit lacounty.gov. To view Statewide case statistics and demographics, including positive cases, deaths, and testing results, visit COVID:19 California Case Statistics.
