COVID-19 Situation Report

MAY 18, 2021

CURRENT INITIATIVES AND UPDATES

- Vaccinating Students With the expansion of COVID-19 vaccine eligibility to everyone 12 and older, Beach Cities Health District (BCHD) continues to partner with the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health and school partners in the South Bay Consortium for School Vaccines to vaccinate the school community. Hermosa Beach City School District, Manhattan Beach Unified School District and Redondo Beach Unified School District are communicating with their families to coordinate vaccination at BCHD closed clinics for students ages 12-18 years. These closed clinics at BCHD's AdventurePlex (1701 Marine Avenue, Manhattan Beach, CA) and off-site pop-up clinics at school locations are not open to the public. - City Hall Appointments and Services City Hall is expanding hours to allow for walk-in services and appointments. Virtual services are available 24 hours, 7 days a week on www.citymb.info. Appointments and walk-in services will be available Monday through Thursday from 1:00p.m. to 5:00p.m. and Fridays 1:00p.m. to 4:00p.m. Upon entering City Hall, visitors to the Parks and Recreation, Finance, or Community Development Departments will have a virtual queueing system where visitors will sign in using an iPad or through their smartphone. Visitors will then queue outside or in their car to avoid gathering inside the limited space of the City Hall lobby. The queuing software has texting capability so staff can let the visitor know when it is their turn. Once inside the lobby area, there are visual delineators to denote where to stand or wait.
- Los Angeles County Guidance on Masks While the County's metrics continue to remain low and stable, there continues to be COVID-19 transmission in California, particularly among those who are not fully vaccinated. For that reason, the State will be keeping its current masking guidance until June 15, and L.A. County will do the same and remain in alignment with the Los Angeles County Health Officer Order of May 3. It is important to note that the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) announcement last week was not meant to eliminate current safety modifications at local and state levels, and the CDC acknowledged the importance of maintaining local protections. Masks are still required for everyone at large events, on public transportation, in retail locations, at business establishments and in the workplace (under Cal/OSHA masking/distancing requirements). Masks are still required for all unvaccinated people when outdoors anytime distancing cannot be maintained. Masks are not required for fully vaccinated people when alone and outdoors unless attending crowded events. Masks are also not required for fully vaccinated people when indoor and outdoor visits with other fully vaccinated people and with unvaccinated people from one household take place without high risk people in attendance.

FEDERAL, STATE, AND COUNTY UPDATES

Yellow Tier - Los Angeles County has met the threshold for the least restrictive yellow tier in the State's Blueprint for a Safer Economy. Changes to the Health Officer Order took effect May 6, reflecting the County's move into the yellow tier allowing for increased occupancy limits across a wide range of sectors with required safety modifications. Fitness facilities, indoor dining, cardrooms and racetracks, movie theaters, family entertainment centers, breweries, wineries, and craft distilleries can expand indoor occupancy to 50%. Bars establishments are now allowed to open for indoor services at a maximum capacity of 25% or 100 people, whichever is fewer, with no counter seating/service. Amusement parks and fairs can increase capacity to 35%, and waterparks can expand to 40% capacity. Museums and aquariums can increase indoor capacity to 75%. Outdoor live performances and events can increase occupancy to 67% of capacity, while the occupancy limits at indoor live events depend on the total capacity of each venue and the vaccination and testing status of attendees. Other sectors where capacity limits have increased include: private informal gatherings, where the occupancy limit has increased to 50% capacity or 50 people if indoors, whichever is fewer; outdoor gatherings are limited to 100 people. At community sporting events, participation is restricted to 500 people per hour and a total of 1,500 people; if everyone is vaccinated or has tested negative at an outdoor community sporting event, the capacity increases to 3000 people. Office-based businesses and workspaces should limit occupancy to 75% of capacity, unless all staff are vaccinated. Distancing and masking requirements remain in effect at worksites per CalOSHA requirements. At indoor malls, shopping centers, retail stores, hair salons, barbershops, personal care providers, libraries, and limited services, capacity remains limited to 75% to allow for at least 6 feet of distancing among staff and customers. The Health Officer Order requires other modifications across a wide range of sectors. These are modifications focused on infection

control, distancing and mask wearing. At all establishments serving food or drink, masking is mandated, except when eating or drinking. Distancing between tables is also still required and counter seating and service is not allowed. Television viewing is now permitted indoors, while live entertainment along with television is permitted outdoors, and aquariums. - PPE Unite Program The PPE Unite program aims to support small business owners by distributing personal protective equipment at no cost to businesses as they aim to re-open their doors to bring employees back to work. State, local, and private entities encourages PPE use for all small business economic recovery and promotes general public health and safety. Eligible businesses are those that are small business (sole proprietor, partnership, LLC, C or S-Corp, microbusiness), non-profits, or organizations with less than 100 employees and located in an eligible County. Eligible businesses will receive a one-time 30-day supply of PPE (may include face masks, hand sanitizer, face shields). For more information and to register for the program, visit PPE Unite.
- Projections in Healthcare / Predictive Modeling Los Angeles County <u>Department of Health Services</u> (DHS) released the COVID-19 Projections of Hospital-based <u>Health Care Demand May 10 Update</u>. The update includes data on hospitalizations through May 5, 2021. The underlying statistical prediction model has been significantly modified to incorporate the effect of vaccination in predicting future hospital demand:
 - The daily number of newly hospitalized patients with positive tests for COVID-19 across Los Angeles County has continued to gradually decrease.
 - Patients are still being admitted to hospitals for reasons other than acute COVID-19 illness who have positive COVID-19 PCR tests, often from prior illness that has been resolved. These do not reflect recent transmission.
 - o Based on recent data, reflecting transmission that occurred in the middle of April, the estimated transmission number ("R") at that time was 0.90 with an uncertainty of 0.78 to 0.99. This estimate for R, lower than prior estimate of 0.96 with an uncertainty of 0.86 to 1.02.
 - Based on the pattern in hospitalizations, and the resulting estimate for R, the demand for hospital-based services including hospital beds, ICU beds, and ventilators over the next 4 weeks is expected to be adequate.
 - Because of the relatively low level of community transmission, the frequency of model updates will continue to be every two weeks.
 - o The DHS team's epidemic model estimates the number of people in Los Angeles County who are susceptible to infection with COVID-19, have been exposed, are infectious to others, and have recovered or been vaccinated so they are no longer susceptible.
 - The model suggests that about 0.06% (uncertainty of 0.03% to 0.10%) of everyone in Los Angeles County is currently infected and infectious to others.
 - o This would suggest about 1 in 1600 (between 1 in 4000 and 1 in 970) Los Angeles County residents are currently infectious to others. One week ago, this estimate was 1 in 1200.
 - Approximately 5 in every 8 persons in Los Angeles County is estimated to be protected from COVID-19. Approximately 3 in every 8 persons in Los Angeles County has been infected and approximately another 2 in 8 have acquired protection through vaccination.
- L.A. County Daily Briefing Statistics on COVID-19 DPH confirmed 159 new COVID-19 cases and 12 new deaths in <u>Today's Daily Report</u>. Of the 12 new deaths reported today, six people

that passed away were over the age of 80, two people who died were between the ages of 65 and 79, and four people who died were between the ages of 50 and 64. To date, DPH identified 1,237,681 positive cases of COVID-19 across all areas of L.A. County and a total of 24,106 deaths. There are 338 people with COVID-19 currently hospitalized, and 20% of these people are in the ICU. Testing results are available for more than 6,653,000 individuals with 17% of people testing positive. Los Angeles County remains in the yellow tier in the State's Blueprint for a Safer Economy that allows for expanded re-openings and increased occupancy limits across a wide range of sectors with required safety measures. Today, the State released updated blueprint tier numbers; L.A. County's adjusted case rate dropped from 1.4 new cases per 100,000 people to 1.2 new cases per 100,000. The overall tests positivity rate dropped from 0.7% to 0.6% across the county and in areas with the fewest health affirming resources, With declining case and test positivity rates, Los Angeles County remains in the least restrictive yellow tier in the State's Blueprint for a Safer Economy. As part of its commitment to reduce health inequities and ensure the best outcomes for all Californians, the State has a Health Equity Dashboard that tracks California's health equity measure and data by race and ethnicity, sexual orientation, and gender identity. The Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) added County View to their national COVID Data Tracker, providing case statistics by County throughout the United States.
