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# COVID-19 Situation Report

JUNE 10, 2021

## CURRENT INITIATIVES AND UPDATES

- **78% of Manhattan Beach Residents are vaccinated** – 22,370 residents in Manhattan Beach have received a COVID-19 vaccine as of June 4, 2021. Of those vaccinated, 98% of residents aged 65 and up and 76% of residents aged 16 to 17 years have been vaccinated with at least one dose.
- **Everbridge** – The City of Manhattan Beach will be enhancing our emergency communication platform and will begin to transition all emergency messaging from NIXLE to Everbridge. Everbridge is a regional integration notification platform with 14 cities in the South Bay that allows you to opt-in to receive notifications via phone calls, text messaging, e-mail, and more based on locations you care about. You can choose to receive notifications about events that may affect your home, workplace, family's schools, and more. If you are already receiving NIXLE alerts, you will continue to receive those alerts, however, you can update your profile and customize your alerts through Everbridge. You can also download the app from your app store by searching for AlertSB and create a profile.
- **City Hall Appointments and Services** – City Hall is expanding hours to allow for walk-in services and appointments. Virtual services are available 24 hours, 7 days a week on [www.citymb.info](http://www.citymb.info). Appointments and walk-in services will be available Monday through Thursday from 1:00p.m. to 5:00 p.m. and Fridays 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. Upon entering City Hall, visitors to the Parks and Recreation, Finance, or Community Development Departments will have a virtual queueing system where visitors will sign in using an iPad or through their smartphone. Visitors will then queue outside or in their car to avoid gathering inside the limited space of the City Hall lobby. The queueing software has texting capability so staff can let the visitor know when it is their turn. Once inside the lobby area, there are visual delineators to denote where to stand or wait.
- **What to Expect on June 15** – The State and the County are expected to update guidance on masking, distancing, and capacity restrictions. Capacity limitations and physical distancing requirements will be lifted, with limited exceptions. Masking requirements will be addressed in the State's separate guidance. There will be limited exceptions for mega events (+5,000 people indoors and +10,000 people outdoors). Indoor mega-events: all attendees must verify full vaccination status or a negative COVID-19 test 72 hours prior to entry. Outdoor mega-events: verifying full vaccination status or negative COVID-19 test is recommended but not required, and attendees who do not verify their status will need to wear masks. LA County's travel advisory will align with the State & CDC. The State will continue to issue separate guidance for: youth, healthcare, and high-risk congregate settings.

County resident cases dating back to March 16, 2020, that are included in case totals. These cases came from inpatient and outpatient medical records and cases with updated address information or revised jurisdiction criteria. As such, Public Health reported an additional 11 new cases dating back to March 16, 2020, in Manhattan Beach. Therefore, these additional cases do not properly reflect a typical daily increase. The change reflects daily increases, not increases from the prior situation report.

## FEDERAL, STATE, AND COUNTY UPDATES

- Yellow Tier** – Los Angeles County has met the threshold for the least restrictive yellow tier in the [State's Blueprint for a Safer Economy](#). Changes to the Health Officer Order took effect May 6, reflecting the County's move into the yellow tier allowing for increased occupancy limits across a wide range of sectors with required safety modifications. Fitness facilities, indoor dining, cardrooms and racetracks, movie theaters, family entertainment centers, breweries, wineries, and craft distilleries can expand indoor occupancy to 50%. Bars establishments are now allowed to open for indoor services at a maximum capacity of 25% or 100 people, whichever is fewer, with no counter seating/service. Amusement parks and fairs can increase capacity to 35%, and waterparks can expand to 40% capacity. Museums and aquariums can increase indoor capacity to 75%. Outdoor live performances and events can increase occupancy to 67% of capacity, while the occupancy limits at indoor live events depend on the total capacity of each venue and the vaccination and testing status of attendees. Other sectors where capacity limits have increased include: private informal gatherings, where the occupancy limit has increased to 50% capacity or 50 people if indoors, whichever is fewer; outdoor gatherings are limited to 100

people. At community sporting events, participation is restricted to 500 people per hour and a total of 1,500 people; if everyone is vaccinated or has tested negative at an outdoor community sporting event, the capacity increases to 3000 people. Office-based businesses and workspaces should limit occupancy to 75% of capacity, unless all staff are vaccinated. Distancing and masking requirements remain in effect at worksites per CalOSHA requirements. At indoor malls, shopping centers, retail stores, hair salons, barbershops, personal care providers, libraries, and limited services, capacity remains limited to 75% to allow for at least 6 feet of distancing among staff and customers. The Health Officer Order requires other modifications across a wide range of sectors. These are modifications focused on infection control, distancing and mask wearing. At all establishments serving food or drink, masking is mandated, except when eating or drinking. Distancing between tables is also still required and counter seating and service is not allowed. Television viewing is now permitted indoors, while live entertainment along with television is permitted outdoors, and aquariums. - **Youth at Work Program** – Calling all L.A. County youth! The L.A. County Youth at Work Program helps place youth in a paid job that leads to a long-term career pathway in high-growth, in-demand industries. The program is for L.A. County resident youth age 14 to 24 years old and those accepted into the program will receive 120 hours of personal enrichment training and paid experience, earn \$15 per hour, have the opportunity to work for a variety of employers in the public, private or non-profit sectors and receive career assistance in areas such as resume preparation and interview training. - **Teen Forum** – With 12-17 year olds now eligible to receive the COVID-19 vaccine, providing accurate and important information to teens is critical. In the COVID-19 Vaccine Teen Forum, Dr. Barbara Ferrer, the Director of the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health, answers some of the most popular questions from Los Angeles County teens themselves, ranging from vaccine safety to how they can talk to their parents about getting the vaccine. - **Projections in Healthcare / Predictive Modeling** – Los Angeles County [Department of Health Services](#) (DHS) released the COVID-19 Projections of Hospital-based [Health Care Demand May 24 Update](#). The update includes data on hospitalizations through May 19, 2021. The underlying statistical prediction model has been significantly modified to incorporate the effect of vaccination in predicting future hospital demand:
  - The daily number of newly hospitalized patients with positive tests for COVID-19 across Los Angeles County has continued to gradually decrease.
  - Patients are still being admitted to hospitals for reasons other than acute COVID-19 illness who have positive COVID-19 PCR tests, often from prior illness that has been resolved. These do not reflect recent transmission.
  - Based on recent data, reflecting transmission that occurred in the middle of April, the estimated transmission number (“R”) at that time was 0.85 with an uncertainty of 0.75 to 0.95. This estimate for R, lower than prior estimate of 0.90 with an uncertainty of 0.78 to 0.99.

- No anticipated shortage of hospital-based resources in the foreseeable future are expected.
  - The DHS team’s epidemic model estimates the number of people in Los Angeles County who are susceptible to infection with COVID-19, have been exposed, are infectious to others, and have recovered or been vaccinated so they are no longer susceptible.
  - The model suggests that about 0.04% (uncertainty of 0.02% to 0.08%) of everyone in Los Angeles County is currently infected and infectious to others.
  - This would suggest about 1 in 2600 (between 1 in 5900 and 1 in 1200) Los Angeles County residents are currently infectious to others. Two weeks ago, this estimate was 1 in 1600.
  - Approximately 5 in every 8 persons in Los Angeles County is estimated to be protected from COVID-19. Approximately 3 in every 8 persons in Los Angeles County has been infected and approximately another 2 in 8 have acquired protection through vaccination.
- **L.A. County Daily Briefing Statistics on COVID-19** – DPH has confirmed 7 new deaths and 220 new cases of COVID-19. Of the seven new deaths reported today, one person that passed away was over the age of 80, three people who died were between the ages of 65 and 79, one person who died was between the ages of 50 and 64, and one person who died was between the ages of 30 and 49. To date, Public Health identified 1,245,771 positive cases of COVID-19 across all areas of L.A. County and a total of 24,414 deaths. There are 244 people with COVID-19 currently hospitalized and 18% of these people are in the ICU. Testing results are available for nearly 6,870,000 individuals with 17% of people testing positive. Today’s daily test positivity rate is 0.4%. Los Angeles County remains in the yellow tier in the State’s Blueprint for a Safer Economy that allows for expanded re-openings and increased occupancy limits across a wide range of sectors with required safety measures. The State released updated blueprint tier numbers; L.A. County’s adjusted case rate dropped from 0.9 new cases per 100,000 people to 0.7 new cases per 100,000. The overall tests positivity rate dropped from 0.5% to 0.4% across the county and in areas with the fewest health affirming resources, with declining case and test positivity rates, Los Angeles County remains in the least restrictive yellow tier in the State’s Blueprint for a Safer Economy.
