CURRENT INITIATIVES AND UPDATES

- Mayor's Town Hall on Public Safety Mayor Suzanne Hadley and the Manhattan Beach Police
 Department hosted a Town Hall on Public Safety and the city's public safety response. Topics
 included Police Department Organization, Data and Calls for Service & Action, Crime Statistics,
 Homelessness, eBike Safety, Neighborhood Watch, and Emergency Notifications. You can view
 the Town Hall and download the supporting presentation at www.citymb.info.
- Everbridge The City of Manhattan Beach will be enhancing our emergency communication platform and will begin to transition all emergency messaging from NIXLE to Everbridge. Everbridge is a regional integration notification platform with 14 cities in the South Bay that allows you to opt-in to receive notifications via phone calls, text messaging, e-mail, and more based on locations you care about. You can choose to receive notifications about events that may affect your home, workplace, family's schools, and more. If you are already receiving NIXLE alerts, you will continue to receive those alerts, however, you can update your profile and customize your alerts through Everbridge. Please take a moment and register for alerts by visiting https://member.everbridge.net/311578402488335/login, or by texting AlertSB to 888777. You can also download the app from your app store by searching for AlertSB and create a profile.
- Still Need to Get Your Vaccine? Uber and Lyft are now providing free rides to and from vaccination sites within Los Angeles County. You can order through the Uber and Lyft apps or by calling 833-540-0473 to book a ride. For more information visit VaccinateLACounty.com. In addition, the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health has a new Transit & Paratransit for People with Disabilities webpage with information to help people with disabilities get to a vaccination site. If you or anyone you know needs assistance with transportation or are homebound and needs to get vaccinated at home, call the DPH Vaccine Call Center at 833-540-0473. The Call Center is open daily from 8am to 8:30pm. You can also submit a request for in-home vaccination by visiting the How to Get a Vaccine webpage. - What to Expect on June 15 The State and the County are expected to update guidance on masking, distancing, and capacity restrictions. Capacity limitations and physical distancing requirements will be lifted, with limited exceptions. Masking requirements will be addressed in the State's separate guidance. There will be limited exceptions for mega events (+5,000 people indoors and +10,000 people outdoors). Indoor mega-events: all attendees must verify full vaccination status or a negative COVID-19 test 72 hours prior to entry. Outdoor mega-events: verifying full vaccination status or negative COVID-19 test is recommended but not required, and attendees who do not verify their status will need to wear masks. LA County's travel advisory will

align with the State & CDC. The State will continue to issue separate guidance for: youth, healthcare, and high-risk congregate settings.

- Masking guidance for Reopening California Department of Health releseased guidance on masking that will take effect TODAY, June 15:
 - Masks will not be required for fully vaccinated people, except in the following settings where masks are required for everyone, regardless of vaccination status:
 - Public transit and in transportation hubs,
 - Indoors in K-12 schools, childcare and other youth settings,
 - Healthcare settings, including long term care facilities,
 - State and local correctional facilities and detention centers, and
 - Homeless shelters, emergency shelters, and cooling centers.
 - Masks will be required for unvaccinated people (including children 2 12) in indoor public settings and businesses. This includes:
 - Retail, restaurants, theatres, family entertainment centers, meetings, and state and local government offices serving the public
 - o Everyone can unmask outdoors:
 - Except unvaccinated people (including children 2 12) attending large outdoor events

Everyone has a right to wear a mask; a person may not be prevented from wearing a mask as a condition of participation/entry into a business. For more information, please visit <u>publichealth.lacounty.gov</u>.

View daily cases in an infographic via the. View Beach Cities Case Information via Beach Cities Health District COVID-19 by the Numbers. *On May 27, 2021, the County Department of Public Health's data teams identified 3,857 historical L.A. County resident cases dating back to March 16, 2020, that are included in case totals. These cases came from inpatient and outpatient medical records and cases with updated address information or revised jurisdiction criteria. As such, Public Health reported an additional 11 new cases dating back to March 16, 2020, in Manhattan Beach. Therefore, these additional cases do not properly reflect a typical daily increase. The change reflects daily increases, not increases from the prior situation report.

FEDERAL, STATE, AND COUNTY UPDATES

- Moving Beyond the Blueprint On June 15, California retired the Blueprint for a Safer Economy and our economy is now fully open. Restaurants, shopping malls, and most everyday places are operating as normal with no capacity limits or physical distancing required. Face coverings will still be required in some settings and Californians will be required to follow restrictions for large events. Find out what you can do to stay safe and keep California open. - Youth at Work Program Calling all L.A. County youth! The L.A. County Youth at Work Program helps place youth in a paid job that leads to a long-term career pathway in high-growth, indemand industries. The program is for L.A. County resident youth age 14 to 24 years old and those accepted into the program will receive 120 hours of personal enrichment training and paid experience, earn \$15 per hour, have the opportunity to work for a variety of employers in the public, private or non-profit sectors and receive career assistance in areas such as resume preparation and interview training. - Strengthening Small Businesses: From Access to Opportunity This National Virtual

- Projections in Healthcare / Predictive Modeling Los Angeles County <u>Department of Health Services</u> (DHS) released the COVID-19 Projections of Hospital-based <u>Health Care Demand May 24 Update</u>. The update includes data on hospitalizations through May 19, 2021. The underlying statistical prediction model has been significantly modified to incorporate the effect of vaccination in predicting future hospital demand:
 - The daily number of newly hospitalized patients with positive tests for COVID-19 across Los Angeles County has continued to gradually decrease.
 - Patients are still being admitted to hospitals for reasons other than acute COVID-19 illness who have positive COVID-19 PCR tests, often from prior illness that has been resolved. These do not reflect recent transmission.
 - o Based on recent data, reflecting transmission that occurred in the middle of April, the estimated transmission number ("R") at that time was 0.85 with an uncertainty of 0.75 to 0.95. This estimate for R, lower than prior estimate of 0.90 with an uncertainty of 0.78 to 0.99.
 - No anticipated shortage of hospital-based resources in the foreseeable future are expected.
 - o The DHS team's epidemic model estimates the number of people in Los Angeles County who are susceptible to infection with COVID-19, have been exposed, are infectious to others, and have recovered or been vaccinated so they are no longer susceptible.
 - The model suggests that about 0.04% (uncertainty of 0.02% to 0.08%) of everyone in Los Angeles County is currently infected and infectious to others.

- This would suggest about 1 in 2600 (between 1 in 5900 and 1 in 1200) Los Angeles
 County residents are currently infectious to others. Two weeks ago, this estimate was 1 in
 1600.
- Approximately 5 in every 8 persons in Los Angeles County is estimated to be protected from COVID-19. Approximately 3 in every 8 persons in Los Angeles County has been infected and approximately another 2 in 8 have acquired protection through vaccination.
- L.A. County Daily Briefing Statistics on COVID-19 DPH has confirmed 6 new deaths and 210 new cases of COVID-19. Of the six new deaths reported today, three people that passed away were over the age of 80, one person who died was between the ages of 50 and 64, and one person who died was between the ages of 30 and 49. One death was reported by the City of Long Beach. To date, Public Health identified 1,246,619 positive cases of COVID-19 across all areas of L.A. County and a total of 24,416 deaths. There are 218 people with COVID-19 currently hospitalized and 20% of these people are in the ICU. Testing results are available for nearly 6,910,000 individuals with 17% of people testing positive. Today's daily test positivity rate is 0.4%. To view Statewide case statistics and demographics, including positive cases, deaths, and testing results, visit COVID:19 California Case Statistics. As part of its commitment to reduce health inequities and ensure the best outcomes for all Californians, the State has a Health Equity Dashboard that tracks California's health equity measure and data by race and ethnicity, sexual orientation, and gender identity. The Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) added County View to their national COVID Data Tracker, providing case statistics by County throughout the United States.
