CURRENT INITIATIVES AND UPDATES

- City Hall Extended Hours for In-Person Services City Hall further extended hours for inperson services. Hours will include Monday through Thursday 8:00 AM to 5:00 PM and Friday 8:00 AM 4:00 PM. The City will be providing an announcement with further details soon.
- 80% of Manhattan Beach Residents are vaccinated 22,730 residents in Manhattan Beach have received a COVID-19 vaccine as of Jun 18, 2021. Of those vaccinated, 98.9% of residents (5,683 people) aged 65 and up and 79.5% of residents (23,773 persons) aged 16-54 years have been vaccinated with at least one dose.
- Everbridge The City of Manhattan Beach will be enhancing our emergency communication platform and will begin to transition all emergency messaging from NIXLE to Everbridge. Everbridge is a regional integration notification platform with 14 cities in the South Bay that allows you to opt-in to receive notifications via phone calls, text messaging, email, and more based on locations you care about. You can choose to receive notifications about events that may affect your home, workplace, family's schools, and more. If you are already receiving NIXLE alerts, you will continue to receive those alerts, however, you can update your profile and customize your alerts through Everbridge. - Best Practices to Prevent COVID-19 The Los Angeles County Department of Public Health
 updated their Best Practice Guidance for businesses as they begin to resume full operations.
 While the risk of COVID-19 is still present, it is important for employers to take steps to reduce
 the risk of COVID-19 transmission among their workers and customers. Following is a
 summary of the Best Practice Guidance:
 - o As a reminder, everyone, regardless of vaccination status, must wear a mask:
 - On planes, trains, buses, ferries, taxis and ride-shares, and all other forms of public transport, Indoors in K-12 schools, childcare and other youth settings,
 - In transportation hubs like airports, bus terminals, train stations, marinas, seaports or other ports, subway stations, or any other area that provides transportation,
 - State and local correctional facilities and detention centers,
 - Healthcare settings,
 - Shelters and cooling centers,

- Indoors at any youth-serving facility (such as K-12 schools, childcare, day camps, etc.), and
- Any business or government office serving the public that requires everyone to wear a mask.
- In addition, people who are NOT fully vaccinated against COVID-19 must also wear a mask in indoor public settings and businesses, for example:
 - Retail spaces, movie theaters, restaurants, theatres, family entertainment centers, meetings, and state and local government offices serving the public.

View Beach Cities Case Information via Beach Cities Health District COVID-19 by the Numbers. *On May 27, 2021, the County Department of Public Health's data teams identified 3,857 historical L.A. County resident cases dating back to March 16, 2020, that are included in case totals. These cases came from inpatient and outpatient medical records and cases with updated address information or revised jurisdiction criteria. As such, Public Health reported an additional 11 new cases dating back to March 16, 2020, in Manhattan Beach. Therefore, these additional cases do not properly reflect a typical daily increase. The change reflects daily increases, not increases from the prior situation report.

- PPE Unite Program The PPE Unite program aims to support small business owners by distributing personal protective equipment at no cost to businesses as they aim to re-open their doors to bring employees back to work. State, local, and private entities encourages PPE use for all small business economic recovery and promotes general public health and safety. Eligible businesses are those that are small business (sole proprietor, partnership, LLC, C or S-Corp, microbusiness), non-profits, or organizations with less than 100 employees and located in an eligible County. Eligible businesses will receive a one-time 30 day supply of PPE (may include face masks, hand sanitizer, face shields). For more information and to register for the program, visit PPE Unite.

- Projections in Healthcare / Predictive Modeling Los Angeles County <u>Department of Health Services</u> (DHS) released the COVID-19 Projections of Hospital-based <u>Health Care Demand May 24 Update</u>. The update includes data on hospitalizations through May 19, 2021. The underlying statistical prediction model has been significantly modified to incorporate the effect of vaccination in predicting future hospital demand:
 - The daily number of newly hospitalized patients with positive tests for COVID-19 across Los Angeles County has continued to gradually decrease.
 - Patients are still being admitted to hospitals for reasons other than acute COVID-19 illness who have positive COVID-19 PCR tests, often from prior illness that has been resolved. These do not reflect recent transmission.
 - o Based on recent data, reflecting transmission that occurred in the middle of April, the estimated transmission number ("R") at that time was 0.85 with an uncertainty of 0.75 to 0.95. This estimate for R, lower than prior estimate of 0.90 with an uncertainty of 0.78 to 0.99.
 - No anticipated shortage of hospital-based resources in the foreseeable future are expected.
 - The DHS team's epidemic model estimates the number of people in Los Angeles County who are susceptible to infection with COVID-19, have been exposed, are infectious to others, and have recovered or been vaccinated so they are no longer susceptible.
 - o The model suggests that about 0.04% (uncertainty of 0.02% to 0.08%) of everyone in Los Angeles County is currently infected and infectious to others.
 - This would suggest about 1 in 2600 (between 1 in 5900 and 1 in 1200) Los Angeles
 County residents are currently infectious to others. Two weeks ago, this estimate was 1
 in 1600.
 - o Approximately 5 in every 8 persons in Los Angeles County is estimated to be protected from COVID-19. Approximately 3 in every 8 persons in Los Angeles County has been infected and approximately another 2 in 8 have acquired protection through vaccination.
- L.A. County Daily Briefing Statistics on COVID-19 DPH has confirmed 5 new deaths and 172 new cases of COVID-19. Of the five new deaths reported today, three people that passed away

were over the age of 80, one person who died was between the ages of 50 and 64, and one person who died was between the ages of 30 and 49. To date, Public Health identified 1,247,899 positive cases of COVID-19 across all areas of L.A. County and a total of 24,445 deaths. There are 220 people with COVID-19 currently hospitalized. Testing results are available for more than 6,964,000 individuals with 17% of people testing positive. Today's daily test positivity rate is 0.8%. As part of its commitment to reduce health inequities and ensure the best outcomes for all Californians, the State has a Health Equity Dashboard that tracks California's health equity measure and data by race and ethnicity, sexual orientation, and gender identity. The Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) added County View to their national COVID Data Tracker, providing case statistics by County throughout the United States.
