# COVID-19 Situation Report

JULY 1, 2021

## CURRENT INITIATIVES AND UPDATES

- **Fourth of July Weekend** – As the community comes together to celebrate Independence Day, the City of Manhattan Beach wishes everyone a safe, healthy, and happy Fourth of July weekend. With many gatherings, parades, and fireworks events planned in the South Bay, we would like to remind the community that fireworks in the City of Manhattan Beach are illegal. The possession and discharge of fireworks, including those that are deemed ‘safe and sane,’ is a misdemeanor and can result in further consequence. - **Still Need to Get Your COVID-19 Vaccination?** - Beginning this Friday, July 2 through next Thursday, July 8 at county-run vaccination sites, LA City sites, and St. John’s Well Child and Family Center sites, everyone 18 and older coming to get a vaccine will have an opportunity to win one of four packages of tickets and passes to botanical gardens in the area. Each prize package consists of one annual membership to the Huntington Botanical Gardens and one-day passes to Descanso Gardens, L.A. County Arboretum, and South Coast Botanic Garden. - **City Hall Extended Hours for In-Person Services** – City Hall further extended hours for in-person services. Hours will include Monday through Thursday 8:00 AM to 5:00 PM and Friday 8:00 AM – 4:00 PM. The City continues to offer virtual services and recommends utilizing these convenient options by phone and online. To find those services, please [citymb.info/appointments](http://citymb.info/appointments). If visiting City Hall, visitors should be aware that City Hall has aligned with the Centers for Disease Control, State of California, and County of Los Angeles guidance on the wearing of face coverings. While the City continues to encourage the use of face coverings at City Hall, face coverings will be optional for vaccinated individuals and required for unvaccinated individuals.
- **Everbridge** – The City of Manhattan Beach is enhancing our emergency communication platform and will begin to transition all emergency messaging from NIXLE to Everbridge. Everbridge is a regional integration notification platform with 14 cities in the South Bay that allows you to opt-in to receive notifications via phone calls, text messaging, e-mail, and more based on locations you care about. You can choose to receive notifications about events that may affect your home, workplace, family’s schools, and more. If you are already receiving NIXLE alerts, you will continue to receive those alerts, however, you can update your profile and customize your alerts through Everbridge. You can also download the app from your app store by searching for AlertSB and create a profile.

- **As Delta Variant Circulates, Public Health Recommends Masking Indoors as a Precaution**
  - With increase circulation of the highly transmissible Delta variant, the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health (Public Health) strongly recommends everyone, regardless of vaccination status, wear masks indoors in public places as a precautionary measure. In the week ending June 12, Delta variants comprised of nearly half of all variants sequenced in Los Angeles County. Public Health strongly recommends people wear masks indoors in settings such as grocery or retail stores; theaters and family entertainment centers, and workplaces when you don't know everyone's vaccination status. Until we better understand how and to who the Delta variant is spreading, everyone should focus on maximum protection with minimum interruption to routine as all businesses operate without other restrictions, like physical distancing and capacity limits. Fully vaccinated people appear to be well protected from infections with Delta variants, however people with only one vaccine dose of Pfizer or Moderna are not as well-protected. The smaller number of COVID-19 infections identified in people who are fully vaccinated have been mild illnesses. - **Health Officer Order Update** – [The Health Officer Order for a Safer Return Together at Work and in the Community](#) was updated on June 28 to include an additional facility/setting where masks will be required for everyone regardless of vaccination status for COVID-19. Following is a summary of the Best Practice Guidance:
  - **As a reminder, everyone, regardless of vaccination status, must wear a mask:**
    - On planes, trains, buses, ferries, taxis and ride-shares, and all other forms of public transport, Indoors in K-12 schools, childcare and other youth settings,
    - In transportation hubs like airports, bus terminals, train stations, marinas, seaports or other ports, subway stations, or any other area that provides transportation,
    - State and local correctional facilities and detention centers,
    - Healthcare settings,
    - Shelters and cooling centers,
    - Indoors at any youth-serving facility (such as K-12 schools, childcare, day camps, etc.), and
    - Any business or government office serving the public that requires everyone to wear a mask.
  - In addition, people who are NOT fully vaccinated against COVID-19 must also wear a mask in indoor public settings and businesses, for example:
    - Retail spaces, movie theaters, restaurants, theatres, family entertainment centers, meetings, and state and local government offices serving the public.

View daily cases in an infographic via the [View Beach Cities Case Information via Beach Cities Health District COVID-19 by the Numbers](#). \*On May 27, 2021, the County Department of Public Health's data teams identified 3,857 historical L.A. County resident cases dating back to March 16, 2020, that are included in case totals. These cases came from inpatient and outpatient medical records and cases with updated address information or revised jurisdiction criteria. As such, Public Health reported an additional 11 new cases dating back to March 16, 2020, in Manhattan Beach. Therefore, these additional cases do not properly reflect a typical daily increase. The change reflects daily increases, not increases from the prior situation report.

### FEDERAL, STATE, AND COUNTY UPDATES

- Moving Beyond the Blueprint** – On June 15, California retired the Blueprint for a Safer Economy and our economy is now fully open. Restaurants, shopping malls, and most everyday places are operating as normal – with no capacity limits or physical distancing required. Face coverings will still be required in some settings and Californians will be required to follow restrictions for large events. Find out what you can do to stay safe and keep California open. - Los Angeles County Department of Mental Health partners with iPrevail** – The Los Angeles County Department of Mental Health is now offering [iPrevail](#) free to all L.A. County residents. iPrevail is an online mental health resource that brings traditional models of talk therapy to any internet-connected device or smartphone. Residents can connect 24/7 with trained peer specialists, join a community support group, or try out one of the many digital programs the platform offers. - L.A. County Daily Briefing Statistics on COVID-19** – Los Angeles Department of Public Health 6 new deaths and 506 new cases of COVID-19. Of the six new deaths reported today, two people that passed away were over the age of 80, two people who died were between the ages of 50 and 64, and two people who died were between the ages of 30 and 49. To date, Public Health identified 1,250,717 positive cases of COVID-19 across all areas of L.A. County and a total of 24,489 deaths. There are 275 people with COVID-19 currently hospitalized and 28% of these people are in the Intensive Care Unit (ICU). Testing results are available for more than 7,035,000 individuals with 17% of people testing positive.
