AGENDA ITEM NO. 14 HOMELESSNESS UPDATE

JULY 6, 2021

GRANT FUNDING

- City has utilized \$230,328 of total grant funding.
- City approved for additional grant funding (\$14,518) to last for calendar year.
- Staff will apply for grant funding with other beach cities to ensure funding for homeless services continues beyond December 2021.
- South Bay Cities Council of Government (SBCCOG) will administer call for projects in the amount of \$1,905,000 in Measure H grant funding.



COORDINATION

- Training materials developed for City Staff.
- Thus far, approximately 20 staff members trained.
- Regional Outreach Response Document
 - Established outreach protocol for persons experiencing homelessness, and providing a contact list of homeless services providers.



The Cities of Manhattan Beach, Hermosa Beach, and Redondo Beach ("Beach Cities") collectively have a population of over 123,000 residents (Manhattan Beach: 35,741, Hermosa Beach: 19,653, and Redondo Beach: 67,908). Beach Cities is part of the County's Service Planning Area (SPA) 8 and the Fourth Supervisorial District. Based on the 2020 Greater Los Angeles Homeless Count, the combined homelessness for these cities is 221. Specifically, the latest homeless count in each City is:

Manhattan Beach - 15
Hermosa Beach - 29

Redondo Beach – 177



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HOMELESS COURT AND PROSECUTION UPDATE

- At the June 1, 2021, meeting, City Council directed staff to continue exploring homeless court, identify necessary funding and perform a cost-benefit analysis of undertaking the effort.
- Additionally, Council directed staff provide information on the process to request the authority from the LA County District Attorney to prosecute state law misdemeanors through the City of Redondo Beach.
- Staff has met with officials from the City of Redondo Beach. Staff has tentatively agendized the July 20, 2021, City Council meeting to discuss the topic.



REGIONAL UPDATES

- Redondo Beach Pallet Shelters
- Torrance Pallet Shelters
- City of Los Angeles Feasibility Study
 - Possibility of housing homeless people in temporary cabins or camping sites in certain westside parks and beach parking lots. Nearby areas include:
 - Temporary single-occupancy tiny homes, a safe camping or safe parking site at Dockweiler Beach county-owned parking lot number three, at 11999 Vista Del Mar in Playa Del Rey;
 - Temporary RV safe parking site in the county-owned RV park at Dockweiler Beach, at 12001 Vista Del Mar in Playa Del Rey,
 - Staff has held meetings with Supervisor Janice Hahn's Office and has asked to be apprised of developments.



SUCCESS STORY AND COMMUNITY COLLABORATION

• Family Reunification

- Client was a Transitional Age Youth meaning between the ages of 18-24 years old and had been sleeping near a grocery store Manhattan Beach.
- Outreach worker was able to discuss their personal resources (family, friends, etc.), and the individuals were able to connect with a family member back home in Richmond, VA.

• Referrals and Donations

- Manhattan Beach Community members reached out to the Beach Cities Housing Navigator via LA-HOP and Beach Cities Coordinator about two houseless youth that were experiencing homelessness.
- Community members pulled together and offered to pay for a few months rent while the individuals wait on the housing subsidies to go through. Successfully, they are both safely housed within the South Bay and connecting to resources that will help build self-sufficiency.



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CONCLUSION

- City remains diligent:
 - Leadership role in region
 - Quarterly reports to the City Council
- Staff recommends the City Council receive the report on homelessness initiatives.



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
