Mayor, Council and Staff,

As outlined in detail in the Coastal Defender document, the sidewalk encroachments are clearly a violation of ADA in spirit and law, and a remarkable step by city staff to undertake without specific council action.

As I'm sure you know, the restaurant lobby has implemented an ambitious, offensive and manipulative campaign online, in social media, and including posters that falsely state there is "No Plan," when in fact the city has initiated a work plan to fully address the complex issues address in potential permanent outdoor dining encroachments. It simply appears that the only plan that will satisfy is one that immediately capitulates to their demand for prime outdoor dining space – most with ocean views, on public land, in the street, at pennies on the dollar.

The poster states; "...outdoor dining has become a blissful way to enjoy our local restaurants. "Blissful..?" – maybe for you, but certainly not for people with strollers, or wheelchairs, or walking their dogs, - and MOST IMPORTANTLY, entirely different from the intent of this program, and the misrepresented rationalizations the restaurateurs chorused about helping to "survive" the pandemic financially.

The objective of this program was to address the emergency – not to create opportunity for the restaurants.

Prominent restaurateurs have criticized council for not starting the process earlier – evidencing what has been clear almost from the outset, that this was not about a short term response to the pandemic, but a unmitigated land grab – and not acknowledging the extraordinary extent to which council has bent over backwards to implement, extend, and reduce costs – not to mention the hundreds of thousands of dollars in lost revenue and staff time...

The fact that outdoor dining may be pleasant does not make acceptable the opportunistic leveraging of a public health and financial emergency to try and create a permanent self-enrichment utilizing the public right-of-way – let alone undermining the unique, small town character and balance of the downtown.

All of this ignores or misrepresents:

- that this was based on an emergency state order that expires 3/31/21.
- the reality, as staff has indicated repeatedly, that an Environmental Impact Report is required to address encroachments beyond the emergency—which means the decks must be removed to get a baseline, and the requisite time for study analysis plan and implementation will likely approach 3 years or more
- ignores coastal plan requirements, particularly in the appealable coastal zone

- ignores violations of current requirements that overall capacity indoor and out not exceed baseline occupancy permits
- ignores repeated requests to substantiate the claims of lost revenue under current circumstances.
- ignores ADA requirements and responsibilities

Before one can legitimately measure support permanent outdoor dining encroachments, people should be fully informed, starting with dispelling fallacies like the "importance" of restaurant contributions to city sales tax revenue (overall downtown sales tax is de minimis, led by Vons, not restaurants, and costs far more to support than it generates), or the misconception that the city can unilaterally and immediately revise the coastal plan in pursuit of blissful dining.

Even if 100% of the city's residents are in favor of some permanent outdoor dining plan, we still must have a plan, and must respect other's rights, laws – and pay appropriate value for the use of the most desirable commercial real estate in the city.

Coupled with the street slurry plan and the need to maintain the sewer system – not to mention the increased COVID risk engendered by encouraging more visitors – it is difficult to understand how any of this makeshift food court – or the "Save Outdoor Dining" campaign – responsibly and fairly serves this community as a whole.

Please stay the course and remove the encroachments from both the street and the sidewalks on January 3.

Hello,

I'm writing as a resident and property owner here in Manhattan Beach. As I watch the news, it becomes more and more clear that the pandemic is not over. Consequently, the decks remain a viable measure for the health of the citizens of the city. If nothing else, please do not end their use until more information on the Covid threat shows a substantial lowering of risk, not an increased threat. FYI my brother-in-law, also a Manhattan Beach resident, is an E.R. doctor at Cedars. He had a slow night two days ago because the hospital is full. This is not hyperbole. They had to reroute patients because the Covid surge has the hospital so full, they're unable to accommodate more people.

On a separate note, Mr. Napolitano replied to a friend who also wishes to continue outdoor dining and said the following:

And yes, the city has lost significant funding over the last two years by the loss of parking meter rates, which goes to support the services the city provides to everyone. The restaurants have not offered to cover those losses. The city imposed a token \$1 a sq foot charge per month about a month ago, well below market rates and certainly doesn't cover the lost parking revenue (a loss of \$750k over the course of a year). Basically, we've done a wink and a nod so far on what is an illegal gift of public funds. We've yet to have any offer from the restaurants to pay for the additional costs incurred by the City. As for the cost of the decks, some cost more than others, but everyone knew it was a choice-some chose to build them, others didn't and there's an equity issue with that, as the moderately priced places that charge \$10 for a burger can't necessarily afford the cost of a deck that a place that charges \$60 for an ala carte steak can. And no, the city is not seeing extra revenue because of the decks because the occupancy remains the same.

Earlier today I received a letter from the city telling me that the 3-unit building I own will be inspected by the Fire Marshall and that I "will be billed for the inspection."

If I can be billed by the city for an inspection to my property (which may or may not be necessary), it is political sleight-of-hand to suggest that the city somehow cannot charge a fair rate to businesses to have decks. You expect them to *offer* additional payments? Are you serious? That's a tremendously disingenuous statement from a politician I otherwise rather like.

Finally, I would like the outdoor decks to become a permanent addition to the Manhattan Beach landscape. Certainly those decks need to be inspected, billed, and properly maintained, but I do believe the vast majority of the city's residents are in favor of keeping them.

Mayor Stern and Councilmembers,

This evening. December 21, for no valid reason, the city council considers extending the eat & drink encroachments in the public right of way.

Even if a valid reason exists, not the case, any reduction in patrons will simply reduce violations by premises owners of their occupancy limits in use and encroachment permits. The attached photos of Simmzy's, Brewco, Rock'N Fish and Rockefeller provide substantial evidence that owners operate at full capacity, both indoors and outdoors, with patrons encroached on sidewalks while waiting for seating.

A stroll through the Downtown reveals that the premises operate at roughly 100% over permitted occupancy, creating public safety hazards and blocking coastal access, by parking unavailability and traffic. Mayor Stern has stated as much to the media. This evidence presented at the December 7 hearing. Have other councilmembers inspected the situation?

Emergency Order No. 10, which on 5 June 2020 established the temporary encroachments, states, "In no event shall the overall dining capacity for a restaurant exceed 100% of its approved capacity." Community Development claims the encroachment permits include the same condition, but in response to a public act request, they refuse to make the permits public so it not possible to fact check them.

These occupancy-limit conditions null and void, however, because the city cannot enforce them, a legal requirement for land-use permits. Except for public safety, city officials may not enter private property without prior notice or a warrant. Consequently, it impossible to count noses inside the premises to determine if indoor and outdoor occupancy complies with the permits.

The premises owners know this, so do not and will not limit how many patrons they can squeeze into their encroachments. Presumably, they comply with interior occupancies, which if not, would violate the fire code.

If premises owners had any sense of responsibility, they would comply with their permit occupancies, but they do not.

No reason exists to extend the temporary encroachments on decks and sidewalks. It would take a 50% reduction in patrons to bring the owners into compliance with their permits. A 50% reduction may happen in areas of other ethnicities, but not in Manhattan Beach.

The council can force a little bit of compliance with occupancy limits by not extending the encroachments past January 3rd. If premises owners complied with occupancy limits, which they do not, then an extension to the March 31 expiry of the state emergency would make sense.

Let's Remember...

In March 2020 – we were in lockdown. Beaches were closed, the ocean was off limits; people were issued fines for trying to surf or even simply walking through pollywog park. Restaurants were closed, gyms were closed, as were shoe repair, surf shops, hair salons, nail salons, etc. We were being told to stay inside. It was the beginning of a global pandemic that brought a complete unknown health threat and we were without tools to combat a rapidly spreading virus.

As outdoor venues began to open – indoor activities remained on lock down. In an effort to help struggling restaurants, the city allowed the use of public right of way and the construction of dining decks in a gesture of overwhelming support that included generous staff time to help these struggling businesses. However, this was not without debate. Many people on multiple occasions expressed concerned about giving away free use of public right of way, loss of parking for local DT residents, additional trash and noise from outdoor activities, and lack of ADA access. In addition, there was much regarding a very specific concern - if temporary dining decks were to be allowed in public right of way (i.e., the street) it would turn into a permanent situation without the benefit of any environmental evaluation and or regulatory approval. To this end – Council stated emphatically and on multiple occasions that these were temporary measures only and that any consideration of anything permanent would be a separate discussion. Comm Dev Director Tai agreed that permanent outdoor dining would need an EIR. Even DBPA President Lamkin stated that any permanent solution would involve environmental, traffic, and the California coastal commission.

The message from Council has been consistent – temporary and permanent would be addressed separately AND temporary dining decks would be removed when indoor dining was allowed without restriction. Thus, on August 24th (four months ago) Council voted to allow temporary outdoor dining decks up until Jan 3rd, 2022 with a point of re-evaluation in early December. Council also instructed staff to begin the process of looking at a long-term permanent solution and develop a draft work plan item for council consideration. The city has kept their commitment and has shown tremendous support to restaurants throughout this process.

Unfortunately, the recent massive misinformation campaign is now attempting to keep temporary outdoor dining until a plan for permanent dining is in place. Their messaging seems to fault council for an alleged recent vote to remove outdoor dining decks without any permanent plan in place. Remember Council voted in August to remove the dining decks on Jan 3^{rd} – this was not recent. They cite the desire for the continued blissful experience of outdoor dining as one aspect of the rationale on why it should continue. This is a complete mischaracterization of

how this process has unfolded and is simply soliciting emotional input from people who may not have been closely following councils' decisions.

What is further disheartening – is that now DBPA leadership is trying to blame the need for an extension of the Jan 3rd deadline on COVID. The outdooring dining deck program allowance was intended to get us through an early difficult time – until indoor dining was allowed. It was not an "everyone likes it so let's continue it" or an "I don't feel comfortable eating indoors", or even the "only blissful dining experience I have is outdoors" program. This is not a program that exists in a vacuum without direct impacts to other city stakeholders and enough is enough.

If anything, now is the time for the restaurants and DBPA leadership to return the city's support by allowing city infrastructure projects to begin again, allow public works to get into stormdrain manholes that have been covered by the dining decks and allow the streets of downtown to be repaved and allow parking Lot 3 to be refurbished as is planned for Jan to April 2022. Allow residents to have their parking back.

The Superbowl is coming to LA in early Feb 2022 and the last thing this town needs are non-vaccinated people coming from all over the country or world utilizing our outdoor dining facilities and walking around town. If we are really concerned about the variant lets remove the temporary dining decks and begin checking vaccine cards or for all indoor diners. Let's scale down – not scale up – our dining program.

Unfortunately, although any downsizing of dining or reduction in visitors might be best for the city relative to COVID - it is not in a restaurant's best financial interest – the real issue at stake.

Fortunately – Council has the authority to make a decision that is in the best interest of the city by not allowing the continuation of outdoor dining after January 3rd.

Indoor dining is now allowed at 100% and we are in a much different time today than we were almost two years ago. We understand the virus better, we have tools and resources to combat the original and the variants – let's do this without outdoor dining decks.

NO PLAN regarding outdoor dining.

Why would these owners do this? Trying to get residents upset with city council? Creating a new "Big Lie"?

We were involved with the Downtown Specific Plan a few year back.

This took millions of taxpayer dollars, lengthy studies - mapping, reports, input from residents and businesses...This took well over 2 years.

In the end, the Coastal Commission turned it down.

The poster also states "blissful" outdoor dining.

I am Reminding everyone that before COVID we were all "blissful" eating indoors at our restaurants. Walking out of Manhattan Meats, turning right with bags of groceries, and being harassed, bullied and threatened by bar patrons just by me saying "excuse me" so i can get by is not a "blissful" experience.

Locals are avoiding shopping downtown altogether

We are not ADA (American Disabilities Act) compliant.

And that's okay because its the way it has been?? And the city turns their heads and does nothing about it. This "ableism" is unbecoming to our town.

Good afternoon Mayor Stern and Council Members:

I may not be able to attend tomorrow night's meeting due to the final push for holiday sales, so I wish to share with you some thoughts.

I own Tabula Rasa Essentials in DTMB for over 20 years, live in MB for almost 24, serve on the MBCC Board and I'm an Executive Board Member of the DBPA. Given all of this, I have vast and experienced knowledge of our downtown. As an executive board member, I also have an essential responsibility to understand and balance the needs of all three primary business segments - Dining, Retail and Service in our downtown. This letter is not meant to represent my position on the board, but my personal thoughts with a focus on downtown because that is where most of my experience both professionally and privately resides.

We live in paradise. Our community is blessed with the ability to live a very outward lifestyle because of our weather, our desire for healthy living and the accessibility of most everything we need within walking or a short driving distance away. In southern California, if we can be outside, we are outside. We are immersed in sunshine and fresh air. Manhattan Beach is a supremely special place.

Through COVID, among all it's challenges, and there were and are still many, a few unexpected opportunities surfaced. The most impactful on our downtown community is outdoor dining. As a council, you acted swiftly to support our restaurateurs who were in a dire situation with the closure of indoor eating. The owner's intelligence, agility and survival kicked in and with the support of the city, business community, and community at large, they pivoted to outdoor dining. It was absolutely the right move. What we learned through this process, and of no surprise to most, is our locals and visitors love eating outside. Why wouldn't we? We live in paradise.

Throughout the past 22 months, our retailers and service businesses have also suffered, with the personal care industry likely being the hardest hit because of all the mandates and the long periods of closure. Thankfully, council bravely voted to lift ordinances to allow retailers to reopen. Unfortunately, our retail and service industries do not benefit from a robust national association like the dining sector does - but they are warriors too - pivoting to web based business, offering curbside pick up, outdoor classes, local delivery, etc. All our small business owners work so hard to overcome the obstacles of county mandates, consumer reluctance and fear, lack of parking, supply shortages, and more. Despite the hardships and the loss of over 70 street parking spaces, support for restaurants able to manage outdoor dining remained.

It is impossible to reconcile the losses and gains for businesses due to outdoor dining decks. From a consumer standpoint, the response is undeniably positive. Our restaurants are beloved destinations and their survival is imperative. Our surrounding businesses are equally as important and beloved.

but what is the revenue effect on non restaurant businesses? Finance knows the cost of a single parking space, and the revenues from meter collections. Can finance surmise the revenue lost by the inability of a consumer to park? Speculation leads me to believe with the elimination of 70 plus parking spaces, the revenues missed equates to millions in consumer spending downtown. Considering how many times an individual parking space turns over in a day, multiplied by how much the consumers are spending downtown in any business segment while they are parked, multiplied by a year - the number is quite substantial and far reaching. So there's a delicate balance...occupied dining deck vs. dining decks only open in the evening hours, vs. revolving consumer parking every 15 minutes to two hours all day and night vs. impact to all businesses. Complicated!

We are now in the throes of another spike in an unpredictable pandemic. Outdoor dining is due to expire on January 3rd. I respectfully ask council to extend outdoor dining for restaurants currently permitted for a period of time so consumers and employees who are unable to or will not dine or work indoors have the option to be outside. I also request that sidewalk dining and outdoor build-outs such as Metlox Plaza which has no affect on street parking remain. Given the past 2 years and a very strong appetite for outdoor dining by consumers, a fast tracked permanent solution should be prioritized in the New Year. We have almost 2 years of data. We no longer need to guess the success, or impact to businesses, residents, safety, cleanliness, traffic, et al. I encourage you to find an equitable solution for all so we continue to thrive as a community both in business and as residents.

The city has cited increased trash, noise, parking and traffic congestion as the reasons for this. I promise you that you can eliminate all of these problems if you put undue pressure on businesses and allow them to fail, but there will be a cost. You might have plenty of parking...but there will be nowhere to go when you do park. We are not through this crisis. We respectfully request that the full impact of profit and loss from downtown businesses during the pandemic be shared fully – and that the Council's proposals for allocating the COVID relief funds be fully transparent to the public.

In August of this year, I asked that you extend outdoor dining through Spring of 2022 given the predictions from our nation's leading epidemiologists (see below). You voted to reject that motion. At the time, you said, the evidence was too contested to allow for decision-making. The evidence is no longer contested. You have another wave of this public health crisis at our doorsteps. Please act now to keep our city safe from harm, both physically and economically. Act

now to extend outdoor dining into Spring 2022 – and monitor the situation in cooperation with our local restaurants to determine when people feel comfortable returning indoors and we can resume business as usual. Until that time, business as usual is the riskiest proposition you could take for our city.

Oral Testimony, August 23, 2021 to the Manhattan Beach City Council

Good evening. I am Susan Bales, my family has lived in MB since 1954 and I am also a downtown MB commercial property owner.

There are two things our downtown restaurants require from you tonight: stability and a chance to recover.

No business can survive without predictability. Our restaurants need to plan for a certain level of staff, to be confident that their physical infrastructure is stable, that they can forecast revenues based on that configuration. A stop-start decionmaking process has a whiplash effect. They get a bit of a respite but then they don't know what the City will do in a few weeks or months. Right now, you have all the **evidence you need**to give our downtown restaurants the **stability they need**. The nation's top epidemiologist has said that spring 2022 is the soonest that we can expect to achieve normality in our restaurants and theatres — and that's **if everything goes right**. Can we look to the City Council to honor the evidence? Will you take a stand and help these businesses get out of the whiplash effect that incremental decision-making creates? I urge you to set a spring 2022 date, not an incremental kick it down the road January date, for reconsideration of outdoor dining. Give these restaurants a solid foundation from which they can rebuild their businesses. Give them stability.

Stability **and a chance to recover**. In a report we submitted to you in July of this year, we documented that the 31 restaurants with outdoor spaces are carrying \$13.5M - \$15.5M of debt. Most said they will not recoup losses for 12-24 months, as anywhere from a quarter to half of their customers still refuse to eat indoors. This situation is unlikely to improve any time soon, given what the nation's top scientists are telling us.

Please do not put your finger on the scale and make it harder for them to recover. I urge you to give our downtown restaurants time to get back on their feet. You have ample means to do that, given the \$8.4 M COVID relief funds acquired by the City. What could be more important than shoring up the economic infrastructure of our city, its downtown small businesses?

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY.

At their December 7 meeting, the City Council "directed staff to maintain the January 3, 2022, expiration date regarding the temporary encroachment permits for outdoor dining" ¹

After Director Tie responded affirmatively to the direction, Mayor Stern began moving on to the next agenda item. Councilmember Franklin interrupted, to address eat and drink encroachments on the pier parking lots. He queried traffic engineer Zandvliet regarding ownership of the lots.

Mr. Zandvliet answered that the county owns the upper and the state the lower. Then, he launched into the following, appearing to read from a prepared statement:

"I just wanted to, to let you know that most restaurants still have the ability and capability to ask for and obtain sidewalk dining permits. Um, and so some of the ones that are ex-, in existence now, we have 26 restaurants that are using sidewalk dining, and they'll continue to be able to use that." [Exhibit 1. Transcript, p. 21; l. 24; Exhibit 2]

Councilmember Hadley clapped in support. [ibid., fourth photograph]

This testimony terminated the agenda item. Prior to council deliberation, neither the staff report nor staff testimony disclosed that Community Development had ministerially authorized retention and expansion of sidewalk encroachments, thereby, usurping the authority of the city council. [Exhibit 3. Zandvliet Dec 8 email]

All Encroachments will Expire with Emergency Order 27 on January 3rd.

On January 3rd, Emergency Order ["EO"] No. 27 expires. [Exhibit 4, p. 63] This will render all temporary encroachments unlawful, because they violate city, state and federal law.

The California executive orders for the pandemic do not enable violations of law by local governments. The state of emergency, however, does permit local governments to issue orders tailored to their specific needs, such as the City's 27 decrees. [Ibid.]

Review of EO Nos. 10, 11, 19, 26 and 27 discloses that the orders apply only to 'public property' and to 'private property.' They do not differentiate between sidewalks and decks, so the two encroachment types remain inseparable and will expire on January 3rd, with EO No. 27.

ADA, CBC, Penal Code, CEQA, and Coastal Act Violations.

The next section summarizes these violations. Two ADA violations standout. MB Blvd. from Strand House to Culture Brewing has a slope that greatly exceeds the maximum standard for wheelchair use of 1-foot rise per 48-feet run. As result, all MB Blvd sidewalk encroachments violate the ADA slope standard. Additionally, all encroachments violate the width requirement that a wheelchair must have a five-foot diameter circle in which to maneuver for seating at and departing from a table, as well as a 32-inch wide corridor to reach the tables.

Summary.

At the December 21 Covid agenda item, councilmembers should nullify Community Development's unauthorized retention and expansion of sidewalk encroachments. Failure to do so can result in fines and jail-time for councilmembers, city staff and permittees, as result of violating the American Disabilities Act, the California Building Code and Penal Code § 370.

ADA, CBC, PENAL CODE, CEQA and COASTAL ACT VIOLATIONS SUMMARY.

Even if the lapse of EO No. 27 does not prohibit the sidewalk encroachments, which it does, then violations of law will prohibit them, as summarized below.

American Disabilities Act ["ADA"] and California Building Code ["CBC"] Violations.

These violations result from violation of ADA standards for wheelchair access to sidewalk encroachments for eat & drink use. Exhibit 5 illustrates that the slope along MB Blvd. between Strand House and Culture Brewing substantially exceeds the wheelchair standard of a maximum one-foot rise per 48-feet run. [CBC § 1113A.1.3.2] These data obtained from Google Earth, which provides elevations

As result, no premises on MB Blvd. qualify for sidewalk eat & drink use.

Exhibit 6 illustrates that the clear width of the sidewalks cannot provide the necessary width to accommodate the 60-inch diameter of wheelchair maneuvering area, plus the required 48-inch width of the adjoining sidewalk. [CBC C 1138A.1.3 & § 1113A.1.1]

Exhibit 7 lists the above ADA violations for the current 30 permit-holders, showing that none qualify for a sidewalk encroachment.

This results from the requirement by the Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control that requires a railing between the sidewalk eat & drink encroachments and the adjoining 48-inch public right of way. In that case, per Exhibit 8, a clear width of 115-inches required to accommodate the mutually exclusive encroachments and the sidewalk. None of the 30 premises in Exhibit 7 adjoin such a wide sidewalk.

CEQA and Coastal Act Violations.

None of the 30 premises in Exhibit 7 have surplus parking onsite. The Local Coastal Program ["LCP"] states, however, "Businesses may lease up to two spaces in the oversubscription program to meet City parking requirements." [LCP § A.64.060(1)]

In principle, the 30 premises in Exhibit 7 could have a maximum of two outdoor spaces each, if the sidewalk encroachments were legal, which per ADA they are not.

The city program for sidewalk eat & drink use will create a 60-space deficiency, which would trigger the environmental cumulative impact provision, CEQA Guidelines § 15064(h)(1).

Staff has stated that an Environmental Impact Report required for encroachments. Because parking critical to coastal access, once EO-27 expires, all these issues require approval by the Coastal Commission, **before any encroachments permitted, temporary or permanent.**

California Building Code and Penal Code § 370 Violations.

If eat & drink use implemented on sidewalk encroachments, that could result in fines and jail time for councilmembers, staff and permittees. The city municipal code Title 9 Building Regulations adopts the California Building Code [Exhibit 9. p.2], and for every day, makes a violation a count $[lbid; p. 3, \P 2]$.

The CA Building Code levies penalties at CBC § 114.4 [Ibid. p. 5], according to the CA Health and Safety Code, HSC 17995 [Ibid. p. 7]. Fines may not exceed \$1,000 and jail time no more than six months per count, totaling \$365,000 and 183 years per year. Because the violations block the public right of way, Penal Code § 370 doubles the penalties. [Ibid. p. 9]

CONCLUSIONS: EAT & DRINK SIDEWALK ENCROACHMENTS.

- At the December 7 encroachment hearing, Community Development usurped the city council authority, by declaring sidewalk encroachments may remain and be expanded;
- When Emergency Order No. 27 expires January 3, all encroachments will variously violate the American Disabilities Act, the CA Building Code, Penal Code § 370, CEQA and the Coastal Act;
- The MB Blvd. slope exceeds the ADA standard of one-foot rise per 48 feet run, so no premises on that street qualify for sidewalk encroachments;
- Downtown sidewalks too narrow to accommodate both wheelchairs on encroachments and a separate four-foot sidewalk, so new eat & drink use violates ADA at all premises;
- Sidewalk encroachments may have only two parking spaces per premises, which relates to no more than two tables. This will result in a cumulative 60 parking-space deficiency, which violates CEQA and the Coastal Act; and,
- If sidewalk encroachments implemented, councilmembers, staff and permittees could incur fines and jail time, per the CA Building Code and Penal Code § 370.

Bottom Line.

At the December 21 hearing on extending encroachments, the city council should nullify Community Development's unlawful act to retain and expand sidewalk encroachments for eat & drink use.

- 14 Mayor Hildy Stern (10:51):
- Any other questions? Okay, so I will op-this in, open this to public comment. Do we have anybody that
- would like to make a public comment at this time?
- 17 Speaker 14 (<u>11:02</u>):
- 18 Yes, we first have Don McPherson.
- 19 Don McPherson (11:09):
- Good evening, um, good evening council. Don McPherson, representing Coastal Depender, 1014 1st
- 21 Street. On November 10th, Governor Newsom signed executive order number 2121, which extends the
- 22 timeframe for the COVID state of emergency from December 31 to March 31. As a result, the eat and
- drink, uh, encroachments will remain legal to that date, but will become, uh, unlawful thereafter. The
- council may extend the encroachments to March 31st, but no later. If the encroachments extended past
- 25 March 31st, they would be, they would violate the following regulations: a 236 parking space deficiency
- would violate the local encroachment program under the jurisdiction of the Coastal Commission. The
- 27 parking reduction would impact Coastal access, a Coastal Act violation. The encroachments would
- violate penal c- code number 370, an 1872 law that prohibits blocking public right of ways. Blocking
- sidewalks would also violate the American Disa- Disability Act. The encroachment, um, permit, permits
- 30 limit occupancy to that in used permits, but many premises violate this condition, which the city cannot
- 31 enforce. The encroachments would violate the California Environmental Quality Act, CEQA, regarding
- parking, traffic and noise. The city would violate CEQA by not conducting an environmental im-, uh,
- impact, uh, report, an EIR, which is required.
- 34 Don McPherson (12:47):
- 35 To avoid these violations of law, the council should limit the extension of the encroachments to March
- 36 31st. I'm good with ending the encroachments, um, on January the 3rd. Thank you.
- 37 Mayor Hildy Stern (13:01):
- Thank you, Don, for your public comments. Next public comment.

- 1 Speaker 14 (13:06):
- 2 Next is Suzanne Learner.
- 3 Suzanne Learner (<u>13:17</u>):
- 4 Hi. Sorry, uh, you can't see me, as th- that'd be nice. Uh, hi everybody, um, happy holidays. Uh, dear
- 5 Mayor Stern, Mayor Pro Tem Napolitano and council members Hadley, Franklin, Montgomery, and the
- 6 city staff who've worked so hard in this project. Um, hope everyone is well. So I'm gonna just, I've lived
- 7 in Manhattan Beach since 1987, in downtown, right on 10th Street. It's been wonderful, and I'm really
- 8 very lucky to live in this slice of heaven. I think you will all agree th-, with me that the quality of life we
- 9 all have here has been special, and should be preserved. The reason why our property values have
- soared and so many people are moving here attests to that fact.
- 11 Suzanne Learner (13:53):
- However, since the temporary outdoor dining's been instituted, the town has changed detrimentally. Of
- course we've all supported whatever we could do to help out the restaurants during COVID. I mean, I
- ate more out than I ever had in my life. Um, but today is a different day; today we can eat inside
- 15 comfortably. Most restaurants require vaccination. I've been all over West LA and Santa Monica, and
- every one of them asked me for a vaccination card. Um, which leads us now to the fact that these
- 17 restaurants now have minimum double capacity, indoors plus outdoors, if not even more. I think some
- people have tripled the space. The city has specifically said in their latest staff report, and thank you,
- 19 Erik, for repeating it, but quote, "Each business obtained a temporary encroachment permit to construct
- 20 their dining area in the PRO- PROW. All of the encroachment permits state that restaurants are limited
- 21 to 100% of their pre-pandemic seating occupancy, using combinations of indoor and outdoor seating
- areas." This has created a nightmare for our downtown, including but not limited to density, people,
- unbearable traffic, overload of cars, consistently utter lack of parking, um, let alone accidents from bikes
- that can't, that are not being seen.
- 25 Suzanne Learner (<u>14:58</u>):
- We also have a ADA issue: we are blocking sidewalks. It is against the law; we will be sued. And I think
- this liability that's gonna be happening to us when there's an accident, like that happened in, outside
- 28 Altamura two weeks ago, where there were car parks on Altamura's patio, and if somebody had been
- 29 there we would been sued, and somebody could been killed. So, um, I think everybody else addressed
- it, but I think it's just time to take them down, so thank you so much.
- 31 Mayor Hildy Stern (15:25):
- Thank you, Suzanne, for your comments. Next comment.
- 33 Speaker 14 (15:28):
- 34 Next is Michael Zisless.
- 35 Michael Zisless (<u>15:33</u>):
- 36 Mayor Stern, city council, this is Michael Zisless, downtown resident, downtown business owner. I just
- wanna remind everybody that, you know, again, thanks, council, staff, for all they've done to help the
- businesses down here survive. Just for, wanna remind everybody, we're still in the middle of a
- pandemic. I know, um, somebody mentioned it was now March 31st or whatever, but that date keeps

- 1 slipping because the pandemic doesn't get under control, and now we have another variant. So, um I
- 2 just wanna remind everybody, also, that the, the decks have been downsized through a mutually agreed
- 3 upon, between the downtown retailers and the restaurants, and it was downsized in November. And
- 4 we've seen it working very well over the last, uh, you know, 45 days, so very happy there.
- 5 Michael Zisless (16:18):
- 6 As far as mandates go, I do own restaurants where we're mandated for vaccinations inside dining, and
- 7 non-vaccinated outdoor dining, and I think that's coming. If this, this, uh, variant does what, you know,
- 8 the news is saying, we're gonna be in that situation here in LA, in all of LA County in the next few weeks.
- 9 I just think it's the wrong time to, uh, take things away. And we do deal a little b-, you know, the
- 10 restaurants just need a little bit of certainty, and that's why, you know, I mean, I, I heard Erik say that,
- 11 that the decks need some paint and some repair, but if you're taking them down in three weeks, you're
- 12 not gonna paint or repair. So once we get some certainty, I'm sure we can br-, you know, everybody will
- bring the decks up to look perfect and act perfectly.
- 14 Michael Zisless (<u>16:59</u>):
- 15 Um, the slurry project bid is a, I, from what I've heard, came in high, they didn't like the contract, and
- 16 then the contractor couldn't guarantee to finish it by, you know, t- til the end of May, which would be
- 17 the wrong time of year to do this. I think we should rebid it. Like, you know, if you're doing any capital
- 18 improvements right now in your business, you're not gonna do it during the pandemic, when there's no
- 19 labor. So I think it's just the wrong time to do that. And, uh, we need some certainty, and I just propose
- you keep it as is and postpone it, and I thank you for your consideration tonight.
- 21 Mayor Hildy Stern (17:29):
- Thank you, Michael, for your comments. Next public comment.
- 23 Speaker 14 (<u>17:33</u>):
- 24 Next is Martha Andreanni.
- 25 Martha Andreanni (17:39):
- Thank you. Good evening. Can you hear me?
- 27 Speaker 14 (17:43):
- Yes, we can hear you.
- 29 Martha Andreanni (<u>17:44</u>):
- Hello? Thank you. Um, as we all recall, the encroachment of the dining decks was permitted in the early
- 31 days of the pandemic, as an effort to keep our restaurant businesses flourishing while they were
- 32 prohibited or vastly scaled back from the serving indoors. It was hope that the restaurants would help
- keep our downtown flourishing, as well as the other re-, uh, businesses there. As restaurants have been
- 34 able to open, and with the dining decks remaining in place, we have created additional problems.
- 35 Occupancy levels of restaurants have exceeded their allowable maximums, more patrons have viewer,
- fewer parking options, sidewalk and street encroachment dining have created congestion, our sidewalks
- and streets. We aren't pedestrian friendly, as we should be.

- 1 Martha Andreanni (<u>18:34</u>):
- 2 There are health and safety issues we didn't have prior to the dining decks. Clutter and trash on
- 3 sidewalks, reduced traffic lanes in an already narrow downtown streets, traffic accidents are on the rise.
- 4 The dining decks have prevented, prevented adequate street cleaning. Trash has accumulated in trash
- 5 receptacles and on downtown, uh, alleyways. With, there has been and continues to be additional
- 6 spending for security, as we've seen for the upcoming fireworks show, an additional \$50,000 to be spent
- 7 for security. Since we all would be forcing more people to the beach, most of the dining decks are used
- 8 during the evening hours, yet they prevent public parking during the day, as well. All classed impacts are
- 9 real for all of us. Please use your power and, (laughs) and, uh, benefit to the city to enforce the
- 10 expiration date of January 3rd, 2022. Thank you for your service, and happy holidays to all.
- 11 Mayor Hildy Stern (<u>19:41</u>):
- 12 Thank you, Martha, for your comments. Next comment.
- 13 Speaker 14 (19:44):
- 14 Next is Mike Simms.
- 15 Mike Simms (19:51):
- 16 Hello, and... Hello, everyone. Thank you, Mayor Stern, council members and staff. Uh, Erik, once again,
- thank you for your presentation and dedication to this. Uh, we can... Well, I don't think you're, uh, we
- can never thank you enough. So, um, I, I do own a residence, uh, in North Manhattan Beach, uh, west of
- 19 Highlands. Um, I do also own restaurants in downtown Manhattan Beach, uh, so I, I do, I am supportive
- of obviously keeping the downtown decks. Uh, we've had two events in the last, um, few months: uh,
- 21 the car show, um, as well as the holiday open house that, um, did actually close down a, a, a lot of the
- streets. And magically, um, thousands of people showed up without the, with all that loss of parking. So
- the lesson is learned is that you create demand and you create something that's special that people
- wanna come to, and they'll just figure out how to get here.
- 25 Mike Simms (20:46):
- 26 Um, parking is, is obviously always gonna be an issue, uh, but as we can tell, uh, the more magical you
- 27 make downtown Manhattan Beach, the more likely people are gonna come to it. Uh, we've, we've
- started a, um, just, you know, in talking to our neighbors, they all ask, "How can we help? What can we
- do? We wanna make sure this stays." So we cor-, we created a, a support downtown Manhattan Beach,
- 30 uh, or the s- support downtown... I, it's too long. Outdoordiningmanhattanbeach.com or something.
- 31 Um, and it, without even advertising it, we have over, you know, like, 400 supporters. It's, this is a vast...
- 32 I mean, I'm shocked that... I'm looking at it, we have 63 people on this call, and there's hundreds that I
- know that support this. Um, I mean, I, you also have neighbors in downtown Manhattan Beach, I, I think
- 34 some of them that spoke, that actually take advantage of, of public space. They have easements that,
- uh, they use to, uh, to, to modify their, their space and outdoor patios into public space.
- 36 Mike Simms (21:44):
- 37 Um, the California Coastal Commission is, is, was commissioned to protect the coast for present and
- future generations. Um, you know, by these two events creating outdoor spaces that people wanna
- 39 come to, that's doing it. So thank you.

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1 Mayor Hildy Stern (21:58): 2 Thank you, Mike, for your public comments. Next comment. 3 Speaker 14 (22:02): 4 Next is Jim Burton. 5 Jim Burton (22:06): 6 Mayor and Mayor Pro Tem Napolitano and members of council, Jim Burton. Um, I don't, I don't know 7 that I disagree with any of the previous speakers. I mean, I think there's truth in, in everything-8 Steve Napolitano (22:19): 9 Hard to hear you, Joe. 10 Jim Burton (22:20): 11 Oh, can-12 Steve Napolitano (22:22): 13 You sound like you're on speaker phone, or far away. 14 Jim Burton (22:25): 15 Uh, let me try to fix my audio, yeah. 16 Steve Napolitano (22:46): 17 Jim. (laughs) 18 Steve Napolitano (22:46): 19 I just thought maybe you could (laughs) sit closer to the, the microphone. I didn't mean for you to sign 20 off. (laughs) 21 Mayor Hildy Stern (22:51): 22 Do we wanna take the next public comment and let Jim dial-23 Joe Franklin (22:54): 24 Hey, hey Jim, just, just walk on down here. 25 Mayor Hildy Stern (22:57): 26 You just-27 Jim Burton (22:58): 28 Yeah, you know what? I wish I could. I, I'm outta state. Can you hear me better right now? 29 Steve Napolitano (23:02): 30 Yeah.

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1 Mayor Hildy Stern (23:02): 2 You can go ahead. 3 Steve Napolitano (23:02): 4 It's a little be-5 Hadley (23:02): 6 Yes. 7 Jim Burton (23:07): 8 Um, well, I'll ju-, I'll just make this quick. I, you know, you all received my letter. Um, I don't know that I 9 disagree with anybody that's been, spoken, but enough is enough downtown. I mean, I get the parking 10 issue has been a tremendous impact to those of us that live downtown. Many people don't have any 11 parking at all, and, um, the relief that we got in November, I think that was fantastic, it provided a little 12 bit. But essentially, the number, the number of things that the city is doing to jump through hoops to try 13 to get, to keep these decks, in my mind, is costing us too much, and for, for a benefit that, in reality, if 14 we want dining decks, we need to look at a longterm solution on what we need to do. 15 Jim Burton (23:49): 16 Um, I witnessed, I didn't see it happen, but I was out walking along the beach when a vehicle hit a 17 parked sheriff vehicle in front of The Kettle, across from Altamura Café. And it literally took the front 18 end of the vehicle, left it at the café, sprayed car parts everywhere, and the vehicle went all the way 19 down past Manhattan Beach Boulevard. And my first thought when that happened was, "What if 20 somebody was in that deck?" And I think a little bit would put, it's, uh, we knew... The decks need to 21 come out, we need to look at a longterm so-solution for dining. I apologize for the audio, but I'm gonna 22 end it there. You have my letter, you know my thoughts. Thank you. 23 Mayor Hildy Stern (24:28): 24 Thank you, Jim, for your comments. Next public comment. 25 Speaker 14 (24:33): 26 There's no additional public comments requests via Zoom, but we do have, uh, Jackie May in c-city 27 council chambers. 28 Jackie May (24:49): 29 Good evening. Um, er-, uh, everyone... We had a meeting last night and there, they had so many great 30 points. And I'm having trouble hearing, so I, I hope that they were touched on. I know that, that they 31 wrote letters. Um, I just wanted to mention that we have a, a residents' group just downtown, just the 32 small area around the businesses of, of 50 people, and they're all opposed to th-, it c-, it continuing, the, 33 um, taking up all of our parking spots. Uh, as Mr. Simms said, yes, we do have encroachments, but we 34 don't have a parking spot to have a visitor visit, so we don't use our encroachments very much. Just, you 35 know, we, we, uh, it's just really sad. Um, I, I, I know there's, there's hundreds of residents who live in

that small area. There's several apartment buildings, so n- nobody's very happy about... I mean, a- also, I

wanted to mention that quite a few of the renters don't have access to garages, so, uh, their, their, uh,

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1 landlords don't give them garages. I know three of my neighbors next door, two of them don't have a 2 garage access, and, and I know of others, but I can't give you a number. 3 Jackie May (26:09): 4 Um, now also, since, uh, COVID has I-, uh, let up a little bit, the Neptunian Club is now renting out their 5 hall weekly, and they take up seven spots. They take up the entire 10th Street every time they have a 6 meeting from 10:00 AM to 10:00 PM. They just got through taking up for three days from 10:00 AM to 7 10:00 PM, so that's even more spaces that we don't have. Uh, uh, someone brought up, I, I don't 8 remem-, I, I'm sorry I couldn't hear, but I don't know if they mentioned that when they removed the 9 decks the last time, there were a lotta rats and weeds and, you know, choking the, uh, storm drains. So I 10 think that, yeah, that's a consideration, too. Th- thank you very much. 11 Joe Franklin (<u>26:55</u>): 12 Um, um, m-13 Mayor Hildy Stern (26:56): 14 Thank you, Jackie, for your comments. 15 Joe Franklin (26:58): 16 Madame Mayor, I have a question for Jackie-17 Mayor Hildy Stern (27:00): 18 Sure-19 Joe Franklin (27:00): 20 ... if I may. 21 Mayor Hildy Stern (27:00): 22 ... Council Member Franklin. 23 Joe Franklin (27:02): 24 Uh, yeah. Hi, Jackie. 25 Jackie May (27:02): 26 Hi. 27 Joe Franklin (27:03): 28 Hi. I, I, I just didn't catch... W- w- what happens on 10th Street from 10:00 AM to 10:00 PM? 29 Jackie May (27:07): 30 The Neptunian Club has meetings, and they don't have a, they don't have a parking lot of their own. So

they're allowed to block off the entire street of public parking for themselves every time they have a

meeting, and that's at least once a week.

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1 Joe Franklin (27:21): 2 So, so that's from Highland down to Manhattan Avenue? That, that segment of 10th Stree-3 Jackie May (27:24): 4 Highland to, uh, Crest-5 Joe Franklin (27:26): 6 Uh-huh. 7 Jackie May (27:26): 8 ... and, and spots on Highland, itself. And they do that, uh, every time they rent out their hall, and they 9 just got through doing it for three straight days. It's from 10:00 AM to 10:00 PM-10 Joe Franklin (27:37): 11 All right. 12 Jackie May (27:38): 13 ... so typically, no one will park there the whole time. Oh, and you know, there was actually... Uh, if I can 14 just mention one more thing, those decks sit empty all the time. On my drive over here, there were two 15 people sitting on the decks. They, they take up 24/7-16 Joe Franklin (27:54): 17 Right. 18 Jackie May (27:55): 19 ... and yet they're closed. 20 Joe Franklin (27:56): 21 Mm-hmm (affirmative). 22 Mayor Hildy Stern (27:56): 23 Thank you, Jackie. 24 Joe Franklin (27:57): 25 Okay, thank you. 26 Mayor Hildy Stern (27:58): 27 Thank you very much-28 Joe Franklin (27:58): 29 Appreciate it. 30 Mayor Hildy Stern (28:06):

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1 ... for your comments. Okay. We have no more requests for public comments, so now, council 2 colleagues, do you have any comments to make about, uh, the January 3rd expiration date for the 3 temporary encroachments? Anybody wanna start us off? 4 Joe Franklin (28:28): 5 S- s- s-6 Mayor Hildy Stern (28:28): 7 Oh, Council Member Montgomery, is that a hand raised? What is that little-8 Montgomery (<u>28:34</u>): 9 Not me. 10 Joe Franklin (<u>28:35</u>): 11 No, that's just a cursor. 12 Mayor Hildy Stern (28:36): 13 Oh, that's a cursor. Okay. 14 Joe Franklin (28:37): 15 If I may, Ma- Madame Mayor, c- can I just ask a guestion? 16 Mayor Hildy Stern (28:40): 17 Yes, Council Member Franklin. 18 Joe Franklin (28:42): 19 Um, are, are restaurants by, uh, the COVID orders, emergency orders, are they, uh, open to capacity? Is 20 there any restrictions inside? 21 Mayor Hildy Stern (28:50): 22 Who is that question directed to? 23 Joe Franklin (28:52): 24 Hmm? 25 Mayor Hildy Stern (28:52): 26 Who are you asking that question of? 27 Joe Franklin (28:53): 28 I don't know. (laughs) [crosstalk 00:28:55] 29 Speaker 2 (28:55): 30 Carrie, Carrie can answer that.

- 1 Mayor Hildy Stern (28:57): 2 Uh, Director Tai? 3 Director Tai (28:58): 4 Uh, sure, Council Member, yeah, Council Member Franklin. Thank you for your question. Uh, no. 5 Currently, restaurants do not have any indoor operating capacity, or limitations. 6 Joe Franklin (29:08): 7 Okay. Got it. Thank you. 8 Mayor Hildy Stern (29:10): 9 Mayor Pro Tem Napolitano? 10 Steve Napolitano (29:13): 11 Sure, I'll jump in. I think that I, um, you know, I, I was on the subcommittee that, that jumped on this, 12 and, and, um, we got ahead of a lot of other cities in setting aside spaces for outdoor dining when the 13 pandemic first started, came up with the loophole, some people would call it, for, uh, keeping our, our 14 outdoor dining open. Um, when everyone else was, uh, shut down. Uh, we did shut down, I mean, Joe 15 and me, I, we went out on a limb and I got beat up for it for, uh, closing down part of an av- avenue. Uh, 16 Mr. Simms talks about, you know, whatever we could do to make it special, well, if we close down 17 streets, that would make it special, but not enough people supported that as, uh, as, as special. 18 Steve Napolitano (30:00): 19 But a- at this point, you know, we made a number of commitments. And I, I don't wanna toss those 20 aside as if they're nothing. And tha-, and we've done that a few times, right? We've extended the 21 outdoor dining, uh, several times now to address the concerns of the pandemic and the operations of 22 the restaurants, uh, during the pandemic. Um, you know, yes, we have this new variant, but no, there 23 doesn't seem to be any movement afoot to do anything, uh, different about it at the moment. Uh, could 24 that change? Yes, but so far the information we're getting doesn't show that the county's going to be 25 ordering new shutdowns or anything like that. Um, uh, I think, too, the point's well taken on the need to 26 make some improvements downtown: the slurry seal of the streets, the construction. It wasn't delayed 27 because of some issue with, you know, it was the, the low bidder, uh, made a mistake, and so we had to 28 drop the bid and we re- re-scoped it, um, and we're, that's already happening, and it would be within 29 the timeframe. 30 Steve Napolitano (31:11): 31 And I think that it, that's needed down there. We need a refresh in a number of different ways. And the, 32 um, the loss of parking that we're gonna have, uh, lot three is, is on top of that. And, but we did make a 33 commitment that this was gonna be temporary, and a- as, as Mr. Zisless pointed out, yeah, no- no one's 34 investing in them right now because they, they are known to be temporary. Um, but I think that we 35 should keep, at this point, the January 3rd, uh, deadline to, uh, say enough, uh, with the temporary as it 36 is, and really get going.
- 37 Steve Napolitano (31:43):

- 1 And this is what I tried to impress upon last time, um, and really, during the, the fall, is when are we
- 2 gonna get going on this discussion of permanent outdoor dining? If we're gonna consider that, we can
- 3 get started sooner or later. We, with all, uh, due respect to our, our community develop director,
- 4 Director Tai, uh, well, I see you smiling, uh, you know, we kinda rejected the, the long, drawn out
- 5 consultant group and, um, planned to, to look at this. And I think we, we know what we want or don't
- 6 want. Uh, I'd like to get to that discussion, and this would provide a, you know, ma-, taking away the
- 7 temporary right now would, would, uh, uh, kickstart the, I think, put a, an impetus, an urgency to it to
- 8 really get those discussions going and, and make them fruitful.
- 9 Steve Napolitano (32:31):
- 10 Um, but, you know, to take the suggestion from the Downtown Association that we should extend the
- 11 temporary to, uh, 2023, defer the, the maintenance of our streets down there til 2023, would take what
- was temporary and make it defacto permanent, because the, the suggestion was also that we just tag on
- 13 the permanent. We talk about the permanent at the same time that we have the temporary, and then
- 14 just continue on, uh, basically turning the temporary into permanent without any gap in between. And
- 15 that wasn't what the commitment was that we made to, uh, the folks downtown, um, who will be part,
- you know, should be part of the discussion of any permanent outdoor dining. Not saying it's a, a slam
- 17 dunk or a guaranteed thing, but we all said we wanna get to that discussion. And in the meantime, I
- think we need time out from the, the outdoor dining as it is now. Uh, it's already shrunk; I think that was
- 19 a bit unfair to some folks. I, I didn't hide my feelings about that at the time, uh, it, you know, uh, I think
- everyone who wanted it before, I didn't think we, we should be picking who gets it and who doesn't by
- 21 endorsing certain plan by veto Downtown Association that pushed on their members to get rid of them.
- 22 Steve Napolitano (<u>33:46</u>):
- But as far as I'm concerned, I think we need time out on them. Uh, keep the, the, uh, expiration date of
- 24 January 3rd, and let's set some real discussions about permanent, uh, outdoor dining so we can get
- 25 going on that. Uh, otherwise, there's really no, no reason to, to do that. So that's, that's, uh, where I am
- on that. Thank you.
- 27 Mayor Hildy Stern (<u>34:06</u>):
- Thank you. Any other comments?
- 29 Joe Franklin (<u>34:12</u>):
- 30 Yes, your, your honor?
- 31 Mayor Hildy Stern (34:13):
- 32 Yes, Council Member Franklin?
- 33 Joe Franklin (<u>34:15</u>):
- 34 Yes, thank you. And, uh, y-you know, we, we owe a debt of gratitude to our restaurants and businesses.
- 35 Um, I remember those dark days early on of the shutdown, and literally, downtown was a ghost town,
- and other parts of town were a ghost town. And we really, um, you know, worked hard, uh, d-, I, I m-,
- this is before I was on council, and then, you know, while I've been on council, but worked hard to, to
- 38 help them. And, and actually, that was to help the city and to save the vitality of the city. It brings a, a,
- 39 you know, a life and an enjoyment, uh, to our streets. Uh, and, and the restaurants and businesses

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- 1 are true entrepreneurs. They, they, uh, it, it takes a lot to open a restaurant and to run a small business,
- uh, and doubly so during, uh, the kinda pandemic. Uh, so we ne-, i- i-, so, so I applaud them, and I think
- 3 a lotta people are, are happy with them about what they did.
- 4 Joe Franklin (35:16):
- 5 Um, the, um, the things that we have to pay attention to is, is just the, the physical realities of our
- 6 downtown. We're a small beach town. Um, you know, throughout the whole, uh, you know, discussions
- 7 about extending, we said, you know, um, people mention in Europe, they got these wonderful plazas
- 8 that they can, uh, that they bring out the tables at night and they have dinner, and it's just so enjoyable
- 9 and family friendly and convivial, and, um, just so much, uh, joy that it brings to people's lives. We, y-
- 10 you know, we're, by nature, social animals, and we wanna, you know, and we wanna see each other and
- 11 be outside, and especially here, because we're blessed with such weather. But the things we're not
- 12 blessed with are a plaza like we see down in Hermosa Beach. Um, we're also not blessed with streets
- that lend themselves easily to closing down to, uh, uh, to accommodate dining like we see in Richmond
- 14 Street in, uh, in El Segundo and in parts of, uh, Redondo Beach. You know, they just lend themselves,
- 15 you can get around those areas easily.
- 16 Joe Franklin (<u>36:25</u>):
- 17 Um, I, um, I, I, I applaud my fellow council members, uh, Napolitano and Montgomery, uh, for being on
- 18 the subcommittee and actually, you know, sticking their necks out for the closure of Manhattan Avenue.
- 19 Uh, it, uh, you know, you know, w- w- we found out it didn't work, and that's fine. I mean, we, we were
- trying all sorts of different things. So those are the things that, um, that, that we're not blessed with. Uh,
- also, wide sidewalks. I mean, I was recently in Chicago, and, uh, (laughs) m-, I, I must annoy my wife so
- much, 'cause we're walking along and I, uh, and I'm measuring this, the width of the sidewalks, 'cause it,
- you know, they have a row of tables and then they have a little iron rail, and then there's enough
- sidewalk for people to walk by. We don't have eight foot sidewalks here; it just doesn't exist.
- 25 Joe Franklin (<u>37:16</u>):
- 26 So we did all these things in an emergency, um, everybody cooperated, um, tha-, i- i- i-, we, we owe a
- debt of gratitude to the residents of downtown Manhattan Beach, and also to the retailers that were
- impacted. I mean, they believed in this. The- the- they, they went forward and they, and, you know, with
- 29 faith, you know, into, in- into what was really an unknown, and they provided their, you know, their
- support of what we did. But I think the time has come, uh, to where, that's why I asked the question
- 31 about the, you know, 100% of the, uh, restaurants, if th-, you know, availability indoors. Um, that's, pre-
- 32 COVID, what they were basing their business plan on, (laughs) was the inside dining. I think, what,
- before that time, we only had one little outside deck, you know, above the Strand House. And I
- 34 remember that c- created quite a, you know, uh, you know, ups-, you know, on the second floor, and
- 35 that created, you know, a, a, a bit of discussion.
- 36 Joe Franklin (38:16):
- 37 So for what w-, s- so for what we've done, I hope that the restaurants are, uh, you know, and they're still
- 38 faced with challenges of staffing shortages and the like, but I hope they've done well. Uh, we know that
- there was federal assistance th- that, that everybody was able to apply for. So, um, I would, uh, I, I
- 40 would also say, I- let's stick with the July 3rd... Uh, my only comment, and, and, and question to my
- 41 fellow council members is, I was just looking at the calendar, assuming that they have, you know, a New

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1 Year's, uh, dinner and parties or whatever, if June, you know, th- that Monday is just a little bit too soon 2 to have it all done. So, uh-3 Steve Napolitano (38:57): 4 (laughs) Council Mem-5 Joe Franklin (38:58): 6 Yeah? 7 Steve Napolitano (38:58): 8 ... Franklin, you've said June and July right now. Are you talking January? 9 Joe Franklin (39:01): 10 Oh! I'm sorry. Ja- January. Sorry. 11 Director Tai (<u>39:03</u>): 12 (laughs) 13 Joe Franklin (39:04): 14 I'm talking about January. (laughs) 15 Steve Napolitano (39:04): 16 Just to be clear. 17 Joe Franklin (39:05): 18 Yeah, yeah. Thank you s-19 Hadley (39:07): 20 For the public record. 21 Joe Franklin (39:08): 22 Thank you so much. Let's clarify that. I'll speak slowly for the closed captioning. January (laughs) 3rd, is 23 just maybe give them an, uh, you know, a- another couple of days, 'cause it's quite extensive work to 24 take those down, so thank you. 25 Mayor Hildy Stern (39:21): 26 Thank you, Council Member Franklin. Any other comments? Council Member Montgomery? 27 Montgomery (39:29): 28 Thank you, your honor. Um, as all of you know, I had the, the, uh, good fortune or misfortune to be 29 mayor when COVID started, when this all started, and what we did and what all of us, the team, staff, 30 residents all did to help downtown, the North End, the East End, forget, we don't, we have an East End, 31 here, people, too. Roads crammed, [inaudible 00:39:54], everyone survived we thought would be a

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- short term COVID experience. We didn't realize there'd be 21 months, and now tailing off, hopefully. Uh,
- 2 I heard Mike Zisless talk earlier, I heard Mike Simms. Much respect to those two and what they did and
- 3 what they went through, where they are today. Also the little guys: Bobby Eskowitz, Manhattan Pizzeria.
- 4 We've all been to Manhattan Pizzeria at least twice in our lives. Um, Peter Kamitz, Loopy's. We've all
- 5 been there.
- 6 Montgomery (40:24):
- 7 But I, I think you're hearing the right thing here. W- when, when the comments came out earlier about,
- 8 "Why aren't decks being repaired," that certainty issue. We've done, probably, a disservice to everyone
- 9 by moving the goalposts every few months, whether it was 'cause we thought COVID was still there in
- full speed, or the county required different paperwork or different this or different that, part of it's
- 11 them, part of it's us. W- we're here. So I, I think we did the right thing. And, and as Mayor Pro Tem
- 12 Napolitano talked about, keep our word, January 3rd, then have an honest to God discussion about
- permanent decks at a, at a future date, and have everybody look at it and see who would go for it, who
- wouldn't. But as far as this goes, keep January 3rd expiration date going, come back from there and
- thank everybody with their patience, let us get through all this, and hopefully get through it all
- 16 completely, by this time next year, no issue. Uh, but keep the date January 3rd and we'll go from there.
- 17 Thank you, your honor.
- 18 Mayor Hildy Stern (41:24):
- 19 Thank you, Council Member Montgomery. Council Member Hadley?
- 20 Hadley (41:29):
- Yes, thank you, colleagues. I think some excellent, um, points have been made. And I, I hope that our
- restaurants feel and know how, um, this council really has scrambled to help our restaurants, and
- thereby, our retailers, as we have, um, really proven that virtuous circle of bringing people into our
- community to eat and then shop, or shop and then eat, and it's really symbiotic. And I think that our
- retailers, up until, uh, recently, have really appreciated that, as well. So I'm proud of how we pivoted,
- 26 I'm proud of com dev, I'm proud of, um, city council, um, traffic manager Erik Zandvliet has been terrific
- about pivoting. I'm really just super impressed with what the city has done in these last couple years,
- um, during COVID in order to have this high class problem that we have now, which is when to, um, uh,
- 29 close off the experiment.
- 30 Hadley (<u>42:33</u>):
- 31 I do agree with one of my colleagues, that it, it was considered, um, a short term, uh, solution. I've told
- every resident, if you live downtown, I know you've heard from me, if you've reached out to me, I hope
- that you've heard back from me. Every single one I said, uh, the temporary dining decks was one track
- and permanent was a second track. I was not, I was committed from day one to not bleed one into the
- 35 other, and I am gonna fulfill that commitment tonight. I did make a commitment to pull up the
- temporary decks until we, um, take on the longterm discussion, which will involve the entire city. I thank
- my, uh, Mayor Pro Tem Steve Napolitano for bringing up com dev. I, you know, I urge community
- 38 development to speed up the down-, the permanent discussion faster than 2023. I, you know, I sucked
- in my, my breath when I saw that in the last staff report. So I think the community does support outdoor
- 40 dining. Our, our shoppers know it, our, our, uh, retailers know it, our downtown residents, our

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- 1 Hadley (<u>43:49</u>):
- 2 I agree with one of the restaurateurs, if that they need clarity over agreement, um, so I do think if, you
- 3 know, it, it sounds like we, we have the votes to end the temporary outdoor dining, um, probably
- 4 tonight, and I think that that won't be welcome news, but at, at least it will be some clarity. Um, I do
- 5 think Joe's right, um, I thank my colleague, Joe Franklin for saying that our restaurants, um, proved

- different personalities popping out on each of the decks, including in the downtown holiday open house
- where we voted, you know, and now their decorated for the holidays and they're spectacular. So I'm
- super proud of the temporary decks, I'm super proud of what we pulled off as a city. I'm sad, um, as a
- 17 patron that they will be coming to an end, but I do owe a commitment to the downtown residents that
- 18 I'm determined to follow through on. Um, I hope we'll keep the pedal, um, on the gas, uh, foot on the
- 19 gas in order to begin to discuss permanent, and I know [inaudible 00:45:39] PA is chomping at the bit.
- 20 Hadley (<u>45:41</u>):
- 21 Um, but I, I would like to take a minute to applaud team CMB, um, you know, downtown residents,
- 22 retailers, restaurants and council and staff, uh, for working together to, to, created something so special
- that I am sad to see it close down. I look forward to the next reincarnation. I know this will make it sad
- for some of the, uh, the restaurants to get bad news, um, but we are in an endemic now, we are no
- 25 longer in a pandemic, and I think these signs of returning to normal will signal to residents, um, safety in
- eating inside. And I know my husband and I try to eat inside whenever we can, in order to signal that,
- 27 um, you know, that it's safe to do so. So thank you. Uh, those are my views, and kudos to everyone for
- 28 this wonderful, um, you know, what, perhaps the only silver lining to COVID I heard over and over from
- residents, and I agree. It's been a blessing, it's been fun, and now we move forward with things.
- 30 Mayor Hildy Stern (46:40):
- 31 Thank you, Council Member Hadley. So I'll just complete, um, this discussion with my comments. And I,
- and, and I echo that it's, it is almost sad, right? We know that the residents, by and large, in Manhattan
- 33 Beach have really enjoyed the outdoor dining, um, and we've heard that over and over again. Um, and,
- 34 and we appreciate that, as, as we all do, um, enjoy to sit outside. And when I was having these
- discussions and I was asking people how they would feel if the outdoor dining, we no longer had the
- 36 outdoor dining, while they were very sorry to hear that, um, what I was reminded of is that this decision
- 37 comes so difficult, in such a difficult way because all of these other factors that we've heard from, um,
- 38 from, both from the residents in the areas or people that have, um, that are patronizing our business
- districts, congestion, ADA access, trash, maintenance, inequities, cost, parking, safety, noise, clutter,

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- 1 Mayor Hildy Stern (48:10):
- 2 So I just want to underscore that this consideration comes with, i- it comes with many factors, and as
- 3 the, the decision makers in the city, we can't just say, "Well, we really like it, so we want, so we'll keep
- 4 it." What we can say, however, is, "We do have a vision that we w-, we want to continue to look at this
- 5 as a longterm solution." Um, this isn't the end of this discussion. This is just a pause to recognize, as has
- 6 been said over and over again, the temporary nature of the decks, so that we now can take all this
- 7 information that we've learned, we can learn from so much that we have had in these last couple years
- 8 to m-, to do this in a way that's much more, um, that m-, uh, that encompasses all of the, all of what we
- 9 have learned in these last years.
- 10 Mayor Hildy Stern (49:05):
- 11 So yes, let's, um, let's continue to look at this as a way to support our community and support our
- 12 businesses. It's been an amazing community effort, both from our city staff, and I, you know, w- we
- couldn't even imagine, and we hear, but I can't imagine, um, the amount of time and effort that our
- community development, um, staff has spent, uh, working on this, how much time our city management
- has spent working on this, even public works and all of our departments. Um, but also, it's been a
- wonderfully collaborative e-, um, community, uh, e- effort with the Downtown Business and
- 17 Professional Association, with the North End, um, bid, with the Residents' Associations, with so many,
- um, that, so many people that have come together, and our chamber of commerce, to really work
- 19 toward solutions. So we know that we have that in our pocket, and that we will continue to do that.
- 20 Mayor Hildy Stern (50:11):
- 21 And I just wanna assure, um, our community that we are committed to continuing to look at a solution.
- 22 Um, but right now is the right time. I think I've heard from all of our council members that right now is
- 23 the right time we, to, to have the certainty that we gave our restaurants, that January 3rd was the, um,
- 24 the expiration of the temporary outdoor dining. Um, and so, to that, I think we all have the consensus,
- 25 um, to, uh, to honor that date, um, and to honor the expiration on January 3rd.
- 26 Mayor Hildy Stern (50:53):
- 27 Um, and I'm going to see if there isn't, there isn't really direction that we need to give at this time. Uh,
- 28 City Manager Moe, I think that we already have the expiration date in effect. Is there anything that you
- 29 need more to hear from us on this?
- 30 Moe (51:15):
- 31 No. I believe we're just gonna continue with that original directive, unless there are other additional
- directions you wanna give us, but, uh, January 3rd is the date.
- 33 Steve Napolitano (51:24):
- 34 [crosstalk 00:51:24] Yeah, your Honor, i- i-, just to Council Member Franklin's point, January 3rd is the
- end date that they must stop using them; the breakdown starts after that.
- 36 Joe Franklin (51:36):
- 37 Okay, great.
- 38 Steve Napolitano (51:38):

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1 I see Director Tai shaking her head in agreement. I must have said something right-2 Director Tai (51:44): 3 Yeah. Thank you. And-4 Steve Napolitano (51:44): 5 ... for a change. 6 Director Tai (51:46): 7 (laughs) I, yes, and, and thank you, Mayor Pro Tem Napolitano. And just to clarify for the council, uh, 8 yes, what we will do is, uh, send out a notice to the, uh, restaurants that the, the last day of operation is 9 January 3rd, and we usually provide, uh, three business days or so prior, uh, yeah, definitely prior to the 10 next weekend for removal. As you may have heard, last night the City Council decided to end the outdoor street dining program on January 3, 2022, as previously approved back on August 26.

All outdoor dining operation within the street encroachment areas shall cease on January 3, 2022 pursuant to your Encroachment Permits and Agreement.

All existing street encroachment areas must be removed and the streets restored to their previous condition by January 7.

Please note that restaurants with current <u>sidewalk</u> dining permits are allowed to continue operation within their sidewalk encroachment areas.

At the meeting, the Council also emphasized an urgency to develop a plan for permanent outdoor dining areas. City Council recently approved a Work Plan item to develop a long-term Dining/business use plan within the public right-of-way.



REQUIRING COVID-19 MEASURES AT CONSTRUCTION SITES EFFECTIVE APRIL 4, 2020 AT 12:01 a.m.

Date of Order: April 3, 2020

WHEREAS, international, national, state, and local health and governmental authorities are responding to an outbreak of respiratory disease caused by a novel coronavirus named "SARS-CoV-2," and the disease it causes has been named "coronavirus disease 2019," abbreviated COVID-19, ("COVID-19");

WHEREAS, on March 4, 2020, the Governor of the State of California declared a state of emergency to make additional resources available, formalize emergency actions already underway across multiple state agencies and departments, and help the state prepare for broader spread of COVID-19;

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, the President of the United States of America declared a national emergency and announced that the federal government would make emergency funding available to assist state and local governments in preventing the spread of and addressing the effects of COVID-19;

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 20-0039, A Resolution of the City Council of the City of Manhattan Beach Proclaiming the Existence of a Local Emergency;

WHEREAS, on March 17, 2020, the City Council ratified Resolution No. 20-0039;

WHEREAS, on March 17, 2020, the City Council adopted Ordinance No. 20-0013-U and Advisory Resolution No. 20-0040 which, *inter alia*, adopted by reference the County Order, imposed regulations regarding social distancing, and recommended additional social distancing practices;

WHEREAS, on March 19, 2020, the Governor of the State of California issued Executive Order N-33-20, directing all residents of the State of California to heed directives issued by the State Health Officer on the same date instructing all Californians to stay home except as needed to maintain continuity of operations of the federal critical infrastructure sectors (the "State Stay at Home Order");

WHEREAS, on March 19, 2020, the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health issued an enhanced Health Officer Order, the Safer at Home Order for Control of COVID-19, amending and superseding its March 16, 2020 Order, closing all nonessential businesses, and limiting gatherings to 9 people or less;

WHEREAS, on March 21, 2020, the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health issued an enhanced Health Officer Order, the Safer at Home Order for Control of COVID-19, amending and superseding its March 16, 2020, and March 19, 2020 Orders, closing all nonessential businesses and prohibiting gatherings of non-household members;

WHEREAS, both the State Stay at Home Order and the County Department of Public Health's Safer at Home Order identify construction, operation, inspection and maintenance of construction sites and construction projects (including housing construction) as an essential business that may continue to operate under these orders;

WHEREAS, on March 25, 2020, the City Council adopted Ordinance No. 20-0014-U which, *inter alia*, required essential businesses, including construction businesses, to comply with health and safety measures required by a state or county order related to COVID-19;

WHEREAS, on March 27, 2020, the City Council adopted Ordinance No. 20-0015-U which, *inter alia*, amended Ordinance No. 20-0014-U to clarify that essential businesses, including construction businesses, must also comply with health and safety measures required by state or county guidelines related to COVID-19;

WHEREAS, the County Department of Public Health's Safer at Home Order directs all essential businesses, including construction businesses, to comply with all of the following: (a) enforce social distancing measures, requiring that individuals maintain separation of at least six (6) feet to the extent feasible; (b) provide access to hand washing facilities with soap and water or to hand sanitizer that contains at least 60 percent alcohol; (c) post a sign in a conspicuous place at all public entries that instructs members of the public to not enter if they are experiencing symptoms of respiratory illness, including fever or cough; and (d) adhere to communicable disease control recommendations provided by the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health, including guidance for cleaning and disinfecting the site;

WHEREAS, as of April 3, 2020, the Los Angeles County of Public Health has confirmed 4,566 cases of COVID-19 in Los Angeles County and that number is expected to continue to rise;

WHEREAS, the act and process of construction may necessitate workers to work together or assist each other within distances of less than the recommended social distancing of 6 feet;

WHEREAS, to ensure that construction workers at construction sites and projects are provided with the means to comply, and comply, to the maximum extent possible, with the County Department of Public Health's Safer at Home Order, it is necessary to put in place additional measures at construction sites to ensure compliance;

WHEREAS, the City Manager is the Director Emergency Services in the City of Manhattan Beach. Pursuant to Manhattan Beach Municipal Section 3.08.060.A.6.a, the City Manager as the Director of Emergency Services is empowered during a local emergency to "make and issue rules and regulations on matters reasonably related to the protection of life and property as affected by such emergency", so long as such rules and regulations are "confirmed at the earliest practicable time" by the City Council; and

WHEREAS, in the interest of the public health and safety, as affected by the emergency caused by the spread of COVID-19, it is necessary to exercise my authority pursuant to Chapter 3.08 of the Manhattan Beach Municipal Code, Manhattan Beach City Council Resolution No. 20-0039, and the California Emergency Services Act, Chapter 7 (commencing with Section 8550) of Title 2 of the Government Code, to issue this order.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED AS FOLLOWS:

- <u>Section 1</u>. The recitals set forth above are true and correct and are incorporated into this Order by reference.
- Section 2. The property owner and contractor (collectively the "Contractor") at any property within the City of Manhattan Beach at which construction work is occurring ("Construction Site") shall develop a comprehensive COVID-19 exposure control plan, which includes control measures such as social distancing, symptom checking, hygiene, decontamination procedures, and training ("Exposure Control Plan" or "Plan"). The Exposure Control Plan shall contain at a minimum the measures detailed in this Order and such measures must be followed to prevent any onsite worker from contracting COVID-19. Upon the City's request, the contractor shall submit the Plan to the City. Failure to comply with this Order shall be deemed as creating unsafe conditions and may result in withheld inspections or the closure of the Construction Site until corrected.
- <u>Section 3</u>. The Contractor shall institute the following measures which shall be included in the Exposure Control Plan.
- A. The Contractor shall post at the Construction Site, in areas visible to all workers, required hygienic practices including: (i) not touching one's face with unwashed hands or with gloves; (ii) washing one's hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds or use of hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol; (iii) cleaning and disinfecting frequently touched objects and surfaces including shared tools and equipment; and (iv) covering one's mouth and nose when coughing or sneezing as well as other hygienic recommendations by the Centers for Disease Control ("CDC").
- B. The Contractor shall install hand washing facilities with soap and water or hand sanitizer that contains at least 60 percent alcohol in multiple locations at the Construction Site (including at each entrance to the Construction Site) and shall ensure that the facilities remain adequately stocked during all times of construction activity.
 - C. The Contractor shall not permit sharing of tools or equipment.
- D. The Contractor shall also establish a schedule for cleaning and disinfecting frequently touched objects and surfaces and maintain a log of the established cleaning schedule which shall be made available to the City upon request.
- E. The Contractor shall instruct its workers and other members of the public at the Construction Site to maintain social distancing to the greatest extent possible by maintaining a minimum 6-foot distance from one another at all times, except as specified in Subsection (F) below. The Contractor shall post a sign in a conspicuous place at each pedestrian entrance to the Construction Site as well as throughout the site instructing workers and other members of the public of this requirement.
- F. The Contractor or the owner, manager, or operator of any business that, as its primary operation, is engaged in construction work at the Construction Site shall ensure that its employees or independent contractors are provided personal protective equipment ("PPE")

such as gloves, goggles, face shields and face masks to comply with the provisions of this Order and as is appropriate for the activity being performed at the Construction Site. Workers needing close contact (less than 6-feet) in order to perform their work duties shall be required to wear Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) such as face masks, eye protection, and gloves.

- G. The Contractor shall instruct its workers and other members of the public at the Construction Site against gathering in groups of any size, including gathering on site for lunch and other breaks. The Contractor shall ensure that, anytime two or more people must meet, such persons maintain a distance of six feet from one another at all times.
- H. The Contractor shall: (i) identify "choke points" and "high-risk areas" where workers are forced to stand together, such as hallways, hoists and elevators, break areas, and buses, and control them so that social distancing of six feet from one another is maintained; (ii) minimize interactions when picking up or delivering equipment or materials so that social distancing of six feet from one another is maintained; and (iii) stagger the trades as necessary to reduce density so that social distancing of six feet from one another is maintained.
- I. For sites with more than 4 workers, the Contractor shall designate a person as the Construction Site COVID-19 Supervisor to enforce this Order. The designated COVID-19 Supervisor shall be present on the Construction Site at all times during construction activities. The COVID-19 Supervisor can be an on-site worker who is designated to carry this role.
- J. The Contractor shall prohibit anyone entering the Construction Site if they are experiencing signs of illness, including respiratory illness, fever or cough or if the contractor knows or has reason to know such person has been in recent close contact with someone with laboratory confirmed COVID-19. The Contractor shall also require anyone working or visiting the Construction Site to return home if such person is experiencing signs of illness, including respiratory illness, fever or cough. The Contractor shall post a sign in a conspicuous place at each pedestrian entrance to the Construction Site instructing workers and other members of the public of these requirements.
- K. The Contractor shall require anyone working at the Construction Site to stay home if they are sick, except to obtain medical care.
- L. The Contractor shall require anyone working at the Construction Site to inform their supervisor if they have been exposed to COVID-19 or has a sick family member or other person at home with COVID-19.
- M. The Contractor shall take all appropriate steps, if individuals are residing at the Construction Site, to ensure that workers minimize their contact with areas within the building but not within the actual construction project, including limiting workers' path of travel in and out of the project site, and, for all such areas with which contact is unavoidable, regularly clean and sanitize those areas at least twice daily, including following completion of work each day, and maintain a log of the cleaning schedule to be made available to the City upon request.
- N. The Contractor shall maintain a daily attendance log of all workers and visitors.

Section 4. The property owner of the Construction Site and their contractor(s) are legally responsible for compliance with this Order. Manhattan Beach staff will verify compliance with this Order during regular scheduled inspections for projects under construction as well as in response to complaints that may be submitted to the City by email to code@citymb.info. This Order authorizes the City's building official or designee to issue a stop work order at a Construction Site at which workers are in violation of Sections 2 and 3 of this Order by giving notice in writing to the COVID-19 Supervisor, the Contractor or to persons engaged in the doing or causing such work to be done at the Construction Site. No person shall fail to comply with such a stop work order if issued by the City.

<u>Section 5</u>. Any violation of this Order may be determined to be a misdemeanor and punishable by a fine or imprisonment, or both, pursuant to Government Code Section 8665 and Chapters 1.04 and 1.06 of the Manhattan Beach Municipal Code, and any other state or city law as may be applicable.

<u>Section 6</u>. This Order is based on the CDC's Interim Guidance for Businesses and Employers to Plan and Respond to Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19), OSHA's Guidance on Preparing Workplaces for COVID-19, and other publications. Please check https://www.citymb.info/services/learn-about/coronavirus for the latest updates.

Section 7. This Order shall take effect on April 4, 2020, at 12:01 a.m.

WHEREAS, international, national, state, and local health and governmental authorities are responding to an outbreak of respiratory disease caused by a novel coronavirus named "SARS-CoV-2," and the disease it causes has been named "coronavirus disease 2019," abbreviated COVID-19, ("COVID-19");

WHEREAS, on March 4, 2020, the Governor of the State of California declared a state of emergency to make additional resources available, formalize emergency actions already underway across multiple state agencies and departments, and help the state prepare for broader spread of COVID-19;

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, the President of the United States of America declared a national emergency and announced that the federal government would make emergency funding available to assist state and local governments in preventing the spread of and addressing the effects of COVID-19;

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 20-0039, A Resolution of the City Council of the City of Manhattan Beach Proclaiming the Existence of a Local Emergency;

WHEREAS, on March 27, 2020, the City Council adopted Ordinance No. 20-0015-U which, *inter alia*, amended Ordinance No. 20-0014-U to clarify that all persons and businesses must also comply with health and safety measures required by state or county guidelines related to COVID-19;

WHEREAS, on March 27, 2020, acting under the authority vested in me as the Director of Emergency Services, I ordered the closure of the beach walking path known as the Strand in conjunction with the County's closure of the adjacent County beaches;

WHEREAS, as of April 7, 2020, the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health has confirmed 6,910 cases of COVID-19 in Los Angeles County and that number is expected to continue to rise;

WHEREAS, the City's public spaces, parks, and facilities continue to attract groups of people who often fail to comply with health and safety measures required by state or county order or guidelines related to COVID-19;

WHEREAS, this Emergency Order No. 2 memorializes the closures of certain City spaces, parks, and facilities that I initially ordered on March 19, 2020, March 24, 2020, and March 27, 2020; and

WHEREAS, in the interest of the public health and safety, as affected by the emergency caused by the spread of COVID-19, it is necessary to exercise my authority pursuant to Chapter 3.08 of the Manhattan Beach Municipal Code, Manhattan Beach City Council Resolution No. 20-0039, and the California Emergency Services Act, Chapter 7 (commencing with Section 8550) of Title 2 of the Government Code, to issue this order.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED AS FOLLOWS:

- <u>Section 1</u>. The recitals set forth above are true and correct and are incorporated into this Order by reference.
 - <u>Section 2</u>. The following City spaces, parks, and facilities are closed until further notice:
 - A. Manhattan Beach Pier.
- B. All City parks, fields, sports courts, exercise equipment, and other recreational facilities.
- C. The parking lots located at El Porto, Bruce's Beach, and the Manhattan Beach Pier, provided, however, that this closure shall not apply to City residents who possess valid and current residential parking permits for the relevant lots. Such lots are more specifically described as:
 - El Porto Lot (APNs: 4137013906, 4137013907, 4137013908)
 - County Lots at 26th Street Lot (APNs: 4177024900, 4177024902)
 - State Pier Lots (APNs: 4179019905, 4179022900, 4179031903)
- D. The beach walking path known as the Strand, as further defined in Manhattan Beach Municipal Code Section 12.12.010.
- Section 3. Any violation of this Order is a misdemeanor and punishable by a fine of \$1000 or imprisonment, or both, pursuant to Government Code Section 8665 and Chapters 1.04 of the Manhattan Beach Municipal Code, and any other state or city law as may be applicable. In accordance with Municipal Code Chapter 1.06, the City, at its sole discretion, may prosecute any violation through the administrative process set forth therein.

WHEREAS, at the conclusion of its April 22, 2020 meeting, the City Council voted to direct me to reopen sections of Polliwog Park, require face coverings, and maintain the City's existing social distancing requirements; and

WHEREAS, in the interest of the public health and safety, as affected by the emergency caused by the spread of COVID-19, it is necessary to exercise my authority pursuant to Chapter 3.08 of the Manhattan Beach Municipal Code, Manhattan Beach City Council Resolution No. 20-0039, and the California Emergency Services Act, Chapter 7 (commencing with Section 8550) of Title 2 of the Government Code, to issue this order.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED AS FOLLOWS:

<u>Section 1</u>. The recitals set forth above are true and correct and are incorporated into this Order by reference.

<u>Section 2</u>. Pursuant to Manhattan Beach Municipal Section 3.08.060.A.6.a, the City Manager as the Director of Emergency Services hereby orders the following, effective April 25, 2020, at 6:30 a.m.:

- A. The park commonly known as Polliwog Park, located at 1601 Manhattan Beach Boulevard, is reopened on a trial basis, subject to the following limitations:
 - 1. Only the green spaces within Polliwog Park are reopened.
 - All other sections of Polliwog Park including but not limited to all restrooms, courts, sports fields, picnic pads, playground equipment, and dog runs – remain closed.
- B. Prior to entering Polliwog Park, all persons shall wear a face covering that covers the nose and mouth and wear such face covering at all times within the Park.
- C. The social distancing requirements set forth in Ordinance Nos. 20-0014-U and 20-0015-U are still valid.
- D. Please note that the County of Los Angeles has issued guidance for cloth face coverings at this link http://publichealth.lacounty.gov/media/Coronavirus/GuidanceClothFaceCoverings.pdf including the following guidance with respect to children:

"Children under the age of 2 (including infants) should not wear cloth face coverings. Those between the ages of 2 and 8 should use them but under adult

supervision to ensure that the child can breathe safely and avoid choking or suffocation. Children with breathing problems should not wear a face covering."

EFFECTIVE APRIL 25, 2020, AT 12:01 A.M.

WHEREAS, international, national, state, and local health and governmental authorities are responding to an outbreak of respiratory disease caused by a novel coronavirus named "SARS-CoV-2," and the disease it causes has been named "coronavirus disease 2019," abbreviated COVID-19 ("COVID-19");

WHEREAS, on March 4, 2020, the Governor of the State of California declared a state of emergency to make additional resources available, formalize emergency actions already underway across multiple state agencies and departments, and help the state prepare for broader spread of COVID-19;

"ABC"), including the requirements that any alcoholic beverages sold by such establishments must be (1) sold in conjunction with the sale of food prepared for off-site consumption, and (2) "packaged in a container with a secure lid or cap and in a manner designed to prevent consumption without removal of the lid or cap (e.g., no lids with sipping holes or openings for straws).";

WHEREAS, in addition, the ABC requires such establishments to prominently post the following warning in a manner that puts consumers on notice of limitations regarding open container laws: "Alcoholic beverages that are packaged by this establishment are open containers and may not be transported in a motor vehicle except in the vehicle's trunk; or, if there is no trunk, the container may be kept in some other area of the vehicle that is not normally occupied by the driver or passengers (which does not include a utility compartment or glove compartment (Vehicle Code Section 23225)). Further, such beverages may not be consumed in public or in any other area where open containers are prohibited by law.";

WHEREAS, the City has received reports that some restaurants, bars, nightclubs, and similar businesses which serve food and alcohol for off-site consumption are providing alcohol to customers while they are waiting for their meal to be ready, and that customers are – in violation of existing state and local laws prohibiting open containers of alcohol and consuming alcohol in public – opening the alcohol container and consuming the alcohol; and

WHEREAS, in the interest of the public health and safety, as affected by the emergency caused by the spread of COVID-19, it is necessary to exercise my authority pursuant to Chapter 3.08 of the Manhattan Beach Municipal Code, Manhattan Beach City Council Resolution No. 20-0039, and the California Emergency Services Act, Chapter 7 (commencing with Section 8550) of Title 2 of the Government Code, to issue this order.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED AS FOLLOWS:

<u>Section 1</u>. The recitals set forth above are true and correct and are incorporated into this Order by reference.

<u>Section 2</u>. Pursuant to Manhattan Beach Municipal Section 3.08.060.A.6.a and consistent with City Council direction, the City Manager as the Director of Emergency Services hereby orders the following:

- A. All restaurants, bars, nightclubs, and similar businesses that serve food and alcohol via delivery, pick-up, or drive-thru shall not provide any alcohol to a customer prior to providing the meal prepared for delivery. All alcohol shall be provided to the customer concurrently with the delivery of food.
- B. All such establishments have a duty to monitor customers waiting for food to ensure that no one is consuming alcohol on or adjacent to the premises.

<u>Section 3</u>. Any violation of this Order may be determined to be a misdemeanor and punishable by a fine or imprisonment, or both, pursuant to Government Code Section 8665 and Chapters 1.04 and 1.06 of the Manhattan Beach Municipal Code, and any other state or city law as may be applicable.

<u>Section 4.</u> This Order shall take effect on April 25, 2020, at 12:01 a.m., subject to confirmation as soon as practicable by the City Council.

WHEREAS, international, national, state, and local health and governmental authorities are responding to an outbreak of respiratory disease caused by a novel coronavirus named "SARS-CoV-2," and the disease it causes has been named "coronavirus disease 2019," abbreviated COVID-19 ("COVID-19");

WHEREAS, on March 4, 2020, the Governor of the State of California declared a state of emergency to make additional resources available, formalize emergency actions already underway across multiple state agencies and departments, and help the state prepare for broader spread of COVID-19;

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, the President of the United States of America declared a national emergency and announced that the federal government would make emergency funding available to assist state and local governments in preventing the spread of and addressing the effects of COVID-19;

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 20-0039, A Resolution of the City Council of the City of Manhattan Beach Proclaiming the Existence of a Local Emergency;

WHEREAS, the City Manager is the Director of Emergency Services in the City of Manhattan Beach. Pursuant to Manhattan Beach Municipal Section 3.08.060.A.6.a, the City Manager as the Director of Emergency Services is empowered during a local emergency to make and issue rules and regulations on matters reasonably related to the protection of life and property as affected by such emergency;

WHEREAS, on March 16, 2020, the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health issued the Safer at Home Order for Control of COVID-19, which was subsequently amended and revised (the "County Safer at Home Order");

WHEREAS, on March 25 and March 27, 2020, the City Council adopted Ordinance Nos. 20-0014-U and 20-0015-U which require all persons and businesses to comply with social distancing requirements and other health and safety measures required by a state or county order or guidelines related to COVID-19;

WHEREAS, on May 22, 26, and 29, 2020, Los Angeles County began gradually relaxing the closures, allowing for non-essential retail businesses to fully open to customers, as well as

restaurants to re-open their dining rooms for on-site dining, along with operating protocols to limit the spread of COVID-19. These protocols include social distancing requirements (where customers must maintain space between themselves and other) and a 60% cap on restaurant dining room capacities;

WHEREAS, to enable any business or restaurant to apply for permission to conduct temporary outdoor operations on private property adjacent to its use, the City recommends the temporary relaxation of any use permit condition or Code requirement, including provisions in Municipal Code Section 10.60.080, that would delay or hinder issuance of the temporary permit;

WHEREAS, to regulate outdoor dining uses in the sidewalk portion of the public right-ofway, the Manhattan Beach Community Development Department currently allows for application of Sidewalk Dining Permits in accordance with Municipal Code Section 7.36.160; and

WHEREAS, to regulate outdoor dining uses in the non-sidewalk portion of public right-of-way, the Manhattan Beach Community Development Department has developed an "Outdoor Dining and Business Use in the Right-of-Way Checklist" ("Checklist") and "Outdoor Dining and Business Use in the Public Roadway Guidelines" ("Guidelines"); and

WHEREAS, in the interest of the public health and safety, as affected by the emergency caused by the spread of COVID-19, it is necessary to exercise my authority pursuant to Chapter 3.08 of the Manhattan Beach Municipal Code, Manhattan Beach City Council Resolution No. 20-0039, and the California Emergency Services Act, Chapter 7 (commencing with Section 8550) of Title 2 of the Government Code, to issue this order.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED AS FOLLOWS:

<u>Section 1</u>. The recitals set forth above are true and correct and are incorporated into this Order by reference.

<u>Section 2</u>. Pursuant to Manhattan Beach Municipal Section 3.08.060.A.6.a, the City Manager as the Director of Emergency Services hereby orders the following:

- A. Notwithstanding any Municipal Code provision or use permit condition to the contrary, any existing, legally-permitted business or restaurant ("Outdoor Use Applicant") may apply to the City to expand its existing footprint to conduct outdoor operations, on a temporary basis, on private property or in the public right-of-way, adjacent to its site.
- B. Each Outdoor Use Applicant seeking to use portions of the sidewalk in the public right of way shall apply to the Community Development Department for an encroachment permit and must comply with all City requirements set forth in Section 7.36.160.
- C. Each Outdoor Use Applicant seeking to use private property, or the Metlox courtyard, shall apply to the Community Development Department pursuant to Municipal Code Section 10.60.080.
- D. As stated in the recitals, Los Angeles County has currently imposed a 60% capacity cap on on-site restaurant dining. Such cap may be increased or decreased by the County. In no event shall the overall dining capacity for a restaurant exceed 100% of its approved capacity.
- E. No business or restaurant shall conduct the outdoor uses authorized by this Order prior to receiving City-issued authorization to conduct such use.
- F. An Outdoor Use Applicant who obtains a City-issued approval for an expanded restaurant dining area shall be afforded a temporary relaxation of use permit conditions or Code requirement pertaining to floor plan areas and configuration, provided they abide by all other applicable State, County, and local regulations and any permit conditions of their encroachment.
- G. An Outdoor Use Applicant who obtains a City-issued approval for an expanded restaurant dining area may follow the temporary relief measures passed by the California ABC, including service of alcohol in an approved expanded area.

<u>Section 3</u>. Any violation of this Order may be determined to be a misdemeanor and punishable by a fine or imprisonment, or both, pursuant to Government Code Section 8665 and Chapters 1.04 and 1.06 of the Manhattan Beach Municipal Code, and any other state or city law as may be applicable.

EFFECTIVE June 10, 2020, at 6:00 p.m.

WHEREAS, on June 5, 2020, the Director of Emergency Services issued Emergency Order No. 10 to authorize businesses and restaurants to temporarily expand their existing footprints into the public right of way, public property, and private property to accommodate social distancing requirements required by state and county protocols to limit the spread of COVID-19;

WHEREAS, on June 9, 2020, the Manhattan Beach City Council directed the City Manager, as the Director of Emergency Services, to expand Emergency Order No. 10 to allow restaurants and businesses to expand existing footprints to conduct outdoor operations, on a temporary basis, in the public street and other public rights-of-way, with an encroachment permit.

WHEREAS, in the interest of the public health and safety, as affected by the emergency caused by the spread of COVID-19, it is necessary for the Director to exercise his authority pursuant to Manhattan Beach Municipal Code Chapter 3.08, Manhattan Beach City Council Resolution No. 20-0039, and the California Emergency Services Act, Chapter 7 (commencing with Section 8550) of Title 2 of the Government Code, to issue this order.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED AS FOLLOWS:

- <u>Section 1</u>. The recitals set forth above and in Emergency Order No. 10 are true and correct and are incorporated into this Order by reference.
- <u>Section 2</u>. Pursuant to Manhattan Beach Municipal Section 3.08.060.A.6.a, the City Manager as the Director of Emergency Services hereby amends Emergency Order No. 10 by adding the following section H to Section 2:
- H. Notwithstanding any Municipal Code provision or use permit condition to the contrary, any existing, legally-permitted business or restaurant ("Outdoor Use Applicant") may apply to the City to expand its existing footprint to conduct outdoor operations, on a temporary basis, in in-roadway/parking space portions of the public property. Each Outdoor Use Applicant seeking to use in-roadway/parking space portions of the public property shall, no later than June 22, 2020, apply to the Manhattan Beach Community Development Department for an encroachment permit and must comply with all City requirements set forth in the Checklist and Guidelines referenced in Emergency Order No. 10. The authorization to use public property pursuant to this Section H shall expire September 30, 2020. Any improvements installed on public property shall be removed, and the public property shall be restored to its condition prior to such use, no later than 11:59 p.m. on September 30, 2020.

<u>Section 3</u>. Any violation of this Order may be determined to be a misdemeanor and punishable by a fine or imprisonment, or both, pursuant to Government Code Section 8665 and Chapters 1.04 and 1.06 of the Manhattan Beach Municipal Code, and any other state or city law as may be applicable.

<u>Section 4.</u> This Order shall take effect on June 10, 2020, at 6:00 p.m., subject to confirmation as soon as practicable by the City Council.

WHEREAS, Manhattan Beach Municipal Code Section 1.06.060.A generally requires a requested administrative appeal to be heard before a hearing officer within 30 days of the City's receipt of the appeal;

WHEREAS, to minimize the risk of transmission of COVID-19 during the administrative appeal process, I deem it appropriate to extend the time period for the City to hold an administrative appeal to 90 days from the City's receipt of a timely, duly filed appeal; and

WHEREAS, in the interest of the public health and safety, as affected by the emergency caused by the spread of COVID-19, it is necessary to exercise my authority pursuant to Chapter 3.08 of the Manhattan Beach Municipal Code, Manhattan Beach City Council Resolution No. 20-0039, and the California Emergency Services Act, Chapter 7 (commencing with Section 8550) of Title 2 of the Government Code, to issue this order.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED AS FOLLOWS:

<u>Section 1</u>. The recitals set forth above are true and correct and are incorporated into this Order by reference.

<u>Section 2</u>. Notwithstanding any Manhattan Beach Municipal Code provision to the contrary, an administrative appeal requested under Municipal Code Chapter 1.06 shall be heard before a hearing officer within 90 days of the City's receipt of the appeal, unless both the City and party requesting the hearing agree to a later date.

WHEREAS, international, national, state, and local health and governmental authorities are responding to an outbreak of respiratory disease caused by a novel coronavirus named "SARS-CoV-2," and the disease it causes has been named "coronavirus disease 2019," abbreviated COVID-19 ("COVID-19");

WHEREAS, on March 4, 2020, the Governor of the State of California declared a state of emergency to make additional resources available, formalize emergency actions already underway across multiple state agencies and departments, and help the state prepare for broader spread of COVID-19;

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, the President of the United States of America declared a national emergency and announced that the federal government would make emergency funding available to assist state and local governments in preventing the spread of and addressing the effects of COVID-19;

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 20-0039, A Resolution of the City Council of the City of Manhattan Beach Proclaiming the Existence of a Local Emergency;

WHEREAS, the City Manager is the Director of Emergency Services in the City of Manhattan Beach. Pursuant to Manhattan Beach Municipal Code Section 3.08.060.A.6.a, the City Manager as the Director of Emergency Services is empowered during a local emergency to make and issue rules and regulations on matters reasonably related to the protection of life and property as affected by such emergency;

WHEREAS, on March 16, 2020, the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health issued the Safer at Home Order for Control of COVID-19, which was subsequently amended and revised (the "County COVID-19 Order");

WHEREAS, the County COVID-19 Order generally requires all persons to "wear a cloth face covering over both the nose and mouth whenever they leave their place of residence and are or can be in contact with or walking near or past others who are non-household members in both public and private places, whether indoors or outdoors" (the "Face Covering Requirement");

WHEREAS, the County COVID-19 Order states that "[w]earing a cloth face covering over both the nose and mouth reduces the risk of [COVID-19] transmission to others from people who do not have symptoms and do not know they are infected";

WHEREAS, the "Guidance for Cloth Face Coverings" issued by Los Angeles County Department of Public Health identifies several groups should not wear a face covering, including but not limited to children under the age of 2 and anyone instructed not to wear a cloth face covering by a medical provider;

WHEREAS, on March 25 and March 27, 2020, the City Council adopted Ordinance Nos. 20-0014-U and 20-0015-U which require all persons and businesses to comply with social distancing requirements and other health and safety measures required by the County COVID-19 Order and other state or county orders or guidelines related to COVID-19, including the Face Covering Requirement;

WHEREAS, despite the Face Covering Requirement, many persons are failing to wear a face covering, which increases the risk of COVID-19 transmission to others in the community;

WHEREAS, the City can increase compliance with the Face Covering Requirement, and therefore reduce the risk of COVID-19 transmission, by expanding its enforcement capacity beyond the code enforcement officers who typically issue administrative citations for violations of the Municipal Code; and

- B. Persons with a medical condition, mental health condition, or disability that prevents wearing a face covering;
- C. Persons who are hearing impaired, or communicating with a person who is hearing impaired, where the ability to see the mouth is essential for communication; and
- D. Persons who are swimming or engaged in other water-based activities.

Persons who are seated at a restaurant or other establishment that offers food or beverage service shall wear a cloth face covering over both the nose and mouth, unless they are eating or drinking.

<u>Section 3</u>. Notwithstanding any Manhattan Beach Municipal Code provision to the contrary, the Director of Emergency Services, or his designee, is authorized to deputize additional persons to issue administrative citations pursuant to Chapter 1.06 of the Manhattan Beach Municipal Code for violations of this Order or the existing Face Covering Requirement under Ordinance Nos. 20-0014-U and 20-0015-U, as amended from time to time.

<u>Section 4.</u> The Director of Emergency Services, or his designee, is authorized to enter into any contracts related to the enforcement of this Order or the existing Face Covering Requirement under Ordinance Nos. 20-0014-U and 20-0015-U, as amended from time to time.

<u>Section 5.</u> Pursuant to Government Code Section 8665, any person who refuses or willfully neglects to obey this Order shall be guilty of a misdemeanor. In lieu of prosecuting a violation as a misdemeanor, the City may, at its sole discretion, issue an administrative citation for each violation and assess a fine of \$100 for the first violation, \$200 for the second violation, and \$350 for each subsequent violation.

<u>Section 6.</u> This Order shall take effect on July 15, 2020, at 8:00 p.m., subject to confirmation as soon as practicable by the City Council.

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, the President of the United States of America declared a national emergency and announced that the federal government would make emergency funding available to assist state and local governments in preventing the spread of and addressing the effects of COVID-19;

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 20-0039, A Resolution of the City Council of the City of Manhattan Beach Proclaiming the Existence of a Local Emergency;

"Section 5. City shall issue an administrative citation for each violation and assess a fine of \$100 for the first violation, \$200 for the second violation, and \$350 for each subsequent violation."

<u>Section 3</u>. All other provisions of Emergency Order No. 13 shall have full force and effect.

WHEREAS, international, national, state, and local health and governmental authorities are responding to an outbreak of respiratory disease caused by a novel coronavirus named "SARS-CoV-2," and the disease it causes has been named "coronavirus disease 2019," abbreviated COVID-19 ("COVID-19");

- 2. Hair salons and barbershops ("Hair Salons"), as provided in Los Angeles County's Reopening Protocol for Hair Salons and Barbershops and applicable state guidelines and regulations; and
- 3. Nail salons, esthetics, skin care and cosmetology services, and massage therapy in non-healthcare settings ("Authorized Personal Care Uses"), as provided in Los Angeles County's Reopening Protocol for Personal Care Establishments and applicable state guidelines and regulations.

WHEREAS, in the interest of the public health and safety, as affected by the emergency caused by the spread of COVID-19, it is necessary to exercise my authority pursuant to Chapter 3.08 of the Manhattan Beach Municipal Code, Manhattan Beach City Council Resolution No. 20-0039, and the California Emergency Services Act, Chapter 7 (commencing with Section 8550) of Title 2 of the Government Code, to issue this order.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED AS FOLLOWS:

<u>Section 1</u>. The recitals set forth above are true and correct and are incorporated into this Order by reference.

<u>Section 2</u>. Pursuant to Manhattan Beach Municipal Section 3.08.060.A.6.a, the City Manager as the Director of Emergency Services hereby orders the following:

- A. Notwithstanding any Municipal Code provision or use permit condition to the contrary, any existing, legally-permitted Fitness Establishment, Hair Salon, or Authorized Personal Care Use with a valid City business license may apply to the City to conduct outdoor operations, on a temporary basis, on private property or public property.
- B. Each Applicant seeking to use a City park shall apply to the Parks and Recreation Director for a permit and must comply with all City requirements set forth in Manhattan Beach Municipal Code Section 12.48.070, the protocols established by the State of California and the County of Los Angeles, and the City protocol established by the City's Parks and Recreation Director.
- C. Each Applicant seeking to use the public right of way shall apply to the Community Development Department for an encroachment permit and must comply with all City requirements set forth in Manhattan Beach Municipal Code Chapter 7.36, the protocols established by the State of California and the County of Los Angeles, and the City protocol established by the City's Community Development Director.
- D. Each Applicant seeking to use private property or Metlox Courtyard shall apply to the Community Development Department for a permit and must comply with all City requirements, the protocols established by the State of California, the County of Los Angeles, and the City protocol established by the City's Community Development Director.

- E. An Applicant who obtains a City-issued approval for outdoor use shall be afforded a temporary relaxation of use permit conditions or Code requirement pertaining to floor plan areas and configuration, provided they abide by all other applicable State, County, and local regulations and any encroachment permit conditions, where applicable.
- F. The City reserves its authority to terminate any rights or privileges afforded pursuant to this Order. In such event, the City shall provide three-day written notice.

<u>Section 3</u>. Pursuant to Government Code Section 8665 and Manhattan Beach Municipal Code Section 3.08.100, it is a misdemeanor for any person who refuses or willfully neglects to obey orders issued by the Director of Emergency Services during an emergency. In the exercise of prosecutorial discretion, the City may, at its sole discretion, issue an administrative citation for each violation in lieu of prosecuting a violation as a misdemeanor pursuant to Manhattan Beach Municipal Code Chapter 1.06.

Section 4. This Order shall take effect on July 24, 2020, at 7:30 a.m.

WHEREAS, pursuant to Emergency Order Nos. 10 and 11, a number of restaurants have received the necessary approvals to have outdoor dining on a temporary basis on public property, including rights-of-way and sidewalks;

WHEREAS, Municipal Code Section 7.36.160 regulates outdoor dining uses in the sidewalk portion of the public right-of-way;

WHEREAS, Municipal Code Section 7.36.160.I provides, *inter alia*, that all dining activities on sidewalks must conclude by 10:00 p.m.; and

WHEREAS, in the interest of the public health and safety, as affected by the emergency caused by the spread of COVID-19, it is necessary to exercise the authority pursuant to Chapter 3.08 of the Manhattan Beach Municipal Code, Manhattan Beach City Council Resolution No. 20-0039, and the California Emergency Services Act, Chapter 7 (commencing with Section 8550) of Title 2 of the Government Code, to issue this order.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED AS FOLLOWS:

<u>Section 1</u>. The recitals set forth above are true and correct and are incorporated into this Order by reference.

- <u>Section 2</u>. Pursuant to Manhattan Beach Municipal Section 3.08.060.A.6.a, the City Manager as the Director of Emergency Services hereby orders the following:
 - A. Notwithstanding Municipal Code Section 7.36.160.l or any other provision to the contrary, a restaurant may conduct outdoor dining on public property, including rightsof-way and sidewalks, up to 11:00 p.m., provided the restaurant has received all necessary approvals required by the City, including those required by Emergency Order Nos. 10 and 11.
 - B. Any violation of this Order or Emergency Order Nos. 10 or 11 may be determined to be a misdemeanor and punishable by a fine or imprisonment, or both, pursuant to Government Code Section 8665, Manhattan Beach Municipal Code Chapter 1.04, and any other state or city law as may be applicable. In lieu of prosecuting a violation as a misdemeanor, the City may, at its sole discretion under Manhattan Beach Municipal Code Chapter 1.06, issue an administrative citation for each violation and assess a fine of \$250 for the first violation, \$500 for the second violation, and \$1,000 for each subsequent violation. In addition, pursuant to Government Code Section 8634 and Manhattan Beach Municipal Code Chapters 1.06 and 3.08, the City shall require the restaurant to cease all operations for two days for a third violation and cease all operations for four days for a fourth violation. For a fifth violation, the City shall initiate

revocation proceedings, and notify the California Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control that the violator has violated the terms and conditions of this Emergency Order, Emergency Order Nos. 10 or 11, or any applicable entitlement or agreement.

C. Except as modified hereinabove, the provisions of Emergency Order Nos. 10 and 11 shall have full force and effect.

Section 4. This Order shall take effect on August 7, 2020, at 5:00 p.m.

appeal process, it is appropriate to extend the time period for the City to hold an administrative appeal to 90 days from the City Council's termination of the local emergency proclaimed in response to the spread of COVID-19; and

The authorization to use public property pursuant to this Section H shall expire September 30, 2020. Any improvements installed on public property shall be removed, and the public property shall be restored to its condition prior to such use, no later than 11:59 p.m. on September 30, 2020."; and

Persons who are seated at a restaurant or other establishment that offers food or beverage service shall wear a cloth face covering over both the nose and mouth, unless they are eating or drinking.

Notwithstanding any provision of Emergency Order No. 13 or any other City provision, participants in tennis and pickleball do not have to wear a face covering while playing either tennis or pickleball. Such persons must continue to comply with all City and Los Angeles County Health Officer social distancing requirements, including wearing a cloth face covering over both the nose and mouth, at all other times."

<u>Section 3</u>. All other provisions of Emergency Order No. 13, as amended by Emergency Order Nos. 14 and 18, shall have full force and effect.

No restaurant, brewery, or winery shall seat customers after 9:15 p.m. No restaurant, brewery, or winery shall operate without all necessary approvals required by the City, including those required by Emergency Order Nos. 10 and 11."
- C. Manhattan Avenue is hereby closed to all vehicle traffic between Manhattan Beach Boulevard and 12th Street, to the greatest extent possible under applicable law.

The Upper Pier parking lots at the Manhattan Beach Pier shall be closed to vehicle traffic until the earlier of: 1) 90 days after the County allows any indoor dining; 2) Sunday, May 16, 2021; or 3) the end of the local emergency. Such lots are more specifically described as State Pier Lots (APNs: 4179019905, 4179022900).

No business shall be open between for between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m. the following day for indoor retail operations, provided, however, that such hours may be modified to the extent authorized by the County Safer at Home Order or any related protocols or regulations issued by the County Department of Public Health.

WHEREAS, on March 4, 2020, the Governor of the State of California declared a state of emergency to make additional resources available, formalize emergency actions already underway across multiple state agencies and departments, and help the state prepare for broader spread of COVID-19;

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 20-0039, A Resolution of the City Council of the City of Manhattan Beach Proclaiming the Existence of a Local Emergency;

WHEREAS, the City Manager is the Director of Emergency Services in the City of Manhattan Beach. Pursuant to Manhattan Beach Municipal Section 3.08.060.A.6.a, the City Manager as the Director of Emergency Services is empowered during a local emergency to make and issue rules and regulations on matters reasonably related to the protection of life and property as affected by such emergency;

WHEREAS, the State of California, County of Los Angeles, and the Manhattan Beach City Council have determined that there is a public benefit to allowing restaurants to conduct outdoor operations to recover from significant losses in revenue during the pandemic. On June 3, 2021, the Governor's office announced the extension of "relief measures that permit restaurants and bars to continue to benefit from their investments to expand outdoor operations in areas such as

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sidewalks and parking lots, and to continue the sale of to-go alcoholic beverages with food deliveries, among other successful pandemic adaptations. In addition, the Administration is urging local governments to facilitate outdoor dining through local zoning and programs that support and promote expanded open-air, take-out and delivery options." Concurrent with this announcement, the State Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control ("ABC") extended "regulatory relief" allowing for the expansion of licensed footprints for specified ABC-licensed restaurants until December 31, 2021; and

WHEREAS, in the interest of the public health and safety, as affected by the emergency caused by the spread of COVID-19, it is necessary to exercise my authority pursuant to Chapter 3.08 of the Manhattan Beach Municipal Code, Manhattan Beach City Council Resolution No. 20-0039, and the California Emergency Services Act, Chapter 7 (commencing with Section 8550) of Title 2 of the Government Code, to issue this order.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The recitals set forth above are true and correct and are incorporated into this Order by reference.

Section 2. Pursuant to Manhattan Beach Municipal Section 3.08.060.A.6.a, the City Manager as the Director of Emergency Services hereby amends Emergency Order No. 21 section 2.A, to read as follows:

"A. The time period in which businesses, restaurants, and breweries, may use public property and private parking spaces pursuant to Emergency Order Nos. 10, 11, 16, 19, and 21 is hereby extended until September 7, 2021. Any improvements installed on public property shall be removed, and the public property shall be restored to its condition prior to such use, no later than 11:59 p.m. on September 10, 2021. The previously authorized use of public property westerly of the easterly side of Ocean Drive, is hereby extended until July 20, 2021. Any improvements installed on this section of the public property shall subject to temporary or permanent removal at the discretion of the Community Development Director, whereupon the public property shall be restored to its condition prior to such use pursuant to the terms of the Encroachment Permit(s).

Section 3. Any business that continues to use public property or private parking spaces authorized by COVID-19 emergency orders subsequent to the applicable deadlines established by this Order may be determined to be a misdemeanor and punishable by a fine or imprisonment, or both, pursuant to Government Code Section 8665, Manhattan Beach Municipal Code Chapter 1.04, and any other state or city law as may be applicable. In lieu of prosecuting a violation as a misdemeanor, the City may, at its sole discretion under Manhattan Beach Municipal Code Chapter 1.06, issue an administrative citation for each violation and assess a fine of \$1,000 for each day in violation. In addition, pursuant to Government Code Section 8634 and Manhattan Beach Municipal Code Chapters 1.06 and 3.08, the business shall cease all operations, including indoor operations, for two days for a third violation and cease all operations, including indoor operations, for four days for a fourth violation. For any violation, the City may initiate revocation proceedings. Further, the City will notify the California Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control

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that any violator with a liquor license has violated the terms and conditions of this Emergency Order.

Section 4. Except as modified hereinabove or previously by other emergency orders, the provisions of Emergency Order Nos. 10, 11, 16, 19, and 21 shall have full force and effect.

9.01.010 - Adoption of the 2016 California Building Code.

Pursuant to the provisions of Section 50022.1 to 50022.10, inclusive, of the Government Code of the State and subject to the particular additions, deletions and amendments set forth in this chapter, the rules, regulations, provisions and conditions set forth in that certain Code entitled the "2016 California Building Code," including the Appendices and Standards (including Chapter/Section 1, Division 2; Chapter 31B; and excluding all Appendices with the exception of Appendices I and J) therein contained, promulgated and published by the International Code Council and the California Building Standards Commission, one full printed copy of which, printed as a Code in book form were by the Council ordered filed and which have been filed in the office of the City Clerk, expressly incorporated herein and made a part hereof as fully and for all intents and purposes as though set forth herein at length, are hereby established and adopted as the rules, regulations, provisions and conditions to be observed and followed in the construction, alteration, improvements, movement, enlargement, replacement, repair, equipment, use and occupancy, location, maintenance, removal, demolition, conversion, area and height, of buildings or structures or any appurtenances connected or attached to such buildings or structures in the city; and subject to the additions, deletions and amendments set forth in this chapter, said Code with its Appendices and the said Standards containing said rules, regulations, standards, provisions and conditions is hereby established and adopted by reference, and the same shall be designated, known and referred to as the "Building Code" of and for the City.

9.01.030 - Work exempt from permit.

PENALTIES INCLUDE ONE MISDEMEANOR COUNT FOR EACH DAY

Any permittee holding an unexpired permit may apply for an extension of the time within which work under that permit may be continued when, for good and satisfactory reasons, the permittee is unable to continue work within the time required by this section. The Building Official may grant one or more extensions for periods not exceeding six calendar months upon written request by the permittee showing that circumstances beyond the control of the permittee have prevented completion of the project. No permit shall be valid for more than 4 years.

If the owner or applicant fails to complete the construction work within the time required, the Building Official is authorized to obtain the abatement of any unsafe condition or nuisance created by such incomplete work. The City Attorney is authorized to file an action for the abatement of any such unsafe condition or nuisance if required to do so by the Building Official.

9.01.060 - Fees.

Sections [A]109.2 and [A]109.4 are hereby amended to read as follows:

[A] 109.2 Schedule of permit fees. The fees shall be determined by the most current City Resolution of Fees.

Plan Review Fees. When submittal documents are required by the building official, a plan review fee shall be paid at the time of submitting the submittal documents for plan review. Said plan review fee shall be determined by the most current City Resolution of Fees.

The plan review fees specified in this section are separate and in addition to any permit fees required.

When submittal documents are incomplete or changed so as to require additional plan review or when the project involves deferred submittal items as defined in Section [A]107.3.4.1, an additional plan review fee shall be charged as determined by the most current City Resolution of Fees.

[A]109.4 Work commencing before permit issuance. Any person who commences any work on a building, structure, electrical, gas, mechanical or plumbing system before obtaining the necessary permits shall be subject to a fee established by the Building Official and the most current Manhattan Beach Resolution of Fees in addition to the required permit fees.

Investigation. Whenever any work for which a permit is required by this code has been commenced without first obtaining said permit, a special investigation shall be made before a permit may be issued for such work.

Investigation Fee. An investigation fee, in addition to the permit fee, shall be collected whether or not a permit is then or subsequently issued. The investigation fee shall be equal up to the amount of the permit fee required by this code as determined by the Building Official. The minimum investigation fee shall be determined by the most current Resolution of Fees. The payment of such investigation fee shall not exempt any person from compliance with all other provisions of this code nor from any penalty prescribed by law.

(§ 2, Ord. 16-0032, eff. January 7, 2017)

9.01.070 - Violation penalties.

Section [A]114.4 is amended to read as follows:

[A] Section 114.4. Violation penalties. Any person who violates a provision of this code or fails to comply with any of the requirements thereof or who erects, constructs, alters or repairs a building or structure in violation of the approved construction documents or directive of the building official, or of a permit or certificate issued under the provisions of this code, shall be subject to the penalties as prescribed by law. Every person who willfully resists, delays, obstructs or interferes in any way with any City Building Inspector in the discharge or attempt to discharge any duty of his or her office or employment shall be guilty of a violation of this Chapter.

Any person, firm, or corporation violating any of the provisions or failing to comply with any of the mandatory requirements of the ordinances of Manhattan Beach shall be guilty of a misdemeanor. Any person convicted of a misdemeanor under the ordinances of Manhattan Beach shall be punished by a fine of not more than one thousand dollars (\$1,000), or by imprisonment not to exceed six (6) months, or by both such fine and imprisonment. Each such person shall be guilty of a separate offense for each and every day during any portion of which any violation of any provision of the ordinances of Manhattan Beach is committed, continued, or permitted by any such person, and shall be punished accordingly.

9.01.080 - Definitions.

Section 202 is hereby amended by adding a definition to read as follows:

ABANDONED OR SUSPENDED WORK. Work that has been stopped or no progress in construction and no inspection is required or performed for a period of 180 days.

9.01.090 - Yards.

Section 1206.2 is amended by adding Exception 1 to read as follows:

Exception 1. One and two family dwellings not exceeding three stories, which are located on a 30 foot wide lot or less may have 3 foot (914 mm) side yards, if additional artificial light and mechanical ventilation are provided for the structure as determined to be adequate by the building official.

9.01.100 - Roofing and re-roofing.

The title of Table 1505.1 is hereby amended to read as follows:

Table 1505.1. Minimum Roof Covering Classification for Types of Construction. All roof classifications of "C" shall be deleted from Table 1505.1 and replaced by class "B" roof classification.

Sections 1505.1 and 1507.1 are hereby amended by adding a sentence to the end of each section that reads as follows:

Fire-retardant roofs are roofing assemblies complying with California Building Code Standards and listed as Class A or B roofs. The use of fire-retardant wood shakes or fire retardant wood shingles is prohibited.

Section 1505.5 is hereby amended to read as follows:

 - 1. The building permit number.
 - 2. The address of the structure.
 - The name and address of the owner or the owner's authorized agent.
 - A description of that portion of the structure for which the certificate is issued.
 - A statement that the described portion of the structure has been inspected for compliance with the requirements of this code for the occupancy and division of occupancy and the use for which the proposed occupancy is classified.
 - 6. The name of the building official.
 - The edition of the code under which the permit was issued.
 - 8. The use and occupancy, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 3.
 - 9. The type of construction as defined in Chapter 6.
 - 10. The design occupant load.
 - 11. If an automatic sprinkler system is provided, whether the sprinkler system is required.
 - Any special stipulations and conditions of the building permit.
- [A] 111.3 Temporary occupancy. The building official is authorized to issue a temporary certificate of occupancy before the completion of the entire work covered by the permit, provided that such portion or portions shall be occupied safely. The building official shall set a time period during which the temporary certificate of occupancy is valid.
- [A] 111.4 Revocation. The building official is authorized to, in writing, suspend or revoke a certificate of occupancy or completion issued under the provisions of this code wherever the certificate is issued in error, or on the basis of incorrect information supplied, or where it is determined that the building or structure or portion thereof is in violation of any ordinance or regulation or any of the provisions of this code.

SECTION 112 SERVICE UTILITIES

[A] 112.1 Connection of service utilities. A person shall not make connections from a utility, source of energy, fuel or power to any building or system that is regulated by this code for which a permit is required, until released by the building official.

[A] 112.2 Temporary connection. The building official shall have the authority to authorize the temporary connection of the building or system to the utility, source of energy, fuel or power.

[A] 112.3 Authority to disconnect service utilities. The building official shall have the authority to authorize disconnection of utility service to the building, structure or system regulated by this code and the referenced codes and standards set forth in Section 101.4 in case of emergency where necessary to eliminate an immediate hazard to life or property or where such utility connection has been made without the approval required by Section 112.1 or 112.2. The building official shall notify the serving utility, and wherever possible the owner and occupant of the building, structure or service system of the decision to disconnect prior to taking such action. If not notified prior to disconnecting, the owner or occupant of the building, structure or service system shall be notified in writing, as soon as practical thereafter.

SECTION 113 BOARD OF APPEALS

[A] 113.1 General. In order to hear and decide appeals of orders, decisions or determinations made by the building official relative to the application and interpretation of this code, there shall be and is hereby created a board of appeals. The board of appeals shall be appointed by the applicable governing authority and shall hold office at its pleasure. The board shall adopt rules of procedure for conducting its business.

[A] 113.2 Limitations on authority. An application for appeal shall be based on a claim that the true intent of this code or the rules legally adopted thereunder have been incorrectly interpreted, the provisions of this code do not fully apply or an equally good or better form of construction is proposed. The board shall not have authority to waive requirements of this code.

[A] 113.3 Qualifications. The board of appeals shall consist of members who are qualified by experience and training to pass on matters pertaining to building construction and are not employees of the jurisdiction.

SECTION 114 VIOLATIONS

[A] 114.1 Unlawful acts. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to erect, construct, alter, extend, repair, move, remove, demolish or occupy any building, structure or equipment regulated by this code, or cause same to be done, in conflict with or in violation of any of the provisions of this code.

[A] 114.2 Notice of violation. The building official is authorized to serve a notice of violation or order on the person responsible for the erection, construction, alteration, extension, repair, moving, removal, demolition or occupancy of a building or structure in violation of the provisions of this code, or in violation of a permit or certificate issued under the provisions of this code. Such order shall direct the discontinuance of the illegal action or condition and the abatement of the violation.

SCOPE AND ADMINISTRATION

[A] 114.3 Prosecution of violation. If the notice of violation is not complied with promptly, the building official is authorized to request the legal counsel of the jurisdiction to institute the appropriate proceeding at law or in equity to restrain, correct or abate such violation, or to require the removal or termination of the unlawful occupancy of the building or structure in violation of the provisions of this code or of the order or direction made pursuant thereto.

[A] 114.4 Violation penalties. Any person who violates a provision of this code or fails to comply with any of the requirements thereof or who erects, constructs, alters or repairs a building or structure in violation of the approved construction documents or directive of the building official, or of a permit or certificate issued under the provisions of this code, shall be subject to penalties as prescribed by law.

See CA Health & Safety Code HSC 17995.5 for penalty.

SECTION 115 STOP WORK ORDER

[A] 115.1 Authority. Where the building official finds any work regulated by this code being performed in a manner either contrary to the provisions of this code or dangerous or unsafe, the building official is authorized to issue a stop work order.

[A] 115.2 Issuance. The stop work order shall be in writing and shall be given to the owner of the property involved, the owner's authorized agent or the person performing the work. Upon issuance of a stop work order, the cited work shall immediately cease. The stop work order shall state the reason for the order and the conditions under which the cited work will be permitted to resume.

[A] 115.3 Unlawful continuance. Any person who shall continue any work after having been served with a stop work order, except such work as that person is directed to perform to remove a violation or unsafe condition, shall be subject to penalties as prescribed by law.

SECTION 116 UNSAFE STRUCTURES AND EQUIPMENT

[A] 116.1 Conditions. Structures or existing equipment that are or hereafter become unsafe, insanitary or deficient because of inadequate means of egress facilities, inadequate light and ventilation, or that constitute a fire hazard, or are otherwise dangerous to human life or the public welfare, or that involve illegal or improper occupancy or inadequate maintenance, shall be deemed an unsafe condition. Unsafe structures shall be taken down and removed or made safe, as the building official deems necessary and as provided for in this section. A vacant structure that is not secured against entry shall be deemed unsafe.

[A] 116.2 Record. The building official shall cause a report to be filed on an unsafe condition. The report shall state the occupancy of the structure and the nature of the unsafe condition.

[A] 116.3 Notice. If an unsafe condition is found, the building official shall serve on the owner, agent or person in control of the structure, a written notice that describes the condition deemed unsafe and specifies the required repairs or improvements to be made to abate the unsafe condition, or that requires the unsafe structure to be demolished within a stipulated time. Such notice shall require the person thus notified to declare immediately to the building official acceptance or rejection of the terms of the order.

[A] 116.4 Method of service. Such notice shall be deemed properly served if a copy thereof is: delivered to the owner personally; sent by certified or registered mail addressed to the owner at the last known address with the return receipt requested; or delivered in any other manner as prescribed by local law. If the certified or registered letter is returned showing that the letter was not delivered, a copy thereof shall be posted in a conspicuous place in or about the structure affected by such notice. Service of such notice in the foregoing manner on the owner's agent or on the person responsible for the structure shall constitute service of notice on the owner.

[A] 116.5 Restoration. Where the structure or equipment determined to be unsafe by the building official is restored to a safe condition, to the extent that repairs, alterations or additions are made or a change of occupancy occurs during the restoration of the structure, such repairs, alterations, additions and change of occupancy shall comply with the requirements of the *California Existing Building Code*.

Any person who violates any of the provisions of this part, the building standards published in the State Building Standards Code relating to the provisions of this part, or any other rule or regulation promulgated pursuant to the provisions of this part is guilty of a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not exceeding one thousand dollars (\$1,000) or by imprisonment not exceeding six months, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

(Amended by Stats. 1983, Ch. 1092, Sec. 162. Effective September 27, 1983. Operative January 1, 1984, by Sec. 427 of Ch. 1092.)

17995.1. Any person who is convicted pursuant to Section 17995 for a second or subsequent time within a five-year period for violations at the same property shall be punishable by a fine not to exceed five thousand dollars (\$5,000) or by imprisonment not exceeding six months, or both such fine and imprisonment.

17995.2. Dear City Council,

I was disappointed to read in The Beach Reporter of the looming deadline to end the dining decks. My family and I moved to Manhattan Beach in August 2019. We initially rented near Manhattan Avenue and 5th and have been homeowners at 19th and Highland since January 2020. My wife and I regularly walk our dog from 19th Street to Metlox or 19th Street to Pages Bookstore with the return route along either Highland, Manhattan and/or Ocean Avenues.

I would like to address the concerns cited by Mayor Hildy Stern from the recent City Council meeting cited in the The Beach Reporter article:

1. Increased downtown traffic. Please quantify this. I have seen no equipment measuring the traffic count. Residents are clearly aware by now of the reduced parking so it is not obvious that fewer parking places give rise to increased traffic. It works the opposite—more people are likely to walk into town and / or park on the periphery of town and then walk in.

Increased foot traffic (versus vehicular traffic) is possible and this is a positive for our small businesses.

2. More trash. Our dog walks traverse the downtown business district. As one who takes pride in my community, I typically pick up trash and litter along the street—pandemic notwithstanding. I suspect no one in this Community has voluntarily picked up as much trash as I have over the past 2 years.

Restaurants and the outdoor dining decks most grievous contribution to trash would be paper napkins and paper receipts. This is easily addressed through the use of a cloth napkin and paperless billing (requiring emailed receipts).

Your biggest contributors to the downtown trash situation are single use containers (eg, Starbucks), aluminum cans (not smuggled from restaurants!), masks and childrens' food wrappers (especially around Metlox and Live Oak Park).

I moved to Manhattan Beach from London where I had lived for 12 years. London is a remarkably trash free town notwithstanding very few trash cans. Terrorist activity—notably the IRA conflict with the British government from the '60s to the '00s—resulted in most trash cans being removed. Local residential areas employ human street cleaners who have a push cart, broom and dustpan. For at most \$75,000-100,000, the City of MB should employ up to 2 full time equivalents to perform this incredibly basic but valuable function. I suspect the restaurant owners would willingly contribute to this function. This is a much better allocation of capital than painting the downtown intersections for \$80,000.

- 3. Inability to clean streets and sidewalks. The above is a very simple and low cost solution. You may feel compelled to require the restaurant community to powerwash the sidewalks and back alleys on a monthly basis. This can be a shared expense across the restaurant owners.
- 4. Interrupted ADA access. Please provide support; regardless this can be addressed easily. I see numerous individuals in wheelchairs navigating our current downtown configuration.

- 5. Reduced Parking. No one can point to parking challenges in downtown MB over the past 15+ months. This again appears to be an excuse versus a well supported argument. If the town is worried about lost parking meter revenues, this is easily resolved. Bring an end to the free Holiday parking from Thanksgiving to New Years. This makes no sense. No one is making the decision to visit downtown Manhattan Beach on the basis of saving \$0.50-5.00 in parking cost.
- 6. Narrower driving lanes and riskier pedestrian safety. We have 15+ months of few if any issues relating to driving activity and pedestrian safety. Where is the statistical support for this suggestion?
- 7. More noise. The pleasant sounds of bringing the community back together post a pandemic bothers members of the City Council?

Please provide support from MBPD or MBFD relating to (1), (4), (5), (6) and (7). They are an informed stakeholder in this debate as anyone.

Equally concerning are the comments from community development director Carrie Tai who suggests that a permanent deck dining program will take 3 years to complete. This comment wreaks of government incompetence and bureaucracy. Local government officials are supposed to have a "can do" mentality to supporting local businesses and entrepreneurs who are the lifeblood of employment and sales tax dollars.

The current dining decks were assembled in under 2 weeks and work totally fine. The restaurant owners have taken a tasteful approach.

A decision to end the dining decks will reverberate far beyond just the small business restaurant owners. You will lower foot traffic to the non-food and beverage retail community.

No thoughtful analytics (additional sales tax revenues generated) appear to have gone into this decision. There is a remarkable lack of creativity from the City Council to addressing some of the easily addressed concerns. You can make the restaurant and small business community part of the solution.

Show leadership and revisit the ongoing opportunity presented by supporting your small business neighbors.

- >> I want to just clarify that the decision only applies to the dining in the parking spots. Outdoor dining on sidewalks, patios and other public right-of-ways is still permissible and widely available throughout MB.

- >> The decision was not an easy one. Broadly, our community does enjoy eating outdoors, as do I. And over the last almost two years we have learned a lot about the impacts the dining decks have had in numerous ways.

- >> Initially, when the city worked with the restaurants to create the temporary outdoor dining we couldn't foresee what we know now. Very importantly is the impact to the other non-restaurant businesses. We fully supported the decks, certainly when the other retail and personal services businesses also either benefited or were willing to sacrifice for the restaurants. - >> A second and very important area of concern is the maintenance and upkeep that has been put on hold because of the decks. Street repairs, storm drain upkeep, trash removal and street cleaning have been postponed but need to be reinstated. In addition, the temporary decks require inspection and repairs. The longer we postpone our maintenance, the greater the cost and disrepair we will withstand.

>> Also, many other impacts have not been addressed - congestion, parking, traffic, safety, sanitation, noise, ADA access - affecting both visitors, residents and the business community. >> >> Finally, as decision makers, we cannot ignore the costs to the city - the lost revenue, safety costs, costs to adapt for events, staff time, increased maintenance costs - which are being borne by the city rather than the restaurants. >> >> The reality is, outdoor dining is certainly a trend in dining that the restaurant sector will have to decide how they want to adapt in their business planning. As a city we will certainly support this as long as we can mitigate the negative effects. The use of our outdoor public right-of-way requires a much more comprehensive analysis which is why we directed staff to look at this as a long term consideration. When all the stakeholders can have input and we factor in the lessons we have learned over the past couple years, I'm confident we will make a more balanced decision about how to incorporate more outdoor dining in MB. I am a Manhattan Beach resident and I'm very concerned with the decision to stop the outdoor dining options in Manhattan Beach on Jan 3. While I understand that this was supposed to be a temporary situation, the fact remains that COVID and this pandemic are not over.

I work for Providence Health Services and we are beginning to see an uptick in COVID cases once again and while they are not like they were last year at this time, we obviously have concerns as to whether we will see it increase further as the Omicron variant continues to rapidly spread.

Additionally, what about young children? I have a 7 year old (recently vaccinated) and a 4 year old (not yet old enough to vaccinate). My husband and I have made a conscious choice to only eat outdoors with our children, and now in particular, my son given his inability to be vaccinated. Are your attitudes that since the 5+ category can be vaccinated now, people can just safely eat indoors again? What about the segment of families, like my own, who have children unable (not unwilling) to be vaccinated?

The State of California just enacted an indoor mask mandate yet again. While it is no change for those of us in Los Angeles County, it's clearly a sign that there is potentially increased risk for COVID transmission and it's safer to eat outdoors. Many restaurants are still just getting by with difficulty staffing and diners still reluctant to eat indoors. Why would we make this change now just as the state and health departments are raising a warning flag? The timing is simply awful from a risk level and optics.

I beg of you to please reconsider this date and delay the stoppage in ourdoor dining decks. Let's at least get through a potential winter surge before we make the change.

I have just learned that the city is requiring all restaurants who have outdoor dining in the public right of way to remove those structures and cease outdoor dining service as of Jan 3, 2022. It is also my understanding that the city will *now* start a *process* to consider making outdoor dining more permanent.

Outdoor dining **enhances our city's character and culture.** It allows restaurants to serve more people, hire more people and create a more welcoming community. Non restaurant businesses benefit by having more passersby and more activity in general.

Outdoor dining is **SAFER than indoor dining** in this day and age. Why force everyone inside, either at the restaurants (which will be more crowded now) or at homes where all viruses are more likely to spread.

And why is the city just *now starting a process* to consider making this permanent? We've had over 18months to look at this, overwhelmingly the city residents support it. Some of these restaurants have incurred great expenses to build and support these structures for the outdoor dining and now they will have to incur expenses to remove them only to be (hopefully!) given permission to spend more money and rebuild them sometime in the future. I have lived in Manhattan Beach since 1973. I remember Metlox when it sold plates and cups, when Vons was Safeway and us teenagers camped under the pier before the Manhattan Open. Closing these community areas will hurt the very community you are here to serve.

With over 120 negative comments on last night's CityMB instagram post, I'm guessing this is the beginning of a robust discussion about outdoor dining. Summing up the comments and my feelings...we are frustrated as business owners and residents that we are not being properly represented. And, that's not ok. To not have a proper plan for permanent decks before removing the temporary ones is poor planning and shortsighted.
