# **COVID-19 Situation Report**

**JANUARY 6, 2022** 

### **CURRENT INITIATIVES AND UPDATES**

- SURGE OF COVID-19 CASES IN L.A. COUNTY From December 15-28th, the rate ratio for ICU admission was 21.3, indicating the risk of ICU admission was 21.3 times higher among unvaccinated individuals than among fully vaccinated individuals. For the week of December 19-25th, the age-adjusted death rate in unvaccinated people was 4.5 per 100,000 and 0.02 per 100,000 in vaccinated individuals, yielding a rate ratio for deaths of 22.3 overall. Of note, the rate ratio for deaths has held steady over the course of the latest surge. While increases in deaths generally lag behind transmission surges, increasing the number of people who are vaccinated will help reduce the worst outcomes of COVID infections. - UPDATED LA COUNTY HEALTH ORDER In an effort to slow the spread of COVID-19 in Los Angeles County, beginning January 15, 2022, the threshold for Mega Events has been lowered from 10,000 to 5,000 attendees for Outdoor Mega Events and from 1,000 to 500 attendees for Indoor Mega Events. Attendees ages 5 and over at Outdoor Mega Events (5,000+) must show proof of full vaccination against COVID-19 or a negative viral test result prior to entry. Children under 5 are exempt. If providing a negative test result, it must be either: a PCR test taken within 2 days of the event; or an antigen test taken within 1 day of the event. Indoor Mega Event attendees are required to show proof of full vaccination against COVID-19 or a negative viral test result prior to entry. Children under age 2 are exempt. If providing a negative test result, it must be either: PCR test taken within 2 days of the event; or an antigen test taken within 1 day of the event. Additionally, as soon as possible, but no later than January 17, employers are required to provide their employees who work indoors in close contact with others with well-fitting medical grade masks, surgical masks, or higher-level respirators, such as N95 or KN95 masks.
- EMERGENCY ROOM FOR EMERENCIES ONLY Health is reminding residents to avoid visiting the emergency room unless they need emergency medical care. Residents should not be visiting the emergency department solely to get a COVID test or for minor complaints that could be resolved through their primary care physician. Emergency room visits should be reserved for those patients who are feeling severely ill for example, those who are short of breath or who have serious concerns about their health and who require immediate emergency care.
- TO KEEP WORKPLACES AND SCHOOLS OPEN Residents and workers are asked to:

- Adhere to masking requirements when indoors or at crowded outdoor spaces, regardless of vaccination status
- Stay home is you are sick and adhere to isolation and quarantine requirements if you are infected with COVID or a close contact of an infected person

Residents are legally required to be isolated if they have a positive COVID test result and that vaccinated close contacts with symptoms and unvaccinated close contacts need to quarantine.

- QUARANTINE/SILD-ISOLATION UPDATE In light of the drastic increases in cases and resultant
  hospitalizations, and to lessen the severity of the Omicron and Delta variant surge in Los Angeles
  County and protect against overwhelming the health care delivery system, the following
  changes are being made to this Order:
  - Regardless of vaccination status, previous infection, or lack of symptoms, if a person tests positive for COVID-19, they are required to self-isolate for at least 5 days, which may be longer if a fever is present.

You may exit self-isolation at Day 5 if:

- You are asymptomatic (remained symptom free) or symptoms have improved including no longer taking medication to control a fever, AND
- o Received a negative COVID viral test result collected on Day 5
- You must also wear a well-fitting mask around others, indoors and outdoors, for a total of 10 days.
  - Adults should wear a well-fitting medical grade mask (surgical or respirator).
  - Children should wear a well-fitting, non-cloth mask of multiple layers of nonwoven material with a nose wire.
- YOUTH SPORTS UPDATE <u>The Protocol for Organized Youth Sports has been updated</u>. Recent update changes are:
  - Updated to reflect a minimum 7-day suspension of all team activities for any youth sports team in which there has been an outbreak of four or more epidemiologically linked cases over a 14-day period.
  - Masking restrictions have been extended. In addition to masking required for all indoor sports when practicable, masking is now also required for moderate and high-risk outdoor sports where distancing is not possible, when practicable.
  - Recommendation and hyperlink added regarding new DPH guidance for improving ventilation in gymnasiums.
- MANHATTAN BEACH CITY HALL AND CITY FACILITIES CLOSED In response to the recent surge in COVID-19 cases, the City of Manhattan Beach City Hall and the Police and Fire Department lobby will be temporarily closed to visitors through January 15, 2022. At this time, City Hall will be closed to visitors for walk-in services. Significantly, public safety and public works services will not be adversely affected, and in-person recreation programs will continue until further notice. - WINTER HEALTH TIPS The CDC is working with the state and local public health officials to
  monitor the spread of the newest variant, Omicron, that is highly contagious. Although the exact
  impact is difficult to know, it is recommended by public health officials to continue to take these
  five steps to prevent the spread of COVID-19.
  - Get vaccinated, and get a booster if it has been 6+ months since you received the vaccine.
  - o Wear a face covering indoors.
  - o Get tested if you have any symptoms, regardless of your vaccination status.
  - o Keep your hands clean and wash them frequently.
  - o Stay home if you feel sick, have symptoms, and distance yourself from others.
- L.A. COUNTY DAILY BRIEFING STATISTICS ON COVID-19 Public Health confirmed 30 new deaths and 37,215 new cases of COVID-19. There are 2,661 people with COVID-19 currently hospitalized with 13% in the ICU. Testing results are available for nearly 10,015,640 individuals, with 21.9% of people testing positive.
