The meeting was called to order at 4:00 PM.

#### F. GENERAL BUSINESS

Discussion of 2022 Workplan Items: Workplan item summary sheet reviewed

El Porto Family Park (Greenberg, McCarthy, Turkmany) – Commissioner Greenberg reported that City Council directed staff to reach out to LA County regarding providing funding for any changes that are in the current development plan, but not to ask that the County pursue development of the Park. Before spending any more staff or commission time on design or public outreach, it needs to be determined if the new County Supervisor will fund the project. Director Leyman stated that he will reach out and next steps will be determined by the County response.

Nature Areas and Trails – (Greenberg, McCarthy, Turkmany) Commissioner Greenberg gave the following update: City Council would like to look at master planning Sand Dune Park and determine what the community would like this park to be. Whether it should be a nature conservancy to protect the bird habitat or a park for the enjoyment of humans, or a mix of the two, is to be studied along with the budget to bring the park up to standard, and maintain. Commissioner Greenberg emphasized that the City Council voiced a sense of urgency to establish and plan through communication with Public Works, the arborist, and community outreach. Commissioner Turkmany added that he is not clear whether the Sand Dune Building should be a separate project or lumped into the Master Plan project. Director Leyman relayed that the City Council has identified \$1,200,000 in ARPA funds for facilities,

and that in addition to the trails and building, programming will need to be considered. There is a small classroom space in the existing building. Whether or not to keep that or expand is a consideration. The estimates received to date are for modular, prefab buildings. Director Leyman reported that the department is putting together a list of everything that is needed in the parks and prioritize. He will prioritize all of the department projects and assign staff to work with the ad-hoc committee. He explained that the department is down four full-time employees, is in the middle of a reorg and is currently supporting 40 work plan items. He will be working with the City Manager to coordinate the City Council priorities with the department priorities.

Dog Runs/Parkettes – Commissioner Weiner summarized that there are not a lot of opportunities to expand in this category. The message that he got from the joint meeting. The City has three usable dog parks that are not in the greatest condition. The first goal is to address any safety concerns and potential upgrades with Public Works. Next step is to do walk throughs to confirm what needs to be put through to Public Works. The message received from City Council is that we have enough dog runs and parkettes but the Greenbelt and Marine Park were also mentioned as possible options. Commissioner Weiner reminded that commission that there is already a small, relatively unused, dog run at Marine Avenue park, and suggested that money necessary to develop a larger park at that location may be better used elsewhere. He would like to explore doubling the size of the Polliwog Park dog run. The Marine Avenue Park location may be reevaluated based on the outcome of the Pay N' Play situation.

Exploring Repurposing the Pay N Play Racquetball Courts – (Karger, Turkmany, Greenberg) Commissioner Karger reported next steps are to get accurate costs for remodeling vs. demolition. The lease and communication with the Lessee is in the hands of the City Attorney. Once staff is advised to move forward, community outreach will be essential to determine future use of the space. Preliminary research has been done for alternative uses but community input will be key. Commissioner McCarthy suggested that if the Pay N Pay building were removed, there could be a large area (including the basketball courts and community center) that could be reconfigured. Director Leyman stated that once staff received confirmation that we can take over operations of the building, program options and cost estimates may be prepared and presented to the Commission and City Council.

Exploring Acquisition of the Armory – This item will be removed from the Commission work plan and is now a staff item for annual follow up with state elected officials.

Exploring the feasibility of developing an aquatics center – (McCarthy, Weiner, Doran) Commissioner McCarthy gave the following report: The message she got from the joint meeting is that there seems to be a conflict between wanting to have facilities fixed and where to find the money to do so. She is concerned that the aquatics facility does not seem to be viewed in the same way as the other parks and does not agree with the opinion that this is a five to seven year minimum project. She stated that statistically valid polling needs to confirm what people are interested in doing with Begg Pool.

- 1. Fixing Begg Pool
- 2. Expanding Begg Pool
- 3. Building a new facility on the Begg Pool site
- 4. Improving Begg Pool and building an additional facility on a different site

In her opinion, the public should be asked if they would support a bond measure after a scope

is established. Commissioner Greenberg mentioned that what he heard in the joint meeting, is that residents should be polled for their appetite to support a bond measure first because most people would say yes to new aquatics facilities. Until you ask if people are willing to be taxed in order to pay for it, you don't know whether you have community support. Commissioner McCarthy added that there are people who are willing to financially support the project and there may be an opportunity to partner with a 501c3. She is concerned that Begg Pool will get to a point where it will need to shut down before any action is taken. Director Leyman reiterated that City Council wants a statistically valid survey. He would like to see where the community wide survey landed on the topic and then work with a company for more specific statistically valid survey. Commissioner McCarthy would like the survey to be presented in a way that educates the public the current facility is in need of significant repair and is at the end of its useful life. Commissioner Weiner does not think that residents should be asked if they want the City to repair and maintain an existing facility and that the survey should pertain to a new facility. He feels that the maintenance of Begg Pool and the concept of a new aquatics facility are separate items. Director Leyman will speak with the City Manager to determine next steps and what can be done before the survey. Commissioner Doran added that demand for water should also be considered and presented.

**Donation Policy and Programs** – (Turkmany, Karger, Weiner) Commissioner Turkmany reported that the amenity catalog is currently on hold. He would like to speak with the City Attorney about the legacy donation program. Commissioner Karger is working on drafting bylaws and a structure for what the donation process through a 501c3 would look like. Her goal is to present to City Council before her term ends in May. Commissioner Weiner recommended using a consultant who is an expert in the field to facilitate. Director Leyman commented that authorization for a consultant could be requested with a detailed justification presented to City Council.

Director Leyman stated that it would be good to bring this to City Council in May with the Military Wall.

Sand Dune Building Replacement – Commissioner Turkmany reported that there were estimates received for ADA improvements in the \$100,000-\$140,000 range, to the existing structure and also for a small reservation booth. Commissioner Weiner added that there were additional quotes received for a larger prefab building in the \$500,000 range. Director Leyman mentioned that an engineer should also look at any quotes to make sure they are realistic.

Options for Historical Red House – Director Leyman reported that commission involvement is dependent on the outcome of the approval of usage of Library Surplus Fund dollars. Possibilities for the facility include building an adjacent facility to aid in East Manhattan Beach library services. The facility may also include a museum space and study rooms for students. Parks and Recreation Commission involvement will be joint with the Library Commission and Cultural Arts Commission. The Library Commission has put together a survey to assess the need for library services on the east side.

#### G. STAFFITEMS

Director Leyman gave the following updates:

City Council tentatively approved the Leadership Manhattan Beach mural project for the Manhattan Beach Art Center (MBAC). The mural will be developed in a paint by number format and painted by members of the community.

The Charles Bragg Exhibition opening at MBAC will be held on February 4<sup>th</sup>.

The Polliwog Playground Project is now due to complete in August, 2022, due to shipping delays.

Sean Roberts has been promoted to Public Works Superintendent. Staff will be working with Sean on a whole laundry list of projects. Bobby Dobson will be in charge of parks and fields.

There are some excellent candidates for the Sr. Recreation Manager position. Updates to come.

#### H. COMMISSION ITEMS

Older Adult Program update – no update

<u>District update</u> – no up-date.

<u>Student update</u> – Commissioner Grampp reported that the first day of school was January 3<sup>rd</sup> and there have been many COVID related absences.

He added that due to the omicron variant, the Students to Seniors program he was organizing with Community Programs Manager, Jan Buike, will not be happening. He is looking for other ways to contribute to intergenerational causes.

DISCUSS AND MAKE RECOMMENDATION

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

Staff recommends that the Parks and Recreation Commission discuss and make a recommendation to City Council regarding updating the Special Events Policy, removing the exclusion of Bruce's Beach Park and 8<sup>th</sup> Street and Larsson Street Parkettes as possible locations.

#### FISCAL IMPLICATIONS:

There are no fiscal implications to the City with the Special Events Policy update.

Event operators will pay an application fee of \$1,417 for a new event and \$977 for a repeat event. In addition, City services will be billed to the event organizer at fully burdened rates. These fees are cost recovery for services rendered and do not represent any additional revenue stream for the City.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

The original Special Event Policy was approved by the City Council in 1989. The current revision of the Special Event Policy was approved by the City Council on July 17, 2018, establishing a tiered event classification review process. The purpose of the policy was to create guidelines and an approval process for review by staff, Parks and Recreation Commission and City Council. The policy includes three impact levels and a process for each. Impact considerations include: number of participants, season, amplified sound, street closures, location and staffing. The policy language excludes Bruce's Beach Park and the 8<sup>th</sup> Street and Larsson Street Parkettes as special event locations, due to the potential impact on residents adjacent to the park/parkettes. The historical significance of Bruce's Beach Park has brought added attention in recent

The historical significance of Bruce's Beach Park has brought added attention in recent years resulting in requests for special events.

#### **DISCUSSION:**

The current policy precludes Bruce's Beach Park and the 8th Street and Larsson Street

Parkettes as possible locations for special events due to the impact on the surrounding neighborhoods. Since the 2018 approval of the Special Event Policy, staff has received numerous inquiries to hold events at Bruce's Beach.

This update to the policy would allow special events to be considered at Bruce's Beach Park and the Parkettes, through the established special events review process or approval by City Council. These locations will continue to remain unreservable through the parks and facilities reservation system.

#### **Parkettes**

8<sup>th</sup> Street Parkette is located on the 1700 block of 8<sup>th</sup> Street. Reservations are not accepted for at this park. The park occupies four-tenths of an acre and has two picnic tables. There is also a wide open space, shaded area and play equipment for small children. The primary use of this park is for neighborhood families to play and gather. There is limited parking and no restrooms at the park.

Larsson Street Parkette is located on the 200 block of Larsson Street. Reservations are not accepted for this park. It is the only park space west of Sepulveda and south of Manhattan Beach Boulevard which occupies one city lot or two-tenths of an acre. This site includes play equipment for small children, one picnic table, a basketball backboard and rim. The primary use of this park is for neighborhood families to play and gather. There is limited parking and no restrooms at the park.

Residents responding regarding the neighborhood parkettes expressed concern for crowding in the parks, as well as parking issues, traffic and lack of restroom facilities.

#### Bruce's Beach Park

Bruce's Beach Park is located at Highland and 27<sup>th</sup> Street. Reservations are not accepted for this park. It is the oldest park site in Manhattan Beach and occupies approximately three acres, with a small basketball half court and numerous shade trees and benches. There is limited parking and no restrooms at the park.

Feedback received showed a high concern for traffic, noise, parking issues, increased trash, alcohol consumption and criminal activity surrounding the park if special events are allowed.

On June 19, 2021, a Juneteenth event was held at Bruce's Beach Park that was unable to be run through the special event process. In an effort to properly plan for future events, staff is bringing this item to the Commission and City Council for guidance and direction.

#### Option 1 – Maintain Special Event Policy language

Maintain the current language in the Special Events policy, which prohibits special events at Bruce's Beach, 8<sup>th</sup> Street and Larsson Street Parkettes.

Option 2 – Update Special Event Policy to allow applications to be considered Allow applications for events at Bruce's Beach, 8<sup>th</sup> Street and Larsson Street Parkettes to be submitted and run through the special event review process. This would allow for review of proposed events, providing time to consider impacts, required City staffing and necessary City services. All events, regardless of size, would require City Council approval. Additional conditions could be set forth including, limitations on number of events, event size, amplified sound, alcohol and other event details. Application does not guarantee approval.

#### **PUBLIC OUTREACH:**

Notices were sent to residents within 1000 feet of Bruce's Beach Park and the Larsson and 8<sup>th</sup> St. Parkettes. As of February 24, 2022, 50 emails were received, 41 opposed to allowing special events, 9 in favor. This item appeared on the February 1, 2022 City Council agenda, however, was referred to the Parks and Recreation Commission for further discussion. 26 eComments were received at that time, 21 opposed to allowing special events and 5 in favor.

Application, application fee and all required documents <u>must</u> be submitted to the Parks and Recreation Department at least 90 days prior to the event. *Please make sure all sections of the application are completed and legible for review*. You will be notified by City staff if your application was <u>not</u> accepted for review.

Applications may require review by the Parks and Recreation Commission and approval by the City Council. You, or your representative, may be required to attend the meeting at which your event will be considered. If the Commission recommends your event for approval, you or your representative may be required to additionally attend a City Council meeting.

Please be aware of the following policies and procedures. You will be required to abide by the following, but not limited to, rules and regulations throughout the event approval process:

#### 1. Application Review

- Special event plans may require review by each City Department, the Parks and Recreation Commission and/or City Council. Need for review is based on size, scope and impact of event.
- Separate permits and fees may be required from Building and Safety, including but not limited to building, electrical, plumbing, mechanical and right-of-way permits.
- Separate approvals, permits and fees may be required from the State ABC and County Health Departments, LA County Beaches and Harbors and the Coastal Commission.

#### 2. Certificate of Insurance

The City requires General Liability insurance in the amount of \$1 million per occurrence/\$2 million aggregate. The insurance should be primary and non-contributory and contain a waiver of subrogation. The insurance certificate and applicable endorsements should be submitted to the City a minimum of **30 days prior** to your event date.

#### 3. Fees

The application fee is non-refundable and is to be submitted with the application. An estimate of event related fees will be provided to you upon approval. Any event changes requested after approval may require additional review by City staff and may result in additional fees. Actual fees will be invoiced within 30 days of your event.

#### 4. Portable Restrooms

Depending upon the duration or size of your event and the availability of public restrooms, you may be required to rent portable chemical toilets to accommodate participants and spectators. The City recommends availability of seven toilets for every 500 people, or portion thereof. The figure is based on the maximum number at your peak event time. The total number of toilets you need to provide will be determined on a case-by-case basis. All portable restrooms must meet State codes and City standards and are subject to Building Division approval.

#### 5. Marketing of Event

You must receive approval for your event prior to promoting or marketing your event. Submission of your application does not automatically constitute a guarantee of the date, location or automatic approval of your event. Copies of marketing material for the event must be submitted to the Parks and Recreation Department for approval 30 days prior to distribution.

#### 6. Clean Up

All debris and trash must be removed from your event site immediately after the event. Failure to do so will require the City to call upon the Public Works Department to complete the clean up and additional fees will be assessed. All expenses will be the responsibility of the event applicant. The applicant is required to arrange for recyclable receptacles at the event.

#### 7. Damage Deposit

The City may require a damage deposit depending upon the size and scope of the event.

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#### CITY OF MANHATTAN BEACH SPECIAL EVENTS POLICY

Upon the recommendation of the Manhattan Beach Parks and Recreation Commission and approval of the City Council, the provisions, procedures and regulations stated hereafter shall constitute the Special Events Policy of the City.

#### **General Provisions**

#### 1. Definitions

- A. **Special Event** any activity that requires more than the normal amount of City Services or Resources for a successful completion and/or includes any of the following:
  - i. City streets or public rights-of-way more than one block long
  - ii. Utilizes public area or facility
  - iii. Requires reserved parking in or on a City parking lot, structure or street
  - iv. A likelihood to cause traffic delays, changes to the normal flow of traffic, or reduction in public parking
  - v. Attracts a substantial number of people
  - vi. Potential City exposure to liability
  - vii. Amplified sound or performances
  - viii. Gathering of over 50 people in a public space not reservable through Parks and Recreation
- B. **Pass-through Event** event participants pass through the City of Manhattan Beach and the event does not begin or end in Manhattan Beach.
- C. **Legacy Event** longstanding annual community special events that occurred in fiscal year 1987/1988 and continue to the present.
- D. **Annual Event** event that occurs around the same time every year
- E. **Peak Season** May 15 September 15
- F. **Commercial Activation** an event with the purpose of promoting a commercial interest, including but not limited to, product launches and promotions, movie premier campaigns and book launches. Commercial activations and events are not permitted.
- G. **County-Permitted Event** event takes place completely on the beach requiring a permit from Los Angeles County department of Beaches and Harbors
- H. City Services services provided by City staff
- I. City Resources City-owned, operated or leased equipment and/or supplies
- J. Fee Waiver Organizations may request from City Council, a waiver of costs for City Services and City Resources and/or fees for City Permits or Special Event Application. Fee waivers may only be granted by the City Council. Fee waivers to not apply to any third party costs incurred to support the event
- K. **Special Events Committee** a committee of representatives from each City department meeting monthly to discuss staffing needs, departmental concerns and logistics for new and upcoming special events.
- L. The following locations are not eligible for Special Event permits: Bruce's Beach, Larsson Street Parkette, 8<sup>th</sup> Street Parkette
- 2. Use Classifications and Impact Characteristics
  Special events will be categorized as a Level I, II, or III event based on information provided in the special event application, Impact Characteristics Worksheet. Events requesting service or

consumption of alcohol on public property, a multi-year contract, and/or expected attendance of over 1,000 are automatically classified as Level III and are subject to approval by the City Council.

- A. Impact Level I events are low impact events requiring little to no City Resources.
  - Impact Level I characteristics may include but are not limited to:
  - i. 300 or fewer expected participants
  - ii. Event date is not in the peak season
  - iii. Event does not have amplified sound
  - iv. Event does not begin or end in Manhattan Beach (pass-through)
- B. Impact Level II events are medium impact events.

Impact Level II characteristics may include but are not limited to:

- i. 300-1000 expected participants/attendees
- ii. Event occurs on the weekend
- iii. Event occurs in a park or facility
- iv. Reserved parking may be requested
- v. Street closures may be requested
- vi. Event requires amplified sound
- C. Impact Level III events are high impact events

Impact Level III characteristics may include but are not limited to:

- i. Over 1000 expected participants/attendees
- ii. Involves alcohol on public property
- iii. Event occurs on a Holiday
- iv. Event occurs on the Strand or Pier area
- v. Street closures are required
- vi. Event occurs in Peak Season
- D. Special events occurring entirely on private property, which do not require City services, may require a Temporary Use Permit or Group Entertainment Permit, issued by the Community Development Department.
- 3. Special Events Approval Guidelines and Process
  - A. Event limits the number of approved events shall be governed by available resources and is at the discretion of the City Council.
  - B. Application submittal deadlines Special Events applications must be submitted as follows:
    - i. Level III events: must be submitted at least 180 days prior to the desired event date. Upon approval by the Parks and Recreation Commission and City Council, permit will be processed and issued by the Parks and Recreation Director. Legacy events may be approved by the Special Events Commission as long as there are no significant changes to the event.
    - ii. Level II events: must be submitted at least 90 days prior to desired event date and will be reviewed by the Special Events Committee and Parks and Recreation Commission. The Upon Parks and Recreation Commission recommendation, the Parks and Recreation Director may process and issue permits. Should the Parks and Recreation Commission recommend denial of a Special Event, that decision may be appealed by the applicant, to the City Council.

- iii. Level I events: must be submitted at least 90 days prior to the desired event date. Level I events will be reviewed and permits will be issued by the Director of Parks and Recreation on the recommendation of the Special Events Committee. Should the Special Events Committee recommend denial of a Special Event, that decision may be appealed to the Parks and Recreation Commission.
- iv. Pass-through Events: must be submitted at least 90 days prior to the desired event date.
- v. Priority will be given to Manhattan Beach resident organizations and businesses (a resident organization is one composed of at least 60% Manhattan Beach residents).
- vi. Established events shall have priority over first-time events.
- vii. Events submitted earliest will be given priority for their preferred dates.
- C. At the discretion of the Director of Parks and Recreation, applications may be submitted and approved after the application submittal deadline has passed, provided:
  - i. There are unforeseeable circumstances (memorial service, team victory celebration, etc.) or,
  - ii. The event is one that requires minimal City staff support and is not deemed to negatively impact City businesses or residents.
- D. Spontaneous events which are occasioned by news or affairs coming into public knowledge less than forty-eight hours prior to such event may be conducted on the Civic Plaza located between City Hall and the Police/Fire Facility without organizers first having to obtain an event permit. If practicable, the organizers should give notice to the Police Department at least four hours prior to the event, informing the City of the date and time of the event and providing an estimate of the approximate number of persons who will be participating.

#### E. Annual Events

- i. Applications for Legacy Events will be requested at the beginning of the calendar year and will be reviewed by the Special Events committee for approval.
- ii. Annual Events will be required to apply for their continuing special events on an annual basis. Applications for the following year shall be submitted within 90 days of the event.
- iii. Legacy Events and established Annual Events shall have first right of refusal in the event of a date conflict with a newer event.
- iv. If any significant changes are requested for Annual and Legacy Events, City Council or Parks and Recreation Commission approval may be required.
- v. Legacy Event status may be requested by event organizers after 10 consecutive years of successful event execution. Legacy status may only be granted by the City Council.

#### 4. Parking and Transportation

- A. A parking plan is required for Level II and Level III events, to show that adequate provision has been made for satellite parking, shuttle transportation and traffic control.
- B. Level II and Level III events must offer Rideshare codes to their patrons and actively promote rideshare options.
- C. Reserved parking for special events may be requested through the special event process but is not guaranteed.
- D. County Permitted Events: Special Event Parking permits may be requested with a Special Event application for events taking place on the beach under the jurisdiction of Los Angeles County Beaches and Harbors. A copy of the County issued permit will be required before parking permits are issued.

#### 5. Fees and Charges

- A. An application fee will apply. Current fees are available on the City website <a href="www.citymb.info">www.citymb.info</a> or by phone.
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- C. If an event is cancelled, fees may be charged for costs incurred by the City for personnel, materials and services.
- D. All third party costs incurred by the City to support the event will be billed to the event organizer. If third party services are deemed necessary, an estimate of costs will be provided prior to the event.
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A. The City may require insurance and/or indemnification as protection from liability in amounts commensurate with the risks involved in the event. Applicants must provide adequate certificate of insurance and an executed endorsement form in compliance with City insurance requirements.

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- J. **Fee Waiver** Organizations may request from City Council, a waiver of costs for City Services and City Resources and/or fees for City Permits or Special Event Application. Fee waivers may only be granted by the City Council. Fee waivers to not apply to any third party costs incurred to support the event

I understand that the Parks and Recreation Commission will review the City's special event permit application process at its meeting on Monday, February 28. I am a longtime City resident and would ask that my comments below be provided to the members of the Commission prior to the meeting.

The City's parks are a valuable asset to the community. They are used daily by many for recreational purposes and all but three are available for events through a reservation system. As I see it, residents should have the opportunity to reserve *all* parks for appropriate events, such as birthday parties, neighborhood gatherings, family reunions and cultural celebrations. There is no reason why Bruce's Beach, and the 8th Street and Larson Street parkettes should be excluded from the existing process by which the City can review and approve or deny permits for special events. The process itself assures that the proposed use will be of an appropriate size and scope for the requested park space and will be subjected to conditions to minimize neighborhood impacts.

When this item appeared on the Council agenda earlier this month, numerous neighbors of Bruce's Beach raised objections based on anticipated impacts. Anyone living adjacent to a park must expect some impacts associated with park use, whether by permit or otherwise. Bruce's Beach was acquired ostensibly for park purposes in 1924 and has existed as a passive park since the 1950s; any person who owns or rents property in the vicinity certainly knew it was a park when they arrived here, and must reasonably expect that the use of the park will occasionally cause impacts. That is a normal consequence of choosing to live near a park, and is balanced out by the advantages and enjoyment of open space and unobstructed ocean views. Those who reside near Pollywog Park and Live Oak Park put up with traffic, parking and noise impacts from summer concerts, the Hometown Fair, sporting activities and other events, some of which are very impactful. The Bruce's Beach neighbors are not entitled to a ban on use of that park any more so than neighbors of the other parks in town.

Bruce's Beach, of course, has special significance insofar as it was acquired by the City for purpose of racial exclusion as documented in the City's official history of the site. It is appropriately the site for events that celebrate inclusion and diversity or seek

a remembrance of troubling parts of our American and City past. I attended the Juneteenth event in 2021 at Bruce's Beach — which could not receive a permit under the current policy — and observed that the park was an ideal setting for the event. The site amply accommodated the crowd in attendance, the event lasted only a few hours during the midday, traffic on Highland flowed unimpeded and there were no visible significant off-site impacts. The symbolic import of having the event at Bruce's Beach cannot be overstated. The park is well suited for this type of event, as well as birthday parties, family reunions and the like.

I strongly encourage the Commission to recommend to the Council that Bruce's Beach and the two parkettes be included in the existing special events policy so that they may on occasion be reserved in part or in whole for events. All parks in the City should be treated equally. The existing permitting process assures that the City will be able to apply conditions to assure that the type of event, the number of participants, the hours and whether amplified sound is allowed are all appropriate for the park in question.

- 1. Please allow all City parks to be places where families and the community can celebrate special events.
- 2. Without a permitting process, parks can be the site of unauthorized gatherings where city rules are harder to enforce.
- 3. A permitting process allows City departments to make the necessary preparations and safety assessments to support the event and mitigate neighborhood impact. This includes staffing, street closures, trash collection and public notice of events.

Dear Park and Rec Commissioners and Liaisons,

Bruce's Beach and our town's parkettes are already difficult to use and enjoy. Bruce's Beach is crowded on weekends, the basketball hoop is in high demand and parking is impossible. Still, we enjoy the park and walk through it regularly as it is precious open space for sunshine and solitude. We pay property taxes to enjoy that open space and we purchased a home with no backyard very much planning to use Bruce's Beach at our leisure.

I am very glad to share all of these spaces with tourists, visitors from other towns and my neighbors, but I see no reason to make these spaces available to special events, large gatherings, concert promoters, reservation systems and the like.

These spaces are very much open to and enjoyed by the public. Persons are free to visit and enjoy the park. There is no basis to expand the public's access to allow special gatherings. There are plenty of public spaces in our town available by reservation for special events. Each of those locations has ample parking and dedicated restrooms. Bruce's Beach and the parkettes have neither. These locations disrupt residential parking already. To expand the use and modify the policy in place will be to voluntarily wade into the mess that followed when physical fitness trainers began using Sand Dune Park for classes. That use was considerably smaller in scope that what a special event modification would permit, but the neighborhoods were overrun with parking problems, trash and early morning/late evening noise and loitering. Note: Sand dune park has restrooms. There is a reason these spaces have the deisgnation they carry and were located in pockets of residential areas. Those designations had strong bases in logic for limiting special events. It makes no sense to open these areas up to large gatherings; the uses are already loud and crowded. Amplified sound would be untenable.

I see no reason to modify the policy.

This email regards the Commission's February 28 agenda item reviewing a policy change to allow special events requests at the 8th Street Parkette.

My family has lived at 1731 8th Street for 33 years. We enjoy having the tiny neighborhood 8th Street Parkette across the street from our house. But we are very opposed to opening up the park for reserved special events. I have spoken with several neighbors and all also oppose this.

As explained to me by the City, "special events" requests are made for larger reserved events that require things such as reserved parking and amplified sound.

This park was never designed for or intended to be used for formal, scheduled events of large groups. This tiny park cannot accommodate such special events. Nor should the neighbors be burdened with the noise, traffic, parking, sanitation and security problems such events generate.

For those who are not familiar with the park--and many in Manhattan Beach are not--it is the size of two residential lots located in the middle of a typical east Manhattan Beach residential street of 50' x150' lots. It is bordered on all sides by houses. Directly to the park's east and west, houses share a chain-link fenced border with the park. At the park's rear, two houses on 6th Street share a chain-link fenced border with the park.

It should be noted that directly across the street from the park are two houses at 1741 and 1747 8th Street. Those properties are owned by longtime resident John Gardner whose deceased father once owned the 8th Street Park property. His father is responsible for this property becoming a public park in the 1960's. Mr. Gardner also strongly opposes this "special events" proposal.

The park should stay as it is—a place for small neighborhood gatherings. There are no bathroom facilities. There is no electricity available. There are no barbecue facilities. There is no parking other than street parking which is frequently occupied by residents. The 1700 block of 8th is regulated by street sweeping signs making parking particularly challenging on Monday and Tuesday. Allowing reserved parking for special events would displace many residents who regularly use street parking. Given the park's location literally in the middle of a residential neighborhood and sharing borders with single family residences, there are no circumstances where amplified sound would be appropriate.

Finally, our lovely little neighborhood park should remain an always-accessible place

for neighborhood gatherings. Access should not be restricted by reserved special events. The park is constantly used by small groups of adults and children for impromptu, informal gatherings. School kids gather after school, mothers and small children meet for play dates, and there are occasional picnics and small birthday parties. This is exactly what the park was designed to be used for.

This is how the official Manhattan Beach website describes the park:

"This lovely **parquette** is quietly situated between homes in the area and occupies four-tenths of an acre. It has picnic facilities for about 16 people, two picnic tables and two barbecues [no longer true]. There is a wide open space and shaded area for rest and relaxation. It also includes play equipment for small children.

Parquettes are ideal for family picnics and social get togethers; however, no restroom facilities are available. Curbside parking is usually available."

Please allow this unique little gem of a neighborhood park to remain a place that fits the City's description of it. Reject special events requests at the 8th Street Parkette.

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

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

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the policy regarding special events at Bruce's Beach. I own a home at 205 27<sup>th</sup> Street, which abuts the park. It's a beautiful spot to live, but my small yard is often treated as an extension of the park. Visitors sit in my entry to chat or picnic, and many leave their trash behind. Occasionally a package disappears, and once we caught someone urinating on the house, but it's mostly a steady trickle of small intrusions that peaks on the weekends.

I've struggled to find a policy for dealing with park visitors who take up in my yard. It's a bold subset of people, and I worry about upsetting someone if I make them feel unwelcome. It would be very easy for them to create lasting damage, then or later. As such, I offer a friendly greeting and hope there isn't too much to clean up at the end of the day.

As you might expect, I'm strongly against any change that brings large crowds to Bruce's Beach. I acknowledge that most visitors contain their recreation to the park, place their trash in receptacles, and abide by noise ordinances and other policies. But several days a week, and virtually every day of the summer, a small number of people do not. Given the way the park opens up to surrounding homes, Bruce's Beach is not a good location for special events. The greater the number of visitors at any one time, the more I can expect trash, trespassing, or worse.

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



In general I welcome the public use of Bruce's beach. It is a beautiful location, brings citizens from all walks of life together and has provided a charming locations for private events with family and friends.

I have been living in the area for over 20 years and have to say that unfortunately the last 2 years with "special event" use of the park have transformed the park to one of the dirtiest in the Southbay at times. The park cleaning crew does their very best to keep up with the littering but it is a constant problem that many visitors of bigger events simply drop their trash wherever they sit or stand. I would encourage you to ask the cleaning crew members to this regard.

Another problem I see is the parking situation. Parking is already a problem and during some of the special events over the last 2 years there was unlawful parking all around the park. On at least 2 occasions I witnessed conflicts between residents and rather aggressive event visitors due to unlawful parked cars blocking driveways and speeding in low speed zones.

I do wonder how the noise and traffic these events would create would impact the neighborhood given the fact of how small the park is and how close hundreds of private homes are. Again, in the past 2 years "cruising cars" during special events have been a noise and safety issue. Speeding, running stop lights and revving engines unfortunately were all too common.

This is a very small park, with very limited parking and small access roads - I just don't see how special events can be safely organized without major involvement of law enforcement. Maybe valet off site parking and event size limits could solve some problems but I wonder how these would be enforced.

To Whom It May Concern:

This email is in response to the invitation for comment on the review of special events at Bruce's Beach. I offer no opinion on the review of 8th Street or Larsson Street parkettes.

I have serious concerns permitting special events at Bruce's Beach for a number of reasons. First, the parking in the area is inadequate to support any special events. It can barely handle the weekend beach traffic in Winter! For example, when the blue wave phenomena occurred in Spring 2020, the area was overflowing with cars and general disruptions due to the increased traffic. Permitting special events would have a very similar effect, and greatly impair the quiet enjoyment of the surrounding blocks.

Second, considering the public profile of this park in particular, any additional attention is not a wise decision in my opinion. The recent moves have been extremely controversial and permitting special events will likely cause the City to make potentially politically charged decisions on who can/cannot plan special events. Again, this may cause unwarranted additional attention to the area, which has already caused a negative impact on the value of properties in the adjacent area (I spoke with Stran Hill Properties about this factor).

For these reasons in particular, I strongly voice my objections to permiting any special events.

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
