#### **Dear Councilmembers**

Regarding the proposal to place a marker plaque on the sidewalk at the site of the Dale Velzy's surf shop: I urge you, for the sake of historical accuracy, to choose the last option listed -

Iconic Velzy surfboard created by Dale "Hawk" Velzy,

#### first developed and sold at this location in 1950.

The City has had its problems with historical markers, as you are aware. Unfortunately, legend often works its way into the town's history, and once published, or cast in bronze, it is difficult to undo when errors are eventually discovered. The proponents of this plaque have not produced or published convincing evidence to substantiate any of the first three proposed plaque inscriptions, at either the November 21, 2022 Cultural Arts Commission meeting, or in the staff report #23-0104 for March 7, 2023.

At this location in 1950, Dale "Hawk" Velzy opened the world's first surf shop and was granted a California sales tax number for the new product category: "surfboards"

It is immensely difficult to prove most reputed historic "firsts," especially "the world's first." There is no world registry for events. Documentation in decades past was often thin. A California sales tax number does not establish world primacy. Additionally, surf boards were being commercially produced for many years before Velzy opened his shop. For example, Pacific System Homes manufactured boards for the Swastika Surf Board Company, since the early 1930s. The Swastika Surf Board Company was at 5800 Boyle Avenue in Los Angeles (and changed their name in the late 30's). Surf boards, in 1950, were hardly a new product.

#### Dale "Hawk" Velzy opened the first surfboard retail shop on this site in 1950

See above. There were several commercial surfboard manufacturers, some beginning as far back as the early 1930s. Tom Blake, another surfing legend, offered several models of boards under his name in the 30's. And exactly how is "surfboard retail shop" being defined? By getting a retail sales tax number? Like so many "firsts," there is quibbling over details and specific definitions. "Surf shop"? "Surfboard retail shop"? "Commercial custom-built surfboard shop"?

Dale "Hawk" Velzy opened his first Surf Shop in 1950 at this location creating a new sales tax category: "Surfboards"

Velzy may have opened *his* first surf shop (lower case, btw) in 1950 at the location, but again: "a new sales tax category"? Surf boards were already being mass produced by at least three companies in California alone. They were obviously being sold somewhere. Is the plaque intended to celebrate a "new sales tax category"? Even if it were so, that's hardly plaque-worthy.

Dale Velzy is a surf legend, and he was an innovative and influential board shaper. However, claims to have opened the "World's first" surf shop are gilding the lily. To make any such claim requires something beyond the legends and stories. It requires more than has been provided, so far, as basis for this project.

As I stated above, the last option offered suitably celebrates Velzy's place in Manhattan Beach history.

Dear Council, Chief Johnson and City Manager Moe:

I just received the latest Neighborhood Watch Crime Report and am extremely disappointed that someone has made the decision, in the midst of a rising crime wave and community-wide concerns for public safety (as evidenced by last Wednesday's turnout at the Joslyn Center), to modify the report to make it virtually useless, in terms of informing the public about recent crimes, and to eliminate the very valuable CompStat Dashboard, thereby providing as little timely information to the public as possible about criminal activity and crime trends in the community and essentially leaving the residents in the dark.

I strongly urge MBPD to reconsider this decision as this new report does not come close to meeting the community's need for transparency and timely information concerning criminal activity in our city and is contrary to the historical cooperation that MBPD has provided Neighborhood Watch.

Several points:

• The residents want to know what crimes are being committed in the immediate vicinity of their homes. Old Report: Divided up the city into a manageable 11 districts and assigned reported crimes to those districts and also the specific block numbers for the crimes in question.

**New Report**: Eliminates the districting system that we've used for decades in favor of a much less helpful system that divides the city up into four large quadrants. Now, for example, a crime that occurs in the southwest corner of the Hill section will be lumped into my district, even though I live a good mile away in the Tree section close to the greenbelt. And, under the new reporting system, I won't have any idea where this crime occurred because the block numbers have been entirely eliminated.

• The residents want to know what types of crimes are occurring and whether they were preventable and PD should want to hi-lite the latter, in particular, as part of their public service reminder to harden the target. Old Report: Provided not just the general crime category (Theft, Burglary, Auto Theft, Vehicle Burglary, etc) but also some basic details regarding each crime and hi-lited crimes in red if they were crimes of opportunity (unlocked car or open garage door, for two examples). The residents also want timely information about serious crimes like armed robberies so we don't end up having to rely on notoriously unreliable sources of information like the neighborhood rumor mill or social media. The old report provided some detail on that as well (although more detail would have been helpful).

**New Report**: Only reports the general crime categories and eliminates all the crime detail, which not only deprives residents of valuable and timely information on crimes in their immediate neighborhood, it also runs counter to the public policy narrative of reminding residents to "harden the target" (since those reading the report would have no idea if the crimes committed were preventable or not). And, with all of the details of the crimes in question now expunged, the new report will only serve to increase residents' reliance on poor sources of information like rumor and social media whenever there is a serious crime of community-wide interest like an armed robbery or a smash & grab.

Of particular concern are forced entry home burglaries, which are a quantum leap's difference from an e-bike stolen out of an open garage. This new report does not distinguish the two, it merely says there were three residential burglaries over the past week, thereby creating additional and needless speculation and consternation within the community.

The same need for greater detail is also true of vehicle burglaries (no indication whether any of the 5 vehicle burglaries reported last week were unlocked vehicles or forced entry or catalytic converter thefts) and robberies (armed or not, new report doesn't say).

# • The CompStat Dashboard can certainly be improved but it is still an invaluable source of real time statistical information and year-over-year comparisons of crime data.

**Old Report**: Included Compstat Dashboard in which crime data was broken down into general categories and analyzed in terms of short-term trends as well as on a year-to-date and year-over-year basis. Also included a 5-day crime map.

**New Report**: Eliminates all of this useful weekly Dashboard information. There is some indication of a possible Monthly Crime Report but that would not be nearly as timely as the Dashboard's weekly data. Other than that, I can't say how helpful the proposed Monthly Crime Report will be as I have not seen it (apparently still in development).

I would strongly urge that we work with the existing (old) report's framework to improve the <u>weekly</u> crime update information (the new report's description of Notable and Upcoming Events is a useful addition). The public wants and needs more information, not less.

I would also urge more regular real-time posting by MBPD on social media whenever there are big events occurring like a stolen vehicle chase & arrest or an armed robbery (Beverly Hills does this - see attached - and it takes two minutes to post on Twitter).

Although surfing originated in ancient Hawaii, it was in California that surfing developed into the sport, lifestyle, and industry we recognize today. The Los Angeles South Bay — Manhattan Beach, Hermosa Beach and Redondo Beach — was the historic crucible of that development, and local surfer and craftsman Dale Velzy played a hugely influential role there.

Surfing was introduced to Southern California in the early 1900s. Prior to World War II, however, there were few surfers. Surfboards were big and heavy, hewn from solid redwood, and hard to find. Most were self-made by necessity, in garages or backyards. There were no professional manufacturers, although there were surfboards made in Los Angeles during the 1930s by the woodworking company Pacific System Ready Kit Homes. Hollow boards, made of plywood screwed onto a wooden frame, were similarly manufactured by The Los Angeles Ladder Company.

But in both cases surfboards were strictly a sideline to their main business.

After WWII, lighter surfboards were made of balsa wood and a newfangled material called fiberglass. A young Dale Velzy started making such boards, first in his mother's garage, then literally on the beach at Hermosa, where he grew up, and later at Manhattan after the formation of the local surfing club at the pier in the late 1940s. City officials, however, were not impressed with Velzy's balsa wood shavings blowing all over the beach and told him he'd have to stop. Thus, in late 1949 or early 1950, Velzy rented a small shop just up the road.

As Velzy told me in an interview for his biography: "One day, just after I opened, a guy in a suit and tie walks in and tells me he's with the City and that if I am making surfboards for sale I need a business license and a state resale number. So I did ... and that's how I got the first state resale number for making surfboards."

The term "surf shop" didn't exist at the time. In fact, it was not coined until the late 1950s when Jack O'Neill, an early maker of wetsuits, opened a shop by that name in Santa Cruz. Still, Dale Velzy's Manhattan Beach workshop can be legitimately recognized as the world's first stand- alone facility that was exclusively devoted to surfboard manufacturing and retailing. It paved the way for many more South Bay surfboard makers — several, like Bing Copeland and Greg Noll, mentored in the trade by Velzy — that opened up to meet the huge surge in demand following the 1959 release of the Hollywood movie "Gidget" that made surfing a youth culture phenomenon.

Biographer of Dale Velzy, Bing Copeland and Hobie Alter, Paul Holmes is a former Editor of Surfer Magazine (1981 - 1990) and Contributing Editor for Longboard Magazine (1995 - 2010). He wholeheartedly supports the proposed Velzy shop commemorative plaque.

Hello, Manhattan Beach City Council

I'm Chip Post writing to encourage the installation of a plaque commemorating the establishment of the world's first surf shop by Dale Velzy at 117 Manhattan Beach Boulevard in 1950, also the year I started surfing at age twelve.

Here's some reasons why I think his was the first commercial shop.

In 1950 surfing was the domain of a small group of counter-culture individualists. Everyone knew everyone else and it would have been known had there been a commercial surf shop in existence. People made their own boards and a few made them for their friends, but not commercially. Surfboards were redwood, balsa/redwood, or plywood "kook boxes," too heavy at eighty to one hundred pounds for anyone not fully grown. The market was on the cusp of exploding with the development of light weight balsa and fiberglass boards which could be handled by twelve-year-old's like me. I think Dale was the kind of person who would have seen the commercial potential of surfing, but even he felt he needed to survey the stretch from El Porto to Rat Beach for several months to determine if there were enough surfers to support a surfboard business. He also saw the potential for surfing to become a pop culture phenomenon when he expanded into surf movies and popular music.

Dale Velzy was exactly the kind of guy who would have taken the chance to start the world's first surf shop.

PS I grew up in Hermosa and first knew Velzy when he was making a few boards from his mother's garage on Loma Drive. I used to sit with friends on the floor of his shop on MB Blvd. suffering the din of his planer and the dust of its shavings. We'd annoy him by picking the centers out of his balsa wood lumber. He had his rough edges but was kind to us kids, telling us we were "lookin' really good in the water." And subtly encouraging us to get his latest model. I went on to become a lawyer and worked mainly in state and local government law. (I think the evidence supports the proposition that his was the first shop. An objector would need to prove it was not, as I see it.)

A plaque will be a good place to go to remember Dale.

On behalf of the Los Angeles County Lifeguard Association Trust Fund, I would like to go on record in support of the proposed Velzy "surf shop" commemorative plaque at 117 Manhattan Beach Blvd. Dale Velzy opened up the world's first "surf shop" at this location in 1950. Dale Velzy was a true pioneer in the surfboard building business and his innovations changed surf culture forever. The following excerpt from "Surfer Magazine" outlines some of Velzy's roll in the surf culture:

"There would be no surf business without Dale Velzy, and hence no surf life as we know it. He was the first to put a name on a surfboard, the first to sponsor a surfer, the first to open a surf shop and the first to print a surf company t-shirt. Velzy bankrolled one of the most impressive surf teams in history, with <u>Miki</u> Dora, Mickey Munoz, Dewey Weber, Mike Doyle and Donald <u>Tabayama</u> all riding for him. He bought Bruce Brown (The Endless Summer) his first camera and paid his living and travel expenses for a year."

The Daily Breeze described the Velzy "surf shop" as follows:

"Velzy Surfboards wasn't fancy by any means, but it was the first retail surf shop in the world when it opened in 1950." Velzy's balsa wood boards were becoming increasingly popular among surfers, and he worked constantly to keep up with demand. Though surfing's breakthrough to the mass media was still a decade off, the early 1950s were a boom time for the sport along the Southern California coast.

In addition to Dale Velzy's career as a surfboard builder, he also served several years as a Los Angeles County Lifeguard, primarily working at the Manhattan Beach Pier. Velzy was one of the top board paddler's on the coast. The International Surf Festivals Pier to Pier paddle is named in his honor. Manhattan Beach's history has always been intricately tied to the beach and surf culture. It seems totally appropriate that this plaque be added to help commonste this historical site and secure Manhattan Beach's role in surfing history.

At first they didn't call it surfing, they called it paddle boarding. Before 1950 there were no accolades that I know of that were coming out of anywhere about surfing.

Not that many people were surfing at that time.

There must have been a demand because people had to make their own boards. Before fiberglass if you dinged a board it absorbed water and you had to repair it right away.

My first board was stubby, like an ironing board. You'd try to paddle and the whitewater would push you in to shore.

When I was 8 years old I saved up the money to buy the materials to make my own paddle board. A neighbor whose Dad was the Mayor had tools. The board was old hunks and stubs of wood glued together. It was a mess.

Dale and I both went to Redondo High. He was in the class before me. Dale was sort of carefree.

When Barbara and I first met she had an 80 pound board, It had a plywood deck and it wasn't fiberglassed, It was just painted. There was a cork you had to remove to drain the water out of it.

Dale's shop was the first in the world.

It was a shop where he took orders and shaped the boards. He was around 22 years old. He worked by himself. No one else was fiddling around =with that in those days. He was a one man operation.

Inside the shop were just some 2x4s and a slab of glued together balsa wood. He had to take the boards outside on the sidewalk to glass them. Later on he had a glasser.

Dale was first with innovations in surfboarding. Not only with manufacturing but experimenting with new shapes. Dale was an innovator in that he was coming up with different ways to make boards. He was the first guy to make a lot of experimental designs.

In 1957 we took the ship Lurline to Hawaii. We bought boards from Dale to take over because we couldn't buy them in Hawaii.



# Dale Velzy: "The Hawk" opened the world's first surfing store in Manhattan Beach

Dale Velzy was born in Oakland, Calif., on Sept. 23, 1927, but grew up in Hermosa Beach. His father was a woodworker and part-time lifeguard.

As a young boy, Velzy loved to hang out on the beach and watch the surfers and lifeguards on their boards. When he was eight years old, his father used woodworking tools to shape a surfboard out of heavy planks for him, and the younger Velzy became hooked on surfing.

He quit school and joined the Merchant Marine at age 16, serving in World War II. After returning home, he began shaping surfboards in earnest, working with new materials such as balsa wood and fiberglass to make the boards lighter and more maneuverable than the early heavy redwood plank boards.

Because of his woodworking knowledge, Velzy also became expert at repairing and reshaping existing boards, originally in the family garage in Hermosa, then later at the club headquarters of the Manhattan Beach Surf Club, under the Manhattan Beach pier.

Velzy was the club's resident leader, and one of the sport's earliest flamboyant personalities. He got his nickname, "The Hawk," not from any physical characteristics, but from his ability to spot coins in the sand on the beach from long distances as a young boy. The nickname stuck, and fit his freewheeling lifestyle, which included a love of horses and cowboy culture, fast cars and women — he was married and divorced five times — in addition to surfing.

After complaints about his board-shaping and repair activities under the pier, Velzy found an empty former shoe repair shop nearby, and transferred his operation there.

Velzy's balsa wood boards were becoming increasingly popular among surfers, and he worked constantly to keep up with demand. Though surfing's breakthrough to the mass media was still a decade off, the early 1950s were a boom time for the sport along the Southern California coast.

Wetsuit designer Bev Morgan, with help from brothers Bill and Bob Meistrell, opened the original Redondo Beach Dive N' Surf shop in 1953 and tried to convince Velzy to come aboard with them, but he remained unconvinced that wetsuits would ever catch on among surfers.

Instead, with some prodding from Morgan, he formed a partnership with fellow board shaper Harold "Hap" Jacobs in 1953. Velzy-Jacobs Surfboards became very successful very quickly. Velzy opened a second store in Venice in 1954, and another in San Clemente in 1958. Business was booming.

He was always searching for a better design, and in 1955, he came up with one of his most popular. Called "The Pig" because of its wide section near the tail, it allowed surfers to do what became known as "hot-dogging" tricks such as walking the nose, quasimoto and head dips.



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Velzy also was the first surfboard maker to assemble a surfing team, a practice which later became much more common. His team of surfers included the legendary Mickey Dora, Donald Takayama, Mike Doyle, Dewey Weber, and Mickey Muñoz.



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In 1956, Velzy helped pioneer another genre when he gave a young surfer and aspiring filmmaker named Bruce Brown \$5,000 to buy camera equipment and finance a trip to Hawaii to make the 1957 documentary, "Slippery When Wet."

During the filming, Brown and the surfers he was filming discovered a a break on the North Shore of Oahu that they named "Velzyland" in honor of their the man who bankrolled the operation. The popular surfing spot still bears his nickname.

Surfing documentaries became extremely popular as a result of "Slippery When Wet" and subsequent efforts, selling out screenings at local auditoriums. After the surfing craze hit in the 1960s, Brown reaped enormous commercial success from his 1966 documentary, "The Endless Summer."


Velzy bought out Jacobs in the late 1950s, shortly before his growing empire crashed to a halt in 1959. He liked the high life, and accounts of him carrying

around a wad of \$100 bills are common, but he left the nuts and bolts of the business to accountants and business advisers.

They let him down.

In 1959, the Internal Revenue Service came calling, and shut down Velzy's operation, which had grown to five surf shops and two surfboard factories, for nonpayment of back taxes. He had to close all of his stores and his surfboard operation, and was no longer allowed to use the "Surf Boards by Velzy" trademark.

After being nearly ruined financially, he continued shaping surfboards for other manufacturers such as Hobie Alter. He started Dale Surfboards in Newport Beach in 1962, but closed it four years later upon

moving to Arizona.

He returned to California at the end of the decade, keeping a much lower profile while continuing to shape boards on a contract basis. He bought a ranch near San Clemente, and began producing high-end custom boards and handmade reproductions of vintage designs while living in the cowboy lifestyle that he always had loved.

In 2003, Velzy was one of the first group of surfing pioneers inducted into the Hermosa Beach Surfers Walk of Fame.

A lifelong smoker, Velzy died in a Mission Viejo hospital after a long bout with lung cancer on May 26, 2005, at the age of 77.

More than 2,000 friends, associates and surfers of all ages joined in the traditional paddle-out ceremony held for Velzy on June 14, 2005 at Doheny State Beach.

In 2006, surfing author Paul Holmes told Velzy's amazing story in full in the book, "Dale Velzy is Hawk," published by the Croul Family Foundation.


