>> I WOULD LIKE TO INTRODUCE TOM TO GIVE A BRIEF PRESENTATION. >> GOOD TO SEE HERE.

GOOD TO BE HERE TONIGHT.

I WANT TO GIVE YOU AN UPDATE ON WHAT'S HAPPENING AT THE HEALTH DISTRICT AND SPECIFICALLY WHAT'S HAPPENING AT OUR CAMPUS THERE, THE OLD SOUTH BAY HOSPITAL.

AS ALL OF YOU KNOW IN 1955 THE VOTERS FROM MANHATTAN BEACH, HERMOSA AND REDONDO BEACH CAME TOGETHER AND FORMED A HEALTH DISTRICT AND BUILT THE HOSPITAL.

SOME OF YOU KNOW IT WELL.

>> Mayor Montgomery: I WAS BORN THERE.

>> IF ALL GOES WELL WE'LL TALK ABOUT IN A MOMENT YOU CAN COMPLETE THE CIRCLE OF LIFE THERE.

[ TOO MANY TALKING AT ONCE ]

>> I DECIDED TO LEAD WITH THAT.

THAT MIGHT HAVE BEEN A MISTAKE.

ANYWAYS, LET'S TALK A LITTLE BIT ABOUT WHAT'S HAPPENING AT THE CAMPUS.

AS MANY OF YOU KNOW, THE HEALTH DISTRICT HAS BEEN AROUND OVER 60 YEARS.

FOR THE LAST 25 YEARS WE'VE FOCUSED ON PREVENTIVE HEALTH.

AS A MANHATTAN BEACH RESIDENT YOU PAY PROPERTY TAX.

THAT'S ROUGHLY LITTLE OVER A THIRD OF OUR BUDGET.

THE REST OF THE REVENUE COMES FROM PARTNERSHIPS THAT WE HAVE AS WELL AS LEASE REVENUE FROM THE OLD HOSPITAL BUILDING.

SO YOU CAN SEE WHERE WE'RE LOOKING HERE.

WE'RE ON PROSPECT AVENUE.

THE TWO BUILDINGS UP FRONT WERE DEVELOPED AFTER THE HOSPITAL CLOSED.

THOSE ARE LEASED OUT.

WE HAVE LAND LEASES FOR THOSE BUILDINGS.

AND THEN YOU CAN SEE THE MAIN BUILDINGS IN THE MIDDLE THERE. SILVERADO IS KIND OF TO THE RIGHT.

I WANT TO TALK A LITTLE BIT ABOUT WHAT WE'RE PLANNING TO DO. AS MANY OF YOU KNOW WE'VE DONE LOTS OF THINGS OVER THE LAST 25 YEARS.

WE'VE HAD SUCCESS WITH REDUCING CHILDHOOD OBESITY IN REDONDO, WE'VE RECENTLY OPENED UP ALLCOVE, A YOUTH MENTAL HEALTH FACILITY.

ALL OF THESE THINGS WE'RE DOING IN THE NAME OF COMMUNITY HEALTH. AND THEN YOU COME ON TO THE CAMPUS AND THERE'S A SEA OF ASPHALT AND THERE'S A BIG THUD.

IT DOESN'T MATCH WHO WE ARE AND HOW WE'VE EVOLVED.

WE'VE EVOLVED OVER THE LAST 60 YEARS BUT OUR CAMPUS HAS NOT. WE WANT TO CREATE A PLACE WHERE PEOPLE CAN COME, BE WELL AND SHOW WHAT THAT LOOKS LIKE, HAVE A PHYSICAL SPACE WHERE WE CAN SHOW UP FOR OUR PROGRAMS AND PEOPLE CAN COME AND BE WELL. WE'VE BEEN WORKING ON THIS FOR ABOUT FIVE YEARS.

THIS WAS OUR FIRST PLAN HERE WHERE WE WERE LOOKING AT ASSISTED LIVING.

WE'VE SEEN THAT THERE IS A NEED FOR ASSISTED LIVING IN THE SOUTH BAY.

NOT TALKING ABOUT SENIOR HOUSING OR APARTMENTS OR CONDOS,

TALKING ABOUT ASSISTED LIVING.

WE ALREADY HAVE MEMORY CARE ON THE CAMPUS.

BUT THIS WOULD ADD ASSISTED LIVING TO THE CAMPUS.

THE ORANGE ON THE LEFT-HAND SIDE, WE WEDGED THAT AROUND THERE FROM THE EXISTING BUILDING.

WE HEARD FROM THE COMMUNITY AND SAY WE WANT TO BE MORE CONNECTED TO THE NEIGHBORHOOD, WE WANT THERE TO BE A CENTER OF EXCELLENCE THAT SHOWS OFF THE PROGRAMS THAT WE PARTICIPATE IN THE SOUTH BAY AND WE WANT IT TO BE INTERGENERATIONAL.

WE DON'T WANT IT TO BE JUST A PLACE WHERE PEOPLE, OLDER PEOPLE COME.

AND SO YOU CAN SEE THE SECOND DRAWING THERE A LITTLE MORE OPEN SPACE.

AND THEN WE GOT TO WHERE WE ARE TODAY WHERE WITH ENDED UP REDUCING SOME OF THE ASSISTED LIVING UNITS.

THE IDEA WOULD BE TO BUILD PHASE ONE, THE ASSISTED LIVING ON THE LEFT-HAND SIDE, NORTH SIDE OF THE PROJECT, WE DECIDED TO MOVE SOME OF THE DENSITY OVER THERE BEHIND THE COMMERCIAL PROPERTY. WE WOULD THEN HAVE ALCOVE AT THE TOP OF THE DRAWING THERE. I'M GOING TO HURT MYSELF THERE.

THAT WORKS.

WE WOULD HAVE ALLCOVE AND THEN A PROGRAM FOR ALL-INCLUSIVE CARE FOR THE ELDERLY.

THAT'S A PROGRAM WHERE OLDER ADULTS CAN COME AND HAVE ALL OF THEIR HEALTH NEEDS MET IN ONE PLACE.

WE DON'T HAVE A PLACE IN THE SOUTH BAY RIGHT NOW WHERE OLDER ADULT CAN COME AND HAVE DAY CARE SERVICES.

WE HAVE A VERY SMALL PROGRAM WITH THE EASTER SEALS BUT THAT'S SOMETHING THAT WE DON'T HAVE A LOT OF HERE IN THE SOUTH BAY. PHASE TWO OF THE PROJECT IS WHERE WE WOULD BRING IN SORT OF THE CENTER OF EXCELLENCE THAT YOU CAN SEE IN THE MIDDLE HERE. WE WOULD BRING BACK THE CENTER FOR HEALTH AND FITNESS FOR PHASE

1.

WE WOULD HAVE TO MOVE THEM OFF CAMPUS.

WE ARE CONTEMPLATING AN AQUATICS FACILITY HERE.

THAT IS SOMETHING YOU ALL ARE LOOKING AT AS WELL.

WE HAVE DONE A FEASIBILITY STUDY AROUND AQUATICS AND LOOKING AT HAVING THAT ON PLACE AND ON SITE IN PHASE 2 OF THE PROJECT.

SO WE'RE GOING TO SHOW JUST A QUICK VIDEO.

YOU KNOW, WE CAN TALK ABOUT OPEN SPACE AND WE CAN SAY TWO ACRES OR TWO FOOTBALL FIELDS OF OPEN SPACE BUT REALLY NEED TO SEE IT IN ORDER TO UNDERSTAND IT. SO HOPEFULLY THIS WILL WORK.

WE'RE TAKING A TOUR COMING FROM PROSPECT HEADING EAST.

AGAIN, THIS IS WHAT THE CAMPUS WILL LOOK LIKE.

AGAIN, THE IDEA IS WHEN YOU'RE DRIVING DOWN PROSPECT AND SAY WHAT IS THAT, THAT'S THE HEALTHY LIVING DISTRICT.

THE IDEA IS TO HAVE A PLACE WHERE PEOPLE WITH RECREATE AND GATHER.

THE FOCUS IS TO BE INTERGENERATIONAL AND HAVE A PLACE WHERE PEOPLE CAN GATHER AND BE HEALTHY AND SHOW WHAT IT LOOKS LIKE TO BE HEALTHY.

WE PARTICIPATE IN THE GALLUP SURVEY, THE WELL-BEING INDEX SCORES IS SOMETHING THAT GALLOP DOES.

WE WANT TO SHOW PEOPLE WHAT THAT LOOKS LIKE.

YOU COME HERE, STARTING TO HEAD EAST.

YOU SEE ON YOUR RIGHT WHAT IS CALLED A LABYRINTH.

THIS IS WHERE PEOPLE CAN DO WALKING MEDITATIONS.

THE IDEA WOULD BE TO HAVE DEMONSTRATION GARDENS AND GARDENS TO CONTINUE TO EDUCATE OUR SCHOOLS ON WHAT GARDENS LOOK LIKE WITHIN THE SCHOOLS.

THERE'S NO DENSITY ON THE EAST SIDE OF THE PROPERTY.

THAT WAS SOMETHING WE HEARD A LOT ABOUT FROM THE TORRANCE RESIDENTS.

TORRANCE IS NOT IN THE HEALTH DISTRICT BUT RIGHT ON THE BORDER THERE AND WE WANT TO BE SYMPATHETIC TO THEIR CONCERNS. AS YOU MAKE THE TURN HERE NORTH YOU'LL SEE THIS IS THE BUILDING, THIS IS WHERE ALLCOVE AND PACE WILL BE THE PROGRAM FOR ALL-INCLUSIVE CARE FOR THE ELDERLY.

YOU CAN SEE THE BUILDING IS SIX STORIES HIGH.

WE HAVE COMPLETED AN ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT REPORT ON THE PROJECT. WE ARE WORKING ON THE HEIGHT.

YOU CAN SEE AS WE TURN THE CORNER THAT IT WILL BE A LITTLE HIGHER THAN THE EXISTING OFFICE BUILDING.

WE'RE NOT BUILDING TALL BUILDINGS TO BUILD TALL BUILDINGS. WE'RE COMING UP IN HEIGHT A LITTLE BIT SO THAT WE CAN MAXIMIZE THE OPEN SPACE.

SO IF THE BUILDINGS NEED TO COME DOWN, THEN THAT WOULD BE LESS OPEN SPACE AVAILABLE.

SO YOU CAN SEE AS WE COME ALONG HERE THAT IT IS TALLER THAN THE OFFICE BUILDING.

THAT'S SOMETHING WE'RE WORKING ON WITH OUR DEVELOPMENT PARTNER. FOR PHASE ONE WE'RE DOING A LAND LEASE WHICH WE WILL RECEIVE A LAND GRANT PAYMENT THAT WILL GO TO FUND OUR PROGRAMS.

AND SO RIGHT NOW THE HOSPITAL BUILD SPENDS OFF \$2.5 MILLION THAT GOES TOWARD OUR HEALTH PROGRAMS.

AND SO OUR HOPE IS THROUGH PHASE 1 THAT WE'LL BE ABLE TO REPLACE THAT REVENUE WITH HEALTH SERVICE PROGRAMS THAT WE NEED, LIKE ALLCOVE, ASSISTED LIVING.

WE THEN HAVE OPEN SPACE WHICH IS SOMETHING WE NEED MORE OF, AND

THEN WE WOULD BE ABLE TO FOCUS ON PHASE 2 TO MEET OUR FUTURE HEALTH NEEDS.

THAT'S JUST A QUICK TOUR.

WE CAN TALK ABOUT TWO ACRES OR TWO SOCCER FIELDS, BUT I THINK TRYING TO GIVE PEOPLE ON IDEA OF WHAT THAT WOULD MEAN IN A PLACE WHERE PEOPLE COULD COME GATHER.

SO JUST IN SUMMARY, I KNOW YOU GOT A BIG AGENDA TONIGHT.

WE'LL KEEP IT BRIEF.

THE REVENUE WILL GO TO FUND OUR PROGRAMS.

WE'RE EXCITED ABOUT ALLCOVE.

IT'S BEEN HAPPENING HERE FOR A COUPLE OF MONTHS.

IT'S GETTING A LOT OF USE.

OBVIOUSLY GOOD NEWS.

BUT IT IS A NEED WE HAVE FOR OUR YOUTH.

WE WANT TO CREATE A PERMANENT HOME FOR ALLCOVE.

THAT WILL BE A PRIORITY.

BLUE ZONE PROJECT PRINCIPLES ARE GOING TO BE INCORPORATED IN HERE.

WE ARE GOING TO MAKE THIS A SHOWCASE FOR ENVIRONMENT SUSTAINABLE PRACTICES.

WE'RE GOING TO TRY SOME NEW THINGS TO BE A SHOWCASE FOR ALL THREE CITIES OF WHAT ENVIRONMENT STABILITY LOOKS LIKE.

WE CAN TALK ABOUT SOME OF THE SPECIFICS.

THERE WILL BE LESS TRAFFIC HERE BECAUSE WE'RE CHASING THE USE

FROM MEDICAL OFFICE TO ASSISTED LIVING, AMONG OTHER USES. SO WE'VE DONE THE EIR WHERE WE'RE SHOWING ACTUALLY LESS TRAFFIC ON THE CAMPUS.

AND REAL QUICK, WE'VE DONE SOME POLLING AND TALKED TO PEOPLE ABOUT THIS PROJECT.

WHEN WE ASKED THEM WHAT THEY THINK ABOUT THE PROJECT, ABOUT 61% ARE IN FAVOR AND ABOUT 21% OPPOSED.

WHEN THEY LEARN MORE ABOUT IT, THAT NUMBER GOES UP TO ABOUT 72%. WE'RE A HEALTH DISTRICT.

WE'RE A PUBLIC HEALTH DISTRICT.

WE WANT PEOPLE TO BE PLEASED WITH WHAT WE'RE DOING.

THERE HAVE BEEN SOME CONCERNS ABOUT THE PROJECT.

THAT'S WHY WE'VE TAKEN OUR TIME.

WE CONTINUE TO LISTEN AND CONTINUE TO TRY TO ADDRESS THE ISSUES THAT WE HEAR FROM PEOPLE.

AGAIN, THIS WAS JUST A QUESTION ABOUT IS THERE A NEED FOR ASSISTED LIVING.

WE'VE DONE THE MARKET STUDY.

THERE IS A NEED BASED UPON PEOPLE BEING ABLE TO PERFORM AVERAGE DAILY FUNCTIONS.

BUT WHEN WE HEARD WHAT WE DID A STATISTICALLY VALID SURVEY IS ALMOST TWO-THIRDS SAID YES, THERE IS A NEED FOR MYSELF OR MY FAMILY MEMBER FOR ASSISTED LIVING.

AND THEN YEARS AGO WE PUT TOGETHER A COMMUNITY WORKING GROUP.

WE HAD MANHATTAN BEACH RESIDENTS AS PART OF THAT, DAN WAS ON THAT GROUP, AND WE ASKED, HEY DID WE GET IT RIGHT WITH WHAT WE WERE LOOKING AT DOING WITH THE MASTER PLAN THAT WAS ULTIMATELY APPROVED, AND 93% SAID YES.

THERE'S ALSO ONE, RIGHT?

BUT 93% SAID YES, YOU'RE ON TARGET WITH WHAT YOU'RE TRYING TO ACCOMPLISH.

AND I THINK THAT'S THE LAST ONE.

HAPPY TO ANSWER ANY QUESTIONS.

>> Mayor Montgomery: THANK YOU, TOM.

COUNCIL HAVE ANY QUESTIONS?

>> Councilmember Howorth: LOOKS NICE.

>> Mayor Montgomery: I HAVE ONE FOR YOU, TOM.

>> SURE.

>> Mayor Montgomery: OF THE HOUSING UNITS, 217 TOTAL NOW, IT'S BEEN REDUCED?

>> YES.

WE REDUCED THAT DOWN FROM THE 450 TO 217.

>> Mayor Montgomery: OF THE 217, HOW MANY OF THOSE ARE

LOW-INCOME HOUSING UNITS?

>> TEN PERCENT ARE GOING TO BE BELOW MARKET.

WE'RE WORKING TO SEE IF WE CAN MAKE THOSE MORE AFFORDABLE. IT'S A LITTLE MORE DIFFICULT THAN YOUR TYPICAL AFFORDABLE HOUSING BECAUSE THERE ARE SERVICES THAT COME WITH US. BUT WE'RE TRYING TO HAVE 10% BELOW MARKET FOR THE REAL ESTATE SIDE AND THEN WE'RE TRYING TO FIGURE OUT A WAY TO HAVE THEM BE TRULY MORE AFFORDABLE OLDER ADULT LIVING BY BRINGING DOWN THAT OPERATING COST, THAT SERVICE COST.

>> Mayor Montgomery: AND ANY CRITERIA FOR ANYONE TO APPLY TO RENT THESE UNITS?

IN OTHER WORDS, THE DISTRICT IS HERMOSA, MANHATTAN AND REDONDO. WHAT IF SOMEBODY DOESN'T LIVE IN THE DISTRICT.

>> THIS IS FOR THE BEACH CITIES DISTRICT.

THIS IS THEIR ASSET, THE PROPERTY THEY BOUGHT 60 YEARS AGO, 65 YEARS AGO.

THE PLAN WOULD BE TO HAVE PRIORITY FOR BEACH CITIES RESIDENTS. >> Mayor Montgomery: WOULD THAT PLAN INCLUDE SOMEONE WHO HAS BEEN A RESIDENT FOR A WEEK VERSUS SOMEONE WHO HAS BEEN HERE FOR TEN YEARS?

I'M CURIOUS HOW THEY WOULD JUDGE THE POINT SYSTEM.

>> I'VE DONE SOME OF THAT WORK WITH AFFORDABLE HOUSING PREFERENCE AND LOTTERIES.

I THINK WE'LL HAVE TO WORK ON THAT.

I THINK TECHNICALLY IF SOMEONE IS A RESIDENT IT WOULD COUNT. >> Mayor Montgomery: DAY ONE.

>> DAY ONE.

>> Mayor Montgomery: UNDERSTOOD.

THANK YOU.

COUNCILMEMBER LESSER.

>> Councilmember Lesser: TO THE EXTENT WE'RE RECEIVING COMMENTS ON THIS PROJECT AT ALL.

WHAT IS THE ROLE OF A PUBLIC HEALTH AGENCY TO BUILD FACILITIES THAT A PRIVATE ENTITY COULD BUILD JUST AS EASILY.

WHAT IS THE RESPONSE TO THAT?

>> I THINK THERE'S BEEN A LOT OF FOCUS ON THE ASSISTED LIVING PIECE.

WE ARE PARTNERING WITH A DEVELOPMENT PARTNER THAT HAS THAT EXPERTISE, JUST LIKE THE DISTRICT HAS PARTNERED WITH THE TWO FRONT BUILDINGS WITH A DEVELOPER THAT HAS THAT EXPERTISE TO PROVIDE THAT SERVICE.

WE'RE NOT GIVING UP THE LAND.

WE'RE LEASING THE LAND FOR \$1.5 MILLION A YEAR THAT WE THEN USE THAT LAND OR THAT REVENUE FOR OUR SERVICES.

AND SO MY ANSWER TO THAT WOULD BE WE'RE TRYING TO FIRST MEET THE HEALTH NEED.

WE SEE ASSISTED LIVING AS WELL AS ALLCOVE, MEMORY CARE, ALL OF THOSE THINGS, OPEN SPACE, WE'RE TRYING TO MEET THAT HEALTH NEED AND FOR PART OF IT WE'RE PARTNERING WITH SOMEONE THAT PROVIDES THAT SERVICE.

>> Councilmember Lesser: IS THE PRIVATE SECTOR NOT KEEPING UP? IS THAT A REASON FOR EXPLAINING WHY --

>> FOR ASSISTED LIVING YOU OBVIOUSLY HAVE A NEW PROJECT COMING

IN HERE IN MANHATTAN BEACH.

AS YOU MAY KNOW, WE'RE ALSO A PARTNER IN SUNRISE, IN HERMOSA BEACH WHERE YEARS AGO THE DISTRICT GOT INVOLVED IN THAT PROJECT AS WELL.

THE SHORT ANSWER IS THERE IS NOT ENOUGH ASSISTED LIVING IN THE THREE BEACH CITIES TO MEET THE NEED THAT WE HAVE. AND SO WHAT HAPPENS AND WE SEE WITH THE CLIENTS THAT WE SERVE, AS YOU KNOW, WE SERVE ABOUT 400 CLIENTS WHERE WE COME IN WITH SOCIAL WORKERS AND HELP THEM WITH THEIR IN-HOME CARE -- AND OUR GOAL IS TO KEEP PEOPLE IN THEIR HOME FOR AS LONG AS POSSIBLE. BUT WHEN THERE COMES A TIME WHEN THEY CAN'T BE THAT THEIR HOME ANY LONGER, WE WANT THEM TO AGE IN PLACE OR IN THEIR COMMUNITY. WE THINK THERE IS A NEED THE BEACH CITIES.

WE THINK THIS IS A WAY TO MEET THAT NEED.

THE ORIGINAL HOSPITAL WAS DEVELOPED THROUGH A BOND ISSUE. WE HAVE DECIDED NOT TO GO BACK OUT FOR A BOND ISSUE AND SEE IF THERE IS A WAY TO USE THE INCREASED VALUE OF OUR LAND TO MEET A HEALTH NEED AND CONTINUE TO PROVIDE FUNDING FOR OUR SERVICES. >> Councilmember Lesser: FINALLY, WHAT IS THE TENTATIVE TIME FRAME BASED ON WHAT WE JUST SAW, AT LEAST FOR PHASE 1. >> FOR PHASE 1 WE'RE LOOKING AT WHETHER OR NOT THERE MAY BE A WAY TO MOVE FORWARD A LITTLE MORE QUICKLY WITH ALLCOVE. THAT'S BEEN SUCH A SUCCESS IN THE LAST COUPLE OF MONTHS. WE WANT TO SEE IF THERE'S A WAY TO MOVE FORWARD WITH THAT. WE NEED A CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT FROM REDONDO BEACH.

WE HAVE AN ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT REPORT.

WE HOPE TO GO THROUGH THE CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT PROCESS FOR THE REMAINDER OF THIS YEAR AND BREAK GROUND PROBABLY IN EARLY '25. >> Councilmember Lesser: THANK YOU.

THANK YOU, MR. MAYOR.

CONDUCT PUBLIC HEARING AND CONSIDERATION OF RESOLUTION ADOPTING KNEW WASTEWATER RATES AND CHARGES EFFECTIVE NOVEMBER 1<sup>st</sup>, 2023,

THROUGH NOVEMBER 1<sup>st</sup>, 2027, AND ALL PROTEST TO THE PROPOSED WASTEWATER RATES LED BY PUBLIC WORKS DIRECTOR LEE. FLOOR IS YOURS, SIR.

>> GOOD EVENING, HONORABLE MAYOR AND MEMBERS OF THE CITY COUNCIL.

I'M ERICK LEE.

TONIGHT'S PRESENTATION WILL BE GIVEN BY SENIOR ANALYST NICOLE. >> GOOD EVENING HONORABLE MAYOR AND MEMBERS OF THE CITY COUNCIL. TONIGHT WE'RE HERE CONDUCTING THE PUBLIC HEARING TO CONSIDER NEW WASTEWATER FEES FOR MANHATTAN BEACH WASTEWATER SERVICES.

GIVE ME ONE SECOND.

IF THESE RATES ARE ADOPTED THIS EVENING, THEY WILL BE EFFECTIVE FOR THE NEXT FIVE YEARS STARTING NOVEMBER 1<sup>st</sup>, 2023, RUNNING THROUGH NOVEMBER 1<sup>st</sup>, 2027.

BASICS REGARDING THESE FEES.

SO CURRENTLY CUSTOMER BILLS FUND THE OPERATIONS AND CAPITAL INFRASTRUCTURE ASSOCIATED WITH ALL WASTEWATER PROJECTS IN THE ITEMS LISTED HERE.

RIGHT NOW WE HAVE 82 MILES OF GRAVITY SANITARY SEWER PIPELINES, 5,000 FEET OF FORCE MAINS, 2,000 MAIN HOLES AND 8 LIFT STATIONS ALL OPERATING WITH 6 1/2 FULL-TIME EMPLOYS.

WE HAVE ONE ENGINEER ASSIGNED TO OUR WASTEWATER PROJECTS. THIS IS A TIMELINE.

Typical MUNICIPALITIES DETERMINE LONG-TERM REVENUE FEES BY

PERFORMING THESE RATE STUDIES.

THESE ARE TO BE PERFORMED BY A CERTIFIED CONSULTANT. AS A TIMELINE OF HOW WE GOT HERE TODAY, IN 2010 OUR WASTEWATER MASTER PLAN IDENTIFIED THAT THE CITY HAS \$42 MILLION IN IMPROVEMENTS NEEDED.

THE LAST ACTUAL WASTEWATER INCREASE WAS IN 2014.

FAST FORWARD TO 2023, A RATE ANALYSIS AND IN MARCH OF THIS YEAR COUNCIL INITIATED THE PROP 218 PROCESS.

WE ALL KNOW THAT PRICES, COSTS FOR EVERYTHING INCLUDING FOOD AND MATERIALS HAVE GONE UP SIGNIFICANTLY SINCE 2014.

IF YOU LOOK AT COMPOUNDED INFLATION SINCE 2014, IT'S GONE UP 25.4%.

THE COST FOR OUR MAINTENANCE AND OUR PROJECTS HAVE INCREASED. AND IF YOU ARE TO LOOK AT THIS SLIDE, IT KIND OF HAS A CUMULATIVE INCREASES FROM 2009 TO 2022.

SO IT SHOWS HERE WHILE ALL ITEMS HAVE GONE ALL OVER THE PLACE WITH REGARDS TO THEIR INCREASE CUMULATIVELY SINCE 2009, WATER RATES AND SEWER RATES HAVE GONE UP UNIFORMLY ALL THE WAY UP TO 2022.

WE'RE IN A NEED WHERE WE HAVE IDENTIFIED MANY INFRASTRUCTURE NEEDS THAT WE HAVE AND THESE RATES WOULD FUND THOSE INFRASTRUCTURE NEEDS.

ALL PROP 218 NOTICES CAME WITH THIS EXCEPT SHOWING THE PROPOSED RATE INCREASES FOR THE NEXT FIVE YEARS. IT INCLUDES THE CURRENT RATE RIGHT NOW AND THEY'RE ALL BASED ON DIFFERENT METER SIZES.

AN EXAMPLE HERE, YOU'LL SEE, IF YOU HAVE A THREE-QUARTER INCH METER, 1280 WOULD BE YOUR FIXED CHARGE AND THE VARIABLE USES CHARGE IS BASED ON WATER USAGE.

FOR THE FIRST INCREASE IT'S \$1.46.

THIS SLIDE HERE SHOWS THE BILL IMPACTS THAT YOUR AVERAGE SINGLE-FAMILY HOUSEHOLD WOULD SEE.

IF YOU LOOK HERE, WE LOOK AT ABOUT 2000 CUBIC FEET IS TYPICALLY THE AVERAGE SINGLE-FAMILY RESIDENTIAL.

YOUR BIMONTHLY BILL WOULD BE \$36.52S AND YOUR PROPOSED BIMONTHLY BILL WOULD BE AROUND \$42.

THE DIFFERENCE IS \$5.40 ON THE BILL EQUATING TO \$2.45 A MONTH. IF THESE RATES ARE ACCEPTED OR INITIATED TODAY, NOVEMBER 1<sup>st</sup>, 2023, WOULD BE THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF THESE NEW RATES. THEY WILL NOT BE REFLECTIVE IN BILLS UNTIL JANUARY 1<sup>st</sup>, 2024. NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE.

HERE IS KIND OF A SNAPSHOT OF OUR WEBSITE.

SO ON OUR WEBSITE WE CREATED A CUSTOMER WASTEWATER BILL CALCULATOR.

IN THIS CALCULATOR YOU'RE ABLE TO TYPE IN YOUR SCENARIO, THE METER SIZE, TYPICAL USAGE IS ABOUT 20 BUT YOU CAN LOOK AT YOUR WATER BILL AND SEE WHAT YOU TYPICALLY USE AND PLUG IN THOSE NUMBERS AND SEE WHAT YOUR RATE WOULD BE. NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE.

THE PROP 218 PROCESS.

SO THIS PROCESS WAS PASSED BY CALIFORNIA VOTERS IN 1996. THIS LIMITS GOVERNMENTS SO THEY CAN'T JUST INCREASE TAXES AND FEES.

THEY HAVE TO GO THROUGH THIS PROCESS.

IT ALLOWS PROPERTY OWNERS AND RATE PAYERS TO PROTEST RATE INCREASES.

THIS IS LIMITED TO ONE PROTEST PER PARCEL.

THIS REQUIRES THAT THE CITY MAILS THESE NOTICES TO PROPERTY OWNERS AND RATE PAIRS.

AS A COURTESY THE CITY ALSO MAILED THESE TO TENANT TO MAKE SURE THAT EVERYBODY KNEW THAT THIS PROCESS WAS TAKING PLACE.

THERE IS A 45-DAY PROTEST PERIOD THAT IS REQUIRED.

THE CITY DID A 49-DAY PROTEST PERIOD TO GIVE PEOPLE AMPLE TIME TO MAKE THIS DECISION.

THIS IS THE PUBLIC HEARING WE'RE AT TO HOLD AFTER THIS PROTEST PERIOD.

NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE.

THIS IS JUST A TIMELINE OF THE EVENTS THAT GOT US TO THIS POINT. MARCH 21<sup>st</sup> COUNCIL INITIATED THE PROCESS AND WE SET THE PUBLIC HEARING DATE FOR TODAY.

MARCH 28<sup>th</sup> IS WHEN THE PROP 218 NOTICES WERE MAILED TO PROPERTY OWNERS, RATE PAYERS AND ALSO TO TENANTS AND OCCUPANTS. WE HELD A COMMUNITY MEETING ON APRIL  $19^{th}$ .

IT WAS IN PERSON AND ZOOM.

TODAY IS THE PUBLIC HEARING WHERE WE'LL DETERMINE IF THERE IS A PROTEST COUNT AND IF WE CAN MOVE FORWARD WITH THE RATES. IF WE CAN AND DO NOT HAVE A PROTEST COUNT OF OVER 50% PLUS ONE OR AFTER 50% PLUS ONE, NEW RATES GO INTO EFFECT NOVEMBER 1<sup>st</sup>, 2023, AND NEW WASTEWATER RATES WILL BE EFFECTIVE ON BILLS JANUARY 1<sup>st</sup>, 2024.

IN ORDER TO GET A MAJORITY PROTEST COUNT, THIS IS THE -- THESE ARE THE NUMBERS THAT WE WOULD NEED TO SEE.

THE CITY CLERK'S OFFICE IS GOING TO ANNOUNCE THE PROTEST COUNT. IF MORE THAN 6700 PROTESTS ARE RECEIVED, THAT WOULD DECLARE A MAJORITY PROTEST IN WHICH CASE THE CITY COUNCIL CANNOT INITIATE THE INCREASE.

IF LESS THAN 6600 PROTESTS ARE RECEIVED, THE CITY COUNCIL MAY APPROVE THE RATE INCREASE.

AND THESE NEW RATES TAKE EFFECT NOVEMBER 1<sup>st</sup> REFLECTIVE IN BILLS 2024.

APPROVAL OF THE RATES IS GOOD FOR FIVE YEARS AT WHICH TIME ANOTHER PROP 218 PROCESS WOULD BE REQUIRED TO INCREASE THE RATES.

NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE.

SO OUR NEXT STEP WILL BE FOR THE CITY CLERK, ONCE WE'VE CONCLUDED THE PUBLIC HEARING, TO GIVE US THE FINAL PROTEST COUNT RECEIVED AT THE END OF THE PUBLIC HEARING.

IF A MAJORITY PROTEST IS REACHED, COUNCIL MAY ADOPT THE RESOLUTION APPROVAL THE NEW RATES.

>> Councilmember Napolitano: IS NOT REACHED.

>> AND OUR RECOMMENDATION IS ADOPTING RESOLUTION 23-0051,

ADOPTING THE ANNUAL PROPOSED RATE INCREASE NOVEMBER 1st, 2023,

THROUGH NOVEMBER 1<sup>st</sup>, 2027.

>> Councilmember Lesser: MR. MAYOR, NO ONE LIKE TO PAY MORE FOR GOVERNMENT SERVICES BUT CONVERSELY, NO ONE WANTS TO HAVE A FAILURE OF OUR INFRASTRUCTURE, PARTICULARLY OUR WASTEWATER INFRASTRUCTURE.

OUR COUNCIL OF PAST DECADES HAVE INVESTED IN OUR INFRASTRUCTURE PRECISELY SO THERE WOULD NOT BE A FAILURE.

WHAT WAS THE OLD ADAGE, WE WANT TO BE ABLE NOT TO HAVE FEAR TO FLUSH.

IT'S BEEN AN RESPONSIBLE UNDERTAKING BY COUNCILS BEFORE US TO INVEST IN OUR INFRASTRUCTURE TO ENSURE THAT THIS CORE, CORE FUNCTION OF OUR CITY IS OPERATIONAL.

AND INVESTED IN IT TO ENSURE IT REMAINS SO.

THAT'S WHY I'VE SECONDED THE MOTION.

>> Mayor Montgomery: ANY OTHER COMMENTS?

CONSIDERATION OF AN INCREASE TO STORMWATER ASSESSMENTS, FINANCE DIRECTOR CHARELIAN.

>> GOOD EVENING, HONORABLE MAYOR MONTGOMERY, MEMBERS OF THE CITY COUNCIL.

STEVE CHARELIAN FINANCE DIRECTOR.

I'M GOING TO TURN THIS OVER TO OUR FINANCIAL CONTROLLER.

THANK YOU.

>> Mayor Montgomery: ALL RIGHT.

>> GOOD EVENING, HONORABLE MAYOR MONTGOMERY AND MEMBERS OF THE CITY COUNCIL.

MY NAME IS JULIE, I'M THE FINANCIAL CONTROLLER.

IT IS MY PLEASURE TODAY TO PRESENT THE REPORT FOR CONSIDERATION OF THE STORMWATER ASSESSMENT INCREASE WHICH IS PART OF THE CITY COUNCIL WORK PLAN.

WE ARE HERE TODAY TO DISCUSS THE STATUS OF THE CITY'S STORMWATER FUND AND WHETHER TO PROCEED WITH THE NEXT STEPS FOR A POTENTIAL FEE INCREASE.

SORRY.

MY APOLOGIES.

TONIGHT WE'RE TALKING ABOUT THE CURRENT STATUS OF THE STORMWATER WHERE FEES HAVE NOT CHANGED SINCE 1996.

WE WILL ALSO BRIEFLY GO OVER THE LAST ANALYSIS CONDUCTED IN 2019 AND THE TWO VALID OPTIONS AVAILABLE IF THE CITY DECIDES TO PROCEED WITH THE STORMWATER INCREASE.

THE OBJECTIVE TONIGHT IS TO DECIDE WHETHER TO PROCEED WITH OBTAINING AN UPDATED REPORT.

THE COST FOR THESE IS \$46,000.

THERE'S A RESERVE OF 20%.

THE GENERAL FORECAST PRESENTED A THE MEETING PROJECTS THAT THE CITY WILL NOT MEET THE RESERVES BY 2027.

THE RED AMOUNTS IN THE FISCAL YEAR 2027 IN FISCAL YEAR 2028

INDICATES THE POLICY RESERVES NOT BEING MET.

ADDITIONALLY THE FORECAST PROJECTS -- MY APOLOGIES.

>> Mayor Montgomery: THAT'S ALL RIGHT.

>> INITIALLY THE FORECAST DIP INTO RESERVE BUSINESS 2026, THE

RESERVES FULLY UNFUNDED BY FISCAL YEAR 2027.

UNRESERVED GENERAL FUND BALANCES IS ALSO PROJECTED TO BE FULLY DEPLETED BY FISCAL YEAR 2026.

IN THE LAST SIX YEARS LISTED ON THE SLIDE IT IS PROJECTED THAT THE GENERAL FUND WILL PROVIDE THE STORMWATER FUND WITH \$11 MILLION OF SUBSIDIES.

CURRENTLY THIS IS UNSUSTAINABLE.

SOME OF THE IMPACTS OF THE GENERAL FUND IN THE LAST COUPLE OF YEARS INCLUDE INFLATION, FUNDING CAP TAMURA PROJECTS AND SUBSIDIES.

INFLATION IS OUTPACING.

SOME CAPITAL PROJECT BIDS ARE COMING IN AS HIGH AS 2.5 TIMES MORE THAN BUDGETED.

DUE TO THE RESOURCES REQUIRED WHEN UNDERTAKING MAJOR PROJECTS, THERE IS INSUFFICIENT FUNDING FOR CRITICAL INFRASTRUCTURE NEEDS. MANDATED PROJECTS ALSO PUT A STRAIN ON FUNDING.

ALTHOUGH THERE ARE POTENTIAL OFFSETS FOR GRANTS FOR SOME OF THE MANDATED PROJECTS, ONGOING MAINTENANCE OF INFRASTRUCTURE IS NOT COVERED BY GRANTS.

AND LASTLY ONGOING SUPPORT OF THE STORMWATER FUND IS ESTIMATED TO RESULT IN 11 HADN'T \$4 MILLION OF OUTGOING TRANSFERS FROM THE GENERAL FUND OVER THE NEXT SEVERAL YEARS.

THE MAIN PURPOSE OF THE STORMWATER FUND IS TO FUND SYSTEM TO DIVERT STORMWATER OFF OF THE STREETS AND PREVENT FLOODING. TRASH IS ALSO CARRIED INTO THE STORM DRAINS ALONG WITH THE STORMWATER.

THEREFORE ADDITIONAL FUNCTION OF THE STORMWATER FUND IS TO PREVENT TRASH AND DEBRIS FROM REACHING SURFACE WATERS LIKE THE OCEAN.

THE CITY CURRENTLY MAINTAINS SEVEN FULL CAPTURE SYSTEM TOTS CAPTURE RUNOFF DEBRIS CARRIED INTO THE STORM DRAINS. MANDATES LIMIT THE LEVELS OF BACTERIA AND METALS IN RUNOFF WATERS.

ENTERPRISE FUNDS LIKE THE STORE FUND SHOULD BE SELF-SUPPORTING WHERE THE INCOMING REVENUES COVER THE OUTGOING COSTS. HOWEVER, THE STORMWATER FUND HAS BEEN RUNNING A DEFICIT YEAR OVER YEAR.

ANY DEFICITS IN THE STORMWATER FUND IS SUBSIDIZED BY THE GENERAL FUND.

CURRENTLY SINGLE-FAMILY RESIDENTIAL PAYS A FIXED RATE OF \$19 ANNUALLY RESULT IN \$350,000 OF ANNUAL REVENUE WHICH IS REPRESENTED BY THE FLAT BLUE LINE ON THE CHART. EXPENDITURES ARE PROJECTED TO FALL BETWEEN 1.6 AND \$3 MILLION OVER THE NEXT SIX YEARS.

THE BULK OF THE EXPENDITURES FUND STORM DRAIN REPAIRS AND CONTROL RUNOFF.

THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN THE TWO LINES IS THE AMOUNT OF GENERAL SUBSIDIES REQUIRED TO SUPPORT THE STORMWATER FUND, \$11.4 MILLION OVER THE NEXT SIX YEARS.

STORMWATER FEES OF \$19 FOR SINGLE-FAMILY RESIDENTIAL HAS NOT CHANGED SINCE THE PROGRAM'S INCEPTION IN 1996, ABOUT 27 YEARS AGO.

THE LAST ANALYSIS CONDUCTED IN 2019 ELECTED TO MOVE AWAY. IMPERVIOUS SQUARE FOOTAGE IS ON A PROPERTY THAT CANNOT ABSORB WATER.

IF WATER CAN BE ABSORBED, THERE IS NO NEED FOR STORMWATER SERVICES.

THE PROPOSED RATE STRUCTURE WOULD DETERMINE THE RATE BASED ON THE IMPERVIOUS SQUARE FOOTAGE.

THE AVERAGE SINGLE-FAMILY RESIDENTIAL PACES \$70 ANNUALLY, AN INCREASE OF \$50 A YEAR.

A SURVEY CONDUCTED AT THE TIME RESULTED IN 60% RESIDENTIAL SUPPORT FOR THE MEASURE.

HOWEVER, THIS ANALYSIS IS NOW OUTDATED SO UPON CITY COUNCIL APPROVAL, STAFF WILL PROCEED WITH OBTAINING AN UPDATED REPORT OF NEW PROPOSED RATES AND CONDUCT A NEW SURVEY TO POLL PUBLIC OPINION.

THIS CHART DEPICTS THE PROPOSED RATES FROM THE 2019 ANALYSIS. SINK RESIDENCES HAD AN AVERAGE FEE OF \$70, AN INCREASE OF \$50. ABOUT 56% OF THE POPULATION WOULD HAVE HAD AN AVERAGE RATE OF 44 TO \$71.

ABOUT 17% WOULD HAVE AN AVERAGE FEE OF \$97.

CONDOS AND MULTIFAMILY RESIDENTIAL WHICH ACCOUNTS FOR 19% OF THE PARCELS WOULD HAVE AN AVERAGE FEE OF 36 TO \$64. HIGHER RATES FOR THE REMAINDER 8% OF PARCELS ARE DUE TO LARGER LOT SIZES OR HAVING FOR IMPERVIOUS SQUARE FOOTAGE ON THE PROPERTY.

A NEW ENGINEER'S REPORT IS REQUIRED TO OBTAIN UPDATED RATES BASED ON CURRENT OPERATION AND INFRASTRUCTURE NEEDS.

IN ORDER TO INCREASE THE STORMWATER ASSESSMENT THE CITY MUST GO THROUGH A BALLOT PROCESS.

STORMWATER HAS TWO OPTIONS.

THE FIRST OPTION IS TO PLACE THE MEASURE IN THE NOVEMBER 2024 ELECTION.

THIS OPTION REQUIRES TWO-THIRDS VOTER APPROVAL OF THE LOCALLY-CASTED BALLOTS.

THE OTHER BALLOT OPTION IS A PROP 218 PROCESS.

IT INVOLVES A 45-DAY PROTEST PERIOD AND A 45-DAY BALLOT PROCESS WHERE THE PROPERTY OWNERS CAN VOTE ON THE MEASURE.

A PROP 218 REQUIRES A MAJORITY APPROVAL OF PROPERTY OWNERS. OUR LAST MEETING HELD APRIL 20<sup>th</sup>, 2023, THE FINANCE COMMITTEE RECOMMENDED PROCEEDING WITH A PROP 218 PROCESS.

SHOULD CITY COUNCIL DECIDE TO PURSUE A PROPOSITION 218 PROCESS, THIS CHART ILLUSTRATES THE PROPOSED TIMELINE.

CITY COUNCIL DOES NOT HAVE TO DECIDE TODAY WHICH BALLOT OPTION TO PROCEED. STAFF WILL WORK ON OBTAINING A NEW UPDATED ENGINEER'S REPORT. ON THE AUGUST 15<sup>th</sup> MEETING CITY COUNCIL CAN REVIEW THE SURVEY AND REPORT AND DECIDE HOW TO PROCEED.

AT THE TIME WE'LL GO INTO MORE DETAIL ON THE TWO BALLOT OPTIONS. SO THERE IS A POTENTIAL OBSTACLE TO THE CITY'S EFFORTS TO ENHANCE REVENUE.

THE TAXPAYER PROTECTION AND GOVERNMENT ACCOUNTABILITY ACT IS SLATED FOR THE UPCOMING NOVEMBER '24 ELECTION.

IF IMPROVED, ALL TAX INCREASES INCLUDING FEES WOULD REQUIRE TWO-THIRDS VOTER APPROVAL.

IN ADDITION TO MAKING IT MORE DIFFICULT TO RAISE FEES, IT IS RETROACTIVE TO JANUARY 1<sup>st</sup>, 2022.

ANY INCREASES AFTER THIS DATE MAY HAVE TO BE REDUCED.

AT THE TIME CITY COUNCIL CAN DECIDE WHETHER TO PROCEED WITH THE BALLOT MEASURE.

THAT CONCLUDES MY PRESENTATION AND I'M HAPPY TO ANSWER ANY QUESTIONS.

>> Mayor Montgomery: THANK YOU, JULIE.

STAND BY.

COUNCILMEMBER NAPOLITANO.

>> Councilmember Napolitano: THANK YOU, YOUR HONOR.

QUESTIONS.

WHEN WE RAISE THIS A LITTLE BIT BEFORE BUT HOW ARE WE GOING TO DETERMINE IMPERVIOUS SURFACES?

DG, ROCKS, GRASS, CRETE, WHAT PART OF THAT IS GOING TO BE COUNTED, SOME OF THE PAVERS NOW HAVE GROOVES BETWEEN THEM TO ALLOW FOR PASS THROUGH.

AND THEN, I MEAN, WE'RE NOT GOING IN PROPERTY BY PROPERTY. ARE WE DOING THIS BY PERMITS OR ARE WE DOING IT BY GOOGLE EARTH? HOW ARE WE GOING TO DETERMINE THIS?

>> SO THE LAST STUDY THAT WAS CONDUCTED IN 2019 WENT BY THE DATA IN L.A. COUNTY.

AND WE ARE ALSO USING THE L.A. COUNTY DATA.

>> Councilmember Napolitano: WHAT DOES THAT MEAN, L.A. COUNTY DATA?

WHAT DATA?

>> THE ASSESSMENT DATA.

THEY HAVE WHAT IS BUILT OUT FOR IMPERVIOUS SQUARE FOOTAGE. >> Councilmember Napolitano: IN TERMS OF WALKWAYS, NOT JUST ROOFS AND SQUARE FOOTAGE OF HOUSES, BUT SURFACES, IMPROVED SURFACES THAT WOULD INCLUDE I DON'T KNOW WHAT.

>> THAT IS MY UNDERSTANDING.

WE CAN GET CLARIFICATION ON THAT.

THEY'RE ALREADY USING IMPERVIOUS SQUARE FOOTAGE TO CALCULATE THE MEASURE W.

IT'S ALREADY OUT THERE.

>> Councilmember Napolitano: YOU'RE JUST ADOPTING MEASURE W? >> FOR MEASURE WE WOULD USE THE SAME DATA AS THAT. >> Mayor Montgomery: MAYOR PRO TEM FRANKLIN.

>> Mayor Pro Tem Franklin: YES, THANK YOU.

CAN YOU JUST GIVE, FOR MY PURPOSES OF CLARIFICATION AND MAYBE FOR OUR RESIDENTS, SORT OF A DRONE-EYE VIEW OF THE EQUIPMENT HERE.

IT'S A LOT OF MONEY, MILLIONS OF DOLLARS BUT I DON'T THINK A LOT OF PEOPLE HAVE SEEN THE PUMPS, THE RETAINING STATIONS, THINGS LIKE THAT.

I HEARD THAT THERE ARE SEVEN OF THEM AROUND TOWN.

CAN YOU JUST SORT OF GIVE US AN IDEA OF THE BREADTH OF THIS EQUIPMENT.

>> YES.

PUBLIC WORKS DIRECTOR LEE IS THE EXPERT ON THAT.

>> IF I UNDERSTAND THE QUESTION RIGHT, WHAT KIND OF INFRASTRUCTURE AND EQUIPMENT DO WE OPERATE IN THE STORMWATER SYSTEM, IS THAT CORRECT?

>> Mayor Pro Tem Franklin: YES.

>> WE HAVE A NUMBER OF LIFT STATIONS AND LIFT STATIONS ESSENTIALLY ARE PUMPS THAT PUMP THE STORMWATER OVER HIGHER GROUND.

AND THEN WE HAVE -- WE MAINTAIN MILES AND MILES OF PIPES AND THEN WE ALSO CONNECT TO COUNTY PIPES AS WELL.

A LOT OF OUR EXPENSES REALLY RELATE TO THE ONGOING MAINTENANCE OF THAT INFRASTRUCTURE, WHETHER IT BE JUST MAKING SURE IT'S CLEAN OR GENERAL REPAIRS ASSOCIATED WITH MOTORS AND GENERATORS AND WHAT NOT.

AND THEN WE HAVE TREMENDOUS CAPITAL NEEDS TO ADDRESS REGIONAL MANDATES.

AND THERE ARE PROJECTS THAT ARE IN THE CIP THAT ARE THE COUNCIL IS GOING TO DISCUSS AGAIN TONIGHT, IN THE TENS OF MILLIONS OF DOLLARS OF OBLIGATIONS THAT WE HAVE TO MAKE SURE THAT THE STORMWATER SYSTEM WORKS CORRECTLY.

SO FORTUNATELY WE HAVE GRANTS FOR MANY OF THOSE PROJECTS AND WE CONTINUE TO NOT ONLY SEEK GRANTS BUT RECEIVE FAVORABLE OUTCOMES FROM GRANTING AGENCIES.

BUT THE COSTS ASSOCIATED WITH RUNNING THIS INFRASTRUCTURE IS REAL AND GRANTS WILL NEVER FUND ALL OF IT.

AND AS WAS MENTIONED PREVIOUSLY, GENERALLY THE OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE OF THE INFRASTRUCTURE GRANTING AGENCIES AREN'T REAL INTERESTED IN THAT.

>> Mayor Pro Tem Franklin: OKAY.

ALL RIGHT.

I WAS GOING TO ASK A QUESTION ABOUT WHAT IS CONSIDER PERMEABLE. SO FOR EXAMPLE, IF SOMEBODY DOES ON LANDSCAPING ON PREVIOUSLY THAT WAS GRASS, THEY PUT DOWN BRICKS AND CEMENT AND THINGS LIKE THAT, DO -- I GUESS THESE HOMEOWNERS WOULD HAVE TO HAVE PERMITS AND HOW DOES THAT GET ADDED ON TO THE -- FIRST OF ALL, IS THAT CONSIDERED NONPERMEABLE, OKAY, AND THEN HOW DOES THAT GET TRANSLATED OVER TO THEIR ULTIMATE, YOU KNOW, FEE, IN TERMS OF THE SQUARE FOOTAGE ON THEIR PROPERTY?

>> I'LL LET OUR CONTROLLER ADDRESS THAT.

>> HELLO.

SO WE DO HAVE A CONSULTANT THAT WE CONSULT WITH THAT DOES THESE CALCULATIONS EVERY YEAR.

SO THEY DO TAKE THE L.A. COUNTY DATA, IF IT'S UPDATED BY A PERMIT.

OF COURSE WE WON'T BE ABLE TO TAKE INTO ACCOUNT ANY DATA THAT WAS NOT PERMITTED.

>> Mayor Pro Tem Franklin: DOES THE PERMITS SAY HOW MANY SQUARE FEET THERE IS OF COVERING OR DO THEY HAVE TO GO INTO THE PLANS OF --

>> I BELIEVE SO ON THE PERMIT DATA.

I CAN DOUBLE-CHECK THAT.

BUT USUALLY IN PERMITS YOU PUT THE SQUARE FOOTAGE OF WHAT YOU'RE MODIFYING.

>> Mayor Pro Tem Franklin: DO WE HAVE A PROCESS FOR A RESIDENT TO QUESTION THAT OR, YOU KNOW, TO CONTEST THE SQUARE FOOTAGE VALUE THAT IS DETERMINED IN.

>> WE CURRENTLY DO NOT.

WE'RE STILL IN THE INFANCY STAGES OF THIS PROCESS. THAT'S SOMETHING WE CAN POTENTIALLY LOOK INTO. BUT USUALLY WE DO TAKE THE L.A. COUNTY DATA. WE DO HAVE AN OPTION IN THE FEE TO TAKE, YOU KNOW, COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT'S DATA.

BUT SINCE MEASURE W IS ALSO USING THE A.L. COUNTY DATA, IT SEEMS MORE CONSISTENT TO USE THE DATA.

>> Mayor Pro Tem Franklin: OKAY.

THANK YOU.

>> Mayor Montgomery: ANYBODY ELSE.

>> Mayor Pro Tem Franklin: JUST GIVE ME A SECOND HERE.

SO THE 218 PROCESS, WE JUST SAW THAT EARLIER, YOU KNOW, WITH THE WASTEWATER.

SO THE 218 PROCESS, SO NEEDS A TWO-THIRDS MAJORITY TO WIN.

>> AND NEEDS A MAJORITY APPROVAL FROM PROPERTY OWNERS.

>> Mayor Pro Tem Franklin: A MAJORITY APPROVAL.

OKAY.

SO THE BALLOT THAT GOES OUT TO HOMEOWNERS, SO THEN WE COUNT THE YES VOTES ON THAT VERSUS THE NO.

I MEAN WE COUNT BOTH BUT --

>> YES, YOU COUNT BOTH.

AND WHATEVER -- IF WE HAVE A MAJORITY OF YESES, THEN YES, THAT WOULD PASS.

>> Mayor Pro Tem Franklin: BUT WHERE DOES THE 50% COME IN? >> GOOD EVENING, MAYOR PRO TEM.

IT'S A SIMPLE MAJORITY ON THE MAIL-IN BALLOT.

IT COULD BE --

>> Mayor Pro Tem Franklin: OKAY.

50% PLUS ONE OF THE BALLOTS THAT COME IN.

>> OF THE BALLOTS THAT COME IN.

IF YOU PUT IT ON A GENERAL ELECTION, IT WOULD BE TWO-THIRDS. >> Mayor Pro Tem Franklin: OKAY.

YES.

>> BUT AGAIN JUST TO CLARIFY FOR TONIGHT, WE'RE JUST

ASKING -- THIS IS A PROCESS.

WE WENT TO THE FINANCE SUBCOMMITTEE FIRST.

TONIGHT WE'RE HERE TO ASK YOU TO, YOU KNOW, GIVE US THE OPPORTUNITY TO GO OUT AND GET A SURVEY AS WELL AS DO AN ENGINEER'S REPORT AND COME BACK TO YOU WITH A LOT OF INFORMATION.

AND JUST ALSO ONE OTHER THING TO CLARIFY, WHEN THEY DID MEASURE W, THEY DID A COMPLETE AERIAL SURVEY.

THANK YOU.

>> Mayor Pro Tem Franklin: THANK YOU.

NO MORE QUESTIONS.

>> Mayor Montgomery: COUNCILMEMBER LESSER.

>> Councilmember Lesser: MAYOR PRO TEM FRANKLIN ASKED A BIT ABOUT THE INFRASTRUCTURE THAT IS BEING INCORPORATED BY THE CITY. I THINK IT MIGHT BE HELPFUL JUST TO CONFIRM WHAT SOME OF THE FEDERAL AND COUNTY OBLIGATIONS THAT ARE THAT HAVE MADE THIS INVESTMENT MANDATED AND REQUIRED. IT ISN'T JUST A STRAIGHT-LINE INFLATIONARY CURVE THAT WE'RE DEALING WITH IN TERMS OF RISING PRICES.

WE'VE BEEN OBLIGATED AS I UNDERSTAND IT TO INCORPORATE MAJOR INFRASTRUCTURE BECAUSE WE ARE AT THE END OF THE LINE AND WE DISCHARGE INTO THE OCEAN.

CAN YOU EXPLAIN THAT AS AN OVERVIEW?

AND I RECOGNIZE THERE WILL BE MORE INFORMATION THAT IS PRESENTED WHEN STAFF COMES BACK WITH THE REPORT.

>> HAPPY TO.

SO REALLY THIS ORIGINATES WITH THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT UNDER THE CLEAN WATER ACT.

IT WAS PASSED MANY YEARS AGO.

LOCALLY THAT'S ADMINISTERED -- STATEWIDE IT'S BY THE STATE WATER BOARD.

AND REGIONALLY IN LOS ANGELES COUNTY WE HAVE THE LOS ANGELES REGIONAL QUALITY BOARD.

REALLY THE AIM OF THIS IS TO MAKE SURE THAT THE SURFACE WATERS OF AMERICA ARE NOT POLLUTED.

AS YOU MENTIONED, WE'RE AT THE FRONT DOOR TO THE BEACH AND 85% OF ALL OF THE STORMWATER IN THE CITY GOES DIRECTLY INTO THE SANTA MONICA BAY VERY QUICKLY.

THE OTHER 15% DISCHARGES INTO THE CHANNEL WHICH TAKES A LONGER ROUTE BUT ULTIMATELY REACHES THE OCEAN AS WELL.

AND SO I THINK ALL OF US HERE AND MEMBERS OF THE COMMUNITY WILL

REMEMBER YEARS AND YEARS AGO WHEN THERE WAS ALWAYS ALERTS IN THE SANTA MONICA BAY, DON'T GO INTO THE WATER TODAY. AND FORTUNATELY WE DON'T HAVE THOSE NEARLY AS FREQUENT. AND A LOT OF THAT IS DUE TO THESE REGULATIONS THAT HAVE BEEN IMPOSED ON LOCAL AGENCIES FOR GOOD REASON.

AND SO AS OUR PART HERE IN MANHATTAN BEACH, WE ARE PART OF THE BEACH CITIES ENHANCED WATERSHED MANAGEMENT PLAN OR EWMP. WE'VE PARTNERED WITH HERMOSA BEACH, REDONDO, TORRANCE TO MEET OUR REGIONAL OBLIGATIONS.

WE RECOGNIZE WE'RE NOT IN THIS ALONE.

AND NOT ONE CITY OR TOWN CAN MAKE A DIFFERENCE.

IT TAKES EVERYONE TO DO THIS.

AND SO WE REALIZE THERE'S ECONOMIES OF SCALE THAT WE CAN GAIN AND BE BETTER BENEFIT% THE REGION WITH MORE REGIONAL PROJECTS AND APPROACH RATHER THAN EVERY CITY DOING THEIR OWN THING. SO WITH THAT EWMP, WE'VE GOT -- I THINK FOR THE ENTIRE REGION WITH ALL OF THE AGENCIES THAT I MENTIONED, WELL OVER \$100 MILLION WORTH OF PROJECTS WE'RE ALL TRYING TO COMPLETE. IN MANHATTAN BEACH WE'VE GOT -- I THINK THE LAST ESTIMATE I'VE SEEN IN A STAFF REPORT IS UPWARDS OF \$67 MILLION OF OBLIGATIONS AND WE'RE WELL ON OUR WAY TO ACCOMPLISH THAT.

OUR SOLUTIONS BIG PICTURE ARE TO -- AND OUR CORNERSTONE PROJECT WHICH I MENTIONED BEFORE IS THE 28<sup>th</sup> STREET INFILTRATION PROJECT AND THAT WILL TAKE THE PARKING LOT OF BRUCE'S PIECE. YOU'RE GOING TO HAVE A SERIES OF DRY WELLS IN THERE AND REROUTE SOME OF THE STORMWATER DRAIN LINES TO DISCHARGE INTO THE UNDERGROUND WELLS AND THAT WATER GOES INTO THE SOIL RATHER THAN INTO THE BAY.

WE'RE WELL ON OUR WAY TO DO THAT.

WE'VE GOT GRANT FUNDS TO COMPLETE THAT AND THOSE GRANTS TOTAL ABOUT \$30 MILLION.

AND THAT'S GOING TO TAKE CARE OF A LOT OF OUR NEEDS.

WE'VE GOT A PARTNERSHIP WITH TORRANCE TO DO SOME GREEN STREETS PROJECTS ON THE PERIMETER OF OUR CITY AND THAT'S GOING TO MAKE SURE THAT WE'VE GOT MORE IMPERVIOUS SURFACES THAT WHEN THE RAINS DO COME THAT WATER CAN PERCOLATE INTO THE GROUND.

AND THEN WE HAVE SIGNIFICANT OBLIGATION TO DEAL WITH RUNOFF INTO THE CHANNEL.

SO THE REGION'S MAJOR PROJECT THAT'S CURRENTLY BEING WORKED ON RIGHT NOW IS AT THE PARK.

WE ARE ON RECORD TO SUPPORTING THAT.

WE DON'T HAVE ANY DIRECT CONTRIBUTIONS YET THAT WE NEED TO MAKE BUT THERE ARE OTHER PROJECTS THAT WE HAVE TO DO TO MAKE SURE THAT -- BECAUSE WE'RE UPSTREAM OF THAT PORTION OF THE CHANNEL, THAT WE'RE TAKING CARE OF OUR BUSINESS.

AND THAT THE COST TO ADDRESS THAT IS LIKELY TO BE IN THE MILLIONS OF DOLLARS.

WE HAVE SOME YEARS THAT WE'RE OBLIGATED TO HAVE THAT PROJECT

SPECIFICALLY COMPLETED.

WE'RE IN THE BEGINNING STAGES OF FIGURING OUT HOW TO DO THAT. THOSE ARE ALL REAL REGULATORY-MANDATED PROJECTS THAT WE'RE DOING.

THESE ARE PROJECTS THAT WE REALLY HAVE EXCELLENT CONSULTANTS THAT KNOW THIS ASPECT OF THE BUSINESS.

THEY'VE HELPED US DESIGN THE PROJECTS.

AND THAT'S ALL ON THE REGULATORY SIDE.

LOCALLY QUITE FRANKLY WE HAVE FLOODING ISSUES AT TIMES. WE'RE SPENDING TENS OF MILLIONS OF DOLLARS TO DEAL WITH REGULATORY ISSUES.

BUT WE'RE HOPING TO SPEND MILLIONS OF DOLLARS IN THE COMING YEARS DEAL WITH LOCAL FLOODING ISSUES TO MAKE SURE THAT WE DON'T HAVE PUBLIC SAFETY ISSUES AND WE DON'T HAVE LIFE AND PROPERTY ISSUES.

>> Councilmember Lesser: THANK YOU.

>> Mayor Montgomery: COUNCILMEMBER HOWORTH.

>> Councilmember Howorth: WHEN YOU WERE TALKING ABOUT THE GREEN STREETS PROJECTS IN CONJUNCTION WITH TORRANCE DID YOU MEAN PERMEABLE RATHER THAN IMPERVIOUS.

>> PERMEABLE, NOT IMPERVIOUS.

>> Councilmember Howorth: THANK YOU.

AND I BELIEVE TO MAYOR PRO TEM FRANKLIN'S QUESTION WHAT IF SOME RESIDENT REPLACES THEIR GRASS WITH BRICK, WE DO HAVE CODES -- THIS MAY BE FOR DIRECTOR MIZAKHANIAN SAYING YOU HAVE TO HAVE A PERCENTAGE OF YOUR PROPERTY.

YOU CAN'T HAVE IMPERVIOUS PAVEMENT, I BELIEVE.

JUST A YES OR NO.

BECAUSE -- YEAH.

>> RESIDENTS HAVE A 30% LANDSCAPING REQUIREMENT.

>> Councilmember Howorth: IT CAN'T BE ALL BRICK OR CEMENT. AND IF YOU DID IT PAST THE MEASURE W ANALYSIS, THAT'S WHERE YOU'LL BE COMPARING THAT DATA WITH NEW PERMITS TO SEE IF THE AMOUNT IS THE SAME, I BELIEVE.

SO JUST A CLARIFICATION.

>> Mayor Montgomery: THANK YOU FOR THAT.

ANYBODY ELSE HAVE QUESTIONS?

SEEING NONE, OPEN UP PUBLIC COMMENT.

ANYONE HERE TO TALK ABOUT INCREASE IN STORMWATER ASSESSMENTS,

THE THEME FOR TONIGHT SO FAR.

SEEING NONE, CAN WE GO TO ZOOM, PLEASE, MARTHA.

SEEING NONE WE'LL CLOSE PUBLIC COMMENT.

COUNCIL.

I'LL START US OFF.

I'LL EVEN GO FIRST.

THE FACT THAT ANYONE WOULD COME AND TELL YOU THAT YOU'RE GOING TO SPEND \$11.4 MILLION ON SOMETHING THAT HASN'T BEEN RAISED IN FEES SINCE 1996 SHOULD SCARE EVERYONE IN THE ROOM, EVERYONE AT HOME WATCHING THIS, THEY'RE BLOWING MONEY AT THE GENERAL FUND. IF YOU LOOK AT THE NUMBERS YOU'RE GOING TO RUN DRY AND EAT INTO YOUR RESERVES IN SIX YEARS, THAT SHOULD GET EVERYONE CONCERNED. I MOTION TO COUNCILMEMBER LESSER'S COMMENT, THIS IS A NEED. WE CANNOT RELY ON GRANTS.

WE HAVE NO WAY TO CATCH UP RELYING ON GRANTS ASSUMING WE WIN. AND WE NEVER DO.

THIS IS THE RIGHT THING TO DO AT THE RIGHT TIME.

I PUT A MOTION THERE.

COUNCILMEMBER NAPOLITANO.

>> Councilmember Napolitano: I WOULD GO FURTHER TO SAY IT IS A MUST.

IT'S UNSUSTAINABLE.

IT WILL EAT INTO OTHER SERVICES, POLICE, FIRE, PARKS AND RECREATION, ALL OF THOSE THINGS THAT WE HOLD DEAR AND WANT MORE OF, WE WILL HAVE LESS IF WE DO NOT ADJUST THIS PICTURE AND RIGHT THIS SHIP.

BECAUSE OUR BUDGET DISCUSSIONS HAVE SHOWN THAT, THE LINES SHOW THAT RIGHT THERE.

AND WE REALLY NEED TO MAKE THE CASE TO FOLKS.

IT'S NOT -- PEOPLE STILL HAVE TO VOTE FOR IT AND WE HAVE TO MAKE THE CASE OUT THERE FOR THEM AND EDUCATE FOLKS AS TO WHY THIS IS NECESSARY AS COUNCILMEMBER LESSER SAID EARLIER, NOBODY WANT TO PAY MORE FOR THESE TYPES OF SERVICES BUT THIS IS PART OF THE INVISIBLE INFRASTRUCTURE THAT WE RELY ON.

POLL AFTER POLL, SURVEY AFTER SURVEY THAT WE SURVEY OUR RESIDENTS, STATISTICALLY VALID, THEY SHOW THAT CLEAN OCEAN IS AT THE TOP OF WHAT THEY LOOK FOR WHEN LIVING HERE IN MANHATTAN BEACH.

THIS WILL HELP ENSURE THAT.

IT WILL HELP ENSURE THAT WE ADDRESS THE FLOODING ISSUES AROUND TOWN AND WITH CLIMATE CHANGE IT'S NEEDED NOW MORE THAN EVER. AND IT'S JUST UNSUSTAINABLE IN THE MODEL THAT WE HAVE. AND SO, YOU KNOW, IT'S STILL GOING TO BE AN ELECTION. WE STILL NEED TO MAKE THE CASE AND WE'RE GOING TO HAVE TO DO THAT AND DO IT RIGHT.

THANK YOU, YOUR HONOR.

>> Mayor Montgomery: WELL SAID.

DEFINITELY A MUST.

COUNCILMEMBER HOWORTH.

>> Councilmember Howorth: IN ADDITION TO SUPPORTING EVERYTHING THAT PEOPLE HAVE SAID POLL AFTER POLL SAYS THAT, YOU KNOW, OUR PEOPLE VALUE CLEAN OCEAN WATER.

THAT'S REALLY CLEAR.

WE ARE A COASTAL COMMUNITY.

I WANT TO AMPLIFY THOSE COMMENTS AND ADD MY SUPPORT.

>> Mayor Montgomery: WELL DONE.

COUNCILMEMBER LESSER.

>> Councilmember Lesser: MY COLLEAGUES HAVE SAID MOSTLY EVERYTHING I WANT TO SAY AND VERY ELOOUENTLY.

THE COMMENT I WOULD MAKE IS I THINK WE NEED TO MAKE SURE THAT OUR RESIDENTS UNDERSTAND THESE ARE NOT FEEL-GOOD MEASURES. IT'S BECAUSE WE HAVE BEEN MANDATED TO TAKE THESE STEPS TO UPGRADE OUR INFRASTRUCTURE AND THESE ARE ACTUAL COSTS AND PROJECTED CONTINUING COSTS AND RIGHT NOW WE ARE ONLY GETTING REVENUE TO PAY FOR IT BASED ON THE RATES THAT WERE SET IN STONE IN 1996.

WE HAVE TO, AS THE MAYOR SAID, UNDERTAKE THE DIFFICULT TASK OF RAISING SUFFICIENT REVENUE TO FULFILL OUR MANDATES.

ONE CAN BE FRUSTRATED WITH THE FACT THAT THESE ARE IN A SENSE UNFUNDED MANDATES EXCEPT FOR SOME OF THE GRANTS THAT THE PUBLIC WORKS DIRECTOR INDICATED.

BUT WE HAVE FAR MORE OBLIGATIONS THAT WE'RE WILLING TO SATISFY WITH THE GRANTS AND I WILL BE SUPPORTING THE MOTION BECAUSE OF THAT.

MAYOR PRO TEM FRANKLIN.

>> Mayor Pro Tem Franklin: I WANT TO ECHO EVERYTHING THAT'S BEEN SAID HERE.

AND WE ALL KNOW THAT IT'S REALLY THE JEWEL OF MANHATTAN BEACH IS OUR OCEAN.

EVEN THOUGH WE'RE TWO MILES LONG OF THE OCEAN, WE HAVE AN OBLIGATION TO DELIVER CLEAN WATER OR AS CLEAN AS POSSIBLE BACK INTO THE OCEAN.

I ASKED THE QUESTION ABOUT INFRASTRUCTURE BECAUSE THAT'S CAPTURING RUNOFF AND WE EVEN MAKE A FURTHER COMMITMENT BEFORE THAT IN THAT WE SWEEP THE STREETS EVERY WEEK.

I BELIEVE THE STATE ONLY REQUIRES THAT YOU DO IT ONCE A MONTH. BUT WE'VE MADE THE COMMITMENT TO SPEND THE MONEY TO DO THAT FOUR TIMES A MONTH SO THAT THE AMOUNT OF MATERIAL THAT GOES INTO THE STORMWATER DRAINS IS REDUCED TO BEGIN WITH.

SO THAT'S, THAT'S OUR OBLIGATION.

WE ENJOY IT.

MANY OF US GO IN THAT WATER AND WE WANT TO MAKE SURE IT'S AS CLEAN AS POSSIBLE AND CERTAINLY FOR THE VISITORS THAT ARE COMING.

YOU KNOW, YOU CAN HEAR DOWN THE SIDEWALK, YOU HEAR THIS THUMP THUMP THUMP AND IT'S TOURISTS, VISITORS WHO ARE VISITING OUR BEACH THEY HEAR SO MUCH ABOUT IT.

THEY'VE GOT A FIVE-HOUR LAYOVER OR THREE-HOUR LAYOVER AT L.A.X. AND THEY'RE COMING HERE, HAULING THEIR LUGGAGE BEHIND THEM TO SEE THE BEACH.

TO GO ON THE PIER. WE OWE IT TO THEM AS WELL. THANK YOU. >> Mayor Montgomery: THANK YOU FOR THAT.

AS YOU'RE AWARE OUR I.T. DIRECTOR IS LEAVING US AT THE END OF

THE MONTH, JUNE 2<sup>nd</sup> AND WE'D LIKE TO BRING BACK IN PATRICK GRIFFIN FOR THIS POSITION.

HE WAS PREVIOUSLY INTERIM DIRECTOR BEFORE, BEFORE TERRY CAME ON BOARD.

SO HE'S VERY EXPERIENCED WITH OUR CITY.

HE KNOWS STAFF.

WE WOULD BE ABLE TO COME RIGHT IN.

IT WOULD BE A SEAMLESS TRANSITION.

>> Mayor Montgomery: WELL SAID.

THANK YOU VERY MUCH.

COUNCIL, QUESTIONS?

PUBLIC COMMENT.

NO ONE ON ZOOM EITHER?

>> Mayor Montgomery: ALL RIGHT.

>> I'M NOT SURE IF I NEED TO ANNOUNCE THE SALARY BUT I'LL ANNOUNCE THAT REAL QUICK.

>> AND WE'RE STARTING RECRUITMENT FOR TERRY'S REPLACEMENT IMMEDIATELY.

>> YOU SHOULD SEE THAT OPEN UP ON THURSDAY.

>> Mayor Montgomery: COUNCIL, I HAVE A FIRST BY COUNCILMEMBER NAPOLITANO AND A SECOND BY COUNCILMEMBER HOWORTH AND WE'LL DO A ROLL CALL, PLEASE.

I'M BACK.

MY PLAN WAS TO START BACK UP WHERE I LEFT THE BUDGET COMMISSION MEETING ON THE 9<sup>th</sup>.

LET ME FLIP FORWARD TO THAT SLIDE.

>> Councilmember Napolitano: YOUR HONOR.

>> Mayor Montgomery: SURE, COUNCILMEMBER NAPOLITANO.

>> Councilmember Napolitano: WE'VE COVERED THIS.

DO WE NEED TO GO THROUGH THIS AGAIN?

>> Mayor Montgomery: I DON'T.

I'M MAKING SURE THAT NO ONE ELSE HAS ANY QUESTIONS, PUBLIC COMMENT.

IF YOU HAVE NO QUESTIONS, DON'T PUSH THE BUTTON.

NOTHING HAS CHANGED SINCE YOUR DOCUMENT DATED MAY 8<sup>th</sup>, 2023.

THAT'S THE LATEST INFORMATION.

>> Mayor Montgomery: SO SEEING THAT, YES, COUNCILMEMBER HOWORTH,

YOU HAVE A QUESTION?

>> Councilmember Howorth: I HAVE A COMMENT.

>> Mayor Montgomery: COUNCILMEMBER HOWORTH.

>> Councilmember Howorth: THANK YOU, SIR.

IT'S NOT JUST HER ENTHUSIASM AND PASSION, I WANT TO SAY IT'S HER EXPERTISE ON DISPLAY LAST TIME.

YOUR THOROUGH KNOWLEDGE OF ALL OF THIS IS TRULY IMPRESSIVE AND I'M GRATEFUL YOU HAVE PRESENTED AS WELL AS YOU CAN.

>> Mayor Montgomery: WE'RE GOING TO COME BACK FOR COMMENTS.

>> Councilmember Howorth: I TOLD YOU IT WAS A COMMENT.

I WARNED YOU.

>> Councilmember Lesser: WERE THERE SPECIFIC ISSUES THAT YOU LOOKED INTO FOLLOWING SOME OF THE COUNCILMEMBER QUESTIONS AND COMMENTS THAT YOU WANTED TO REPORT BACK TO US TONIGHT? >> I COVERED THOSE LAST TIME, THE SPECIFIC QUESTIONS THAT CAME UP.

>> THEY'RE COMBINED ON THE AGENDA.

>> DIRECTOR CHARELIAN DOESN'T HAVE ANYTHING TO ADD AT THIS POINT.

>> Mayor Montgomery: THANK YOU BOTH FOR YOUR MOVE AND THE SECOND.

ANY QUESTIONS ON THE CIP AND/OR THE OPERATING BUDGET?

>> Councilmember Napolitano: NO QUESTIONS, YOUR HONOR.

>> Councilmember Lesser: NO QUESTIONS.

>> Mayor Montgomery: DO I HAVE TO OPEN THIS BACK UP FOR THE SECOND PART OF THE --

>> IT'S NOT LEGALLY REQUIRED.

YOU GAVE AN OPPORTUNITY FOR THE PUBLIC TO SPEAK ON BOTH ITEMS. YOU CAN ASK IF YOU WANT.

>> Mayor Montgomery: LET ME RESTATE MY QUESTION.

ANYONE IN THE PUBLIC ON A COMMENT ON EITHER THE CIP OR OPERATING BUDGET TONIGHT?

>> EXCUSE ME, MR. MAYOR.

THERE WAS ONE ISSUE OUTSTANDING ON THE BUDGET AND THAT WAS THE PARKING CITATION IF YOU OR COUNCIL WANTED TO PROCEED WITH THAT. >> Mayor Montgomery: YOU WANT TO ADDRESS THAT SO EVERYBODY AT HOME CAN UNDERSTAND WHAT WE'RE TALKING ABOUT?

>> SURE.

SO THE ONE ADDITIONAL ITEM IS PROPOSED REVENUE ENHANCEMENT TO INCREASE PARKING CITATIONS FROM 53 TO \$55 WHICH REMAINED UNCHANGED SINCE 2015.

THE AVERAGE OF THE TOP TEN CITIES SURVEYED WERE CLOSER TO \$58. EVEN WITH THE PROPOSED INCREASE IN MANHATTAN BEACH WE WOULD BE BELOW THAT ARCH.

THE ITEM WAS DISCUSSED AT THE APRIL 20<sup>th</sup> FINANCE SUBCOMMITTEE MEETING AND THE DISCUSSION WAS TO BRING IT FORTH TO CITY COUNCIL DURING THE BUDGET PRESENTATION.

THE INCREASE WOULD GENERATE ABOUT \$166,000 ANNUALLY FOR THE GENERAL FUND AND ABOUT \$800,000 FOR THE FIVE-YEAR FORECAST IN YEAR 27-28.

WE ALL SAW WHERE THAT'S HEADED.

\$15 OF EACH CITATION GOES TO THE COURTHOUSE.

WE PAY THEM ABOUT \$900,000 ANNUALLY.

ANY QUESTIONS, BE HAPPY TO ANSWER.

>> Mayor Montgomery: NOW WE HAVE QUESTIONS.

COUNCILMEMBER HOWORTH.

QUESTIONS OR COMMENTS?

>> Councilmember Howorth: WE CAN DO EITHER.

I HAVE TO DO PUBLIC COMMENT AGAIN BECAUSE HE CAME AND SPOKE. >> Councilmember Howorth: I HAVE A QUESTION ABOUT THE MOTION SO I CAN WAIT FOR PUBLIC COMMENT.

>> Mayor Montgomery: COUNCILMEMBER NAPOLITANO?

>> Councilmember Napolitano: I'LL WAIT FOR PUBLIC COMMENT.

>> Councilmember Lesser: COMMENTS AS WELL.

>> Mayor Montgomery: I'LL KNOCK THESE OUT AND WE'RE GOING TO COME BACK.

COUNCILMEMBER NAPOLITANO.

>> Councilmember Napolitano: LOOK, I'M FIRST TO SPEAK.

THANK YOU.

AND I'M NOT TRYING TO SHORTCUT THIS BY ANY MEANS.

THIS SOUR MOST IMPORTANT DOCUMENT AND UP WITH OF THE MOST IMPORTANT DECISIONS WE MAKE ON A YEARLY BASIS REGARDING BUDGET AND CIP. AND I WANT TO ENSURE EVERYONE THAT IT'S BEEN THOROUGHLY VETTED BY COUNCIL THROUGH A COUPLE OF MEETINGS NOW.

UNFORTUNATELY WE DON'T HAVE AN OVERWHELMING PARTICIPATION RATE FROM THE PUBLIC ON THIS BUT WE HAVE HEARD FROM A NUMBER OF INDIVIDUALS.

AND I THINK IT'S ALSO THINGS THAT WE KEEP IN MIND THROUGHOUT THE YEAR FROM THE THINGS WE HEAR AS PRIORITIES AND EVERYTHING ELSE. >> Mayor Montgomery: UNDERSTOOD. THANK YOU. COUNCILMEMBER HOWORTH.

>> Councilmember Howorth: THANK YOU.

>> Councilmember Napolitano: I'M SORRY.

ONE MORE COMMENT.

WITH THAT, AGAIN, IN SPEAKING ABOUT PERFORMATIVE THINGS, I DON'T SEE THAT WE NEED ANOTHER STUDY SESSION ON THIS GIVEN THE LEVEL OF PARTICIPATION WE'VE HAD SO FAR.

THAT'S MY ONLY ADDITIONAL COMMENT.

>> Mayor Montgomery: THANK YOU.

COUNCILMEMBER HOWORTH.

>> Councilmember Howorth: THAT WAS GOING TO BE MY QUESTION AND COMMENT.

RIGHT NOW ONE OF THE THINGS THAT WE'RE FACED WITH ON THE AGENDA IS WE COULD YOU KNOW HAVE ANOTHER STUDY SESSION NEXT TUESDAY. AND I THINK IF WE HAD ALL COME HERE WITH ADDITIONAL QUESTIONS AND MAYBE ADDITIONS OR SUBTRACTIONS TO THE BUDGET, YOU KNOW, THEN IT WOULD BE APPROPRIATE TO COME BACK AGAIN NEXT WEEK. SO I JUST WANTED TO GET SOME CLARITY AND STILL NEED TO KNOW IF WE'RE COMING BACK NEXT TUESDAY FROM THE REST OF MY COLLEAGUES. >> Mayor Montgomery: UNDERSTOOD.

I PROMISE WE'LL ADDRESS THAT.

COUNCILMEMBER LESSER.

>> Councilmember Lesser: I AGREE WITH EVERYTHING MY TWO COLLEAGUES HAVE SAID.

MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC THAT MIGHT BE WATCHING THIS SHOULD UNDERSTAND THAT WE'RE NOT SEEKING TO RUSH THIS THROUGH. IT HAS BEEN REMARKABLE TO ME OVER THE YEARS I'VE HAD THE PRIVILEGE OF SERVING ON COUNCIL WHEN WE HAVE ONE OF THE LARGEST ITEMS, APPROVING THE BUDGET AND APPROVING THE CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECT THAT VERY FEW IF ANY SHOW UP.

I THINK I AND ALL OF MY COLLEAGUES HAVE STUDIED THE BUDGET AND APPRECIATE THE PROFESSIONALISM AND THOROUGHNESS OF CITY STAFF IN PREPARING THE BUDGET TO DATE.

THAT'S WHY I MADE A MOTION TO APPROVE IT.

AGREE WITH MY COLLEAGUES' COMMENTS ABOUT CITATIONS AT THIS TIME, ESPECIALLY AT A POINT WHERE WE'RE PROPOSING TO RAISE FEES. I THINK WE WANT TO BE SENSITIVE TO THOSE THAT FEEL THAT THE CITY

IS GOING AFTER EVERY LAST NICKEL WHEN IN FACT THERE IS CERTAINLY JUSTIFICATION FOR IT.

I WOULD RATHER DEFER IT.

I DON'T THINK IT'S APPROPRIATE AT THIS TIME.

AND I ALSO AGREE WITH THE PROPOSAL THAT WE NOT HAVE A STUDY SESSION NEXT WEEK AND WAIT FOR THIS BUDGET TO COME BACK ON THE 6<sup>th</sup> UNLESS ANY OF MY COLLEAGUES HAVE ANY ISSUES.

NOW WOULD BE THE TIME TO RAISE THEM SO CITY STAFF HAS A CHANCE TO ADDRESS THEM.

I'VE MADE THE MOTION TO MOVE FORWARD AND THE EXACT SPECIFIC IS TO, LET'S SEE, RECEIVE THE SUPPORT, PROVIDE DIRECTION.

I GUESS THAT WOULD BE THEN THE DIRECTION.

>> Mayor Montgomery: THANK YOU FOR THAT.

MAYOR PRO TEM FRANKLIN.

>> Mayor Pro Tem Franklin: YES, THANK YOU.

I WANT TO BE ON RECORD TO NOT SUPPORT THE INCREASE IN THE

PARKING TICKETS.

IF THEY ARE DESIGNED TO MAKE PEOPLE NOT DO IT AGAIN, \$3 ISN'T GOING TO MAKE THAT MUCH OF A DIFFERENCE.

AND I ALSO WANT TO BE BELOW BEVERLY HILLS AND SANTA MONICA AND ALL OF THAT.

SO THANK YOU.

>> Mayor Montgomery: YOU'RE WELCOME.

SO STAFF AND CITY ATTORNEY BARROW, MAKE IT CLEAR THAT THE

PROPOSAL TO RAISE CITATION FEES DENIED.

THE REST OF THE BUDGET APPEARS ON SCHEDULE.

WE WILL NOT, I REPEAT, NOT HAVE ANOTHER BUDGET STUDY SESSION. WE'LL WAIT FOR THE FULL ITEM TO COME BACK ON JUNE 6<sup>th</sup>.

NOTHING PAST THAT POINT.

AND WE HAVE A MOTION BY COUNCILMEMBER LESSER AND A SECOND BY COUNCILMEMBER NAPOLITANO.

WITH THAT WE'LL DO A ROLL CALL VOTE, PLEASE.

>> MOTION PASSES 5-0.

>> Mayor Montgomery: WELL DONE.

THANK YOU BOTH.

MAYOR PRO TEM FRANKLIN HAS ONE, FIRST COUNCILMEMBER LESSER. >> Councilmember Lesser: I TRAVELED OUTSIDE THE CITY LIMIT TO

THE CITY OF EL SEGUNDO I WANT TO REPORT FOR THE 2023 WATER ISSUES FORUM.

I'M THE COUNCIL LIAISON TO THE WATER DISTRICT.

IT WAS A SUBSTANTIVE SECTION, INCLUDING THE CHIEF ENGINEER OF THE WATER DISTRICT, THE GENERAL MANAGER OF THE WATER REPLENISHMENT DISTRICT, THE PLANT MANAGER.

THE HIGH-LEVEL TOP-LINE TAKEAWAYS ARE THAT THE RECENT STORMS ARE OBVIOUSLY MADE A HUGE DIFFERENCE IN OUR WATER SUPPLY FOR THIS YEAR.

BUT BECAUSE CALIFORNIA IS VULNERABLE TO EXTREME INVARIABLE WEATHER BECAUSE OF CLIMATE CHANGE, WE HAVE A SHORT RELIEF BUT IN FACT THE LONG TERM FOR A WATER SUPPLY IS STILL QUESTIONABLE. THE COLORADO RIVER WHICH SUPPLIES SO MUCH OF OUR REGION WITH ITS WATER IS BEING CUT BACK AND THERE ARE OBVIOUSLY INCREASING DEMANDS.

AS A RESULT THE TAKEAWAY IS WATER EFFICIENCY STILL NEEDS TO BE A WAY OF LIFE IN SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA.

I CAN TALK FURTHER BUT I PRESUME THOSE ARE THE HIGHLIGHTS THAT PEOPLE NEED TO HEAR.

>> Mayor Montgomery: THANK YOU.

THAT'S GOOD.

MAYOR PRO TEM FRANKLIN, TALK ABOUT SCAG.

>> Mayor Pro Tem Franklin: ALONG WITH MAYOR MONTGOMERY WE ATTENDED THE SCAG CONFERENCE IN PALM DESERT LAST WEEK. >> Mayor Montgomery: YES.

>> Mayor Pro Tem Franklin: IT WAS MY FIRST SCAG CONFERENCE. I WANTED TO SEE -- WE HEAR SO MUCH ABOUT THEM, WHAT THEY DO, HOW

THEY GIVE US OUR HOUSING NUMBERS AND HOW THEY WORK.

IT WAS A GOOD INTRODUCTION.

MET DURING LUNCH AND BREAKOUT SESSIONS WITH PEOPLE, YOU KNOW, WITH COLLEAGUES IN OTHER CITIES AND DISCUSSED HOMELESSNESS, YOU KNOW, EVS, ELECTRONIC VEHICLES, CHARGING STATIONS.

A LOT OF THE SAME KIND OF CHALLENGES THAT WE'RE ALL FACING. SOME OF THEM WANT OUR @BIKE SAFETY PROGRAM WHICH I THINK WE CAN, YOU KNOW, WE CAN GO AHEAD AND PROVIDE FOR THEM.

INTERESTING WAS THE EV -- WHAT'S THAT EXPRESSION, EV, ANXIETY OR EV CHARGING ANXIETY?

>> RANGE ANXIETY.

>> Mayor Pro Tem Franklin: RANGE ANXIETY, THANK YOU VERY MUCH. THAT POPPED UP A LOT DURING THE DISCUSSIONS AND IT'S TRUE AND IT'S VERY REAL.

HOPEFULLY THE STATE CAN PROVIDE SOME DIRECTION AND MONEY AND FINANCING AND SO CAN THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT BECAUSE, YOU KNOW, IT'S GOING TO HINDER THE ADOPTION OF EVS UNTIL THAT CAN BE ADDRESSED.

AND ADDRESSED EFFICIENTLY AND FAIRLY.

THANK YOU.

>> Mayor Montgomery: WELL DONE. I COULD SAY, SCOGS, SOUTHERN

CALIFORNIA ASSOCIATION OF GOVERNMENT.

IF YOU'RE ELECTED, THE STAFF WAIVES ADMINISTRATION FEES WHICH IS GOOD FOR ALL OF US.

IT'S IMPORTANT FOR US TO ATTEND.

YES, WE DID OFFER MAYOR PRO TEM FRANKLIN'S SERVICES TO ANY CITIES IN CALIFORNIA eBIKE SAFETY.

THAT WAS THE HIGHLIGHT OF IT.

THE ONLY PIECE THAT WE DIDN'T TALK ABOUT WAS THE TRANSIT, WHAT THEY'RE SEEING IN THE GOVERNOR'S PLAN, THE GOVERNOR'S THEORY IS WE'LL HAVE CHARGERS UP AND DOWN THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA WITH RAPID PULL UP AND GO.

THAT WILL NOT HAPPEN IN THE NEXT FIVE YEARS.

THEY CANNOT BUILD CHARGERS FAST ENOUGH.

THOSE OF YOU WONDERING DRIVING SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA ALMOST WITHOUT A STOP ALL THE WAY THROUGH, CANNOT DO IT YET. THE NEXT PROJECTIONS ARE FIVE YEARS BEFORE THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA WILL HAVE A COMPLETE EV CHARGING STATION ALONG THE HIGHWAYS GOING FORWARD.

THAT WAS THE REPORTS FOR AB1234.

WE'LL MOVE ON TO ITEM 17, REQUEST FOR COUNCILMEMBER HOWORTH AND COUNCILMEMBER LESSER TO DISCUSS ELECTRIC BIKE SAFETY.

COUNCILMEMBER HOWORTH.

>> Councilmember Howorth: THANK YOU, MR. MAYOR.

SO I WOULD LIKE TO GET SUPPORT TO BRING THIS BACK.

AND WHAT I'M ENVISIONING -- SO AS YOU'VE MENTIONED AND WE'VE ALL MENTIONED --

>> Councilmember Napolitano: I SUPPORT IT.

THAT'S THREE.

>> Councilmember Howorth: GREAT.

I DO WANT TO GIVE STAFF -- I DO WANT TO GIVE A LITTLE BIT OF HEAD'S UP TO WHAT I WANT.

>> Mayor Montgomery: IS SHE ALLOWED TO EXPAND?

>> Councilmember Howorth: NOW I CAN EXPAND.

>> YES, SHE CAN.

RIGHT ON, COUNCILMEMBER HOWORTH.

>> Councilmember Howorth: OKAY.

I WANT TO KNOW IF THERE'S BEEN ANY CHANGES OR IF THERE'S ANY PROGRAMS THAT OTHER CITIES IN CALIFORNIA MIGHT BE DOING BEYOND THE SAFETY, WHICH I DO THINK IS FANTASTIC THAT WE'VE DONE WITH MAYOR PRO TEM FRANKLIN'S LEADERSHIP.

BUT THINGS LIKE, YOU KNOW, IS THERE A CERTIFICATE PROGRAM THAT IF YOU'RE 13 TO 15 YOU COMPLETE SO YOU UNDERSTAND THE RULES OF THE ROAD OR WHATEVER IT IS, WHATEVER KIND OF JURISDICTION WE MIGHT HAVE, YOU KNOW, ARE THERE DIFFERENT PENALTIES WE CAN GIVE. WHAT ARE THE ENFORCEMENT RULES AND WHAT CAN WE DO IN ADDITION TO WHAT WE'RE DOING.

JUST BECAUSE EVERYBODY SEEMS TO BE WEARING A HELMET NOW, WHICH IS GOOD.

KEEP IT UP.

THEY ARE STILL CUTTING AROUND CORNERS AND NOT UNDERSTANDING HOW TRAFFIC WORKS AND STOP SIGNS AND THINGS LIKE THAT.

SO I WANT TO UNDERSTAND IF THERE'S ANYTHING ELSE WE COULD DO, IF WE'RE ALLOWED TO DO AND WE MAY NOT WANT TO DO IT.

BUT I WANT TO UNDERSTAND WHAT THAT IS.

HE IS STILL SUPPORTING IT.

I KNOW.

>> Mayor Montgomery: YOU'RE GOOD?

DIRECTION GIVEN?

MAYOR PRO TEM FRANKLIN, ARE YOU TALKING ABOUT SOMETHING ELSE?

IT'S GOING TO BE ABOUT THIS.

>> Mayor Montgomery: ALL RIGHT.

>> Mayor Pro Tem Franklin: I APPRECIATE MY COLLEAGUES BRINGING THIS TO COUNCIL.

A YEAR AGO I SAID HOW DO YOU EXPECT CHILDREN TO FOLLOW THE RULES OF THE ROAD IF THEY DON'T KNOW THE RULES OF THE ROAD. WELL, WE'VE TAUGHT THEN AND THEY'RE LEARNING AND PROBABLY MOST

OF THEM ARE LEARNING WELL.

SO I WOULD LIKE TO SEE THIS EXAMINATION OF INCREASED ENFORCEMENT AT THE TIME WHEN WE WERE PUTTING THE MATERIALS TOGETHER I HAD SEVERAL EXTENSIVE INTERVIEWS WITH THE POLICE DEPARTMENT, LIKE GIVING YOUR PRIORITIES AND WE DISCUSSED ENFORCEMENT, WORKING WITH THROUGH BEACH CITIES HEALTH DISTRICT AND THEIR REMEDIATION SERVICES AND ALSO IMPOUNDING.

DIDN'T SEEM TO BE THAT PRACTICAL AT THAT TIME, AT LEAST THE POLICE DEPARTMENT HAS ENOUGH ON THEIR HANDS WHERE THEY HAVE -- THESE ARE EXPENSIVE MACHINES AND THEY DIDN'T WANT TO LOSE THEM OR DAMAGE THEM IN ANY WAY.

ABSOLUTELY LET'S TAKE A LOOK.

I CAN, YOU KNOW, GO WITH A CLEAR CONSCIOUS KNOWING THAT WE TAUGHT THEM, THEY KNOW THE RULES OF THE ROAD.

NOW WE GOT TO GET THEM TO FOLLOW IT.

THAT'S ENFORCEMENT.

>> Mayor Montgomery: MORE DIRECTION.

COUNCILMEMBER LESSER.

>> Councilmember Lesser: I WOULD ADD TO MY COLLEAGUES' COMMENTS, FOR ME, I'M INTERESTED IN WHAT THE REGULATORY ENVIRONMENT IS IN CALIFORNIA AS RELATES TO E-BIKES.

NOTWITHSTANDING THE WONDERFUL EFFORTS OUR POLICE DEPARTMENT IS TAKING ON AND MAYOR PRO TEM FRANKLIN, WE ALL SEE SOME OF THESE JUST, YOU KNOW, ASTONISHING SIGHTS OF PARTICULARLY KIDS ON E-BIKES.

I'VE READ THAT THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA HAVE ROLLED BACK THE ABILITY TO REGISTER BIKES.

WANT TO UNDERSTAND WHAT THAT'S ABOUT.

IN TERMS OF THE ABILITY FOR CITY TO REQUIRE ANY SORT OF

REGISTRATION OR ANY FURTHER STEPS IN THE REGULATORY ENVIRONMENT, WHAT IS WITHIN OUR DISCRETION, I GUESS WOULD BE THE QUESTION I HAVE.

SO THAT WOULD BE THE DIRECTION I WOULD BE INTERESTED IN UNLESS THERE'S OBJECTION.

>> Councilmember Howorth: THAT'S GOOD.

>> Mayor Montgomery: I THINK YOU HAVE PLANNED DIRECTION FROM THREE MEMBERS OF THE COUNCIL.

I WILL NOT ADD TO THAT.

>> I THINK WE HAVE CLEAR DIRECTION.

WE'LL REPORT BACK.

THANK YOU.

>> Mayor Montgomery: THANK YOU.

NEXT ITEM 18, COUNCILMEMBER LESSER AND COUNCILMEMBER NAPOLITANO TO DISCUSS THE BOARD OF BUILDING APPEALS.

WHO'S GOING TO TALK ON THAT FIRST.

>> Councilmember Lesser: IT SEEMS THAT WE HAVE SOME REALLY CAPABLE MEMBERS OF OUR BOARD AND BUILDING APPEALS AND THAT ARE EAGER TO DO MORE THAN JUST HAVE A TITLE BY THEIR NAME AND NEVER MEET.

MY UNDERSTANDING OVER THE YEARS AS PRIOR COUNCILS HAVE SOUGHT TO COME UP WITH WORK FOR THEM TO DO AND NOT JUST BUSY WORK BUT SUBSTANTIVE WORK WAS THERE IS A STATE REQUIREMENT TO HAVE THE BOARD OF BUILDING APPEALS AND THUS THERE'S JURISDICTION THAT THEY HAVE WHICH IS STATE MANDATED.

BUT TO THE EXTENT THAT WE AS A CITY WANT TO ADD CERTAIN TASKS WITH, CERTAIN ELEMENTS OF WHAT MIGHT OTHERWISE GO THROUGH THE PLANNING COMMISSION OR MIGHT INVOLVE PERHAPS, FOR EXAMPLE, WE'RE LOOKING AT OUR OUTDOOR DINING.

WHAT IS SOMETHING SUBSTANTIVE THAT THEY CAN DO TO CONTRIBUTE AND NOT JUST BUSY WORK THAT WE CAN ADD TO THEM.

BUT I DEFER TO COUNCILMEMBER NAPOLITANO.

>> Councilmember Napolitano: WE HAVE AN INCREDIBLE AMOUNT OF EXPERTISE ON THAT BOARD, ENGINEERS, BUILDERS AND MORE.

AND WE'RE WASTING THEM AWAY.

THEY'RE READY, WILLING AND ABLE TO SERVE BUT WE HAVEN'T GIVEN THEM ANYTHING TO DO AND THAT'S A LACK OF JUST AS YOU SAID, LEGAL REQUIREMENTS.

VERY FEW THINGS COME BEFORE THEM.

BUT PUT THAT EXPERTISE TO WORK.

HAVE THEM AS A TECHNICAL BOARD FOR REVIEW OF CIP PROJECTS OR REVIEW OF THE MANAGEMENT OF CIP PROJECTS, REVIEW OF OTHER THINGS IN THE CITY.

I WOULD, YOU KNOW, ASK STAFF TO COME BACK WITH SOME IDEAS HOW TO BRING THINGS TO THEM.

THEY COULD ALSO BE A REVIEW OF ANYTHING FROM THE SUSTAINABILITY TASK FORCE AS WELL.

THERE'S PLENTY OF STUFF THEY COULD WORK ON, AGAIN, PUTTING

DECADES OF GREAT EXPERIENCE IN ENGINEERING AND PROJECT MANAGEMENT TO WORK.

SO THAT'S THE IDEA AND WE'RE LOOKING FOR A THIRD.

>> Mayor Montgomery: THIRD.

>> Councilmember Napolitano: OKAY.

>> Mayor Montgomery: ANYONE ELSE?

I HAVE ONE.

>> Councilmember Napolitano: ARE YOU MOVING ON TO FUTURE AGENDA ITEMS.

>> Mayor Montgomery: YES.

I WAS AHEAD OF MYSELF THERE.

ITEM M.

AGENDA ITEMS.

ANYBODY ELSE HAS ITEMS GO FIRST.

SEEING NONE WE'LL MOVE TO ITEM N, CITY MANAGER REPORT.

>> YES.

I HAVE TWO ITEMS ACTUALLY.

GIVEN THE NATURE OF THE LENGTH OF THE MEETINGS TYPICALLY IN AUGUST DUE TO VACATIONS AND OUR DESIRE TO NOT PUT VERY WEIGHTY THINGS ON LATE IN THE SUMMER BECAUSE OF VACATIONS, I WOULD LIKE TO SEE IF THE COUNCIL IS OPEN TO GOING DARK ON THE SECOND MEETING IN AUGUST, AUGUST 15<sup>th</sup> AND NOT HOLD A MEETING.

>> Mayor Pro Tem Franklin: I'M GOOD WITH IT, JUST CHECKING MY CALENDAR TO BE SURE.

>> Councilmember Napolitano: HE'S CALLING HIS TRAVEL AGENT.

>> Mayor Montgomery: COUNCILMEMBER HOWORTH.

>> Councilmember Howorth: I'M JUST, YOU KNOW, GLAD COUNCILMEMBER NAPOLITANO CAN EVOLVE.

>> Mayor Montgomery: WITH MY COLLEAGUES, I AGREE.

I THINK WE'RE ABLE TO GET A MORE EFFICIENTLY WORK DONE AT AN EARLIER TIME THANKS TO SCHEDULING AND MOVING THINGS AROUND.

A LOT OF ITEMS PUT ON CONCEPT.

BEARING NO OTHER UNFORESEEN EMERGENCIES PRIOR TO 8/16, OR EMERGENCY AFTER 8/16 I AGREE WITH CAN DELAY AND PUSH OFF THAT MEETING AND TAKE A SUMMER BREAK 8/16.
